Father's Day History and Fun Facts

The Father's Day tradition may have started on July 5, 1908, when a West Virginia church sponsored a one-time event in honor of fathers, a Sunday sermon in memory of the 362 men who had died in the previous December's explosions at the Fairmont Coal Company mines in Monongah. The nation's first Father's Day was celebrated on June 19, 1910, in the state of Washington. However, it was not until 1972, 58 years after President Woodrow Wilson made Mother's Day official, that the day honoring fathers became a nationwide holiday in the United States.

When World War II began, advertisers began to argue that celebrating Father's Day was a way to honor American troops and support the war effort. By the end of the war, Father's Day may not have been a federal holiday, but it was a national institution. In 1972, in the middle of a hard-fought presidential re-election campaign, Richard Nixon signed a proclamation making Father's Day a federal holiday at last. Today, economists estimate that Americans spend more than \$1 billion each year on Father's Day gifts. Happy Father's Day to all the dads who make University City more than a neighborhood.

On May 20, our 2nd Neighborhood Watch Conference and Solutions Summit was held for Neighborhood Watch Captains and Co-Captains

Council person Barbara Bry and Council person Chris Cate attended along with our keynote speaker, Chief Zimmerman, Capt. Williams from Northern Division, Lt. Grubbs, Lt. Manansala, Lt. Sara Nappoli, President and CEO of the San Diego Police Foundation discussed their role in providing special equipment for our law enforcement that is not covered in the regular budget. As a 501(c)(3) organization they do fundraisers throughout the year but accept donations at any time. Kristin Amicone, the Director of Education and Technology of the San Diego Police Foundation, explained social networking, cyberbullying, sexting and how to protect our children from these threats.

Rusty Sailors, President and CTO of Protecting Tomorrow. His organization is responsible for helping to secure, protect and educate students in schools, women on line, small and medium size businesses, emergency response organizations and helps transition veterans to successful civilian careers. He works with the Intelligence Community, the Department of Defense, Special Operations community, Academia and Commercial Industry.

If you are a homeowner or renter, your responsibility not only covers your front and side lawn areas, but on the other side of a backyard fence all the way to the curb. For example, all homeowners whose back yards back up to Governor Dr. are responsible for the foliage, trees, shrubs and weeds and sidewalk on the other side of the back fence.

We, in University City, are known for our volunteering and would be willing to help out a neighbor. What if several neighbors got together with shovels, clippers, rakes and brooms and offered their services; wouldn't that be a "high five" moment. Here's another option, a group of neighbors could pool their resources and hire a gardener for a one time cleanup or more. What are you waiting for, form a crew and dig in.



CODE ENFORCEMENT: IMPROVING THE QUALITY OF SAN DIEGO'S NEIGHBORHOODS

San Diego Code Enforcement, a division of the Development Services Department, works in partnership with the people of San Diego to promote and maintain a safe and desirable living and working environment; to improve the quality of San Diego's neighborhoods through education, enforcement, and abatement; and to respond to community concerns and attain code compliance while maintaining high professional standards and continually seeking improvements and innovations.

Code Enforcement has an established hierarchy of priorities. Priority 1 cases represent imminent health and safety hazards such as dangerous/unstable structures, inadequate barriers for swimming pools/spas, leaking sewage, live, exposed electrical wires and uninhabitable living conditions. Priority 2 cases represent significant code violations such as abandoned properties, disturbance of environmental resources, substandard housing conditions and unpermitted grading. Priority 3 cases include other code violations or conditions that adversely impact quality of life such as garages illegally converted to living spaces, landscaping issues, parking in the front yard, high occupancy, and short term vacation rentals. Where: University City and Clairemont are holding this event at the same time in their respective parks



Barbara Bry City Council, District 1

As chair of the Budget Review Committee, it is my goal to ensure that the City Council approves a balanced Fiscal Year 2018 Budget that preserves core neighborhood services and advances public safety in our communities. I have been working with my colleagues on the Council to carefully review the Mayor's proposed FY 2018 Budget and make sure that the community has a chance to weigh in on important decisions about how we spend taxpayer dollars in this challenging fiscal year.

Thank you to all of the engaged San Diegans who came to City Hall to testify, sent emails and letters, called, and attended our District town hall meeting to share your priorities and concerns. Because of your input, many important revisions to restore critical neighborhood services were made to the Mayor's revised budget, issued on May 16th.

Below is a list of some of my key budget priorities:

- Search to find San Diego's next Police Chief
- Develop a comprehensive police recruitment plan with funding for implementation
- Increase lifeguard training and staffing
- Create a 5-year roadmap of necessary expenditures to implement the City's Climate Action Plan
- Increase funding for the Arts

The next step in the budget process is for the Office of the Independent Budget Analyst to issue a final report on recommended revisions to the FY 2018 budget on June 1st. Finally, the City Council is expected to put the stamp of approval on the FY 2018 Budget on June 5° .







SD Parks & Rec Approves Standley Park Improvements

The San Diego Park and Recreation Board met in Balboa Park on May 18 to vote on agenda items that included Standley Middle School and Spreckels Elementary School joint use and aquatic facility general development plan amendment. The Parks and Recreation Board voted unanimously to approve the projects. At the meeting Dr. John Lee Evans, Board of Education member, outlined the issues under consideration. The joint use agreement between the San Diego Unified School District and the City of San Diego was adopted in 1975 and has worked smoothly with fields being shared by the schools and the community. At one time, Standley students took swimming at Swanson Memorial pool. The new initiative put forth by Mayor Faulconer and SDUSD Superintendent Cindy Marten is called Play All Day Parks program. The SDUSD schools can help fund the capital projects and the City can underwrite the operational costs. Both the schools and community benefit.

At a UC public input meeting in 2014, over 100 people attended to share ideas on the proposals: the pavilion, the pool, and jogging path around the perimeter of the park. The stage pavilion will be ideal for student events and our summer concerts and big events like the UC Celebration. The new pool will provide a much needed site for high school water polo and swim teams, as well as benefit the community.

It is exciting to be on the cutting edge of some wonderful projects at Standley Park, knowing added green space at Spreckels and energy efficient methods will drive the design of the pool. While Standley Park Recreation Council overwhelmingly supports this project, the unanimous votes by San Diego Park and Recreation Board were music to the ears of those who have been working on the project since 2014. Plenty of work lies ahead, but University City is on the right path after that unanimous support.






