

It's a Bird, It's a Plane... It's a Helicopter Lifting a Tree

Greg Barnes, UCCA member and Neighborhood Watch Captain, witnessed the moving of the trees at Westfield UTC Shopping Center.

He provided an explanation that "They are moving trees that had been preserved when they tore up the parking lots and took down buildings. They are moving them from the storage area, where they maintained them, to areas in the new construction and in a few areas of the existing mall. Rather than put them on a flatbed, where they would have to be put on their side (and possible damage) and where it would be hard to get them into some of the places they are to go, they are using the helicopter to pick them straight up and lower them to the exact spot in the new construction."

A total of sixteen full grown trees were airlifted into Westfield UTC from nurseries throughout the United States to line the walkways in the new development. Among those sixteen trees, were several olive and coral trees. Later this year various palm trees will be brought into the new development as well. TROLLEY RELATED UTC AREA CONSTRUCTION

Construction activities will continue this month to prepare for the Mid-Coast trolley extension, including demolish and permanent removal of the pedestrian bridge at Executive Square and Genesee Avenue. A pedestrian crossing signal will be placed there temporarily. This construction work will require a full closure of Genesee Avenue from La Jolla Village Drive to Eastgate Mall. Ongoing work includes vegetation removal and sidewalk demolition between Regents and Eastgate Mall and utility relocation work. Several traffic controls during the construction will be in place, including lane closures, shifts and detours, to aid the progress of the work. Crews will eventually begin construction of the viaduct - a bridge structure that will carry the trolley down the middle of Genesee Avenue. A light rail viaduct is planned for the Gilman Drive Bridge and on the UCSD campus. For info and updates go to: www.keepsandiegomoving.com.

I need to make a confession...I contributed to alternative facts. By not confirming a rumor that was sent to me by a friend, who was told by his child, who was home sick and was informed via social media posts; I advanced the rumor even further by then texting my son at school, who proceeded to tell his friends at the school. The rumor...that there was a lockdown at the school due to a possible student shooting.

Well, of course, it wasn't true. And I should have known better. I knew that if there was a lockdown, a callout to parents would have been sent immediately. I knew that when I texted my son and he didn't know what I was talking about, and told me that everyone was preparing to go to the pep rally, that it probably wasn't true. Yet the panicking mom in me told him he should go home right away and not be in a crowded gym. I was now encouraging him to ditch. Bad mom.

I confess this because with today's use of technology, we are too quick to share information, whether confirmed or not, because our emotions get in the way. While scrolling through our Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram feeds, we forget the warning of "don't believe everything you read." (Except, of course, this newsletter.) My own emotions perpetuated the rumor that I should have questioned in the first place, I shared alternative facts.

The alternative fact sharing scenario is an epidemic, and it's not limited to certain news outlets and the president's Twitter feed. I have seen it in Facebook postings, and on NextDoor.com — the neighborhood social media platform meant to bring neighbors together. While I think NextDoor is a useful platform for communities, once certain hot button issues get posted, some reactions can simply be mean — and more alternative facts are shared. Our assumptions get in the way, and we don't listen to the whole story. And our prejudices (we all have them) skew our perceptions of the situation.

What am I trying to say? Let's remember to educate ourselves and learn the true facts of a situation or issue, don't point fingers to place blame — rather do something about it, and practice "do unto others, as you would have them do unto you." Peace be with you neighbors.

Public Safety Advisory Team

At the Public Safety meeting hosted by Councilmember Barbara Bry in March, SDPD Captain Tina Williams shared information about two of the resources available to Northern Division: The Homeless Outreach and the Psychiatric Emergency Response Teams. Both teams provide help to those who may not have committed a crime but are in need of some type of assistance.

Homelessness is an extremely complex social problem that impacts the quality of life. There are no easy solutions. The San Diego Police Department (SDPD) and elected officials in the County and City recognize that there is a fine line between homelessness as a social issue and homelessness as a criminal issue. Many homeless are on the street because of substance abuse, mental illness or both.

To assist the City and County provide better service to this atrisk population, the SDPD has created the Homeless Outreach Team (HOT). The team consists of police officers, County Health and Human Services specialists as well as psychiatric clinicians from the Psychiatric Emergency Response Team (PERT), a private non-profit organization.

HOT is available to assist the community with homelessrelated issues. HOT provides field assessments for eligibility to public entitlements, crisis intervention, comprehensive case management, drug/alcohol rehabilitation placement, and psychiatric/medical treatment placement.

The police department recommends that San Diegans not offer food or money to those that appear homeless as it may encourage more panhandling. Those who are inclined to help the homeless should consider contributions to local charities, missions, food banks or social service organizations that assist the needy.

Help Keep San Diego County Seniors Safe

San Diego County handles approximately 9,000 cases of elder and dependent adult abuse each year. Many other incidents go unreported, leaving vulnerable adults in distressing, potentially life-changing, even dangerous, situations.



Victims will live in silent desperation, unwilling to seek assistance because they believe their cries for help will go unanswered and they fear retaliation from their abusers. Many remain silent to protect abusive family members from the legal consequences of their crimes, or they are too embarrassed to admit that they have fallen victim to predators.

Reporting Elder and Dependent Adult Abuse

If a situation appears to be life threatening or a crime is in progress, call 9-1-1 or your local law enforcement. If you believe elder or dependent abuse has occurred, call Adult Protective Services at 1-800-510-2020, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Outside the County of San Diego call 1-800-339-4661

Often victims of elder abuse can be abused in more ways than one. For example, an abuser may hit the elder (physical abuse) in order to convince him or her to turn over money to the abuser (financial abuse).



Earth Day celebrates its 47th birthday on April 22. Believe it or not, the movement grew out of bipartisan support in Congress. U.S. Senator Gaylord Nelson of Wisconsin, a Democrat distressed by a 1969 oil spill in Santa Barbara, and Congressman Pete McCloskey, a conservation-minded Republican Congressman from California, teamed up with academics, students and community organizers to stage massive coast-to-coast rallies. Twenty million Americans of all ages took part in this watershed moment in the history of the environmentalism.

Today, Earth Day is celebrated more than one billion people every year -- the largest secular observance in the world. How can you get involved in Earth Day in San Diego? On Saturday, April 22, register to volunteer (www.creektobay.org) with I Love A Clean San Diego's Creek to Bay Cleanup. Last year, 6,400 volunteers worked at 110 cleanup sites around the County and removed 150,000 lbs. of litter. Locally, People for a Clean UC will celebrate Earth Day a couple of weeks early. On Sunday, April 9, we will conduct our monthly litter cleanup. In 2016, we conducted 12 monthly cleanups, attracted hundreds of volunteers of all ages, and removed hundreds of pounds of litter and debris from major streets and avenues in UC.

When I think of Earth Day, I recall astronomer and author Carl Sagan who said, "The Earth is a very small stage in a vast cosmic arena...To me, it underscores our responsibility to deal more kindly and compassionately with one another and to preserve and cherish that pale blue dot, the only home we've ever known."

UC PLANNING GROUP REPORT

The SDPD led the pledge of allegiance, and were thanked from the Las Palmas community representative and a UCPG member for diligently investigating burglaries. A landowner commended the homeless outreach for removing the drug dealers from property along Gilman Drive south of UCSD. The SDPD officers offered the information that they provide for services for the homeless called "Quality of Life" groups for all of San Diego. Chair Janay Kruger announced a city Community Housing Committee, FedEx parking lot East of 805 has a public hearing to get city approval, and the McDonalds in Costa Verde is being renovated for the next 6-8 weeks.

SANDAG Mid Coast Trolley update: The plan is to widen the northbound side of Genesee for the next 4–6 months, followed by the southbound and drilling holes for the viaduct along Genesee and by the VA. During March, the drilling is started along Regents and Genesee, westbound to UCSD. Negotiations with La Paz and La Jolla Colony are continuing about road closure for seven weeks closed completely or keep half lanes open for 14 weeks. The contractor prefers the 14–week plan for drivers' convenience. They are currently removing shrubs and trees on I–5 and Genesee to accommodate the widening and are working with property owners about the tree replacements.

SANDAG Rose Canyon update: The plantings that were contracted did not live up to what the community had been told. The contractor maintained that phase 1 plantings had rooted and looked good and that phase 2 plantings had not yet kicked in. However, Debbie Knight of Friends of Rose Canyon said that was not the case; the plantings look awful and weeds are bigger than the plants. In addition, the invasive plants have not been removed as promised. A planning group member also mentioned that the broken city storm drain, the west end fiber line is in the wrong place, and the grading at the west end. The path down needs repair and the orange fungus needs to be removed. The contractor will look in to it.

Reports: Barbara Bry's representative welcomed comments for the Budget Review Committee hearing. The three Community Advisory Boards will meet quarterly and Bry's office will continue participation in the U.C. community clean up. Scott Peters' representative reported that Peters held a town hall at Clairemont High School with 600 attendees. Peters is on the Energy and Commerce Committee reviewing the AHC but waiting for the CBO score. There was discussion about the AHC act; Peters wants to repeal the medical device tax. Janay mentioned that the 600-800 companies in Biocom feel that Peters supports their point of view and is also a supporter of SIO.

The Illumina Campus in Nobel Research Park is working on a site development permit, community plan, and entitlements for adding a 10story building. The architect presented a power point of the expansion plans, which would amend the 1995 plan for the 42-acre site. Currently there are 6 buildings of 5 stories each and 1 parking structure; the plan is to add a 7th building and a second parking structure. The parking structure will have louvers to obscure the cars and allow airflow. The ten-story building would be 350,000 sq. ft. primarily for research and development but will also have some office space and one floor for amenities. It will be energy and water efficient, use clean renewable solar energy, have antireflective coating on the glazing and provide open green space for baseball, volleyball, and basketball. Parking was discussed since they added 987 ADT's not previously allocated or transferred. supports the super loop to transit station, SANDAG, and provides incentives for bike walk and transit use. Next time they will come back with a site development plan and their construction schedule and show how plans will impact traffic.

Marcy Park Project Update

Thank you to all the people who have supported the Marcy Park project. To date, we have received donations totaling just over \$10,000, and we haven't even had our first fundraising event. We expect to boost that figure soon with a donation from the UCCA. Historically, UCCA has been a great supporter of community improvements. Funding for improvements, such as the Marcy Park project, comes in large part from UCCA membership dues. Please take a minute to renew your membership as it goes right back into our community!

With enough resident donations, we expect to be able to undertake the first phase of improvements to Marcy Park before the end of this year. This phase is proposed to include replacing missing play equipment, changing infant swings to standard belt swings, re-painting the play structure and adding benches along the concrete walkway. The City has agreed to replace the missing concrete picnic table and we have requested examination of the older trees for safety. These improvements would hold us over until phase two, when the City would completely replace the 2-5 year play structure, add a new play area for older children and re-do the slope to create ADA access.

One of our locals, Ryan Ahearn (pictured right), has been giving back to our community by his donating time resources to the Marcy Park project. Many enjoyed his free pie giveaway in November and Bounce into Spring in March, with a bouncy house, food trucks and free bag giveaway. He and his team have been doing a great job of promoting the Marcy Park project. As a realtor, Ryan is aware that a well-maintained park great value to homes and is a draw for potential new buvers. Like most local parents, he and his wife are excited about plans to renovate the park that their young daughter often visits.



Many have asked about the cost to complete the more extensive phase 2 renovation. Like an ever-moving target, this figure seems to keep changing. In a recent meeting with the Asst. Dir. of Parks & Rec, we learned that the total project cost will not be known until the project is submitted for review, analysis and bid. With enough community support, a beautiful phase 2 renovation could be completed within the next 4 to 6 years. A representative for Mayor Faulconer's office suggested that to expedite the renovation of Marcy Park, it is necessary for residents to express their support for the project by emailing the following representatives:


