How will we, and most importantly our fire and police protection, be impacted? All south UC residents need to be aware of this increased predictable traffic condition and be willing to explore ways to work together to find answers that will best serve our entire community.

Public Meetings Held to Discuss Community Stage at Standley Park

On Tuesday, November 5th, the Standley Park Recreation Council held a public meeting at the Recreation Center to discuss the possibility of constructing a community stage at Standley Park. This project is being proposed by the University City Community Foundation ("Improve UC") and is currently in the due diligence phase. John Schindell presided on behalf of the Rec Council, asked Greg Zinser, President of Improve UC, to present conceptual drawings, along with the architect who drafted them. Two design alternatives and three possible locations for the stage were presented and discussed by about 15 members of the community who provided comment and suggestions. Overall, the response was positive, although concerns were raised regarding noise levels in the canyon that could be generated with one of the locations and design alternatives. Various options to mitigate noise levels were discussed, and Improve UC agreed to follow up on them and report back at the next public meeting on this issue. It will be held on Thursday, December 5th at 7:00 pm at the Rec Center. At this meeting, the Recreation Council will vote to either support or reject this project. If it is supported, the approval process goes to the next level within the City of San Diego Park & Recreation Department. All are welcome to attend the meeting on December 5th or can provide comment by emailing to info@improveuc.org.

Cutting Back Weeds & Overgrowth of Pickleweed on Sidewalks in UC

Have you read the municipal code 54.0208 about property maintenance? Probably you haven't, but if you live on streets like Stadium Court, Tulane, Fisk, and Carnegie, read on under section B: "It is unlawful for a responsible person whose premises abut any portion of a public street or parking strip to fail to maintain any public walking thereon in a condition free from waste, weeds, and other plant growth." In other words, homeowners on Stadium and Tulane should be keeping the sidewalk free of pickleweed on Governor between Stadium and Scripps. Stadium homeowners are doing the deed. Folks on Fisk should be keeping the west side of Genesee north of Governor free of weeds. A certain water company should keep weeds from growing along the north side of Governor between Greenwich Drive and Governor Gardens Park because this water company owns that undeveloped land. Finally, this municipal code applies to homeowners on Carnegie overlooking Regents responsible for clear sidewalks on Regents and Carnegie homes abutting Governor should tend to those.

ALERT! HOLIDAY SHOPPING FOR YOU AND THE CRIMINAL

This is the time of year to keep your antennae up whether at home or in a mall parking lot.

Be sure to lock up your home and gate when you leave the house, leave lights on at night, even a radio. If you have an alarm, use it.

Lock your car and leave nothing of value visible, whether in your driveway or anywhere. That includes cords to electronic devices.

Post a "Beware of Dog" sign even if you don't have a dog.

Look for well lit places to park at a shopping center. Don't park between 2 vans or trucks. When you get out of your car, look around and lock up. When you return with packages, have your car key ready and lock up purchases in the trunk then leave. Don't sit and make phone calls in the car.

A new scam seeks credit card security codes. A thief who has managed to get your card number and other information such as your address, calls claiming to be doing a fraud investigation for the card issuer. The thief provides your card number and asks you to confirm it. When you do, you are asked to prove that the card is in your possession by providing the security code (the three or four digit code on the back or front of your card), which is all the thief needs to make charges on the card. Never give out the security code to anyone who calls you.

If you park in your garage, drive in, close the door, then get out of the car and remove your packages. Unfortunately, there are criminals who may be on your street watching for any chance to take what is yours.

Call 911 if you see a crime in progress or feel threatened by someone.

Call 619-531-2000 for suspicious activity on your street or shopping mall. Your report will be electronically downloaded into the police database.

On a lighter note, my thanks to all the street captains who have gathered their neighbors and helped empower them to improve the quality of their lives through crime prevention education, problem solving and cooperation with the San Diego Police Department. There is still more to do, so if your street does not have a captain, step up and take the lead. Fire at UCHS

A fire is burning at our University City High School Biomedical Sciences pathway program. Curiosity is first ignited in a freshman elective course, Principles of Biomedical Sciences, when students find a mock crime scene with a dead body sprawled on the floor in a pool of potential evidence. Students learn different elements and related careers in biomedical science as they determine cause of death. Tenth grade Human Body Systems students learn structure, function, disease and medical terminology for the human body. The eleventh grade Medical Interventions course offers students the chance to study biotechnology, learn the power of research and the many cures still needing to be discovered.

In the fourth year of rigorous science-based Career Technical Education courses, seniors in Biomedical Innovations experience intense work-based learning by touring an Emergency Department and hearing from guest speakers in a quest to understand how an ED functions and the problems they face. Students then propose solutions to improve ED efficiency and effectiveness to a panel of health professionals. Ellie Vandiver, hometown hero and Registered Nurse turned teacher, feeds students' ever-growing flame of curiosity by challenging their critical thinking skills to prepare for a clinical work based learning experience, The Internship.

We are calling on our healthcare community to join the workforce development efforts of Scripps Memorial, Scripps Genomics and VA Hospital to open their doors twice a week for 3-4 weeks to our students. The City of San Diego is offering a rain barrel rebate program to help offset the cost of installing a rain barrel (or barrels) for single meter residences. Rain barrels can be used to collect rainwater from rooftops using your gutters and downspouts. Rainwater is stored in the barrel and can be used later to water your plants, trees and lawns. The City of San Diego will rebate \$1.00 for every gallon of rain barrel storage capacity, up to 400 gallons and \$400.00. The minimum rain barrel size is 50 gallons, but homeowners can install multiple barrels at the same, or different downspout locations.

When you install a rain barrel at your home you can save water and lower your bill while helping to maintain a healthy urban watershed. By collecting rainwater and putting it back into your garden, you are reducing the amount of runoff that flows to the public storm water system, which goes untreated into our creeks and bays. The City of San Diego has an easy-to-use Rainwater Harvesting Guide to help you get started on selecting the rain barrel that is right for you at <http://www.sandiego.gov/water/pdf/conservation/rainwaterguide.pdf>.

Bicycle Friendly San Diego

There may be some days where you want to go much farther than you want to pedal, yet you still would like to go by bicycle: maybe a festival in Balboa Park, a baseball game at Petco Park or Mission Bay on July 4! Traveling by bicycle is enjoyable. Not having to deal with car parking issues could make the event even more pleasant.

San Diego Metropolitan Transit System is there for you! Bicycles are allowed on MTS vehicles free of charge. Bicycles are not allowed inside buses, so most buses have a folding bicycle rack outside at the front that can hold up to two bicycles. Advise the driver before you load your bike. You can load or unload your bicycle at any stop where it is feasible and safe.


Bicycles are permitted on the Trolley anytime. On the trolley, one bicycle is allowed on during rush hours and two bikes are allowed on at other times. Load your bike through the last door of the car. If the maximum number of bikes is already on board, go to another car or wait for the next Trolley. You should stay with your bicycle.

Each Coaster car is equipped with straps to secure up to four bicycles at any time. Simply roll your bike on, strap it down in the provided space, and find yourself a seat!

Boarding the Sprinter? Enter the train through doors marked with a bicycle emblem. On the Sprinter you must supply your own straps or bungee cords to secure your bicycle.

Vision 2020 for A Quality School in Every Neighborhood was the theme of the annual State of the District Address. A standing room only crowd filled Kearny High School October 29 as a sign of the new found enthusiasm for public education in San Diego. It started this year by being named one of the top four urban districts in the nation based on student achievement.

Also included at the event was the inauguration of the San Diego Unified Hall of Fame, patterned after a similar one at University City High and other schools in the district. It is intended to honor those who have gone on to succeed after graduating from San Diego Unified schools.

The First Inductee was Interim Mayor Todd Gloria who graduated from Madison High School. Even Superintendent Cindy Marten spent part of her school career in San Diego Unified. All of the members of the Board of Education are products of public schools across the nation.

We have many future Hall of Famers in our schools. Vision 2020 is an ambitious plan to move towards a world class school system by the year 2020. It was begun in 2009 when the Class of 2020 was in first grade. Those same students started middle school this year.

We have met some of our goals. The Class of 2016 already faces more rigorous high school requirements to prepare them for both college and technical careers. Cluster committees have been formed across the district to promote quality neighborhood schools. We have made incremental gains in student achievement over the past four years. AN ATTITUDE OF COOPERATION

During my time on the San Diego City Council and as a Commissioner for the Port of San Diego, I was proud to work with members of both parties to address difficult problems facing the region. We worked with the mentality that while we wouldn't always agree on every issue, we would put the interests of constituents above all else to reform our local government. One of Santa's Favorite Helpers Lives in UC & Has Served the Community Well

John Walsh, proud of his Chicago Irish heritage, is the father of five and grandpa of seven. He is also a near recordholding Santa helper, starting way back in 1957 as a young businessman in commercial development. When Clairemont only had 4,000 homes and W.T. Grant store was in the Clairemont Quad, the Salvation Army Santa didn't show up. John donned the Santa suit and began a long career of volunteering to make kids happy at Christmas.

For the newbies in University City who take Standley Park and Swanson pool for granted and enjoy Little League and Bobby Sox, soccer and football games for your kids, just look to John Walsh as your community benefactor. It is no surprise he was called "The Mayor." An empty lot where Carl's Jr. and the library stand was turned into Little League fields and Bobby Sox fields in 1963, and John headed that committee. He moved some teams to Chapparal Field in North U.C. where Costa Verde is.

In 1972 as president of U.C. Civic Association, John was the "go to guy" who rallied the fledging community members to raise \$1-million dollars for a first class Standley Park. The City had promised only \$800,000 to build Standley Park, but John knew U.C. needed racquetball courts, tennis courts, Pop Warner football field, and 7 baseball fields, not just granite fields.

He, Kathy Anderson, and Don Reeves oversaw a tough campaign to get local homeowners to assess each home \$250 to raise that million bucks and also get 66 2/3 vote of approval. John and his team worked with the school board for Standley's joint use and lighted field. Ernie Hahn, developer with vested interest in U.C., supported these ideas.

In 1975 Mayor Pete Wilson proudly opened this park and John was glad to be part of the celebration. Then John told Mayor Wilson, U.C. needed another ball field and McElroy field was built at Governor Gardens.

However, Walsh's work didn't end there. He continued to serve as first chair of University City Planning Group. As chair, he advocated for building UTC and getting Nordstrom to come to UTC. He also supported the idea of Regents Road bridge, From 1985 to 2000 John was chair and advocate for Golden Triangle Chamber. He also served Our Mother of Confidence Church as Past Grand Knight, Color Court, and Honor Guard.

Since 1968 when he bought his home on Charae, John has been a force for good in working for the betterment of our community but has suffered his share of tragedy as well. He credits his wife Syd, who passed away on December 14th, 2012 for inspiration and his grown children Kevin, Tim, Bryan, and Heather. Tragedy struck the Walsh family when their first born Katie accidentally died at age 30 from carbon monoxide poisoning in January 1990 in Laguna Mountains. John Walsh has been an exemplary member of his community and has set an example which should inspire us all.
