Leap year doesn't mean much to most of us. It's simply another day tacked onto February's standard 28 days, once every four years.

But if you're of an astronomical



bent, leap year is serious business. "A leap year occurs every four years to help synchronize the calendar year with the solar year, or the length of time it takes the earth to complete its orbit about the sun, which is about 365¼ days," say Ann Marie Imbornoni and Mark Hughes in "Leap Year Explained," found on the website Infoplease.

Blame it all on Roman Emperor Julius Caesar. In 46 B.C., on the advice of the astronomer Sosigenes, he added the first leap day.

But February 29th is really serious business if that's your birthday. You're not alone. There are about 200,000 Americans who have been born on leap year, although the chances are slim, about one in 1,500.

Frankly, a birthday on leap year doesn't give you much to leap about. It's an annoying day to have a birthday. For starters, you really only celebrate it once every four years. On the other three years you have to choose an alternative birthday, say, February 28 or March 1st.

Many "leapers" say friends and even some family members forget to wish them birthday greetings in the off years. To make up for celebratory delay and the forgetfulness of well-wishers, some "leapers" plan elaborate birthday parties or trips abroad.

If February 29th is your big day, then happy birthday! Sadly, you probably won't hear that for another four years.

UCCA Welcomes Fast Response Squad 56

UCCA members and neighbors welcomed Fire-Rescue Fast Response Squad 56 to University City at its January meeting. Their new home is on Governor Drive, west of Regents Road. Staffing for Squad 56 consists of a two-person crew: a fire captain and a firefighter/paramedic. They will work a 12-hour shift from 8 AM to 8 PM.

Chief Newell explained that the new location will result in faster response times to calls from south University City. The Squad carries a full complement of medical supplies as well as some fire suppression equipment capable of handling small fires.

Chief Ricci explained that 85% of all calls to fire-rescue are medical in nature. In south University City, Squad 56 is dispatched from the 9-1-1 call center. Anyone with a police, medical or fire-rescue emergency should call 9-1-1. The dispatcher will send the appropriate units based on the reported emergency. If Squad 56 is dispatched, it will be joined by a fire engine from a nearby station.

Some questioned the necessity of sending both Squad 56 and a fire engine; doing so results in four to six or possibly more firerescue personnel responding to a medical call. Chief Ricci explained that a paramedic is assigned to each fire truck. And, that in a CPR (cardio-pulmonary resuscitation) situation such as during sudden cardiac arrest, four to six people are needed. Two staff would be doing CPR, while others could be administering medicine or starting IV (intravenous) fluids, or arranging for transport, for instance.

Police Lieutenant Adam Sharki returns for a second assignment at Northern Division. He previously worked in investigations and the beach communities. Most recently, he was assigned to Northwestern Division. He is looking forward to working with all of the communities of Northern Division. Lt. Sharki announced that Northern has recently hired additional officers and a new class of officers is currently attending the police academy.

Lt. Sharki was questioned about a recent accident in front of University City High School. Lt. Sharki said that increased traffic enforcement in that area, especially as it relates to illegal left turns out of the high school, is in place. However, on the day of the accident, the officer working enforcement was called away before the accident happened.

Community Relations Officer Holly Tafoya spoke of the 'garage burglary' series that's affecting south University City. Thieves are breaking into cars parked on the street and opening the garage door with the opener found in the car; then opening the garage just enough to get in. Once they have access to the garage, they are stealing items from the garage and home.



Imagine UC 2020 and other school projects progressing

The UC community effort to enhance our schools and park facilities simultaneously is moving forward. At the June 2 semiannual Propositions S and Z update to the Board of Education the Spreckels to Standley project was on the approved list for 2015-2017. This allows the staff to develop plans and work with the city in the hopes of developing the joint use project. We all win if the school district and the city can pool resources.

This project includes potentially upgrading the pool at Standley Park to a full aquatic center to benefit high school teams, as well as swim instruction and community use. Another proposal is the permanent stage/pavilion for school and community performances at a community gathering space in the center of

the park. A third proposal is a jogging path that connects Standley Middle School and Spreckels (with its runnina which club). would also be used by the community.



Improvements will be made to each school in UC. The high school already has a new football field with Friday night lights and other athletic fields are currently under construction there, as well as upgrades to the school building. Curie is on the 2016 list for an artificial turf field to replace some of the decomposed granite field at the school. Doyle is revamping the entrance for security and is in need of an auditorium to accommodate its large enrollment. Spreckels will eventually have modifications to its interior.

Standley Middle School is the next up on whole site modernizations and meetings will begin this fall for input on what the school community needs to improve its facilities. Unfortunately, even as we upgrade our facilities in the community, the school district has been called on to reduce its water consumption as we endure the drought. The sports fields will continue to be watered as needed, but ornamental lawns will not be watered in the same way.

We will have info about Imagine UC 2020 at the UCCA booth on the Fourth of July.

December was an eventful month at City Hall. I am proud to announce that I was unanimously reelected by my peers to continue to serve as the Council President for another year through the remainder of my term in office. A notable piece of legislation that was approved by the Council on December 15th was the Climate Action Plan. The plan outlined goals for the City to reduce our greenhouse gas emissions over the next twenty years some of which include transitioning to 100% renewable energy, becoming a zero waste City and increasing transit use, bicycling and walking in priority areas.

A Scoping Meeting for the Environmental Impact Report being prepared by City staff as a part of the process for updating the transportation section of the University Community Plan was held December 16th at the Nobel Recreation Center. Approximately 80 members of the public were in attendance, which is a great turn out! Let's keep this level of engagement going through the remainder of the process.

I am excited to welcome the Fire Department's new Fast Response Squad being set up at the west end of Governor Drive between Regents Road and Stresemann Street. This has been in the works over the past year and we all expect that it will improve emergency response times in the neighborhoods along Governor Drive.

A newly proposed Fire Station at the intersection of Nobel Drive and Shoreline Drive is moving forward through approval process and is expected to come to the University Community Planning Group in February or March for the group's input and approval.

Please express your appreciation to the City Fire-Rescue emergency response teams that have been working to protect our safety in the recent dangerous storm conditions making dozens of water rescues. With more anticipated storm events on the way this winter season make sure you do your part to be prepared and avoid dangerous flooded areas. On that note, please report any damage from storm events, such as potholes, to our office.



UC Planning Group Report

The January meeting was opened with Chair Janay Kruger announcements: four additional appointees to the Costa Verde Committee-- Tom Fetter from the Chevron station, Stephanie Boudreaux from Vi, Janis Deady of Oggi's, and Greg Zinser from S.D. Community Foundation. Janay stopped the city from increasing the traffic speed on Nobel Dr. between Town Center Dr. and Shoreline from 40mph to 55mph because of the construction of the new fire station at Shoreline. On April 2 the Ragnar Relay from Huntington Beach to Coronado will require the closing of Genesee from the glider port through UC and the closing of the UCHS parking lot. The City Council will be considering the adoption of an ordinance restricting the use of plastic and paper single-use carryout bags in upcoming meetings.

SDPD update: the addition of 8 new officers in the Northern Division. They caution people to take their garage door openers from their cars into the house since there have been occurrences of openers being used to enter houses through the garage. The SDPD is sponsoring the "Try Harder Triathlon" to raise money for at risk youth.

The SANDAG update on the trolley: Currently demolishing the median on Genesee followed by the demolition of the median from Nobel to Regents with fencing down the middle of the streets. They are in the process of right of way acquisitions, negotiations with builders, working with UTC re the MTS bus station, advancing the utility changes on the Genesee sewer, water, and storm drain lines. The trolley should be running 2020-2021. The Feds and Transnet will split the price for the construction. At the February meeting they will explain the lane shifts and how they will build the entire line for the trolley.

Councilperson Lightner's rep. Kyle Heisakala cited the City Climate Action Plan, which should be in effect 100% by 2035, and the city council discussion of El Nino preparedness. Last month's EIR scoping meeting is a continuing process. Lightner has been very instrumental in getting fire stations for our area: the new south UC FAST Response fire station 56, station 50 is in process on Nobel Dr., and she is working with UCSD to have a campus station. They are looking for people to work on boards and commissions on gangs, parking, senior affairs advisory, human sourcing, libraries, internal affairs, and city attorney. He is still keeping tabs on the 5850 Regents Road building proposal. Senator Marty Block's office reported his work on bills to update the penal code on threats to schools and on human trafficking.

Dan Monroe from the City Planning Department reported that they are considering all the suggestions made at the University Community Plan Amendment Scoping meeting and those mailed. The Traffic report is not yet complete but should be posted in about two weeks; future analysis is important for the EIR draft. The City is surveying how to improve mobility and transportation when I-5/Genesee project finishes in 2017, the super loop, mid-coast trolley, I-5 and 805 improvements by SANDAG. Planning will brief the UCPG on FBA and CIP funds for projects.

Supervisor Dave Roberts made a personal appearance at the planning group meeting introducing himself and his family. He is currently president pro tem for the supervisors and Mel Milstein runs his office. He laid out his projects: suicide task force and expanding emergency response teams with mental health emphasis, housing for the homeless released from the hospital, and the grant processes for the county funding for community activities. MCAS Miramar report by Kristine Camper involved monitoring trespassers on 25,000 acres.

A proposal on the agenda to request a vote on a new idea for the Regents Road Bridge and Rose Canyon was presented by Louis Rodolico, a south University City resident. He presented a very innovative slide showing undergrounding the railroad through Rose Canyon, a long span separated-lanes bridge, and drainage, which could result in a lake in the canyon. He was complimented on his originality and for volunteering to line up the many agencies that would need to be consulted to bring his plans to fruition. Questions were asked and discussion ensued and the vote of the planning group was one abstention and 15 nays. NEXT MEETING: February 9 at the Scripps building 10010 Campus Point Drive

Environmental Impact Report Update

On Wednesday, December 16th, at the Nobel Rec. Center, the City's Planning Dept. led by Dan Monroe, Senior Planner, and Susan Morrison, City Planning Supervisor, introduced and explained to the audience the required EIR, (Environmental Impact Report). They stated this report, which is mandated by California state law, CEQA, (California Environmental Quality Act) will be presented to San Diego's City Council for their approval as an amendment of the University City Community Plan.

Mr. Monroe reviewed various pre-selected alternatives to be considered for a needed community plan amendment that would affect all of the area within the greater University City boundaries. These listed alternatives, <u>but not limited to</u>, focused on variations of either completing the planned Genesee widening and the building of Regents Road Bridge or removing one or both from the Community Plan. The City Planning Dept. has set a target date of completing the study, to include recommendations, by November of 2016.

Ms. Morrison then reviewed how the public comment portion of the meeting would be conducted. Forms for written comments were available to turn in that evening or mail in to the planning department. There were 26 speakers, each limited to a maximum of two minutes. It was requested that speakers not ask questions, but focus their comments on what they felt are the important factors for consideration in the EIR report/analysis. A few of the speakers, not only provided their own viewpoint on environmental factors, such as traffic, air/water pollution, and safety, but also expressed disdain over the reply time allowance for community input during the December holiday period. Speakers included residents from Pacific Beach, La Jolla, and Clairemont, as well as residents from both north and south University City. Additional meetings for public review/comments will be scheduled in 2016.

UCCA will continue to provide updates of this important community issue in future newsletter editions.

Mid-Coast Trolley

Project Update

The Mid-Coast project will extend the Trolley from Old Town to the University City community. Nine new stations will be constructed, serving major activity centers such as the Mission Bay area, the VA Medical Center, UCSD, and Westfield UTC.

In order to make way for the primary construction of the project, crews will begin this month the work of relocating underground utilities – such as water and sewer lines—along portions of Genesee Avenue. This effort will help prepare the area for the new trolley infrastructure. This "wet utilities work" includes opening sections of the street to locate, move or repair portions of underground systems. The majority of this work will be performed at night to minimize impacts to traffic.

For all residents and businesses in the area, access to driveways will be maintained throughout the project. There may be some portions of roads closed or detoured at night. You may notice impacts to portions of the road over a period of three years as crews prepare to build San Diego's newest transit line. Our team will be making sure to keep local residents informed about any major impacts of the project.





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
