City of San Diego's

New Neighborhood Parking Rules Permits will be Required Starting August 17th

The San Diego City Council adopted a new Neighborhood Parking Protection Ordinance that restricts overnight parking of "oversized vehicles, non-motorized vehicles and recreational vehicles." This ordinance is authorized by Sections 86.0138 through 86.0143 of the San Diego Municipal Code.

Oversized vehicles are defined as any vehicle, including any attached trailers, vehicles or loads thereon, that exceeds 27 feet in length AND 7 feet in height. Non-motorized vehicles include open and closed trailers with or without loads.

Recreational vehicle owners may obtain a permit allowing overnight parking. A permit is valid for one 24-hour period. Permit applicants may obtain up to three consecutive days (72 hours total) at one time. Applicants may purchase up to 72 days of permits per year. The permit is only valid on the same block as the resident's address.

Recreational Vehicles are defined as "any camp trailer, camper, trailer coach, or house car," in the Vehicle Code, or, "any boat, dune buggy, all-terrain vehicle (ATV) or other motorized or towed vehicle designed, maintained or used primarily for recreational purposes." Individuals must offer proof of residency in advance of purchasing the permit. Permit applicants – once confirmed by City staff – may purchase up to three consecutive permits (72 hours). Applicants may purchase up to 72 days of permits per year.

The new ordinance includes an automated permit system. That system went "live" via the City Treasurer's website on July 8th (http://www.sandiego.gov/parking/permits/torvp/index.shtml). It allows permit applicants to provide appropriate proof of residency. Permits will become available for purchase on August 17th when the ordinance officially goes into effect.

City of San Diego

The City will adhere to a grace period for vehicles parked in violation of the ordinance between August 17 and August 31. All citations issued after the grace period will include a first notification with no associated fines. Subsequent violations will levy a \$100 fine to vehicle owners.

Permitted Vehicles

• Camp Trailer • Camper • Trailer Coach • House Car • Boat • Dune Buggy • All-Terrain Vehicle • Other motorized or towed vehicle designed, maintained, or used primarily for recreation purposes

Non-Permitted Vehicles

Any Trailer or Trailer Bus, as Defined in Vehicle Code Sections 630
 and 636
 Any vehicle, including any attached trailers, vehicles or loads thereon, that exceeds 27 feet in length and 7 feet in height





A crew of seven teenage scouts and their leaders went on a life changing summer trek through the Sangre de Cristo Mountains at Philmont Scout Ranch in Cimarron, New Mexico. During their trek, the Boy Scout crew from Troop 271 in UC hiked 85 miles over 12 days between June 22nd and July 4th.

The group of scouts and their advisors carried everything on their backs they need to survive. They participated in backcountry programs along the way, including rock climbing, logging, pole climbing and gold prospecting. The trek included a conservation project where the Scouts learned and participated in the upkeep of Philmont's ecosystem. On one part of the trip, the boys made use of a burro for carrying some of their gear and were responsible for saddling, feeding and leading the animal.

"They may meet only one other group of Scouts on the trail in an entire day of hiking," according to Backpacker Magazine. "Even in the most crowded destinations, each Scout group camps in isolation, out of sight and sound of all other groups."

You will need your driver's license. Once you're past the registration process, there is a poke on your forearm from which the blood is taken. This lasts about 15 minutes.

If you're feeling extra generous and you weigh at least 150 pounds, you're welcome to request to donate a "double." That's not two pints of blood, but the same one pint with double the red blood cells. If you have O negative, your blood is extra special. It can be used by anyone regardless of blood type. If you haven't given blood since July 12th (or given a "double" since May 17th) you can donate. You don't need to RSVP. During the July 4th UC Celebration, Cadette Troop 3615 highlighted the problem of recycling one-pound propane bottles. As part of their Silver Award Project, the girls researched the problem and networked with community members to develop a plan to reduce this waste in our landfill. In San Diego, the only legal ways to dispose of used propane bottles is to prove them empty and put them in the garbage or to make an appointment with Miramar Landfill and dispose of them as hazardous waste. For most people, throwing propane bottles in the trash is most convenient. But lovers of the outdoors must realize the impact that has on the environment.

The troop proposed ways to reduce, reuse and recycle. For example, a simple attachment from the hardware store lets us use the five gallon refillable propane canisters instead of the disposable one pound bottles. If you must use a one pound bottle, have a system to know when it is empty. For example, rip or mark the label of partially used bottles, and completely remove the label of empty bottles. Another great option is to put a screwdriver into the tester valve (looks like a bicycle valve). If you hear a hissing sound there is still usable gas in the bottle.

The troop hopes this information will help reduce propane bottle waste. Please ask our government representatives to develop programs to properly recycle them. Also, spread the news to others! Think of the good you are doing. Reduce, reuse and recycle. It makes the earth smile.

UCHS Recycling Program

Did you know that University City High School does not recycle? While there may be blue recycling bins around campus; at the end of each day, the bins are mixed together and all waste is thrown into the regular trash. The reason for this is that San Diego Unified School District no longer funds recycling programs. The main issue at our school is that the janitorial staff is not paid to separate recyclables from non-recyclables. In fact, there is still recycling pick up from campus daily, but the recyclables need to be separated by somebody first. At UCHS, we are taking initiative to try to solve this problem by instituting our own recycling club.

The club will start with approximately 15 dedicated students who will bring the small bins of recycling from each classroom to larger, central bins daily to be recycled. The long-term goal of the club is to have 100% of recycled materials actually recycled and get all staff and students actively recycling within the first year. We will be taking cans and bottles to a recycling center to raise money to purchase more bins. Ideally, in the later years of this program, our school will begin to compost and hold used-cellphone drives to enable students and community members to properly dispose of waste.

Bright Year Ahead for Students in UC Schools

Classes in San Diego Unified will begin on September 2nd. We are looking forward to continuing to improve the quality of our UC public schools this year.

At the end of Superintendent Cindy Marten's first year, we evaluated the accomplishments of the district under her leadership. The areas of strongest improvement were improving the core leadership team, professional development for principals and teachers and developing a budget that was truly student centered in its priorities.

State funding is gradually improving, but California is still behind the rest of the nation. Nevertheless, we were able to begin reducing K-3 class size, make small down payments on school libraries and arts funding and continue a strong program of graduation coaches.

While the Superintendent has set 20 focus areas for this year, the board has requested special emphasis on a few of them: Common Core implementation at all achievement levels, support for the Class of 2016 to meet the more rigorous requirements to make high school graduation meaningful, improve the district's internal and external communications, improve our connection with parents and improve our information technology.

Be sure to get involved with our UC schools as a parent or a community volunteer. UC Cluster meetings are the fourth Friday of every month at 4:30 pm, in the UC High Media Center.

The construction work at Standley Middle School on Governor Drive is an upgrade to the electrical system. We look forward to continued improvements to the facilities at UC schools through Propositions S and Z.

University City Updates

As many of you know, Improve UC is a not-for-profit organization which was formed last year for the purpose of facilitating community projects. They are currently working to construct a pavilion in Standley Park that will bring the community together for all types of events. For the past several months, members of Improve UC have attended various community meetings to brief neighbors about their plans for the community stage. Community support has been overwhelming and construction drawings have recently been completed.

As permit approval is expected shortly, Improve UC needs your involvement more than ever. I encourage everyone to find out more about this organization by visiting www.improveuc.org or by emailing them at info@improveuc.org.

Many of you may also have noticed construction work at the intersection of Genesee Avenue and Governor Drive. This work, when completed, will improve traffic and pedestrian safety in south University City.

These improvements include:

- Reconstruction of the median on Governor Drive in order to provide dual westbound left turn lanes
- Removal of median mounted poles
- Cutting back of median noses that stick out into the crosswalks
- Installation and replacement of signal mast arms and poles
- Installation of a new traffic detection system
- Upgrades to traffic signal indicators
- Installation of new emergency vehicle pre-emption systems
- Installation of pedestrian countdown timers and new ADA pushbuttons
