Do You Know Your Score, San Diego?

San Diego's credit rating continues to rise, providing further evidence of our ongoing financial recovery. Last month Standard & Poor's raised the city's credit rating by two notches from A+ to AA-. Standard & Poor's said the improved credit rating was the result of "strong financial management practices."

The credit agency also boosted the city's rating for its long-term bond from A- to A+. On May 15, Moody's affirmed the city's credit rating, saying that "the city's overall financial position has improved significantly." The continued recovery is a far cry from the mid-2000s when the city's short-sighted decision to underfund its pension liabilities meant its credit rating was suspended and the city was locked out of the bond market.

As I've said before, your credit rating doesn't go up if you are doing something wrong. The hard work, fiscal discipline and sacrifice of the last few years are paying off. Higher credit ratings translate into lower interest rates, so it is less expensive for the city to borrow money for much-needed infrastructure projects, such as street resurfacing. In fact, the City Council recently approved a plan to issue bonds and invest \$75 million to improve San Diego's infrastructure including:

- \$30 million for road resurfacing
- \$15.5 million for storm water repairs
- \$16.3 million for upgrades to fire stations, libraries and other facilities
- \$2.5 million for streetlight improvements

While we must reinvest in our city, we must do it responsibly and continue to enact pension reform and managed competition so we can assure our financial future.

The district's initiative for a Quality School in Every Neighborhood is placing an emphasis on more students attending school in the communities in which they live. This allows for greater parental participation, a key to academic success. Be sure to let your neighbors with children in preschool know about the success of University City schools.

In University City we have the support of EdUCate!, one of the leading foundations in the district supporting neighborhood schools. We also have an active University City Cluster Association that meets each month to promote cooperation between our schools, partnership in the community and academic excellence. This group includes principals, teachers, support staff, parents, students and community members. Become a part of our team next year after a wonderful summer vacation.

EdUCate's! 18th Annual Taste of the Triangle, held this year at the beautiful UCSD Faculty Club, was a perfect match for us as a college campus is likely the next step for many students after graduating high school. So far, there are about a dozen residents who have volunteered to be neighborhood watch captains; this is a good start, but we need many more to cover the city. Each street needs someone to be a main link for all their neighbors and our community police In order to disseminate information about crime and safety issues, I need contacts from all areas of UC. Please call or email with your willingness to take on this responsibility. I will be happy to meet with you, share the folder of information and attend your first street meeting.

Some safety tips:

- Keep your doors locked, including the garage door and door from the house to the garage.
- Take your remote garage door opener into the house, do not leave in a car in the driveway.
- Prevent auto theft by not leaving anything in the car, that includes clothes, books, electronics.
- Do not open the door to a solicitor. Talk thru a door/window or ignore.
- Add an alarm system if possible.
- Lock your gate to the backyard.
- Know how to turn off your main gas/water valves.
- Use timers for inside lighting.
- Motion detectors for outside.
- Sleep with your car remote at the bedside; you can punch the alarm button if necessary.

We want the new neighborhood watch sign to be very visible everywhere in UC. More captains are needed to gather their neighbors and become a cog in the wheel.

Practical Recovery Has Moved Into Our University City Neighborhood

Practical Recovery is a business which has moved into our neighborhood. You can learn more on the website: www.practicalrecovery.com. The organization has taken up residence in two homes on the west end of University City. Plans include opening more. Currently the two homes are used as 6-bed rehabilitation facilities where clients come to stay (typically 30 days) to detoxify and rehabilitate from drug and alcohol addictions. One house is located on Bloch Street and the other is on Lange Avenue.

Upon speaking with many UC community members, residents have concerns about this type of business in our neighborhood, which include increase in traffic as well as potential decrease in home values. While University City residents understand the need to help people with life threatening addictions, many of us are concerned that this will lead to other organizations opening rehab homes in the area, even though state law currently permits it.

Over 50 people showed up at the UCCA board meeting on May 9th to express their concerns about Practical Recovery in our neighborhood. The board members decided another meeting was needed to strictly discuss this topic. On June 13th, UCCA will host a community meeting, from 6:00-8:00 pm at the University City United Church, 2877 Governor Drive, at the corner of Stresemann in UC. You and your neighbors are invited and encouraged to attend. Please come to learn more and to see what steps UC residents can take to address this issue.

Save The Birds!

Local Girl Scout Troop 3012 wants to see nature thrive. So, to start locally, the Junior Girl Scouts – 5th grade students at Curie and Hawthorn Elementary schools – have been working very hard to earn their Bronze Award by helping the birds in Rose Canyon. Working with a grant for volunteer resources from SDG&E, the girls connected with Debby Knight and Gretchen Nell, from Friends of Rose Canyon, to complete the details.

The girls decided to place bird houses in the canyon and put in native plants for the birds to eat. "Replacing lost habitats makes sense, since we have destroyed lots of their natural habitats." said a man who lives on the edge of the canyon. Our Girl Scouts agree that it is the least we can do to make up for the trees we have cut down and loss of bird habitat.



To make the nest boxes, the girls got in contact with Richard Griebe, who has made bird boxes for other areas of San Diego. The California Audubon and the California Bluebird Recovery Program, with help from the San Diego Audubon, donated money for the supplies. The girls set out to build these boxes! They posted 12 boxes in three areas of the canyon, and also planted many native plants. Recon Nursery, in Imperial Beach, donated these plants.

A special thanks to the Fortier/Goldstein, Frederich and McLaughlin/Kjellman families for allowing the troop to plant on their properties. The girls will spend three months monitoring the boxes and supplying data to the state program. Look for the brightly decorated bird boxes along the trail, but be quiet! There may be baby birds sleeping. Let nature thrive!

UNIVERSITY CITY RACQUET CLUB NEWS




Community Members, We Need You!
