

The **Community Enhancement Grant** provided for the design of attractive and uniform street banners to welcome visitors to University City and highlight key gateways, demonstrating that University City is more than a neighborhood. The **Neighborhood Reinvestment Program** paid for banner production and installation.

UCCA BOARD ELECTION

At its November 9 meeting, UCCA will be holding elections for the following officer positions:

The **President** shall preside at all meeting of the corporation and the Executive Board. The President shall be an ex-officio member on all committees except the nominating committee. The President shall have the power to appoint, subject to ratification by the elected officers, a corresponding secretary, membership secretary, parliamentarian and any other chairpersons. The President shall perform any other duties pertaining to the office.

The **Vice President** shall assume the duties of the President in the absence of the President, shall automatically fill the unexpired term of the President if the President should resign and shall assist the President with the duties of the office of the President. In the event that the association is without a Parliamentarian, or said Parliamentarian is absent from the meeting, the Vice President shall assume those duties.

The **Secretary** shall keep an accurate account of the meetings of the corporation and the Executive Committee. The Secretary shall be the custodian of the corporation's records and at all times shall have a current copy of the minutes.

The **Treasurer** shall be the custodian of all the funds, disbursing the funds at the direction of the Executive Committee. All checks must be signed by two parties consisting of any of the officers. The Treasurer shall make a financial report at each general meeting and at any Executive Committee meetings. The Treasurer shall file all appropriate tax statements at the correct times required to maintain the non-profit status of the corporation.

In order to run for office, a candidate must be a UCCA member is good standing and have attended at least two UCCA meetings during the calendar year. Those who are interested in running for elected office should contact Nominating Committee Chairperson Mack Langston at 619–818–4205.

PACKAGE THEFT PREVENTION TIPS

Millions of packages are delivered every day in the U.S. and thieves know they are delivered straight to your front door step where they may sit for hours until you come home. Here are some tips to ensure your packages are delivered safely!

- Tracking numbers let you see when your package is supposed to arrive. This gives you the ability to pick up the package immediately upon delivery or to set up an alternate method of pick up.
- Ask your neighbor to please pick the package up for you or Leave a note on your door instructing the carrier, where to leave the package or request the delivery to be at a location where somebody will be home.
- Request a "Signature Delivery Option." This ensures the package will not be left on your doorstep. If you are unable to sign, the package will be taken to the post/carrier office.
- 4. Request a specific drop off time when you will be home.
- 5. Use a post office box and pick up all your packages there.
- 6. Have packages delivered to your workplace if possible.
- 7. If purchasing something online from a large retailer, have the item delivered to a local branch of the store so you can pick it up in person.
- 8. Request that the shipper holds the package at their facility for pick up.
- Use Nextdoor.com to communicate any suspicious vehicles seen roaming the neighborhood after delivery times, take pictures if possible.
- Call 911 if you see a theft occur and report all package thefts to San Diego Police 619-531-2000 or online
 - https://www.sandiego.gov/police/crimereports/startaccess
- 11. Set up a surveillance camera system aimed at you porch like Ring, Nest or Samsung's SmartCam. Let it monitor your entire front porch area. Some of these can record 24/7 video footage and send instant motion alerts to your smart phone. If you have any suspicion that a package might have gone missing, simply check the delivery time (as confirmed by your shipping service) against the stored recordings from your camera and see what happened. If indeed a theft has occurred, you can download the video and use it as evidence when you file your police report.

The Basic Do's and Don'ts of Email

DO

- Keep a separate email account (e-mail address) for junk mail, online purchases, newsletter sign-ups, etc., and one for your family, friends, personal services like bank accounts, stock broker, financial advisor, etc.
- Empty your trash and spam folders at least once per week.
- Delete emails regularly, especially those of a personal nature. If you want to save your emails, download them to your computer or a thumb drive.
- Log out of your email when you are finished. Never leave it logged in.

DON'T

- Don't use an app on your wireless phone to check email.
 Always go to the Web site using your browser to check email.
- Don't ever open an email if you do not know who sent it. Just delete it. It's okay.
- Don't use the preview pane in your email. When you are using the preview pane, you are essentially opening the email, and if there is a worm/virus/malware attached to the email, you will have downloaded it. For more help with your preview pane, contact your IT professional for assistance.
- Never respond to an email or click a link in an email, requesting your social security number or other personal information. If a bank, for example, needs this information they will contact by regular mail. Also, the IRS never contacts anyone by email, it is always through the regular mail. If you are still not sure, contact the institution using a phone number you have (not one provided by the email) or in person.
- Software companies never contact you by email or phone
 to say your computer is in need of service. This is what is
 called "phishing", which in this case means trying to get
 information under false pretenses. If you get an email or
 phone call like this, hang up the phone and immediately
 delete the email.

Safety Equipment for Firefighters Dave Roberts, Board of Supervisors

Keeping the public safe is a top priority at the County of San Diego.

In October, I was proud join San Diego Fire-Rescue Chief Brian Fennessy to watch a demonstration of the Personal Escape System -- a new safety tool that enables firefighters to get out of burning buildings quickly.

San Diego's fire department serves many areas of my district, including University City, Scripps Ranch, Rancho Bernardo and Tierrasanta. Some of these communities adjoin the wildland-urban interface, which means the fire threat is high.

Earlier this year, Chief Fennessy approached me about purchasing Personal Escape Systems for his firefighters and I asked what I could do to help. As a result of that conversation, I brought forward a county grant recommendation of \$29,000 to purchase the hardware, which includes a hook, rope and belt. The grant request passed unanimously.

Our firefighters make great sacrifices to keep us safe. The very least we can do is to equip them so they can keep themselves safe, too.

SHERRI LIGHTNER City Council, District 1

It is hard to believe that November is here and yet there is so much to do before the end of the year. Here are some important University City updates.

Unfortunately, the Swanson Pool experienced some unscheduled closures during the month of September caused by some filtration problems. In light of this, my staff followed up with the Park and Recreation Department to request that the hours of operation be extended next spring. The request was approved; the pool will close on January 9, 2017 and reopen on March 20, 2017, a month earlier than previously planned.

I am very pleased to announce that the U.S. Post Office located at the Shops at La Jolla Village, behind the Whole Foods off Nobel Drive, will continue its operations at a new space within the same shopping center. Our office worked with the Development Services Department and the property owner to ensure that the post office could remain after the remodel threatened to displace it without a new home. As a result of the negotiations, the post office will stay open at the current location during construction until the new space is completed early next year.

The City Council is scheduled to have a discussion on Short Term Vacation Rentals in the single-family zone on November 1, 2016 at 10:00am in Golden Hall. My office is partnering with Councilmember Lorie Zapf and the City Attorney regarding this important issue. We look forward to your feedback.

Lastly, those who are registered to vote should have received two different sample ballots with all the information about the city candidates and city ballot measures, along with an additional third sample ballot from the State with all the information about the state propositions. Be sure to cast your vote!

School Reforms Taking Hold

The Board of Education recently released the annual evaluation of the Superintendent. It is not so much of a personal evaluation as it is an evaluation of how the district is performing, according to the targets we set the previous year. On September 27 San Diego Unified Trustee Dr. Sharon Whitehurst-Payne announced the results at a press conference. Below are the highlight of some of the goals and the results for the school district:

<u>Improve student achievement</u>: San Diego ranks #1 among the large urban districts on state math test scores and #2 in the state on English Language Arts.

Make graduation more meaningful: The Class of 2016 was required to meet more rigorous requirements for graduation, resulting in more students being prepared for college and/or technical careers.

Increase the graduation rate: The district average is approximately 92%, up from 79% ten years ago. Last year 99.8% of all UC High seniors met the graduation requirements. Our higher expectations resulted in better results. We are closing the achievement gap. The African American rate was 91% and the rate for Latinos is improving.

<u>Increase the diversity of our staff</u> to more closely reflect our student population: Seventy percent of new recruits are from diverse backgrounds.

Provide first-rate facilities at our schools for our students: SD Unified received a rating of 96% by the state for our facilities.

Provide effective means for parents and students to resolve complaints: the new Quality Assurance Office is fully operational and investigates all concerns.

Expand access to technology in the classroom: The District's nationally recognized i-21 program has put technology in the classrooms across the district.

Increase offerings of AP and college courses on high school campuses: This year over 2,000 students are taking college courses.

The school district turned a corner in the 2015-16 school year and the improvements will accelerate in the next four years of Vision 2020.



COMMANDER ROGER BROWN

Well before there was a UTC or a UC High School, an early morning jogger could be seen on the streets and trails at 4:00 am getting in his two-hour workout. If you were also out in the early morning, you may have met long time UC resident retired Commander Roger Brown.

Born in Reading, Pennsylvania during the Great Depression, Roger began his education in a one-room schoolhouse. He graduated from the University of Delaware in 1956 with a degree in agriculture, and was accepted as a naval aviation cadet trainee in Pensacola, Florida where he was commissioned as an officer in 1957. Following initial training, Roger was assigned to a number of duty stations over the span of his 24-year career as a naval aviator and flight instructor, including four tours at NAS Miramar, a tour at the Pentagon, and duty on the aircraft carriers USS Lexington, USS Theodore Roosevelt, USS Ranger, and the USS Kitty Hawk.

Having lived in the area during his early deployments, Roger and his lovely wife Kay purchased their current residence on Calgary Avenue in 1971. While raising their two daughters here, they have seen UC grow into a thriving community over the years.

Following military retirement, Roger worked for the Department of Defense as an accountant after obtaining a degree in that field. Today a distinguished senior citizen, Roger has modified his fitness workouts by walking rather than running, covering a shorter distance, and by starting "later" in the morning, about 6:00 am. Now fully retired from military and civilian work, he keeps busy around the house and engages in his hobby of restoring a 1983 Mercedes Benz.

CAPTAIN HARRY MATHIS

Harry Mathis grew up in San Francisco, and graduated from the University of California at Berkeley in 1954 with a degree in Political Science. During his senior year he was a starter on Cal's Soccer team.

Commissioned an Ensign in the regular Navy upon graduation, he served for 28 years, retiring with the rank of Captain in 1981. During his naval career, he participated in the Bikini H-bomb tests, and was scuba diver qualified.

He received postgraduate level schooling in nuclear reactor engineering, and was certified as a supervisor of reactor operations. He served on five different submarines, and commanded a nuclear attack submarine based in San Diego, which saw action during the Vietnam conflict, He also commanded two shore bases and, as head of the Cruise Missile Branch in the Pentagon, coordinated the development of the Tomahawk cruise missile.

Mathis' time in and out of San Diego during that period, which included learning to fly, convinced him that San Diego was the place where he wanted to live out his life when the opportunity came. When he returned to San Diego to command the Sculpin in 1970, he brought his wife Mary, who he married in 1962, with their two daughters, who were 4– and 2-years-old.



During his final years in the Navy, and well into his return to

civilian life, Harry was a State licensed professional soccer referee in Hawaii, Florida, and California, and was certified as an Instructor of referees.

Following his naval service, he worked for Southern California Edison (SCE), later a partner in a public affairs firm, and was active as a community planning group leader in the early development of San Diego's Golden Triangle.

Harry was elected to represent District One on the San Diego City Council in 1993, serving two terms, and was Deputy Mayor in 2000. When first elected to the City Council, he began a 23 year-to-date association with regional public transportation as Chair pro tem of the then Metropolitan Transit Development Board (MTDB), Chairman of San Diego Trolley, and an ex-officio member of the Board of the newly consolidated Metropolitan Transit System (MTS), where he is currently serving his third four-year term.

Harry and his wife, Mary, have made their home in University City for 46 of their 54 years together, and were founding members of Good Samaritan Episcopal Church. They raised two daughters, Laura being in the first graduating class at UCHS, and have five grandchildren. Harry was an instrument rated pilot, and, until recently, he and Mary regularly flew in their Cessna Centurion to visit their grandchildren in California's Monterey Bay area.

Harry and Mary decided to settle in UC on the advice of a realtor who said it was the best place to find the kind of home we wanted at the price we could afford. They ended up buying the first home we looked at on Arnoldson Ave. After 18 years and an empty nest, they moved their present home on Sandburg in 1988.



Japanese Garden Delight in UC

On October 9, the UC Garden Club and guests were visiting the beautiful Japanese garden in the large recently landscaped backyard of Merle and Mack Langston. The garden tour, refreshments and the Armstrong Garden Centers speaker, Susan Nessel, made for a wonderful relaxed, informative afternoon. Ginger Steketee, President of UC Garden Club, welcomed the large crowd. Her incredibly efficient team of Robert Byrnes, Theresa Fassel, Marilyn Mehr and Pegg Daly helped with hospitality and refreshments.

Susan spoke of Japanese gardens with their use of statuary, fountains, lanterns and bridges, all seen in the Langston garden. The "Hill and Pond" variety of Japanese gardens has to be walked slowly. The spiritual atmosphere of the Langston garden gives one a real desire to walk quietly through it. Steppingstones slow you down to see everything up close.

Japanese Gardens use drought tolerant plants such as bamboo, grasses, azaleas, camellias, evergreens, cedar, junipers, and ferns. "Plants are happiest with less water; use water meters for plants. Water longer, not as often and always in the morning between 5-8 am; plant in zones according to water needs." Redbarked Strawberry trees and the Michaelia Champaca Alba trees from which 'Joy' perfume originates were seen. Questions were answered about grasshopper damage: "not a worry; they munch and move on"; spider mites and white fly fungus gnats -"use worm castings in the soil."

Merle encouraged her guests to read their landscape contract very carefully. Make sure the contract provides for visualization, proper planting procedures, zoned irrigation, plant and structure guarantees, follow up services and detailed pricing before signing off. To Remove Regents Rd. Bridge and Genesee Widening

The final PEIR (Program Environmental Impact Report) was published on October 10 and can be found on the following website:

www.sandiego.gov/planning/programs/ceqa

Included in this voluminous document are the responses to the nearly 200 responding organizations and individuals. The recommendation included in this report is to give consideration to building a tunnel on Genesee under Governor Drive and to widen Genesee to six lanes by narrowing lanes where possible". This recommendation will be reviewed at the meetings listed below. Continued input will be accepted on the "amendment" at the following public meetings:

Wednesday, November 16, 2:00pm Smart Growth/Land Use Committee

Monday, December 5, 2:00pm

The City Council is expecting to hear any further evidence and rule/vote on the amendment.

The meetings will be convened at 202 "C" Street, 12th Floor, downtown San Diego.

The University Community Plan Amendment was also presented to the Planning Commission for recommendation on October 27.

UC Planning Group Report

UCPG Chair Janay Kruger opened the October meeting with a summary of items in progress. UCSD's mitigated negative declarations for parking, NORA posted for Torrey Pines golf tournament (January 23-31), and the steps to finalize the UC Community Plan Update. The community plan amendment updates are: 1. October 20, the final EIR posted, 2. October 21, the staff report, 3. October 27, UC Plan Amendment transportation element, 4. November 16 (1:00pm) Smart Growth review, 5. December 5, City Council Meeting (2:00pm). The City Council will vote on: certification of the EIR, adoption of the plan, adoption of the SEQUA findings, and the overriding considerations.

The UCPG has approved five of the twenty-three mitigation measures in the community plan amendment. The subcommittee will reconvene to again review the mitigation measures and the staff reports, and will prepare a report to present to the City Council.

The UCSD report stated that the Osler Parking Structure mitigated negative declaration closes on November 9. This new parking structure on Olser Lane off the Gilman entrance to campus will provide additional parking to bring the total spaces to 17,000. The Community Advisory Group comprised of faculty, students, and community members to tour development and planning for campus housing. A medical center representative who touted the Jacobs Center grand opening where over 700 people toured the new building, also gave a Health Care Update. Next they will offer a tour of the Breast Cancer Detection area and the Altman Transitional Medical research in clinical practice and clinical trials.

The SANDAG rep gave a mid-coast trolley update: The \$1billion commitment came through with dispersal at \$1 million a year for ten years. The contract to complete the trolley was signed. By the end of December the Genesee, Regents Rd. and Executive Dr. water lines relocation will be complete. A kick-off construction picnic was held in October. Scott Peters' rep reported that the resolution to keep the government open until December 10 passed as well as The Water Resources Development Act providing \$170 million, which included Flint, Michigan restoration.

Council Chair Sherri Lightner came to her last UCPG meeting before she leaves office. She thanked the members of the planning group for their dedication and service and reported on local issues for city council. Swanson pool was closed for repairs for weeks so the next season will open weeks earlier this year on March 27. The La Jolla Village square (Whole Foods shopping center) is completing renovations and the post office has now signed a lease and will open in January or February. The City Council will have an open discussion on November 1 at 10:00am in Golden Hall on the Vacation Rentals Rules.

Public Comment: 1. The changes at U.C. Village on Governor Dr. and the parking problems entailed. The reply was that Open DSD on the city site lists all of the approved development details and it is open to residents to review. 2. Flyers advertising a Mediation Center on Carnegie in a house. Janay replied that if over six people are attending the sessions a Neighborhood Use Permit is required.

An information item on Measure D was presented by Jeff Marsten, a consultant for the Citizens Plan for San Diego. He was promoting measure D for prohibiting a convention center on the waterfront, prohibiting use of the occupancy tax for a sports stadium, and promoting selling QUALCOMM stadium land for parks and education, building a smaller stadium and using land for housing and research.

VOTE NOVEMBER 8: Mail ballots have gone out and 60% of the City of San Diego votes by mail. This time when you vote make sure you enclose the entire two-page ballot and mark both sides of each page; both pages must be mailed TOGETHER.

Future agenda items: Lossan Rail Project, Glider Airport, and the single family home project at 5807 Regents Road (off 52 freeway).

NEXT MEETING: Scheduled for November 8 at Campus Point Drive/Alexandria. (If there are no agenda items, which must be covered at the November meeting, it may be cancelled.)

University City Cluster Committee Meeting Update

The UC Cluster Committee was formed in 2010 when SDUSD created neighborhood advisory boards. The UC Cluster consists of UC High, Standley Middle, and Curie, Doyle, and Spreckels Elementary.

The October meeting was held at the UCHS Media Center, and the school updates included: Red Ribbon Week at Curie; school reorganization at Doyle and the focus to build the concept of "community" in the classrooms; implementation of a compassionate program at Spreckels; annual Homeland Security visit at Standley, and PSAT testing at UCHS.

EdUCate! President Bonnie MacRitchie reported on the success of the annual Oktoberfest celebration. The Teacher Grant process is under way, EdUCate! is continuing the Dollar-A-Day fundraising campaign, and Food Trucks, until it gets too dark, and they are experimenting by locating it at different schools.

A district rep discussed the choice program and the shorter application window this year, in order to be aligned with the other 42 school districts in San Diego County. Siblings of current enrolled choice students must still apply. The deadline is November 14. Choice lists will be generated in February.

Board Member John Lee Evans reported that the Standley Park joint use improvements will be going through the EIR process and since part of the project runs through city property, city funds will need to be located; there is a focus to increase the literacy levels, eventually leading to higher graduation rates, and as Evans said "higher expectations get higher results."

- Pathway Articulation path from elementary to middle to high schools






