A Look Into the Future of University City & the UTC Area

UCCA General Meeting, May 14th, Recap

A very interested and concerned *standing room only* audience listened to presenters at our May 14th UCCA general meeting. After our local government representatives provided updates, and Lt. Cedrun from our Northern Division Police reviewed local concerns, Mr. John Haggerty from SANDAG's Rail Division was introduced. He explained the proposed route of the mid-coast trolley with his PowerPoint presentation and distributed various informational handouts. The fairy shrimp vernal pools could be a possible environmental issue which could delay construction and guaranteed funding. The impact of the proposed elevated rail line down the middle of Genesee was mentioned as being an expected added concern to the already realized traffic congestion, as well as temporarily impeding first responders providing emergency service to south UC. On July 8th, an additional public hearing is scheduled. Details of that meeting will be published in our July UCCA newsletter for our interested residents.

Our second speaker, John Alderson, vice-president of Westfield Development Group, walked us through a presentation of the proposed UTC mall expansion. There were many questions related to parking, coordination with the trolley and the anticipated additional traffic on Genesee. A sub-committee of UCPG is meeting with Mr. Alderson to review concerns and recommendations. Mr. Alderson spoke of the many future, special and unique features being planned. He was happy to hear suggestions from the audience.

Barry Bernstein, UCCA president, offered special thanks to our community branch library staff and to UCCA board member, Diane Ahern, for her planning /coordination of our general meeting. Diane is also chairing the proposed "Buy Local" UCCA membership campaign for 2015. Susan Revak was the winner of the UCCA "DOES WHAT" contest with 20 valid items on her list.

Some Things Change, Some Things Stay the Same

With over 20 years in the San Diego Police Department, Community Service Officer, Larry Hesselgesser, has seen many changes in policing.

At a recent Neighborhood Watch meeting hosted by Toby Giesting on Via Cinta, Larry explained. "Gone are the days when officers patrolled neighborhoods looking for bad guys. Now the police rely on residents to report suspicious and criminal activity, what's not ordinary, what's not right and to watch out for each other and their friends," said Larry.

There is also more emphasis on what Larry referred to as proactive safety. Larry advised residents to take steps to reduce the chance of being an easy target such as keeping side gates locked, installing LED lights around their property, keeping valuables out of sight and acting as if they have a dog.

The combination of a "beware-of-dog sign, large dog bone and doggie bowl can be enough to make your home look annoying to a bad guy; they're more likely to move on to the next house," he said.

Larry has seen the increased use of technology to both prevent and solve crimes. "If a suspicious person comes to your door, you can open it with your safety chain and

smart phone video camera on. Pretend to be on the phone and record the encounter," he explained.

The use of social media such as Nextdoor.com and Facebook has influenced policing. "Both the police department and neighbors can post information about suspicious activities and crimes," he said. "In my personal Nextdoor.com neighborhood, we were able to solve a local burglary because residents observed and posted information about suspicious actions."

As much as times change, some things stay the same, however. "Bad guys are always looking for easy targets such as open garage doors, unlocked cars, unoccupied homes and valuables left in plain sight," Larry said.

That's why Neighborhood Watch groups are so valuable. "Get to know your neighbors, be nosey, and find a neighborhood buddy or two that will watch out for you and your home as you watch out for theirs."

Look around your neighborhood. If you do not see a Neighborhood Watch sign posted, it may mean that you don't have an active group on your street. Contact Barbara Gellman at bggellman@yahoo.com or 858-452-2326 for help in getting a group started.

Stranger Danger: How to Talk with Your Child

Our children see strangers every day, and most of these strangers are friendly, ordinary people. Unfortunately, some are child predators who are out to harm our kids. Parents can protect their children from dangerous strangers by talking to them about strangers and suspicious behavior, and by taking a few precautions of their own.

School will be out soon, so now is the time to set some guidelines. Make it a rule that your children must ask permission or check in with you before going anywhere. Give your children your work and cell phone numbers so they can reach you at all times. If your child is old enough and responsible enough, get them their own cell phone so they can call you in case of an emergency. Did you know that a cell phone, which is no longer under a service contract, can still dial 911?

Show your children safe places to play, safe roads and paths to take, and places to go if there's trouble. Teach your children to trust their instincts. Explain that if they ever feel scared or uncomfortable, they should get away as fast as they can and tell an adult.

Tell them that sometimes adults they know may make them feel uncomfortable, and they should still get away as fast as possible and tell another adult what happened. Reassure children that you will help them when they need it.

Teach your children to be assertive. Make sure they know that it's okay to say no to an adult and to run away from adults in dangerous situations. Encourage your children to play with others. There's safety in numbers.

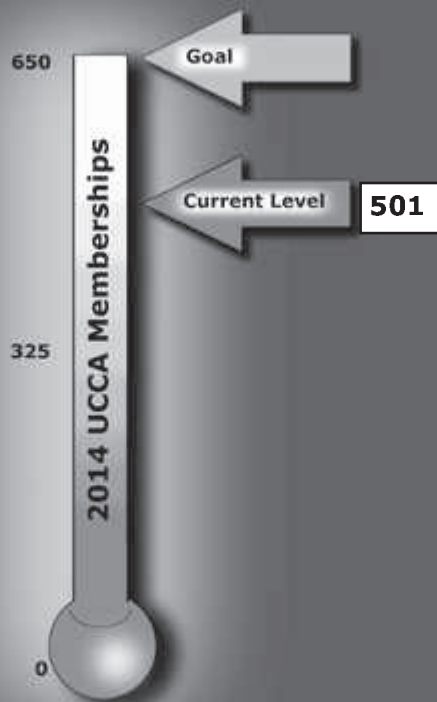

That's why it's important that every resident prepare their home and family for the possibility of a major fire. This is also why San Diego Fire-Rescue has partnered with the International Association of Fire Chiefs to create the **Ready, Set, Go!** Wildland Fire Action Guide.

- **Ready**—Take personal responsibility and prepare long before the threat of a wildland fire, so your home is ready. Create defensible space by clearing brush away from your home. Use fire-resistant landscaping, and harden your home with fire-safe construction measures. Assemble emergency supplies and belongings in a safe place. Plan escape routes and make sure all those residing within the home know the plan of action.
- **Set**—Pack your emergency items. Stay aware of the latest news and information on the fire from local media, your local fire department and public safety.
- **Go**—Follow your personal wildland fire action plan. Doing so will not only support your safety but will allow firefighters to best maneuver resources to combat the fire.

It is not a question of if, but when, the next major wildland fire will occur, according to the fire department. Advance planning and preparation are the best forms of defense. 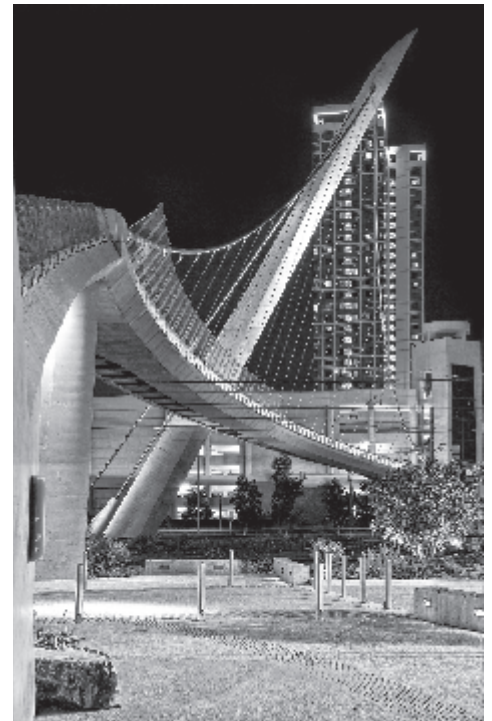

If you are healthy, at least 17 years old, and would like to help save someone's life anonymously, Ray the Bloodman, wants you to donate a pint of your blood at the Sprouts Marketplace bloodmobile. The bloodmobile will be parked near Starbucks on Saturday, June 14th, from 8:30 am-1:30 pm. It's totally free, takes about 45 minutes and you get snacks at the end.

You will need your driver's license. There is a slight finger poke at the beginning to test your iron level, so be sure to eat your raisins, beans and greens the day before you come. Once you're past the registration process, there is a poke on your forearm from which the blood is taken. This lasts about 15 minutes.

If you're feeling extra generous, you're welcome to donate a "double". That's not 2 pints of blood, but the same 1 pint, with double the red blood cells. You do have 5-8 pints of blood, depending on your size and your body will replace the missing pint within 24 hours, with fresh, new blood that reduces your risk of heart disease. You should drink plenty of water and take it easy the rest of the day to help your body make new blood.

If you have O negative, your blood is extra special. It can be used by anyone regardless of blood type. If you haven't given blood since April 19th (or given a "double" since February 22nd), Ray the Bloodman would greatly appreciate you stopping by the bloodmobile. Walk-ins are definitely welcome.
