
UCCA Marks 15-Year Anniversary It Started with L.O.V.E.

Today we are so used to instant communication...texting, emailing, tweeting using our smart phones, tablets and computers. Looking back to 2002, when our community association was revived as UCCA, computers were a lot slower; those who had email didn't always check it, and a lot of communication was by plain old word of mouth.

Sandy Lippe had already recruited volunteers in 2001 with Project L.O.V.E. (Landscaping Our Various Environments). We each called and talked to friends asking them to join the effort to support the beautification project and revive the community association. New volunteers in turn called and talked to others and the group grew. Through Project L.O.V.E., Sandy had obtained International City Bank's \$10,000 sponsorship for our first banners. Those banners were ceremoniously hung on March 21, 2002 marking the rebirth of UCCA.

Things started moving quickly. By the time the first newsletter was printed in May, the Garden Club was established and meeting on the 4th Thursdays of the month. Linda Canada was the contact. The first community Clean UP was scheduled for May 18, and residents were being advised about Free Street Trees. Dayna Hydrick had set up a website and served as webmaster. Our first officers were Sandy Lippe, President; Carole Pietras, Vice President.; MaryAnn Guerra, Secretary; Melodie Hallet, Treasurer; and Darlene Ventimiglia, Historian. We all owe Darlene a huge thank you for the wonderful scrapbooks she put together preserving our history through last year!

YOU ARE NOT ALONE (YANA) PROGRAM

Provided by RSVP (Retired Senior Volunteer Patrol) Submitted by Art Gurerrero, Supervisor

Volunteer RSVPs from the San Diego Police Department are available to provide regularly scheduled welfare-check visits to persons living alone who have no one else to check on them. Under unusual circumstances, YANA candidates with full or part time caregivers may also qualify for the program. Basic Eligibility Requirements to Participate:

- a. YANA candidates must agree to participate.
- b. YANA candidates must be physically and mentally able to answer the door or telephone.

Visits are on weekdays only and are always done by two RSVPs. During the visit the general health and well-being of the YANA will be checked. Typical visits are five to fifteen minutes of social interaction. If there are problems during the visit, RSVP officers can notify emergency contacts approved by the YANA. For more significant problems or if the YANA fails to answer the door or telephone, RSVP officers can notify medical personnel or regular police officers for resolution.

Understanding Public School Funding

As taxpayers, we provide support for our public schools, but the methods by which funding is determined are often difficult to understand. Here are some answers to frequently asked questions.

Where do we get funding for our schools? Most of funding comes from the state, which is subject to the variability of sales and income taxes each year. Less than 10 percent of our funding comes from the federal government. By the way, less than 2 percent of the funding comes from the lottery.

How well does California fund public education? For several years, we ranked near the very bottom for per pupil funding compared to other states. Even with the approval of temporary taxes, we are still in the bottom fifth of states. Proposition 98 was approved by voters to guarantee that 40% of the state budget goes to public schools. This was meant to provide a minimum for education funding, but it has turned out to be more of a ceiling. When politicians talk about our schools being "fully funded" it means only that the Prop 98 MINIMUM has been met. When Governor Brown implemented the Local Control Funding Formula, the goal was only to reach the level of funding we had in 2007 by the year 2020. That goal has not yet been met. But at the same time as funding has increased in the last few years, the state has taken back a lot of the money by more than doubling the amount of money the district is required to pay into the state pension fund.

About two years ago San Diego Unified calculated that our funding was about \$350 million short to provide those essential services that the educators and the public agree are needed in our public schools. We do not even seek the highest funding of the nation, but we do believe that if we approached the national average of funding that we could provide a world class education to our students.

How well does San Diego fund education? San Diego taxpayers have strongly supported our schools through local bond measures. Propositions S and Z have provided for new schools, modernization of outdated facilities, improved technology for all of our students, athletic facilities, arts facilities and career technical facilities that have transformed our high school programs. However, these are capital funds that cannot be used for any operational expenses.

How are decisions made about how the funds are dispersed locally? The Board of Education must approve a balanced budget based on whatever amount the state gives us each year. Through public meetings we develop a Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP), which is based on San Diego Unified's Vision 2020 for Quality Schools in Every Neighborhood. This plan sets in place our community's priorities, so that whenever we have a major budget shortfall (as we will have next school year), we protect what is most important (classroom instruction) and make reductions around the edges (administration) to have the least impact possible on our children's education.

It is also important to set a conservative fiscal example at the highest level. For that reason, the Board of Education has waived its right every year to increase its small salary that was set in the 1990s. Our Superintendent, who leads the second largest district in the state, takes a lower salary than some superintendents at smaller districts. We must lead by example when we face budget challenges. Our commitment is to provide the highest quality education for our children with whatever funds we receive.



Barbara Bry City Council, District 1

Keeping our neighborhoods safe is my first priority as your Councilmember. I recently provided a memo to the Independent Budget Analyst outlining my budget priorities, and public safety was at the top of the list. Some of these priorities include:

- Focusing on police recruitment and retention by filling the approximately 180 vacant budgeted jobs for SDPD officers.
- Conducting a nationwide Police Chief search upon the planned retirement of the current Police Chief that includes community workshops, online input, and recommendations from the Citizens Advisory Board.
- Supporting community policing programs that provide police officers with the resources they need to foster relationships with the community.
- Identifying resources to support the 9-1-1 Computer-Aided Dispatch replacement program.
- Preparing for the Citygate and CIP fire station recommendations and identifying resources for the proposed priority fire stations and fast-response squads.

As chair of the Council Committee on Budget and Government Efficiency, I will continue to prioritize public safety in the FY2018 budget and beyond.

On February 11, our office hosted our first round of community office hours in University City (see photo above). My team and I met with more than 40 residents to discuss their concerns and offer assistance with City services. 



THE BIRTH OF UNIVERSITY CITY

Have you ever wondered what University City looked like at its beginning, or wonder where the first houses were built? Might you be one of the original settlers? This photograph taken by Howard Rozelle on November 15, 1960 shows the original development of University City.

The light-colored areas along the bottom of the picture are the first subdivisions. At the time, the only paved road into UC was Regents Road. State Highway 52 and Governor Drive had not been constructed. Genesee Avenue did not yet extend down the hill from Clairemont.

Regents Road originates in south Clairemont and travels northbound across the bottom of San Clemente Canyon and up the other side to where the Sprouts shopping center is today (A). About halfway up the hill, Regents Road intersects with Pennant Way (B) which goes past Honors Drive and ends in a T-intersection at Stresemann Street. If you travel south on Honors Drive, you will arrive at Award Row where the original model homes were built. Here today you can see the butterfly roof house of a Mid Century Modern home designed by William Krisel, the pioneering architect who was commissioned to design the University City tract in 1960. Nearby, Stresemann St. makes an arc to the right and becomes Soderblom Avenue, ending at a T-intersection with Bloch St (C).






She is currently a lawyer in Office of Attorney General.

Reports: UCSD Long Range Development Plan Is in progress. Completion will assist the campus in meeting its long-range plan to house at least 50 percent of students on campus. Current plans show that the number of students will increase 25-30% by 2035. Ongoing plans for a UCSD fire station are being negotiated with the city. You may view the monthly updates online, which are available at physicalplanning.ucsd.edu/community/monthly.html.

SANDAG Mid-Coast Trolley update: K-rail in place for clearing from Nobel to Villa La Jolla Drive, in May drill holes for columns for VA, for one year there will be two big drills in operation on Genesee. In April, they will close Executive to Nobel North to UCSD for a weekend to take down the pedestrian bridge at Executive. Also, discussion of MCTC firm who is still doing the unsatisfactory and unfinished work in Rose Canyon and now the same firm will be doing part of Mid-coast trolley. Will there be scale back of the Voight Drive Bridge due the \$30 vs. \$45 million projections? Janay asked that SANDAG send the finance guy to the March meeting since we have lots of questions.

Public Comment: A question was asked about the house on Regents Rd across from Pennant Way and Janay answered that the owner has not gotten everything through the city process so it cannot yet come to the UCPG for a vote. Public issues with cell towers at Nobel Park and now proposed at Doyle Park will be discussed at the March meeting. A formal request from Katie Rodolico was made to investigate that the Business Members are in good standing. Nine letters from their employers or companies were submitted and placed in the membership file. All are in good standing. The Bylaws have changed since these members were elected.

Westfield presenter John Alderson showed the apartment design for the planned apartment building, which was approved years ago. The subcommittee went over the process 2 and moved the item for approval. Vote was taken and approved 14 yeas, 1 nay, and 1 abstention.

SANDAG Mobility Study for HUBS: this is a grant-funded study to enhance access for ridership on the trolley and to find what may encourage you to ride transit. Ideas put forth: shuttle from both East and West, South U.C. to the trolley, more lighting at stations, express trolley, charging stations at each hub. UTC retail and shuttles to hubs, importance of landscaping at stations.

The UCCA February meeting audience had a chance to hear Fire Chief Dave Connors review the status of Fire/Rescue response times, as well as his announcement of the addition of a brush control unit to be working in the South UC area.

New representative from CA State Senator Toni Atkins' office, Chenille-Tate, was in attendance and she explained how busy our State Senate has been in its early weeks of work in their discussions related to possible new government regulations. Bridger Langful, Councilwoman Barbara Bry's representative to UC, gave his report on recent storm damage and a reminder for Barbara Bry's first "Office Hours" on Saturday. Brian Elliot, Scott Peter's representative, announced the new congressional committee assignments for Scott Peters, and provided information related to the elimination of the WebTrak app, which tracked flights in and out of Miramar.

Our UCCA Board authorized donations of \$1,000 each to UC High's Swim Team as well as to the support of UC High's Music Department's Spring Showcase. The Marcy Park Project request was put on hold for further review later in the Spring. New requests for funds were received from UC Mesa del Sol Girls' Softball and "ImproveUC 2020".

UCCA President Barry Bernstein announced that the Standley Park Rec. Council did NOT endorse the proposed "joint-use" field at Curie Elementary. The City's Park and Rec will decide next month if to move forward on the project. He said there was no further information related to the "Citizen's for Regents Road Bridge" law suit to report. Barry also reminded everyone about the planned work to be done on Genesee Ave. the next few weeks.

Diane Ahern, UCCA Vice-President, reviewed new county grant applications to support continued work on street banners and electrical box painting. She will be seeking Standley Park Rec Council's support for publicizing special community events with street banners.

Barbara Gellman, our Neighborhood Watch chair, announced some tentative plans to coordinate with both Clairemont and La Jolla Rec Councils to support SD Police on the August 1 National "Nite Out" with a fundraising dance event.

This legal action will temporarily freeze any action to allocate funds from the University City DBA/DIF accounts, as well as stall the planned development of a new Community Plan. UCCA will continue to provide updates as needed.






