What Makes a Neighborhood Great?

The Great Neighborhood Book by Jay Walljasper and the Project for Public Spaces describes the concept of "Placemaking" as the notion that great communities have places within the neighborhood where people can go to relax, have fun and see one another. It goes on to say that one of the key characteristics of community "places" is that they promote sociability. "These are the spots where you run into people you know, where you take friends and family when you want to show them the neighborhood. These places become the heart and soul of the neighborhood because they offer people many different reasons to go there". They go on to say that great "places" are also accessible and attractive and facilitate activities that bring people together. We have an extraordinary opportunity to create such a place in University City.

The Great Neighborhood Called University City

University City (UC) is an active community of 56,000 people bordered by La Jolla on the west, State Route 52 on the south, and Interstate 805 on the east. It is truly a *Great Neighborhood* within America's finest city, due in large part to the generosity of its residents who supported the construction of Standley Park Recreation Center and Swanson Pool in the early 1970's.

The park is ideally located in the center of South UC and is the focal point of most activities in our community. Outstanding recreation facilities, easy access and a variety of year–round activities have resulted in Standley Park consistently ranking near the top of the list among the 30 Parks in the City of San Diego in terms of overall usage.

Among those activities are the July 4th UC Celebration and summer concerts which draw hundreds of community residents to Standley Park each year. Concerts are currently held on a portable stage which is also used for many other events throughout the year. It is a simple platform put together in 4x8 sections, which are heavy and cumbersome. The small size of the total stage area limits the type of events that can be held on it. With nothing overhead, it is completely open to the elements, which can also be a safety hazard. Volunteers are recruited to set up and take down the stage each time it is used posing additional safety hazards.

We propose to replace the temporary stage with a state-of-the -art pavilion that will be the centerpiece of Standley Park. This will increase park usage and bring the community together for all types of events for many years to come. The new pavilion will be located in the open space on the South side of the park facing Governor Drive.

With dimensions of approximately 30′ by 50′ and protection from sun and other elements, it will have broad appeal not only to the community at large, but also the two adjacent schools (Spreckels and Standley Middle School), and many other organizations which hold events at the park. Examples would be: Little League, Girls′ Softball, etc. It will blend into the existing landscape with an open design, using materials similar to those used in adjacent buildings. The project will offer various types of donor recognition opportunities based on level of support. We are currently in the process of obtaining a building permit for the project and, assuming a successful capital campaign during the coming year, we expect to complete construction by the end of 2015.

CAPTAIN'S ADVISORY BOARD MEETING

On May 20th, I attended the second newly reinstated Captain's Advisory Board meeting under the leadership of Captain Jerry Hara. About 25 community leaders were present to continue the discussion of current police issues and community concerns. This partnership is all about crime prevention and forming stronger community bonds.

Bicycle thefts are one of the major problems in Northern Division and mainly in the areas of Pacific and Mission Beach, although the Westfield Mall area has its share.

Using bike decoys, with GPS attached, has been extremely successful in catching the thief. The bike is stolen, tracked and an arrest is made. If stolen bikes are reported frequently in an area, the police will set up a decoy. Please report this to 619-531-2000 and request an incident number for follow up.

Lt. Misty Cedrun reported that extra staff were hired to control the participants at the Sun God Festival at UCSD on Friday, May 16th of this year which ran from 12:00 noon to 12:00 midnight. Aside from residents' complaints about the noise, there were few problems on the campus. It's a tradition.

Acting Lt. Ernie Servin, who is with the Investigation Unit, encourages residents to report any information that seems suspicious that could assist the prosecutor in a case. The more information he has, the easier to prosecute.

There will be more DUI patrols over the summer in Central and Northern Division and more ticketing of cars who don't stop at stop signs. For example, those of you who visit Costco on Morena Blvd., be alert to the stop sign on Jutland and Morena. If anyone has kudos or concerns, please contact me before the next meeting in July, and I will be happy to bring it to their attention.

Crime Trends, Detection and the Quality of Life Team

At a recent briefing for Neighborhood Watch Captains, Community Service Officer Larry Hesselgesser and Investigator Ernie Servin provided updates of crime trends, the crime investigation process and the quality of life team.

Compared to last year, motor vehicle thefts and breakins are down. But, residential and commercial burglaries are up, according to Officer Hesselgesser.

Keeping valuables out-of-sight and locking vehicle doors are two of the most effective ways to prevent motor vehicle crimes. Some of the best tactics to prevent residential burglaries include locking side gates and installing bright LED lights around the property, including in backyards that are adjacent to canyons.

If you are a victim of crime, report it as soon as possible, advised Acting Lieutenant Servin. If it's a crime in progress, call the emergency 911 number. If it's a non-emergency, report it to the non-emergency number 619-531-2000.

Take pictures, but do not tamper with any evidence. Police officers will interview both witnesses and victims of crime as well as gather evidence. A detective will be assigned to the case to further investigate.

Officer Hesselgesser urged neighbors with concerns, such as the welfare or safety of a neighbor, to call the police non-emergency number 619-531-2000 to explain their observations and ask the quality of life team to conduct a welfare check.



Free Recycling Bins Available!

Here in San Diego, we're lucky to have a top-notch recycling program run by the San Diego Environmental Services Department. Containers are collected curb-side at no charge, many things are accepted and no sorting is required. However, homeowners sometimes find that bins get filled long before the next scheduled pick-up day. It takes very little to overflow a bin; a child's birthday party or summer barbecue, grand kids visiting for a week, or even just an online purchase that arrives in a big box. Before you know it, the bin is full and you're left to choose between storing excess recyclables in a pile for weeks on end or throwing them away where they'll take up valuable space in our landfills. There is a solution! Unlike the black trash bins that must be purchased independently or from the city for \$70 each, up to three blue recycling bins are available to residents free of charge. They come in two sizes, 96 and 64 gallons, so you can mix and match size and quantity for a combination that best fits your recycling needs. Bins can be picked up from the City of San Diego Collection Services at 8353 Miramar Place, San Diego, 92121. The office is open Monday-Friday 8:00 am-4:00 pm. They recommend calling ahead (858-694-7000) to place your order. Delivery is also available for a \$25 fee.

The Burning Truth about the Sun

Q: How long does it take for the sun's ultraviolet (UV) rays to damage unprotected skin?

A: The sun's UV rays can damage your skin in as little as 15 minutes, according to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC).

Skin cancer is the most common cancer in the United States. Some are at higher risk of skin cancer, but anyone can get it. The most preventable cause of skin cancer is exposure to ultraviolet light.

Follow These Recommendations

- You can reduce your risk of skin damage/cancer by seeking shade under an umbrella, tree or other shelter before you need relief from
- Loose-fitting, long-sleeved shirts and long pants made from tightly woven fabric offer the best protection from the sun's UV rays. A wet T-shirt offers much less UV protection than a dry one. Darker colors may offer more protection than lighter colors.
- For the most protection, wear a hat with a brim all the way around that shades your face, ears, and the back of your neck.
- Sunglasses protect your eyes from UV rays and reduce the risk of cataracts. They also protect the tender skin around your eyes from
- Put on sunscreen before you go outside, even on slightly cloudy or cool days. Don't forget to put a thick layer on all parts of exposed skin. Your best bet to protect your skin is to use sunscreen or wear protective clothing every time you're outside, even when you're in

COLLEGE AFFORDABILITY

Access to an affordable college education for lower and middle income families has long been an essential part of the American story, including my own. I would not have been able to afford a college education had I not taken out loans and done work-study programs. As our economy continues to rebound from the worst recession since the great depression, we need to make higher education more affordable, not less.

With over two-thirds of American college students graduating with massive student loan debt, it's crucial that Congress reaffirm our country's commitment to affordable higher education. More and more studies are concluding that student loan debt is preventing consumers from making major purchases like homes and new cars, hurting economic growth.

That's why I introduced the Federal Student Loan Refinancing Act last month, a bill that would automatically refinance every federal student loan currently above 4 percent down to that level. Doing this would bring interest rates much closer to the current 30-year mortgage rate and save the average California borrower nearly \$10,000 over the 20-year life of the loan — that's income that can be used on other purchases to create a positive ripple effect on the economy, buy a home, or save for retirement. This legislation would give students flexibility when they graduate and provide some necessary, and welcome, relief to families that are struggling to advance themselves

WE ALL HAVE A STAKE IN GREAT PUBLIC SCHOOLS IN UC

Summer is here and we have the traditional break from classes. However, the district continues to work on the budget over the summer. After Proposition 30 passed in 2012, we breathed a sigh of relief. At least it put a stop to major cuts in education.

The state has come up with a plan to gradually improve the funding for our schools. But it is going to take until 2020 for our schools to reach the level of funding that we had in 2007.

We knew that it was going to take three years for the funding from the state to catch up with our current operating expenses, staff and class size. We developed a School Stabilization Fund through selling properties our district no longer uses until state funding catches up.

We are now entering our second year of the school stabilization program. In the fourth year, we will begin to see "extra" money to improve our educational programs.

The board has directed the Superintendent to continue working with our team to improve educational outcomes while living within our means. In fact, despite the past five years of economic downturn, our student achievement has consistently gone up. The new budget will lay out exactly how the money will be spent to improve student achievement.

Vision 2020 calls for a quality school in every neighborhood. We will continue that quest. University City already has five quality schools, but the district and the community are working hard to raise our levels of achievement even higher.

Quality schools go along with quality neighborhoods. As an added benefit, property values go up with quality schools. We all have a stake in great public schools.

CITY COUNCIL APPROVES MAYOR'S FY2015 BUDGET

I'm pleased to announce that on June 9th the City Council approved the fiscal year 2015 budget, which goes into effect July 1st.

This is the best budget I've seen since taking office six years ago, and I look forward to working with the mayor and city staff to implement a budget that recognizes many of the most crucial needs and top priorities of the citizens of San Diego.

During the budget process, the City Council has been able to restore many of the services and programs that our constituents want and need.

This budget focuses on putting "neighborhoods first" by directing more funds for road and sidewalk repairs, streetlights and infrastructure construction; critical police, fire and lifeguard public safety needs; and expanded hours at our treasured branch libraries and popular community recreation centers.

Working with my council colleagues, I was successful in getting more dollars directed to urban forestry and tree trimming, brush management, arts and culture organizations, library materials, and coastal management efforts — including funding for a new shoreline park ranger and for La Jolla Cove odor abatement.

Local residents and Friends of the University City Library will be happy to note that the approved budget includes restoration of \$500,000 to fund the library materials budget to ensure that our library system continues to provide current books, periodicals and other materials to its users at the Central and 32 branch libraries.

In addition, many critical one-time needs have been funded, such as additional police equipment, police helicopter support, police retention program, and the relocation of the Park and Recreation garage from Life Guard Headquarters.

I was also pleased to be able to secure additional funding and support for our community planning groups, neighborhood parking plans as well as to streamline our city's hiring process in order to fill vacant positions faster.

I commend the city for its ongoing commitment to vital community services, including funding for homelessness and youth programs such as the after-school tutoring and CONNECT2Careers summer jobs.
