

Roots of Patriotic UC Celebration



Do you know your UC Celebration history? Well, Sandy Lippe has kept much of the history alive, not only by her continuous involvement in the annual event, but in keeping some of her files from back in the day. Her file included a newspaper clipping pictured above, with the caption:

"In a matter of days, Standley Park will come alive with the sights, sounds and smells of the UC Celebration. Event organizers Sandy Lippe, Left, Lenda Paris, Sue Detisch and Phyllis Speer are anticipating the scene here July 4: There will be games, crafts, swimming, a fun run, live music (plus a DJ for the younger set), a catered box dinner... (purchase tickets at UC Pharmacy, Standley Rec Center or Baskin Robbins) and much more during the all-day bash."

First off, who remembers the UC Pharmacy by the then Henry's (now Sprouts), and the Baskin Robbins where the Forbidden Yogurt is now? And yes Lippe was involved in the creation of the UC Celebration, now in its 27th year. She remembers that "I tried to get a parade in University City because I grew up in Stratford, Connecticut, where each patriotic holiday the American Legion put on a huge parade on Main Street. However, the permit process was unbelievable and police weren't available to man each street that intersected with Governor Drive. So we switched to UC Celebration at Standley Park. Sunny Pippin agreed to co-chair the first one, and we enlisted Sue Detisch, Lenda Paris, Bob Vilven, Phyllis Speer, Bonnie Hornbeck, Mary Mathis and others to kickoff a July 4th UC Celebration to keep folks at home and take a page out of New England and mid-western celebrations."

Early fliers for the UC Celebration listed events that included a Beard Growing Contest, Bingo, Sheriff and Jail, Soccer Tournament, and the Molly Trolley. Good times, good times. Make sure to read about this year's UC Celebration on page 5.

Neighborhood Watch is a crime prevention program that enlists the active participation of residents in cooperation with the San Diego Police Department (SDPD) to reduce

crime, solve problems and improve the quality of life in your area. You will get to know your neighbors, and learn how to:

- Recognize and report crimes and suspicious activities
- Protect yourself, your family and your property
- Protect your neighbor's family and property
- Identify crime and disorder problems in your area and work with the SDPD personnel to solve them.

The goal is for each street in University City to have a street captain or co-captain who will schedule a one-hour meeting in their home, backyard or driveway and invite neighbors to share safety tips and crime prevention techniques with our Community Officer Holland Tafoya.

Do you know why you need to lock your side gates?

Why you need to switch to LED lights.

What to do about solicitors, party houses, or abandoned cars?

When do you call 911 versus the non-emergency number 619-531-2000?

What do criminals look for?

How to Prevent Human Trafficking: What Can You Do?

Human trafficking is a form of modern-day slavery where perpetrators profit from the sexual exploitation and/or forced labor of men, women and children. It is a violation of basic human rights, and it is also a crime as defined by U.S. federal law and California state law.

Sex trafficking is the exploitation of a person by means including coercion or deceit to engage in commercial sexual activity, prostitution, exotic dancing, or pornography. When the victim is a minor under the age of 18 years old, sex trafficking does not require force or coercion. Minors cannot legally consent to sexual activity.

Labor trafficking is the exploitation of a person by means including coercion or deceit for labor services. Labor trafficking victims are often forced into domestic servitude, construction, restaurant, agricultural, massage parlors, or sweatshop factory work with little or no pay.

- Become aware and educate yourself as to the facts and myths of human trafficking.
- Support legislation that holds perpetrators accountable and promotes dignity for victims.
- Support and encourage schools and universities to educate their teachers, counselors, health providers and staff about this topic.

Victims of human trafficking seldom report and often do not self-identify as victims. If you suspect that someone is a victim of human trafficking or if you have information about a potential trafficking situation, please call the National Human Trafficking Hotline 1-888-373-7888 or text BeFree (233733). They, along with their families, attended the ceremony and read their winning essays. Each Grand Prize winner took home a laptop computer donated by Computers 2 SD Kids.

And Ashley wrote on the same topic and her essay was titled *World Book Encyclopedia 2015*. 


The Golden Rule for Data Safety

It used to really crush me when someone would come into our store and tell me that their hard drive had crashed and, with tears in their eyes, ask me if any of the photos that they had accumulated over the years could be recovered. Sad to say but in the event of a mechanical failure, for instance the drive not spinning, the chances are slim. If the drive can be disassembled and the platters removed and replaced into a working hard drive

body, the proposition, if successful, is EXTREMELY COSTLY. We are talking \$1500 and more depending on the amount of data involved and that is painful for anyone. I used to feel your pain. Not anymore; I'm sharing the Golden Rule for Data Safety.





Assuming that you have located your assets, it's important to see to it that these items are copied, not moved, COPIED to another physical drive. There is a difference between copied and moved. If they're moved they are simply removed from one physical drive and put onto another physical drive. The result is that your stuff is still on one physical drive and in danger of being lost through a hard drive failure. That nifty little external hard drive that you just bought at the computer store that is called a "Backup Hard Drive" is only a backup drive if you COPY the data from your computer's hard drive to the external drive. That means leaving the original data on the computer hard drive and putting a copy of it onto another, in this case your Backup Drive. You'll be following the Golden Rule for Data Safety. This is a vanguard project for the Diocese of San Diego. Prior to solar installation, OMC became good stewards of energy under Msgr. Mark Campbell: replacing light bulbs, switches, and fixtures. With the blessing of SDG&E, the parish reduced electrical usage by 20%.


The annual electrical energy use is now estimated to be 89,000kwh, down from 113,000kwh. OMC electrical energy use has been reduced by more than 65% with solar. Based on the current SDG&E rates, this represents a savings of approximately \$10,478 since this system was operational and \$5,827 in the past three months. Robert Wiegand is much more than just a University City Resident. To celebrate his 60th birthday, this stepfather to four adult children, decided to do something unique this year, participate in the "Cactus to Clouds Hike" and the "Palm Springs Tram Road Challenge" both on the same day. The Cactus to Clouds Hike starts in the Palm Springs Desert near sea level, and ends at the top of Mt. San Jacinto, 10,834 feet above sea level. It is one of the hardest hikes in the country. People have died on this trail from heat exhaustion, it harder to breath, and that the weather can change very quickly. The "Palm Springs Tram Road Challenge" is a 6K uphill run/walk. Participants climb 2,000 vertical feet in just over 3.7 miles.

The race is unique, because of the shortness of the race and the dramatic elevation gain. You need to be in extraordinary shape to complete this race. Wiegand stated, "I maybe the only person to have completed the Cactus to Clouds Hike and the Palm Springs Tram Road Challenge Run on the same day. I have always liked to push the physical envelope and thought it would be great to accomplish this at age 60, but I could not have done this without the support of my wife Susie, friends, family and community."

Wiegand grew up in University City and lives in the house he grew up in in. His home is 52 years old. It also seems that his athletic abilities rubbed off on his stepchildren: his younger boys played multiple sports through high school and the older girls are both runners.



THE UC PLANNING GROUP REPORT

At the May 12, meeting of the UC Planning Group, Chair Janay Kruger appointed the applicant to replace Sam Greening. The new member is Isabel Kay, Representative Resident District 2.

Taking the agenda out of order, I will first tell you the news for which many in the South UC neighborhood have been waiting. The Regents Road housing project by Alegria was disapproved in March but they took into account all of the objections of the neighbors, well, except maybe not building at all. Each objection was answered: the 10 two story close houses were reduced to 9 houses with no deviations (front yard width now 50' rather than 40', setback now standard 15' rather than the previous 9'). House #1 closest to Regents Road had the pad lowered by 3' and re-angled away from the house above it on Renault St. with windows well below the pad of the upper house. Also four of the nine houses will give the buyer the option of having a 3-car garage that could help with the lack of parking, and the tile roofs will be replaced with those more in keeping with the neighborhood. The trees originally on the upper slopes will now be at the bottom of the slopes with native shrubs planted on the slopes.

There was still the push to have the city extend the purple pipes from Stanley Park, but so far the city has declined. There was discussion of how the city can really approve the bioswale as "usable "open space when it is planted with Juncus Patens, a grass that is 1'-2 ½' tall and not suitable to be walked upon. The developer has also added a paved walking path around the bioswale. The owner of the house above house #1 spoke in favor of the development with the proposed changes. The planning group voted to approve.

We welcomed back Kyle Heiskala as Councilperson Sherri Lightner's spokesman. Kyle was the UCSD student rep and active member of the UCPG for several years. He reminded all of the City water regulations, announced an open meeting to review the city budget on June 8, at 2:00pm at City Hall, and that Sherri is still pushing for a Fast Response Squad in south UC.

Dan Monroe from the City Planning Dept. commented on the amendments to the community plan and the transportation/traffic study (which we reminded him was to be done with existing conditions.) UC is next in line for a complete, updated Community Plan given all the big changes taking place in North UC.

Last month the UCPG had been asked by the Carmel Valley Planning Group to support their opposition to One Paseo. UCPG decided that we did not know all the facts, pros/cons, and changes over the years so instead it was decided to present to the City Council a resolution asking them to listen carefully to the decisions of all planning groups, rather than have them too often overruled by the Planning Commission or the City Council.

The project Manager for Fire Station 50 on Nobel gave an update on the progress and announced a sub committee meeting on design, materials, and elevations.

UCPG chair, Janay Kruger is working on a comprehensive list of all the projects currently on the docket. There are 14 public and 18 private projects that she will detail with start/end dates and send to UCPG members.

The next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, June 9, 6:00pm at the Forum Hall UTC.



Council President Sherri Lightner

During the first week of May, the City Council reviewed the Mayor's FY16 Proposed Budget, and now the "May Revise". Council District One, and University City specifically, will benefit from several items where funding has been either reallocated, continued or newly provided.

Highlights include:

- A Fire-Rescue FAST Response Squad is proposed for South University City
- North Torrey Pines Golf Course Improvements
- Doyle Community Park ADA Upgrades

The May Revise included other items that I was requesting, such as increased recreation center hours and more funding for library materials.

Council members Emerald, Cole and I traveled to Washington, D.C. in late April for a whirlwind business trip with San Diego legislators and industry professionals to advocate for more federal resources for our city. On the trip, we discussed economic development, learned more about Qualified Public Infrastructure Bonds, and discussed International Trade at the Department of Commerce, focusing on trade and export policies that will benefit San Diego.

I was especially keen to talk about cyber-security with the Cybersecurity Industry Group. We discussed how San Diego can become the leader in this field, including assisting in the development of industry-led standards to reduce risks to critical infrastructure.

We also met with Congress members Peters, Davis and Vargas to discuss water policy, public safety, education and infrastructure. We were honored to attend the National Geographic "World's Smart Cities San Diego" premiere at the National Geographic Museum and were presented with an algae surfboard created in conjunction with UCSD.

On Friday, we met with the US Interagency Council on Homelessness. The trip concluded with a tour of 18F at the General Services Administration, which builds digital services focused on the interaction between government, people and businesses it serves.

Don't forget to attend the special "Street Safety" meeting that Sherri Lightner's office is coordinating with UCCA to address increasing concerns about traffic safety – auto, bicycle, and pedestrian. The meeting is scheduled for Thursday, June 4, 4:45pm at the South UC Library.


