### UCCA JANUARY MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

San Diego Water Authority Pure Water Update. Jeff Soriano, SDWA Phase I Project Manager, updated those in attendance about the Pure Water program which plans to provide 1/3 of San Diego's water supply locally by 2035. The program involves a system of treatment facilities, pump stations and pipelines to: use technology to clean recycled water to produce safe, high-quality drinking water; provide a reliable, sustainable, water supply; and offer a cost-effective investment for local needs. Phase I includes the North City Water Plant (NCWRP) Expansion, Pure Water Facility, Pump Station and Pipeline located at the Eastgate Mall and Miramar area. The project is currently in the "Design" process and the SDWA will be asking for public comments on design and pipeline plans. Phase I also includes a Morena Station and pipeline that will eventually continue through UC to the NCWRP. The public is welcome to take a guided tour of the water purification testing facility and find out how: wastewater becomes purified water, the project will decrease reliance on imported water, and see comparisons of purified, drinking, and recycled water samples. Miramar MCAS Communications. UC resident Stephanie Jed brought up concerns about communicating with Miramar MCAS in commenting about low-flying violations over the neighborhood. Recent incidents have brought back unpleasant memories of the unfortunate crash of 2008, which destroyed two homes resulting in unnecessary deaths. It was agreed that open dialogue was needed, and residents should continue to file warranted complaints. Jed will work with UCCA VP Diane Ahern to communicate with Miramar.

Community Grant Requests. UCCA granted UC Little League their request for \$1,000 to help pay for new fencing for the Minors field. Additional request were presented by: UCHS Music Boosters, to sponsor the program's, which has expanded by 50%, Spring Concert on March 31; and the UCHS Boys Water Polo, Girls Water Polo, and Swim Team Boosters for aquatics parkas which are good for 10 years. The aquatics programs must spend funds to rent pool time at UCSD. The groups requested grants of \$2,500, which will be decided at the next UCCA meeting.

# NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH CAPTAIN'S ADVISORY BOARD MEETING RECAP

Captain Jerry Hara who was appointed Communications Director with SDPD, about eight months ago reported some very good news at our Captain's Advisory Board meeting. This is a selected group of residents who meet bimonthly with our Northern Division Police Captain, officers and other residents in the Northern area to discuss crime, prevention and other aspects of law enforcement and city concerns. Included are hotel owners, condo complex managers, security personnel from the Westfield Mall, Town Council representatives, Neighborhood Watch Coordinators in the Northern Division area and other organization representatives.

Regarding the dispatch center; seven months ago the average 911 response was 15-20 sec. it is now 3 seconds and 93% of the time under 10 seconds exceeding all national standards which is 90%. One change that has contributed to their success is the "Phone Tree" with over 140,000 calls coming in on a monthly basis, the Phone Tree directs calls to the right department quickly, freeing up valuable time for the dispatchers. You can also help; if you call 911 by mistake, stay on the line and tell the dispatcher this is not an emergency, you made a mistake, if in fact it isn't an emergency. If you hang up, they are required to call back to confirm it was not an emergency which is a waste of valuable time. Make sure the phone is off if kept in your back pocket or you may end up making a (Pocket Misdial) "butt" call by mistake. In a five (5) week period they had 12,000 of these calls.

The non-emergency number hold time was 15-35 minutes, now averaging 4 minutes. Keep in mind, if there are more 911 calls coming in when you call, they are the priority, so it may be more than 4 minutes but, stay on the line to report or you will lose your place in the queue.

The second major change was the hiring of 36 new trainees in the communications department. It takes 4 months to train on the non-emergency line plus another 5 months for the 911 line. They also have added 12 supervisors onto the floor, mentoring and coaching and 90 officers have been trained to assist during peak times. They volunteer on their off time so it does not interfere with their primary role and are paid working the dispatch lines.

Another suggestion is to use the "Get it Done" App to report any number of problems, graffiti, street signs, potholes, tree limbs falling, etc. The response time is quick and remember to send a photo of the problem. Using the Get it Done app, UCCA's beautification committee, under the direction of Merle Langston, requested evaluation and trimming of trees with overhanging branches on Governor Drive.

#### A SHOUT OUT TO FIRE SQUAD 56

My name is unimportant. I would just like to give a big shout out to Mark and Darren of Fire Squad 56 – our very own EMTs on Governor Drive. I had occasion to stop by the house to get some help with a blood pressure cuff. Both of them were so kind and accommodating and extraordinarily helpful. We are lucky to have them in our community and especially in our neighborhood.

# Get It Done: City streamlining non-emergency requests for services

Using the new mobile app and web portal Get It Done, residents can report nonemergency problems to the City. The

Get It Done app also allows San Diego residents to track the progress of a complaint and increase efficiency for both residents and City crews.

To report a problem, people can now take and upload photos related to over 20 nonemergency problems with roads, street lights, traffic signals and more. The Get It Done app **GPS** information uses embedded within photos automatically update the



address and location of problems. After uploading the photo, the app user simply identifies a few details about the problem and submit. 

### **SDUSD TAKES STEPS TO** REDUCE BULLYING

Information from SDUSD

Definition: Bullying is unwanted, aggressive behavior that involves a real or perceived power imbalance. Providing a safe learning environment is a critical element that all schools must focus on if we are to achieve our goal of providing our children a quality education. Bullying is a serious issue that every administrator in every school in our country must handle. Research indicates that more than half of all school-aged children nationwide will be involved in bullying this year as a victim or a perpetrator.

In our commitment to providing all students and staff with a safe learning environment where everyone is treated with respect and no one is physically or emotionally harmed, the San Diego Unified School District does not tolerate any student or staff member being bullied (including cyber-bullying) or intimidated in any form at school or school-related events, (including off-campus events, school-sponsored activities, school busses, any event related to school business), or outside of school hours with the intention to be carried out during any of the above.

Such acts include those that are reasonably perceived as being motivated either by an actual or perceived attribute that includes but is not limited to race, religion, creed, color, marital status, parental status, veteran status, sex, sexual orientation, gender expression or identity, ancestry, national origin, ethnic group identification, age, mental or physical disability or any other distinguishing characteristic.

Inciting, aiding, coercing or directing of others to commit acts of bullying or cyber-bullying, harassment or intimidation are also prohibited by the San Diego Unified School District. These problems cannot be solved unless schools, students, parents and the community work together. ### **UC Planning Group Report**

At the January UCPG meeting, many UC residents having concerns related to the proposed construction of a single-family dwelling on the property on the east side of Regents Road and across from Pennant Drive, attended the meeting to discuss related issues with the property owner. (UCCA previously had two meetings with the owners, their contractor, and the City Fire Department in the summer of 2015, when it first became known that the property was going to be developed.) The major concern was one of safety since the proposal to make a "curb cut" for in and out to the property onto a very busy road with a current 50 mph speed limit would be hazardous. The City is still working with the owners of the property on various compliance/code issues at this time. Also at this meeting, Alexandria, a major national building/leasing company which primarily provides facilities for the bio -sciences industry, was requesting approval for a major addition to their property at the end of Campus Point Drive. UCPG's committee which has been in conversations with Alexandria for over year, did not feel the supplemental EIR information was completed to their satisfaction and recommended to not endorse the project, at this time. Janay Kruger, UCPG Chair, announced there was suit filed against the San Diego City Council based on the December 5 vote to approve the amendment to remove the Regents Rd. Bridge and Widening of Genesee from the Community Plan.

### Marcy Park Project Update

News of the renovation of Marcy Park has sparked excitement and overwhelming praise for the project. Without even having yet begun the fundraising campaign, unsolicited donations have been rolling in.

Don Hotz, Project Manager, says, "We already have just under \$10,000 in the kitty even though fundraising won't officially kick off until after the new year". As his project partner, Ruth DeSantis explained, "Now that we are under the University City Community Foundation (UCCF) umbrella, donations to the Marcy Park renovation are tax deductible. With yearend tax planning upon us, many people are looking to reduce their taxable income and what a win-win to be able to save on their taxes while helping renovate their own park."

Plans for the renovation of the existing broken 2- to 5-year-old play structure as well as the addition of an older play and picnic area were unveiled at a kickoff event at the park in September. While there is great enthusiasm for the project, it did spark some questions from residents that Ruth and Don have been fielding. They share residents' concerns about off-leash dogs and maintaining the pristine nature and beauty of the park. Marcy Park is open from sunrise to sunset and will remain a leash-only park. Most park-goers respect their neighbors and will happily leash their dogs if asked. The new play structure, along the fence line with Mission Bay Montessori Academy, should provide more distance between dogs and children, while in no way encroaching on the open green space.

There have also been questions about the cost of the park. As Ruth advises, "When I started this project 5 years ago, the cost was less than half of what it is now. Since then, Prevailing Wage Laws were enacted which increased the basic hourly rate required to be paid on public works projects." However, Ruth and Don are encouraged by talks they have had with local and City officials and believe that if half of the estimated \$400,000 project cost can be raised by resident donations, they can find the other half in the City's coffers. Additionally, Ruth believes there may be a loophole that would allow part of the project to by-pass Prevailing Wage Law. Ruth adds, "To accomplish this, we would have to raise \$50,000 quickly and then break the project into smaller stages. Based on what I have seen over the past 30 days of donations and the positive feedback we have gotten, I think this a real possibility".

Many people understand the value of having a well-maintained park with a play structure for children and adults alike. UC Realtor Ryan Ahearn is one of them. He and his very capable team of realtors and marketing specialists have just joined forces with the Marcy Park Project to help push the renovation timeline forward. As a realtor, Ryan realizes the value that a wellequipped and maintained park adds to a home. He says that "Improving Marcy Park is very important to me and my family, especially my 2-year-old who loves to play there. 


