Where does all the money go?

o you ever wonder how UCCA budgets its money? I will write an occasional article in the newsletter to let you know. First we'll deal with 2010. Our main source of revenue is membership contributions. Last year we took in \$16,300 from members. Thank you so much for your generosity! This funded the newsletter (\$3,653), banners (\$1,587), donations to worthy causes (\$2,000), liability Insurance (\$1,779) and several smaller items like the web page. Donations were \$1,000 to the Rec. Council for the 4th of July celebration, \$200 to the Standley Middle School band for the Christmas/Holiday tree lighting, \$200

for UCHS Grad Nite, \$200 for Camp Kesson and \$200 for the 4th of July pancake breakfast. We ended the year with a surplus of \$7,046 which turns out to be a good thing since our membership donations are down so far this year.



As a result of our membership drive in March, we have taken in \$9,525 –

once again thank you! However, this is considerably down from the amount we budgeted (\$15,000). But to offset this, the newsletter has returned a profit of \$2,861 through April due to increased advertising. Advertisers increasingly recognize the value that the newsletter brings to their businesses thanks to the work of Editor **Kay Goodfellow** and Advertising Manager **Terri Day.**

In summary, we are in sound shape financially and I look forward to keeping you up to date as the year unfolds. Peter Burch, Treasurer UCCA

Real Estate Signs

s real estate agents, we all need to be aware of where we place our Open House signs. While the **_** goal is to help the seller sell their home, we need

to be aware of safety in placing those signs and be sure to not block the view of drivers, including emergency vehicles. Following is a brief outline of local sign ordinances applicable in residentially zoned areas of San Diego.



On-Premise For Sale Signs: 1 sign per frontage (4 square feet maximum), no flags or banners. Must have firm name. Removal 15 days after close of escrow.

Off-Premise Directional Signs (Open House): 4 square feet maximum. Daylight hours only. Not on public rightof-way including street medians, sidewalks & grass strip at curb. Signs placed on private property require permission of the owner.



Redistricting Commission Seeks Community Input District 1 Meeting May 11th

very 10 years, the City Council district boundaries are redrawn to account for population changes based on the census. Midori Wong, Chief of staff to the Redistricting Commission, presented information and explained the process at the April UCPG meeting. This year, the Redistricting Commission will also have to add a 9th council district (as voted by the people) when redrawing the districts. The council districts must be made as equal in population as possible or practicable. Based on the latest census figures, each district should have 144,624 people. Our current Council District 1, with a population of 199,464, will have to give up about 55,000 people.

The Redistricting Commission is in the pre-map stage and will adopt a final plan in August. To encourage public input prior to the drawing of the maps, community meetings are being held in each council district and will continue through July 2011. The meeting in **District 1**, is scheduled for May 11th at the La Jolla Library at 6:00 p.m. The LOCATION MAY CHANGE TO A LARGER VENUE. Residents of each district are encouraged to attend the meeting in their district (or another district) to learn more about the process and provide input. Post-map community meetings will be held in July prior to the final plan.

Per City Charter Section 5.1, Districts are required to:

Be geographically compact

Be composed of <u>contiguous</u> territory

Have reasonable access between population centers Be bounded by natural boundaries, street lines and/or city boundary lines

Preserve identifiable communities of interest

The UCPG Board recommended to Midori Wong that the Community Plan boundaries be kept intact when redistricting. It was also pointed out that South UC residents are tied closely to UCSD and Biotech/Medical companies and facilities in North UC and LaJolla—forming a community of interest.

Redistricting Commission meetings held the 1st and 3rd Thursday of the month at 4 p.m. in the 12th Floor committee room at the City Administration Building. The public is invited. Cal Trans planted some beautiful trees and landscaping on the entrance and exit of 805 near Miramar Nursery. 



What is it?

s I jogged under the Judicial Avenue Bridge last week, perched above me was a Common Barn Owl. I named it

Hooter. For seven days now, I've stopped under the bridge for a moment to look up at Hooter. If you don't know this, joggers hate to stop until their run is finished.

After work and on weekend mornings, I jog for about one hour each day. My pace has

slowed considerably since the installation of a new titanium hip. On the plus side, however, I spend more time looking around as I'm jogging - so I guess I could say my metal hip is paying dividends.

Most of you might have heard about Molly, the barn owl in San

Marcos. She is a Common Barn Owl, too. She has been tending to her owlets in her owl box as people watch the hatchlings grow via webcam.

Barn owls are known for their white heart-shaped faces and tiny, dark eyes. They're popular among farmers because they eat rodents. An adult Common Barn Owl will typically eat 2-3 rodents a night. And a family of owls can increase that to about 10. So

that equates to more than 2,000 rodents per year!

Common Barn Owls are nocturnal raptors and kill their prey with strong grasping talons. With their remarkable hearing and excellent



low-light vision, they can accurately strike and capture prey at night in total darkness. They have a large 40-inch wingspan, and fly slowly and silently while hunting. Owls swallow their prey whole, in one piece. Later they regurgitate the left-overs in a "pellet" of fur, bones and teeth. These pellets are found under their nests and where they roost.
