

Upgrading Our Schools Could Benefit Students and the UC Community

University City has a jewel at its center. No, I am not talking about a traffic-laden intersection with four gas stations. I am talking about the non-commercial center, which stretches from Radcliffe to Stadium on Governor Drive. It is wholly owned by the community, i.e., San Diego Unified and the City of San Diego.

We have Little League and soccer games, swimming, basketball and tennis, as well as summer concerts on the green. But if the school district and the city and the community were to partner, it could be the gathering place of the community for all ages every day of the week.

San Diego Unified's Vision 2020 calls for quality neighborhood schools to be an integral part of the community, serving the specific needs of the community, not simply to be located within the community.

Across the school district each school cluster will begin a master facilities planning process. Each site has developed its own modernization plans, but now we want to look at what is collectively needed across the five schools of the cluster to best meet UC's needs.

Before developing plans we need to dream. ImproveUC has begun raising funds for a permanent outdoor stage in Standley Park with acoustics, which could serve as a performance venue for all of the schools. Wouldn't it be nice to upgrade our pool so that UC High swim teams could have their competitions at home? What about a jogging track for our students that circles the park from Spreckels to Standley Middle School? It would also be a great place for residents to walk and jog in the evening. What could we do to calm traffic between our schools on Governor? Perhaps a roundabout or some other feature could make the area more walkable and inviting.

These are just a few ideas. San Diego Unified potentially has funds available through Propositions S and Z for developing some of these facilities. This would all require cooperation for joint use between the schools, the city and the community. It's time to begin the conversation in University City.


Making Necessary Reforms at the VA

Earlier this summer, Congress passed, and the President signed, legislation to make necessary reforms at the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). It was a rare point of true bipartisanship that will bring needed relief to our veterans and begin to address the failures at the VA. But this will not be the last piece to solving the puzzle – it will take a concerted effort and constant oversight to root out the culture of complacency and ineptitude that has left too many of our veterans in the dark.

The reforms include provisions to increase access to healthcare for veterans by allowing the VA to lease more facilities, fill staff shortages, and let veterans see non-VA providers in certain situations. It will also improve accountability, allow veterans to access in-state tuition rates at public universities, and expand counseling care for victims of sexual assault.

Washington press credited my effort to find a bipartisan solution, when I led a *motion to instruct* House leadership to stop bickering and agree with a Senate approved version of the bill, as a catalyst for this final agreement.

Now that this legislation has become law, Congress and community leaders must continue to provide aggressive oversight over the VA to ensure that our veterans receive the benefits and care that they were promised and deserve.



Trash Got Bashed in UC on Coastal Cleanup Day

Litter and debris in UC were running scared on Saturday, September 20th, from 9:00 am to noon. That's because 31 local residents, children, high school students, Moms/Dads, and seniors, participated in I Love A Clean San Diego's Coastal Cleanup Day. In UC, People for a Clean UC organized the event.

The neighborhood litter brigade collected 18 bags of trash,

weighing 151 lbs., and covered nine miles of major streets and roadways, including Governor Dr., Regents Rd., Genesee Ave., and Nobel Dr. The trash was deposited in a bin at Standley Park provided free of charge by Republic Services. It was later collected by the solid waste and recycling company.

There was one additional feature in Saturday's Coastal Cleanup activities: data collection. One member of each of the UC teams was provided with a data collection form to tally the number of litter items picked up. Not surprisingly, the most common item plucked off UC streets was cigarette butts, followed by plastic bottles, plastic lids and straws.

This data will be collected by I Love A Clean San Diego and forwarded to Ocean Conservancy, the organization that sponsors International Coastal Cleanup Day. Ocean Conservancy will analyze the data and publish its 2015 Ocean Trash Index Report.

Why were we collecting trash off UC streets if the end result is an ocean trash report? Because 80 percent of ocean pollution

comes from the land.

People for a Clean UC will hold their next neighborhood cleanup Sunday, October on 12th, from 7:30-9:00 am. We will meet and greet at Standley Park, 3585 Governor Dr., from 7:00-7:30 am. All cleanup materials are provided.



5 Easy Ways to Reduce Your Water & Sewer Bill

The months of October and November can be some of the hottest and driest months of the year making water conservation more important now than ever. The City of San Diego Water Conservation Team shares 24 ways to save hundreds of gallons at *www. WasteNoWater.org*, both indoors and outdoors. For example:

- Reduce grassy areas and use drought-tolerant plants such as succulents, rock garden plantings, native shrubs, trees and wildflowers in yards and gardens.
- Water your lawn and landscaping before dawn or after the sun sets when there's less evaporation. Adjust your sprinklers so they don't spray on sidewalks, driveway or street.
- Repair all leaky faucets, fixtures and pipes both inside and outside your home.
- Keep your showers down to five minutes or less using a lowflow showerhead. Turn the water off while lathering-up in the shower. Turn the water back on to quickly rinse.
- While waiting for the hot water, catch the cool, clean, water in a bucket or a watering can. You can use it later to water plants, run your garbage disposer or wash the car.

Join in the *Waste No Water* campaign; use water-saving methods yourself and share your water conservation tips with friends and neighbors. And keep this in mind: the more water you conserve, the more money you'll save on your water and sewer bill.

Municipal Codes Help UC Look Good

While most UC residents, both renters and owners, abide by the municipal codes outlined by the City of San Diego, occasionally homeowners and renters need a reminder. Your community association is concerned with keeping the neighborhood looking good without interfering with your right to individuality.

Please review the following municipal codes and see if you are adhering to them.

Homeowners are responsibility for parkways; the area between the sidewalk and street, also known as a right-of-way. Folks on Tulane and Stadium Place must keep the sidewalk clear of pickle weed and grass on Governor between Scripps and Stadium. People on Fisk must do the same for a portion of Genesee on the west side. Carnegie Street folks need to maintain Regents Road and part of Governor.

Cars may not block driveways or sidewalks. A car may not be parked on the front lawn or hardscape across driveways. Dry grass and weeds cannot exceed 18 inches. Homeowners must maintain parkways that have bushes and trees, and water, trim, and maintain them. When Scott Peters was City Council representative, he oversaw a tree planting on Governor Drive. Many of the UCCA board members went door-to-door to ask residents if they would like a free tree and would be willing to take care of that tree. You can see the results every day and you know who kept the promise.

Finally, for your safety and that of your neighbors, as well as maintaining appearances that contribute to the value of your home and your neighbors' homes, please maintain your roof. The Raptor Institute will showcase several native raptor species, including a live flight demonstration that will reveal one of the raptor's flight characteristics and hunting style. You will meet several native raptor species (hawks and owls) found throughout San Diego and Rose Canyon. The Raptor Institute is a non-profit organization dedicated to the support of San Diego's local raptor species. They strive to educate the public about these wonderful aerial predators in an effort to promote conservation and respect for some of San Diego's favorite natural residents.

Friends of Rose Canyon is dedicated to the protection, preservation and restoration of Rose Canyon and the Rose Creek watershed. Rose Canyon provides habitat for a number of different species of birds of prey.

What is a raptor?

Raptors are usually predators. They have keen eyesight, hooked beaks for tearing flesh, and powerful, curved talons and strong leg and toe muscles for grabbing and holding prey. Hawks, eagles, kites, ospreys, falcons and owls are among the birds sometimes considered raptors, or birds of prey. The Raptor Institute birds are *ambassador animals*. They all have some disability that prevents them from being released back to the wild.
