What would midyear state budget cuts mean for San Diego schools?

e have started off this year with an enthusiastic and motivated group of teachers and students. We must continue the

steady achievement gains in our San Diego schools, including our local UC schools.

However, balancing our budget each year has become increasingly difficult with the reduced funds from the state. This year we started our school year with 1,000 fewer employees and millions of dollars of program cutbacks. We had to budget so tightly that a few weeks into the school year we have had to move teachers and change class configurations to fit the exact number of students. This is hard on teachers and kids, but we do not have money for any teachers above the tightly budgeted amount.

Due to continued cuts by the state we will face even bigger challenges next year. We must consider closing several schools, selling properties for basic operating costs and asking our unions for major concessions. We will do what it takes to keep our schools operating in these difficult economic times.

While making these cuts each year is painstaking, making cuts in the middle of the year is impossible. Unfortunately, when the legislators passed the 2011-2012 budget, they made a very optimistic projection of an extra \$4 billion of revenue. If that extra revenue does not miraculously appear, there are automatic cuts to our schools in the middle of the year.

We cannot remove a first grade teacher from a classroom in the middle of the year or drop courses for seniors in their last year. Even our custodians are already down to cleaning the classrooms only once every three days.

If the midyear education cuts are allowed by the Governor and legislature, we will be forced to use every emergency reserve dollar left to finish out the year. The Superintendent has

announced that this will push us to the brink of insolvency for the next year. Insolvency is when the state gives us less money than is needed to carry out the educational programs that we are required by the state and federal government to provide. All of the salary rollbacks, school closures, property sales, program cuts and layoffs will not be enough.

We as a state keep kicking the can down the road. Now we are near the end of the road. Are we as San Diegans and Californians willing to pay what it takes to keep our schools running? We've done our part in cutting. Now it's time to look at the revenue side. We need to decide through our elected legislature how much we value education for our kids.

Good news for University City residents -- the muchanticipated Coastal Rail Trail is on its way.

From Sherri Lightner's Office

n Oct. 5, the Land Use & Housing Committee, which I chair, voted to accept more than \$500,000 in funds to begin the preliminary engineering phase on this important project.

The Coastal Rail Trail will be a 40-mile bike trail along our railways from Oceanside to San Diego and will help improve bike access throughout University City and Sorrento Valley.

That's important because right now those getting off the Coaster at the Sorrento Valley station have to ride their bikes on the shoulder of the I-5 to get to their jobs in University City, something that can be extremely dangerous.

While establishing the Coastal Rail Trail through University City is important in increasing transportation options, there are a number of cost and environmental concerns that need to be addressed.

For instance, I find some potential routes completely unacceptable. They cost too much and have too great an impact on the environment. Anything that threatens Rose Canyon or Roselle Canyon will not have my support.

To make the best possible route choice, we need everyone to give their input. There will be an extensive outreach effort, and I hope everyone in the community gets involved so we can pick a route that is convenient, cost-effective and sensitive to the environment.

y term as Treasurer comes to an end at the November election so I thought I'd give you a final report for my "time in office". Our funding is mainly the very generous donations from Members (\$15,200) thanks to Ginny Charvat's efforts, and the Newsletter turning a healthy profit of \$4,100. Thanks for the Newsletter are due to Kay Goodfellow (Editor), Terri Day (Advertising) and Mary Kay Hewitt (Distribution).

Over the year we have made donations to several worthwhile causes such as the Banana Split in the Park (\$2,000) putting up seasonal banners on the street lights (\$1,210), 4th of July Celebration (\$1,000), Summer Concerts (\$2,500), Holiday/Christmas Tree Lighting (\$200), \$700 for the Transformer Box art and \$300 for the design of the new plantings to improve the Governor Drive Medians (thanks to Sandy Lippe and Barbara Gellman) and

the newly formed Garden Club (\$550) which has proved very successful thanks to the efforts of Tanya Howe Aeria.

We supported our local schools with a \$200 donation to the Standley Marching Band, a \$500 donation to UC High School Grad Night, a \$1,000 donation to the UCHS Football Boosters so they can have the Homecoming football game at a lighted venue while the football field is being renovated, and recently a \$1,000 donation to support the UCHS Music Program. Our general expenses for the year are quite substantial but there are essential fees we must pay to run a not-for-profit organization such as our association. These expenses are mainly due to audit fees (\$1,000) and liability insurance (\$1,800).

I've enjoyed being your Treasurer and look forward to hopefully continuing to serve such a worthwhile organization as the UCCA.

We even saw a Red Sox game at iconic Fenway Park.

Mom always encouraged my journalism career. Frequently, I would mail her my game stories, features and columns. I'll miss making those trips to the post office. But more than that I'll miss my mom, who did her best to love and raise her son and, in the process, helped to instill in him a love of sports that lives on. Thanks, Mom

Ann Wille had a very successful real estate career and retired in 2009 and later moved to Texas to be near family. She was a founding member of EdUCate! Foundation for Public Schools in University City and involved in Rotary Club. Her kindheartedness, passion and vibrant personality touched and inspired so many of us. 

Urban Corps of San Diego will plant your free tree(s) in a public right of way, or at the curb in front of your home approximately 8 to 16 weeks after your application is received. Before your tree is planted, Urban Corps will perform a site analysis of your property. Then we will check for underground utilities and apply for a permit with the City. When the permit is received your tree will be planted.

Due to water restrictions and the regional drought, we encourage you to find alternative ways to water your newly planted tree. For example, ideas like capturing cold water from your shower as it heats up, collecting rainwater from your roof and rain gutters with a water capturing tank, or installing new self-watering technology called 'gel packs' (available at your local nursery) are all good water conserving methods. Shade trees provided through this program are recognized by the City of San Diego's Water Department as providing many benefits to the community including carbon reduction, air filtration, and a reduction of the "heat island effect" which helps cool down our city.
