Keep Garage Doors Closed and Shut the Door on Crime

Burglars can spot an open garage door and remove visible items in a matter of seconds. In many instances, the home owners are home and even outside when the burglary takes place.

Typical items taken are:

- · Tools and ladders
- Lawn equipment
- Sporting equipment
- Bikes and kids toys
- Or valuables left inside vehicles parked in the garage.

If you notice your neighbor's garage door open, please be a good neighbor and remind them of the importance of keeping their garage doors closed! Neighbors looking out for one another is the single most effective crime prevention tool.

Besides keeping your garage door closed, lock side gates, install LED lights around the your home, keep valuables out of your parked cars, bring garage door opener in at night and share information with your Neighborhood Watch group.

CHANGE YOUR CLOCKS, CHANGE YOUR BATTERIES

Now that we've changed our clocks and we're well into the longer days of Daylight Savings Time, emergency lighting and smoke detectors may not be at the top of your to-do list. However, the San Diego Fire-Rescue Department recommends checking smoke detector function once a month by pressing the test button. Replace batteries at least once a year; and replace the smoke detector after 10 years.

If your fire or smoke alarm sounds, don't try to fight the fire yourself; get out of the house as quickly as possible. Call 9-1-1 as soon as you are out of the house. If your detector makes a chirping sound, it usually indicates a low battery. Replace the battery with a fresh one immediately. And, while you're at it, Neighborhood Watch reminds you to check your flashlight and other battery powered lights and equipment once a month and replace batteries once a year.

Do You Have a Plan for the Next BIG Disaster?

Even though we don't know if and when the big Earthquake, fire or natural disaster will strike San Diego County or University City we must stay prepared. CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) San Diego is the largest single program in the County of San Diego.

Did you know, when the next major disaster hits University City we may and probably will not have our first responders such as the Fire Department, Police and even Emergency Medical Team (EMT) able to respond to our needs?

CERT has helped in the past and will help when needed in the future. The CERT team may be your First Responders and are trained to perform minor medical procedures, communications (HAMM radio), light search and rescue, small fire suppression and other tasks that may be necessary to assist our family, neighbors and community.

You do not need to be CERT qualified to participate with CERT.

Do you have a go bag, emergency supplies, 3-day supply of water and food, cash (electricity may be out, no ATM's) and where is your meeting/staging area? You can get yourself and your loved ones prepared by creating a Family Disaster Plan Checklist and practicing it. Visit www.sdcounty.ca.gov/oes for more information on how to create a plan of your own.

School Board Ethics Reform Approved

Recent events have focused attention on the role of board members and the board's ethical guidelines and enforcement. I decided that it was time to move forward with a clear policy for board members that is open and transparent to the public. Ultimately, the voters decide who is an ethical and effective board member. Board Governance policy states that the Superintendent is the sole point of direction for staff members. The Board is very clear that the Superintendent has not made personnel decisions based upon pressure from any Board member. The Superintendent keeps the entire Board apprised of potential personnel changes and her reasons for those changes. But there was a perception by some staff members and by the public that one board member had undue influence on such decisions. We need to address any perception, especially by staff, that a board member is exerting undue influence.

I proposed four additions to board governance policy to prevent future problems. They were all approved. First, if a board member attempts to direct a staff member or displays unprofessional behavior to that staff member, the Superintendent will discuss the problem with the Trustee and then issue a memo to all board members regarding the incident. This is the first step in shining light on the offense. If that is not sufficient or if such incidents recur, the Superintendent will place it on an open board meeting agenda for public discussion. With the new policy even an attempt by a board member to direct operations would be made public, as would any unprofessional conduct by a board member towards a staff member.

Second, the Superintendent was directed to set up a reporting policy for employees who feel that they are being operationally directed by a board member or treated unprofessionally. This needs to be done in a way that ensures that there is not any retaliation. Third, within sixty days following the election of each new Trustee the full board will participate in training by experts on conflict of interest laws and ethics. We will have our first board governance workshop on March 15 with our outstanding new board member from District E, Dr. Sharon Whitehurst-Payne. Fourth, if a new Trustee has a child in San Diego Unified, the Trustee, Superintendent and the staff at that school will have a conference in the first month of the Trustee's term to address the distinction between the role as a parent and the role as a Trustee.

Certain behavior is prohibited by the Board's Code of Conduct. But the above additions will serve to prevent certain misconduct and provide remedies when it occurs. We must hold ourselves to a high standard. As the late Congresswoman Barbara Jordan once said, "We as public officials must set an example for the nation...we must hold ourselves strictly accountable."

Finally, Don't miss the annual Taste of the Triangle on Friday, May 6 at the UC Faculty Club. This is your chance to show your support for UC neighborhood schools.

Spring is here as 2016 speeds by! It has been a productive first three months of the year with many notable actions by the City Council and improvements in University City to report.

For its first full month of operation, University City's new fast response squad, called Squad 56, had 79 total responses in February. Over 80% of those responses were for medical calls with an overall average response time of 6 minutes and 10 seconds. In other fire station related news, the University Community Planning Group voted unanimously to approve preliminary designs for Fire Station 50, which will be located at Shoreline Drive and Nobel Drive.

At the end of February, the City Council approved the creation of an Urban Agriculture Incentive Zone. This allows owners of vacant properties to receive a property tax reduction if the parcel is used for agriculture such as a community garden. Parcels that qualify must be a

For Earth Day: A Call for Safe Disposal County Supervisor Dave Roberts

In anticipation of Earth Day, I am asking constituents in University City and throughout the Third Supervisorial District to dispose of unused or expired prescription drugs properly.

As a member of the county's Prescription Drug Abuse Task Force, I appreciate any opportunity to talk about the dangers of prescription drug abuse and the importance of safe disposal. I'm also asking doctors and pharmacists to participate in a state program designed to treat the prescription drug abuse epidemic. So much is at stake. I'm reminded of that whenever I look into the faces of my children.

In March, the Prescription Drug Abuse Task Force published the results of a survey that explores public attitudes on medication disposal. Among 2,000 local respondents, about two in three reported that they do not properly dispose of expired or unwanted meds.

That's not OK.

When dangerous drugs fall into the wrong hands, household medicine cabinets often are the source, law enforcement officials and prevention advocates say. In other words, that old bottle of painkillers can be as deadly as any lethal weapon.

In 2014, local authorities recorded 244 prescription drug overdose deaths and 17 of them were among people age 15 through 24. Clearly, legal drugs can bring deadly outcomes. That's why authorities are urging us to do a better job of getting rid of pills that we don't need.

Take expired or unwanted meds to any Sheriff's station for disposal into a secure drop-box. In 2014, those collections totaled 13,000 pounds. Watch for take-back events. The Drug Enforcement Administration regularly coordinates collections of prescription drugs. In September, at 42 locations in this county and three in Imperial County, agents collected 7.3 tons of drugs.

The DEA has announced April 30 as National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day for 2016. Mark your calendars. Please don't flush those old pills.

Authorities warn that wastewater treatment systems often are not equipped to filter pharmaceuticals before they are released into the ocean, lagoons, groundwater, rivers or other water bodies. Researchers have identified pharmaceutical drug contamination in the water supplies of millions of Americans and have blamed it for altering female-to-male ratios of marine life and for producing fish with both male and female sexual characteristics.

To reduce our pharmaceutical footprint, we continue to push for reforms on the front end of the supply line.

minimum of 0.1 acres and a maximum of 3 acres as well as be in a zone that already allows for agricultural use. Additionally, an agreement between the City and Local 911, the Lifeguard Union was approved, which will extend presumptive illness coverage to full time Lifeguard employees for illnesses contracted on the job such as Pneumonia, Tuberculosis, exposure to biochemical substances and Meningitis.

In March, a batch of updates to the City's Land Development Code was approved. More time will now be required for the noticing of projects after an application is submitted. The City will also be changing regulations to make it easier for projects such as charter schools, electric vehicle charging stations, and home occupations.

Lastly, thank you for the ongoing feedback to our office about neighborhood streets. New 'no turn on red' signage has been installed by City transportation engineers at the intersection of Regents Road and Governor Drive as the result of requests from local residents. Please continue to reach out to my office as the year continues!

What's Your Type?

Did you know? There are two types of volunteers who are associated with the San Diego Public Libraries. There are those who volunteer with the library and often are assigned functions by the Branch Manager. Tasks often have to do with the day-to-day running of the library such as shelving books, helping with Storytimes or crafts for the kids, mending books, to helping weed books such as removing non-circulating items from the shelves.

These people are recognized as City Volunteers and go through a vetting process, which includes on-line training modules. In addition, in cases where they will be in contact with children, these volunteers undergo fingerprinting and criminal background checks. They are not involved with money raising activities, although they save the city huge amounts of money by doing jobs the staff would have to do. Their volunteer hours are entered into an on-line tally sheet.

Library Friends, on the other hand, are a volunteer organization whose main purpose is to raise money to supplement the branch's budget for programs, equipment and materials (books, etc.) The funds raised are matched by the Library Foundation at either 100% or 50%, depending on the fund to which they are submitted. The Friends usually do not interact on a day-to-day basis with library patrons, except at book sales. They pay a small membership fee and their hours are recorded separately, not online, and reported every six months to their "Umbrella" organization, the Corporate Friends.

Now, Friends may be Volunteers too, and Volunteers may be Friends, but hours are kept and reported separately. This is important because for many years this was all a very grey area which was just clarified by the City of San Diego last year.

Many of you have probably seen the movie, "Amadeus." In the movie, there is a scene where Salieri watches Mozart and his fiancé cavorting in the room where a reception is to be held after a concert. Suddenly Mozart, hearing that the music of the concert has started, jumps up, runs out, and takes the baton to lead the ensemble; at this point Salieri realizes that the fellow he has been watching behave badly is indeed the composer of whom he has heard so much. In the movie Salieri later looks at the score for this movement; he comments:

"On the page it looked nothing. The beginning simple, almost comic. Just a pulse. Bassoons and basset horns, like a rusty squeezebox. And then suddenly, high above it, an oboe. A single note, hanging there, unwavering. Until a clarinet took over and sweetened it into a phrase of such delight! This was no composition by a performing monkey! This was a music I'd never heard. Filled with such longing, such unfulfillable longing, it had me trembling. It seemed to me that I was hearing the voice of God."

Come and hear the piece for yourself! And if you know students who are wind players, encourage them to come as well!

THINK-EAT-SAVE

I recently attended the 3rd annual Zero Waste Symposium with UCHS PTSA board member and UC resident Margie Watkins. The primary focus of this year's event was to highlight steps currently underway to achieve San Diego's Zero Waste plan by 2040. The spectrum of speakers ranged from City

agencies, community partners, and national non-profits to for-profit waste management companies and restaurateurs. Collectively, they are helping to reshape the concept of "what is waste". While innovation and forward thinking are integral to the future success of the City's plan, there is a

concerted effort centered on the significant benefits of simple conservation.

I would love to go on and on about a Zero Waste lifestyle, but food recovery is specifically high on the list of low hanging fruit and the theme of this year's Earth Day - so let's start there. In the US, 40% of food is thrown away somewhere between farm to fork. Not only is this a tremendous



waste of food, but when we also consider the massive waste of resources including energy, water, and land, it becomes obvious that this upward trend is not sustainable or responsible. The tragic irony is that 1 in 6 Americans lack food security, most of them children.

We can all be part of the solution, so here are some ideas and resources to guide you on a path toward Zero Waste in your home, community, school, workplace, and ultimately our wonderful City.

- Speaking of low hanging fruit, many UC homes are experiencing stellar crop yields from their citrus trees this year. If your green thumb generates more fruit and/or vegetables than your family can eat in one season, the app NextDoor offers an easy way to let your fellow UC neighbors know you would like to share your bounty.
- Beyond sharing with neighbors, there are local organizations, such as Senior Gleaners of San Diego County and Harvest Crops that will either come and glean your trees or offer a drop off location. The produce is then distributed to low-income families and seniors.

By making small shifts in how we shop, store and prepare food, we can keep the valuable resources used to produce and distribute food from going to waste. As with all Zero Waste mantras, "Reduce" is where our journey begins:

- Meal Planning By buying no more than what you expect to use, you
 will be more likely to use it up and keep it fresh.
- Prepare a Food Storage Guide / Eat Me First Prompt.
- Still Tasty Learn the difference between "sell-by", "best-by", and expiration dates at www.stilltasty.com.

To the extent that some of your produce still spoils, be sure to compost it. Instead of sending this waste to the landfill, convert it to compost right in your own backyard and eventually add the nutrients to your soil.










Doyle Park's Butterfly Garden Enters Caterpillar Stage

Rose Canyon Bird Walks

Experience the amazing sights and sounds of spring birds, including some from the tropics. The free walks are hosted by the Friends of Rose Canyon and are led by skilled birders. Walks are on Saturdays, April 10, 16, 23, 30 and May 7, from 8:00-10:00am.

Spring is the best time of year to see and hear a great variety of birds in Rose Canyon, including migrants arriving from the tropics, winter residents getting ready to migrate north, and year-round residents. Many are in breeding plumage, some with spectacular colors. Some are singing to establish territories and attract mates. Some are building nests, gleaning insects off the trees, feeding their young. Birds of prey are on the wing, courting, hunting, and carrying prey to their nests.

Walks are easy and participants can leave at any time during the walk. Best for adults and children ages 9 and up. Reminder that there are no bathrooms or water in Rose Canyon Park or at the trailhead parking area. Meet at the intersection of Regents Road and Lahitte Court (at the dead end). Bring binoculars if you have them, water and sunscreen. Walks start promptly at 8:00am, please arrive early to park, sign in, and borrow binoculars if needed. UC Planning Group Report

Sherri Lightner's rep reported on the city council passage of the urban incentive zone, lifeguard union expanded health agreement, and city boards still open for parking and libraries. The expansion of hours for the UC Rapid Response Team is in the budget proposal. The study is on going on air pollution control at Miramar landfill and the odor source. Recycling is still a priority. On behalf of the city a formal commendation was given to Bruce Rainey for his four years of service on the UCPG. Supervisor Dave Roberts' rep reported on the Work Force Policy Board meeting April 28 to match employers with employees and on the Getting to Zero Task Force on HIV/Aids as well as Aging and Independence Services forums. Scott Peters' rep reported on free income tax prep for those who need it at Nobel Library, and the Educational Plan, and the High School Art Contest deadline April 20. Senior City Planner Dan Monroe gave an update on the community plan amendment. The planners are still summarizing the February survey results on walking, driving, and biking in U.C. The city will release the draft EIR by summer.

<u>UTC Westfield Update:</u> John Alderson assured us that there would be a new Forum Hall for meetings. They are tearing down the old Nordstrom's building and the new 144,000 sq. ft. building on the corner of La Jolla Village Drive and Genesee will be above the parking and is being paid for by Nordstrom; it is on schedule and on budget. Lots of new restaurants with outdoor seating and many trees will be added. There may be a residential tower added on the southwest corner with up to 294 apartments. The parking structure will open before November 23, 2016 with 2,000 spaces of which 200 will be for trolley riders and validated parking will be available for Arc Light, 24hr Fitness, and restaurants. After 2017, a new additional parking lot will open.

<u>Fire Station 50 on Nobel</u>: Elif Cetin from City Public Works gave an update on the planning progress and introduced architects Safdie Rabines and their landscape architect. The Fire Chief, Brian Fennessy and the city civil engineer have approved the 12,400 sq. ft. fire station plans. The UCPG sub-committee approved the preliminary plans. Everyone within 300 ft. has been notified. The building has a small footprint and gains space by going up and also uses half floor mezzanines within. The schedule: need approval of UCPG, city approval in May, bids out in summer and construction plans in by winter 2016-17 with ground breaking in late 2017. The landscape architect explained zone 2 with removal of invasive species and replanting of natives. The station is in the Multi-Species Habitat Planning Area (MHPA) and they are keeping reduced light spill and will mitigate swap for the land used within the same area. This was an action item and the UCPG approved the plans unanimously.

<u>City Council Action to sell 5 Excess Properties</u>. One of these properties lies in the UCPG area with 4 acres of a 42-acre area developable land valued at \$4,070,000. Proceeds of the sale would go to the capital outlay fund and a portion for police. A motion was made that the city remove from consideration for sale the three parcels at the north terminus of Campus Point Dr. totaling 42 acres. In 2012 the UCPG voted to recommend that the entire 42 acres be dedicated as open space since the parcels are inside the Multi-Species Habitat Planning Area (MHPA). The land is part of the 150 plus acre site that is part of Roselle Canyon and it represents one of the last undeveloped coastal headlands in the north city area. The motion passed with 12 yeas, and 3 abstentions.

MID-Coast Trolley Update: SANDAG reported that they are in the process of issuing "Resolutions of Necessity" to take land for the trolley right of way, taking the minimum amount of sq. ft. and pricing the property. Much of this land involves La Jolla Colony managed by McKibbon Co. and will affect Barcelona, La Paz, Irvine Co., Scripps, as well as land in the CA Pizza Kitchen area. There will be a meeting at Doyle Rec Center on March 29 at 6:30-8:30pm to discuss the impact on those living in the area. Most currently owning or renting in the area do not seem to be aware of the taking of the land since McKibbon has not informed them.

MARCY PARK RENOVATION

University City residents are fortunate to have a jewel right in their midst; MARCY PARK. This diamond in the rough is located on the rim of a beautiful and quiet canyon along Stresemann Street. Marcy Park is adjacent to lovely single family homes and the prestigious Mission Bay Montessori Academy. It should be a park that makes residents proud, yet it has fallen into a sad state over the decades and many liken it to the forgotten child.

For years Marcy Park has received the least funding and attention of all our area parks. Several trees have come down over the years without being replanted, park benches destroyed but never replaced and playground equipment inaccessible to those children with special needs. The park is not enjoyed by MBMA students, as it should be, and residents often choose to take their children and grandchildren to other parks because of the lack of current and safe playground equipment.

Six years ago there was considerable effort made to renovate Marcy Park but the timing was not right and the funding was not available. Fortunately now, in 2016, the tide seems to have turned and those plans have been resurrected to revitalize Marcy Park and restore it to its original grandeur. In an effort co-chaired between longtime residents, Ruth DeSantis and Don Hotz, there is once again hope for Marcy Park. If they are to succeed this time, it will require the overwhelming support of the community.

Plans will propose replacement of lost trees and park benches/tables, renovation of the existing play structure to be limited to 1-5 year olds, with the addition of a new play area for older children with their own swings and climbing equipment. All play equipment would blend in with nature, similar to that pictured here, and a shade structure would be added. For adults, stretching and exercise stations with resting benches would be added adjacent to the walking path to create a "healthy heart" trail. Broken water fountains would be fixed and grading would be adjusted to make the park ADA accessible. Public restrooms would not be added and parking would remain as is, retaining the local private park feel & safety of Marcy Park.

The time is right for this renovation but it won't happen without your support. Ruth & Don invite readers to sign a virtual petition to renovate Marcy Park at http://tiny.cc/marcypark. This matter was heard at the UC Community Association meeting on March 9 and will be heard again at the next UC Recreation Council meeting on Thursday, March 24th at 6:30 at Stanley Park. 
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
