The UCHS Musical Showcase on April 14, (cosponsored by UCCA), which was held in the JCC's Garfield Theater, was a smashing success...what talent! And how do you like those Padres...surprising us with some great baseball. And for this May, a big UCCA "shout-out" and sincere well-wishes to all of our UC Mothers, (Mother's Day is Sunday, May 14). *Special thanks to those wonderful "moms" that volunteered, starting fifteeen years ago, in the production of our monthly newsletter.



At UCCA'S April Meeting, CA State Senator, Toni Atkins (pictured above) was our guest speaker, Senator Atkins spoke to two main topics: The Education Code as it relates to the required March 15 termination deadline, and San Diego Unified's large deficit and its impact on our newest teachers. The recently passed Senate Bill #1. (the gas tax legislation) was also explained. She is working on legislation related to the statewide affordable housing problem and the development of a single-payer healthcare plan for all Californians. Sen. Atkins was optimistic that more funds would be forthcoming from the Governor's preliminary budget then was originally proposed. UCCA approved donation requests for EdUCate, UCHS Grad Nite, and Marcy Park Improvement. Bridger Langfur, Barbara Bry's community representative reported that as expected, the Mayor's preliminary budget was based on a 3.5% cut from all depts. The City's pension fund deficit and longevity factors were the causes for this action.

The good news for UC residents, (in particular the "ImagineUC 2020 and Marcy Park Improvement projects) is that Barbara Bry has met with key city officials from the budget and city attorney's offices to pursue making North UC. DIF monies available for community-wide projects that meet identified criteria. We applaud Councilperson Bry for doing this. Our County grant applications for street and Standley Park banners (for summer concerts and the 4th of July), are in process). Diane Ahern, our vice-president is working closely with Standley Park Rec. Council and the County Supervisor Kristin Gaspar's community representative to UCCA, Corrine Buta, to provide input and technical assistance with our grant applications. Mike O'Sullivan, the local organizer of "coffee and cars" announced April plans for the popular community/car event, as well as plans for a display at Standley Park's 4th of July Celebration.

Have a wonderful month of May, and congratulations and thank you to all those wonderful volunteers, from our past to the present, who have been associated with providing our community, FOR FIFTEEN YEARS, with a free, monthly UCCA newsletter. Remember, University City "is more than just a neighborhood." ~Barry



Costa Verde Center Development

Recap of April UCPG Subcommittee

On April 5, John Murphy of Regency Centers, the company that owns Costa Verde Center on the corner of Nobel Drive and Genesee Avenue, met with the Costa Verde Center UCPG subcommittee, which included 11 residents, the Vi executive director and several business owners to discuss options for redeveloping the shopping center. The first option was to add 125,000 square feet of retail space, a 200-room hotel and 120 apartments. The second option was to add 125,000 square feet of retail space and a 200-room hotel. The third option was to add 125,000 square feet of retail space. The fourth was no project, which is a requirement that all developers must consider when proposing a project. All attendees were given an opportunity to ask questions and provide their input on a preferred option. Most attendees preferred the third option, which would include adding 125,000 new square feet of shops and restaurants to the shopping center. A few attendees also liked the idea of a new hotel. There was also discussion about a smaller hotel, which was embraced by more members of the subcommittee, though a consensus did not exist.

As the developer, Regency Centers raised some interesting questions. For example, what will parking look like over the next several years? How will services like Uber and Lyft and self-driving cars play a role in our community? Should Regency Centers build the same number of parking spaces required by the City or fewer because the demand will be less in the future if fewer people drive? When asked how many "average daily traffic trips" their project would generate, Regency Centers explained that it depends on the type of businesses since different uses have different trip requirements. Trips refer to vehicular trips. I wanted to know the trips so as to gauge how much impact this project would have on the Genesee corridor. If "The Citizens for the Regents Road Bridge" are unsuccessful in building the Regents Road Bridge, trips may become more important.

The Vi retirement facility is next door to Costa Verde Center. The Vi has an interest in the increased size of the Costa Verde Center development, in particular, a proposed parking garage. The Vi would like the parking underground as much as possible, and it was suggested that the exhaust ventilation from the garage should not be close to Vi, which is a residential complex.

The new Mid-Coast Blue Trolley Line will have an impact on development, but the extent to which parking spaces can be reduced has not been fully explored with the City. Some of the residents were strongly outspoken about the prominence of the overhead trolley and the congested feel Genesee Avenue will have when everything is built up.

Regency Centers can request any of the four alternatives when they go to the City for project approval. It is up to Regency Centers, as a general rule; the more they ask for, the more resistance they can expect from residents.

Imagine UC 2020 projects in the Standley Park area are moving along in the approval process. Projects include an aquatics center, a stage/pavilion, a jogging path and added grass field space. It is a joint use project between San Diego Unified School District and the City of San Diego and the UC community. The projects have already been approved by the Standley Park Recreation Council. The next step is approval by the City Park and Recreation Board. Then it will require approval by the San Diego Unified School Board and the City Council. Across the United States, the growth in the number and proportion of adults over the age of 65 has hit new and unparalleled levels in our history. Alzheimer's is the third

leading cause of death in San Diego County. In 2014, more than 64,000 San Diegans 55 and older were living with Alzheimer's disease and related dementias (ADRD), and were cared for by more than 145,400 unpaid caregivers. Within 15 years, the number of San Diegans living with ADRD is projected to increase by almost 50%, from 64,000 to nearly 94,000. Last month, the Board of Supervisors released *The Alzheimer's Project 2017 Annual Report*.

The Alzheimer's Project, launched in 2014, is an unprecedented regional initiative that has united an all-star team of stakeholders from multiple community sectors to address the toll Alzheimer's disease is taking on our families, communities, and local health care systems. This year, I have joined Chairwoman Dianne Jacob in leading this ambitious regional effort.

Barbara Bry City Council, District 1

As Chair of the Committee on Budget and Government Efficiency, I invite the community to weigh in on how the City spends our money. This is a challenging budget year, because our pension payment is higher than it was last year due to lower than



anticipated investment returns and employees' increasing life spans. Because of this, the Mayor has asked each department to prepare an initial budget that is 3.5% lower than last year. On April 13, the Mayor presented his proposed budget for Fiscal Year 2018, and the City's Independent Budget Analyst Andrea Tevlin and her team are currently conducting an indepth analysis that will be presented at the first Budget Review Hearing on May 3 (other meetings May 4, 8, and 9).

Public testimony is welcome at all hearings as well as at an evening meeting of the full City Council on May 15. And of course, you can also write to me or any of the other councilmembers about your priorities. After the hearings are completed, the Council makes recommendations to the Mayor, and he presents the final budget for ratification in early June. Since it might be difficult for some residents to come downtown to City Hall, we are holding a **Budget Town Hall** in the district (Saturday, May 6, 10:00-11:30am, La Jolla Village Square Community Room, 8657 Villa La Jolla Dr.--adjacent to AMC box office, RSVP required: BarbaraBry@sandiego.gov).

It is important that your voice be heard during the budget process so that the City Council can make informed decisions about how to allocate our spending. I look forward to hearing from you. TRAFFIC STUDY AT GOVERNOR AND MERCER

A few months ago, I observed two near hits of pedestrians at the intersection of Governor Drive and Mercer Street. Barbara Bry's office and her assistant, Bridger Langfur, agreed to a traffic study of this intersection and all intersections along Governor as many of them are adjacent to parks and schools. The assessment of all intersections is going on now, but the first one concerning Mercer and Governor is complete. Although I had suggested it, the City engineer failed to recommend a pedestrian-only walk time because the study found the sight distance for turning vehicles to be adequate to see pedestrians in the crosswalk. And checking police records for the past five years resulted in no reported collisions regarding vehicles failing to yield when turning.

I want improvements made, but I want the improvements to be made with community input. We only can progress by working together with the City and understanding the reality from many viewpoints. 

UC Library Will Temporarily Close for System Technology Upgrade

The San Diego Public Library is taking steps to enhance customer service and improve efficiency. Through July 2017, libraries across the city will undergo a system-wide technology upgrade. To complete this work, the **University Community Branch Library will be closed from May 15 through May 26**. Patrons can call the library before May 13 to arrange to pick up items at a nearby branch library such as the North University Branch Library, etc. During the closure, items placed on hold will be kept at the library and holds will be extended until after the library re-opens. What will happen during the upgrade? The library will receive equipment upgrades and RFID (Radio Frequency Identification) technology. Materials will be tagged with RFID microchips, replacing the use of barcodes to catalog and track materials. The RFID chips do not contain patron information, so there are no privacy risks. The new equipment will allow for quicker check-out times and inventory of the collection. The University Community Branch Library will re-open on Saturday, May 27 (closed Sunday May 28 and Monday May 29 for Memorial Day). Staff will be available to help patrons use the new self-check machines.

History of Spreckels Elementary

Our family moved to San Diego in February of 1972. If you moved here after 1981, it would be hard for you to realize what University City really looked like in 1972. Standley Park did not exist, nor did Standley Junior High, Swanson Pool, or University City High School. All of that came later, as the community came together to make these things come true.

What did exist at the time was Spreckels Elementary school. It was a sorry looking double row of shabby wooden portable bungalows, lined up against the fence of the neighbors on Stadium Ct. There was only a dirt lot for a playground and no lunch court, and no air conditioning. The teacher's "lounge" was also housed in a wooden bungalow, with no bathroom. The neighbors on Stadium Court complained constantly about the noise from the school.

I was the Chair of the newly formed Citizens Advisory Committee when the Teacher's Union called a strike in the 70s. What we learned from that experience was that teacher morale at our site was very low, due in part to the conditions under which they were forced to work. After listening to the teachers at our site, and after the strike was settled, I and Martha Cox, another parent volunteer, decided we had to do SOMETHING about the deplorable conditions at Spreckels. We decided that we needed a new permanent facility at Spreckels, and to that end we started writing letters to the Superintendent, Tom Goodman, to the School Board, and to our Board member, John Witt. When that did not produce results, Martha and I decided we would go the School Board meeting and make a presentation.

We had our facts and figures, pictures of the sorry-looking site, the dust covering everything when the wind blew. We got nowhere. We were told there was no money for a new school. But, we were now angry, and made the decision to attend every weekly school board meeting for the entire school year, and speak to the Board during the public comments period. This went on every week for three months. Martha and I attended and spoke at every scheduled school board meeting. At end of three months, we got the news we wanted. The School District had somehow received federal money, and our new school would be built.

We broke ground in the Spring of 1977, Martha and I digging ceremonial shovels of dirt. It was a great day. The school you see there today is the result. It opened in 1978 and has been a big part of our community ever since.

By the time it opened, Martha Cox and family had moved away. My own children never attended the new school. The two older children were now in Junior High, and my youngest attended a Magnet School for 6th grade.

On May 28, the Rose Canyon Harmonie, a wind ensemble made up of current and former members of the La Jolla Symphony orchestra, will return to UCUC to perform Charles Gounod's Petite Symphony, Beethoven's Rondino, and Mozart's Serenade Number 12. The program, which begins at 7:00pm, will include a free-will offering benefiting the church and its music program; and lasts for about one hour. UCUC is located at the west end of Governor Drive - 2877 Governor Drive.

All of these pieces are beloved works in the wind ensemble repertoire. The Mozart Serenade and the Beethoven Rondino are written for eight wind players (pairs of oboes, clarinets, horns, and bassoons); the Gounod Petite Symphony adds to this ensemble a flute. The Mozart and Beethoven pieces are very much in the Harmonie wind ensemble tradition, and date from its prime around 1780-90. Charles Gounod's Petite Symphony was written for French flutist Paul Taffanel in 1885; however, it also references the earlier classical styles of Mozart and Beethoven. This is joyful music, full of wonderful melodies and harmonies. We've had such fun playing them ourselves, and we're looking forward to performing these pieces for you!








UC PLANNING GROUP REPORT

Announcements: There is a site development permit for a new trail behind Genesee Highlands. Sears is cutting their parking in half in May and will share with Crate & Barrel. City Councilmember Barbara Bry will hold a Budget Town Hall on May 6, 10:00-11:30am at La Jolla Village Square Community Room next to AMC. Full City Council hearings for public input on the 2018 budget will be May 15, 6:00pm at City Hall.

Reports: Bridger Langfur representing Councilperson Bry reminded all that input is welcomed at the Town Hall May 6. Bry does not expect parks and libraries to be cut. Bry is chair of the budget committee which is reviewing pension payments. A 3.5% lower city budget is being proposed. Bry will help any neighborhood watch group get started and pay for their sign. The Community Forest Advisory group had met with Bry and set tasks but no money has yet been allocated to replace trees. Chevelle Tate representing Senator Toni Atkins announced that Atkins is on the Rules, Transportation, Health, and the Natural Resources Committees. She supports SB2 the Affordable Housing bill, three Human Trafficking bills, Single Payer Health Care, SB1 road repair, transit and road improvement, and SB 179 for gender recognition. There was discussion over the 500 affordable housing units in District 1. Chevelle will follow up and check the city list of these units in 92121. Permit applications for the MCAS trails (Santee Lakes to Stowe Trail) are at www.miramar.marines.mil/Resources/StoweTrail/. The board unanimously voted to seat the officers: Chair Janay Kruger, Vice Chair Meagan Beale, Secretary Kris Kopensky.

Action item: Campus Pointe 10290 & 10300 to add 318,383sf multi-tenant office building and add a two-story 10,000sf, microbrewery and dining area (not be open to the public) as well as a six-story parking structure, soccer field and reconfiguration of 2,909 parking spaces. The Sub Committee recommended: Approve the Campus Pointe project, including the proposed Community Plan Amendment with the following conditions: 1) The City commits to preserve and dedicate as permanent Open Space the 42 acres of city-owned lands adjacent to the project site and that Alexandria Real Estate Equities (ARE) commit to support and advocate for this with the City. 2) As a community benefit, ARE deposit \$3.5 million in the escrow account for UC Projects: land acquisition, restoration, and/or dedication of Open Space or parkland in the UCPG area. Up to \$500,000 may be used for improvement of population-based developed parks in the UCPG area since the community bears the brunt of the extra traffic and the change to the community plan. 3) ARE maintain permanent public access to the adjacent 42-acre city-owned open space parcels and include no less than 12 free public parking spaces and bike parking adjacent to the parcels. 4) ARE register a permanent no-build restriction on the area north of the existing 10300 building and designate MHPA that would preclude development of building or parking structures within the area. 5) ARE will reduce the height of the proposed new building CP3 to a be a tiered 10- and 5-story configuration. The follow up is to get a letter from the City Council "dedicating" the 42 acres as Open Space. The recommendation of the subcommittee was approved.

Action Item: Expansion of the existing cell towers by Sprint at Doyle Park. A citizen's committee did some research on cell tower antennas and had Dr. Alan Ross give a presentation slated to keeping cell towers away from parks and schools. The 1996 city mandates that: 1) The city must let cell towers be installed and not deny permits. There is antenna in 620 locations in SD of 50,000 watts each. 2)One cannot sue a communications company over electromagnetic fields. At Doyle Park Sprint, ATT, Verizon, and T-Mobil all have antenna installed; Sprint is requesting to expand at Doyle. Sprint noted that with all the companies in the area combined; at groundlevel the emissions were 5% below what is allowed by the FCC. Subcommittee members reported on their findings: Testing would cost \$5,000. 34 community groups were contacted, comments included: Children are sensitive receptors; maintain a safe zone for kids. Peter Krysl, a UCSD Engineer weighed in that the waves were 70' in the air and not a problem. Others felt that NIH and scientific data should be gathered. A motion was made to disapprove of Sprint's request and ask them to find an alternate site, which passed. If this is approved by the City the UCPG will do further study.

Infrastructure improvements and new projects in University City (UC), as in all other San Diego communities, are funded primarily as part of the City's annual budget process, more specifically, the Capital Improvements Program (CIP) component. Your opportunity to make a difference is during the community input part of that process as outlined in San Diego City Council Policy 000-32. This policy requires each Community Planning Group to start the process of soliciting community input and building consensus in July of each year and they are also required to hold two or more public hearings to gain community input before submitting recommendations to the City Planning Department by October 1st. The policy further states that:

- The University Community Planning Group (UCPG), along with all others in the City of San Diego, provides recommendations in an advisory capacity,
- Community members or organizations have the right to directly contact the Mayor's Office or the City Council, and
- The Mayor's Office and the City Council have the ability to directly seek public input.

We encourage all interested members of the UC community to provide input on CIP projects, both during the City's annual budget process and when our North and South UC PFFPs are updated. You can make a difference by:

- Contacting your City Council Member www.sandiego.gov/citycouncil;
- Attending meetings or contacting representatives of the UCPG (which represents both North and South UC), the Standley Park Recreation Council, the University City Community Association (UCCA), Improve UC and other groups soliciting community input; and
- Participating in the formalized process to obtain public input on community infrastructure needs and priorities as outlined in City Council Policy 000-32.






