Hi everyone...summer is here! School is out and San Diego is certainly a great place to be in July and August. I hope many of you were able to get to the "Celebration" this 4th of July and enjoy the wonderful activities planned for our community. Congratulations and thank you to the event

chairman George Odero and the committee of dedicated volunteers, and Standley Park staff, in making this event something very special for University City. We hope you are looking forward to enjoying the "Concerts in the Park" summer series at Standley Park. *UCCA will be honoring its many volunteers, (newspaper, Neighborhood Watch, et al.), at the August 21 concert so please join us in recognizing their volunteer efforts. A special thank you to University City Round Table Pizza, (a UCCA "Buy Local" partner), for providing our UCCA volunteers with a special discount coupon. Another local business, Lorna's Italian Restaurant, (also a UCCA "Buy Local" business partner), was recognized by California House of Representatives Speaker Toni Atkins in late June as being an exemplary small business contributing to their community.

At our June meeting, Fire Chief David Connor, confirmed that the mayor's budget does include the provision for a "fast response team" to be located somewhere in South University City. He also alerted us to the extra dry conditions that exist and that it will be very challenging during the predictable late summer Santa Ana winds. Construction at UTC starts this month...and parking will be limited. You'll notice the City and Super Loop buses will be parked and operating out of lanes marked on Genesee. Drive carefully on all of our streets! On Governor Drive, medians in front of Standley Middle School and at the west end of Governor, have begun the repair work needed to make the transition to our new planned drought resistant landscaping. This project is being paid for by UCCA and Councilwoman Lightner's office. Please read Merle Langston's article on page 10. Last month an important meeting to discuss street safety in University City was held at our library. See page 4 for information.

Plans for "Imagine UC 2020" will continue to move forward during the summer months. Captain's Forum Features Northern Division Officers

More than 50 Neighborhood Watch Captains from around Northern Division gathered at Standley Recreation Center on June 18, with Community Liaison Officer Holly Tafoya and other law enforcement officials to learn how to recognize and prevent elder abuse and financial crimes. Other topics included traffic accident investigation and the Quality of Life team. Panel members were (from left to right in photo above) Officer Holly Tafoya, Detective Farrell Layton, and Officers Joe Benavides, Phil Worthington and Collin Governski. The forum was organized by UC Neighborhood Watch Coordinator Barbara Gellman (standing). Tips and takeaways were many.

From Detective Layton: The most frequent way scammers contact their victims is by telephone. There is no way to prevent these calls as many are made by computer using Internet technology, not regular phone lines. You can protect yourself from these crimes by being smart. For example, if a 'family member' calls with a request for money, verify their story with another family member before sending money or purchasing a pre-paid debit card.

From Accident Investigation Officer Benavides: Officers are seeing an increase in fatal pedestrian, bicycle and motorcycle accidents involving cars and trucks. Most often, it is not the car or truck driver who is at fault; it is the pedestrian, bicyclist or motorcyclist. To prevent these types of accidents, make eye contact with motorists and be especially cautious walking or riding at night, even in a crosswalk or designated bike lane.

From Quality of Life Team Officers Worthington and Governski: This is a proactive team that responds to complaints from residents about people, often transients, who are interfering with the complainant's quality of life. To report an issue such as a homeless camp, loitering or people living in cars, call the police non-emergency number 619-531-2000. Homeless outreach and other services are offered to all who are contacted by this team.

Street Safety Concerns

Last month, an important University City "Street Safety Meeting" was held at our community library. This meeting was cosponsored by UCCA and Councilwoman Sherri Lightner, and was an outcome of the April "Imagine UC 2020" general meeting held at Standley Middle School. There were several City of San Diego departments in attendance to listen and respond to the various concerns voiced by residents. Representatives from the San Diego Police Traffic Division and San Diego City Streets Department were there to hear and address the various concerns. A report compiled by Mr. Fred Goossens, San Diego City Streets Supervisor, will be filed with Sherri Lightner's office and will be made available to review on the UCCA website. Some concerns addressed include: the Governor and Genesee intersection, the "no turn on red" at Regents and Governor, bicycle lane design, and the general concern of speeding on our side streets.

NATIONAL NIGHT OUT TIMES TWO

University City will be participating in our 3rd Annual National Night Out on Tuesday, **August 4**, 2015 and Wednesday, **August 5**.

This is a national program where neighbors on the street or block meet outside their homes and participate in potlucks and/or barbeques; your neighborhood watch street captain is usually the initiator. It promotes crime prevention, safety and neighborhood unity and sends a message to criminals that we are organized and fighting back. Lock your doors, turn on the lights, add a little night music and enjoy.

In the previous years, many of our police from Northern Division drove around from house to house for brief visits at homes in the community. This year they will not be able to visit in the same manner, instead:

Imagine 2020 and Other School Projects Progressing

The UC community effort to enhance our schools and park facilities simultaneously is moving forward. At the June 2 meeting, where a semi-annual update on Propositions S and Z to the Board of Education, the Spreckels to Standley project was on the approved list for 2015-2017. This allows the staff to develop plans and work with the city in the hopes of developing the joint use project. We all win if the school district and the city can pool resources.

This project includes potentially upgrading the pool at Standley Park to a full aquatic center to benefit high school teams, as well as swim instruction and community use. Another proposal is the permanent stage/pavilion for school and community performances at a community gathering space in the center of the park. A third proposal is a jogging path that connects Standley Middle School and Spreckels (with its running club), which would also be used by the community.

Improvements will be made to each school in UC. The high school already has a new football field with Friday night lights and other athletic fields are currently under construction there, as well as upgrades to the school building. Curie is on the 2016 list for an artificial turf field to replace some of the decomposed granite field at the school. Doyle is revamping the entrance for security and is in need of an auditorium to accommodate its large enrollment. Spreckels will eventually have modifications to its interior.

Standley Middle School is the next up on whole site modernizations and meetings will begin this fall for input on what the school community needs to improve its facilities.

Unfortunately, even as we upgrade our facilities in the community, the school district has been called on to reduce its water consumption as we endure the drought. The sports fields will continue to be watered as needed, but ornamental lawns will not be watered in the same way.

We will have information about Imagine UC 2020 at the UCCA booth on the Fourth of July.





Making UC Medians Beautiful

The Beautification Committee of University City is proud to announce that we will be re-landscaping the Governor Drive medians at Radcliffe and Stresemann. The cracked asphalt and inner curbs have been removed by the City thanks to the generous support and help from Sheri Carr from Sherri Lightner's Office. All trees will remain. The larger pine trees will be trimmed in December. The plan consists of drought-resistant plants, boulder clusters with plants and dry riverbed pebbles with mulch outer edges similar to the Poway/ Pomerado Road medians just east of Highway 15.

UCCA is reviewing bids from several contractors and will be making a decision by early July and hopefully completing the project within two months. UCCA is also preparing to set up a maintenance contract for the two newly planted Governor Dr. medians and also the non-irrigated hard surface medians on Genesee from Governor Dr. to Highway 52 and the Regents Road medians north and south of Governor.

Kudos to all those people who have become UCCA members in helping us to provide the funds for this project. We couldn't have done it without your support. The 2016 membership campaign will begin in September.

Save Water -Get A Free Bucket

The San Diego County Water Authority is giving away free standard sized buckets that residents can use to save water during the drought. The containers can collect water during showers, while doing



dishes or rinsing produce, or used to boil pasta or steam vegetables, according to the water authority. The collected water can then be used for watering plants, washing cars or windows, soaking dishes, and flushing toilets. The buckets are available at the water authority headquarters at 4677 Overland Ave. in Kearny Mesa, during regular business hours. For more info: www.sdcwa.org. (Info from ABC10news)

Water Regulations: Beginning in June, the state-mandated 16 percent water use reduction began for the City of San Diego as a whole. The City is strongly urging San Diegans to water no more than two times per week, for no more than five minutes per day, with:

- Homes with street addresses ending in an ODD number watering on Sundays and Thursdays
- Homes with street addresses ending in an EVEN number watering Wednesdays and Saturdays.
- And apartments, condos and businesses watering Monday and Fridays
- Previous restrictions remain in effect, and enforcement of these restrictions by City staff may increase.

Into the Wild with Friends of Rose Canyon

Friends of Rose Canyon brings hundreds of students a year from UC and Clairemont schools into Rose Canyon and Marian Bear Park. We divide into small groups, each with its own guide. Each group becomes a party of exploration – we never know what we'll discover. Kids as well as any parents and grandparents who attend are encouraged to point things out. We sneak up on rabbits and lizards. We watch hawks hunt and ravens attack hawks in aerial combat. We catch spiders and insects and examine them with magnifiers before letting them go. We find bones, feathers, and scat. The kids run and climb. Above all, we have fun.

For students in grades 4 and up, we also offer bird walks. We come to the classroom a few days beforehand with enough binoculars for every student and practice by observing birds on the school grounds.

Thanks to grants from SDG&E, our programs are free to the schools. Our guides are skilled naturalists. We draw our inspiration from the words of Rachel Carson, who in a 1956 article for Woman's Home Companion magazine encouraged parents to take their kids to wild places. She wrote:

"If a child is to keep alive his inborn sense of wonder, he needs the companionship of at least one adult who can share it, rediscovering with him the joy, excitement, and mystery of the world we live in." For info, go to: www.rosecanyon.org

Right: Blue-Eyed Grass, our local iris that is perennial and can be grown from seed. Left: Lance-Leaf Dudleya (Dudleya lanceolata) has fleshy leaves and blooms at this time of the year. Good in rock gardens.



Chairperson Janay Kruger announced the projects going forward to the Planning Commission: University Terrace East (Angelucci apts.), West End Project (houses on Regents Road). She also announced a public scoping meeting on single-use carryout bag ordinance. New crosswalk at La Jolla Village drive and Genesee and resetting the traffic lights is going forward within four months. Planning Group members were given a list of the 15 public projects, 20 private projects, and 3 potential projects being processed by UCPG.

Council person Sherri Lightner's rep reported on the 2016 city budget, addition of 3 lifeguards, support for the arts, 3 hours additional for libraries giving UC an 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ hour day on Sat., Swanson Pool has been temporarily closed in March and May because of contamination, pedestrian safety and traffic, Doyle International Festival and Lightner's support for the UC 4 th of July Celebration.

A UTC renovation update was given that starting in July much of the parking will be closed off for 12 months and busses will be moved out of UTC. All UTC watering will be purple piped recycled and will mitigate down to baseline for water neutral using no more than before.

The La Jolla Village Center is starting renovation and will close the Landmark theatre and several businesses in the center. The Post Office will have to move by Oct 31st when their lease runs out and is trying to find a new location. They have a neighborhood use permit for 800 P.O. boxes and need 2,400 sq ft in this area to service the current box holders. San Diego Forward Sandag, Regional Transportation plan is available and a UCPG subcommittee was appointed to review the plan and make comments by July 15.

David Akin, Public Utilities Customer Advocate spoke on the hot topic of water. The pure water project will purify wastewater and put it into the San Vincente Reservoir providing 1/3 of the city's water supply, but they are still building infrastructure so it will probably be 10 years before it is distributed. Also 10 % will come from the desalination plant. Discussion ensued and questions were asked about HOA's setting individual sub metering to encourage individual water conservation. It is possible but would cost \$350 per unit. Parks and Rec needs to make real efforts to save water. The purple pipes do not extend south so getting recycled water to Balboa Park is not now feasible. Planning and development must require drought tolerant plantings for new development. New construction should use recycled water for dust control when possible.

Aiken reminded people to change sprinklers to 2 times a week for no more that 5 minutes and to switch to micro spray and drip. Rebates for grass removal will begin July 1 at midnight; they must be preapproved and will be granted only until the \$350,000 is allocated. Watch for new rebates for grey water, rebates for micro sprayers and drip. Free home surveys are available from the water department. There is a new free app for the smart phone available called Waste No Water or go to http://wastenowater.org.

Brian Elliott presented information on the Climate Action Campaign. The draft climate action plan is to reduce the CO2 greenhouse gases 50% back to the mid 90's level by 2035 to prevent fires and deal with the rise of sea level. Transportation makes 54% and heating and cooling make the rest. By 2035 the climate action plan would have the 87% who commute by car reduced to 50%, the 10% who take public transportation change to 25%, the 1% who walk change to 7% and the 1% who bike change to 18%; we need to shift our transportation focus. Community Choice Energy would buy electricity, deliver energy, maintain lines and benefit customers with affordable rates with local controlled clean energy. San Diego is currently 2nd in the nation in solar installation meaning many jobs for the city. Learn more about the Climate Action Campaign at http://www.climateactioncampaign.org.

The Fire Stations Committee is working on design and traffic flow for station 50 on Nobel.

Next UCPG meeting is July 14 and there is no meeting in August.

That said, I am once again looking forward to attending the upcoming annual "Oh Say Can U.C." 4th of July Celebration at Standley Park! It is such a great event, and I would like to say <u>thank you</u> to all the volunteers for the hard work and planning that goes into making this event a great success!

On June 8th, the City Council unanimously approved the FY16 Budget. This is truly the best budget we have seen in years. It restores public safety and neighborhood services, and also funds additional infrastructure. I was pleased to support increased funding for public safety, including three more Lifeguards and three additional Park Rangers. I'm also especially pleased to increase funding to our libraries to add additional hours on Saturdays at 23 branch libraries across the city, including the University Community Library.

In May, UC residents met with a panel of City staff (including my staff) and Police for a productive discussion on safety issues. A list of concerns was developed based on feedback, and it will be looked at and analyzed for improving safety and quality of life for community residents. I look forward to seeing the results of this effort.

Our office is also working on Swanson Pool contamination issues. Please help to keep this valuable community resource open by keeping an eye on suspicious activity taking place around the area after hours. If you see anything, please notify our office or contact SDPD via the non-emergency number at 619-531-2000. In the meantime, we are working with the staff at the Parks and Recreation Department to bring about a long-term solution so that we can keep the pool open for the summer.


