### University City High School Celebrates Construction Milestone

District leaders and University City High School students celebrated the official grand opening of recently completed Fabrication and Design program space, new athletic facilities and site improvements with a ribbon cutting ceremony before the September 22 varsity home game against Mar Vista. Brand new facilities also include a beautiful monument tower and stadium entrance.

The photo above shows SDUSD Trustee John Lee Evans and Superintendent Cindy Marten cutting the ribbon with UCHS Cheerleaders Maddie Sagui and Carly Hunt.

UCHS PTSA President Greg Hom noted that "The improvements surrounding the stadium as well as the other athletic fields enhance the student experience, not only for the sports teams and physical education classes, but also for activities such as marching band."

These projects are funded by San Diego Unified School District's Propositions S and Z, which are local bond measures approved by San Diego voters to repair, renovate and revitalize neighborhood schools. In addition to renovation and replacement, bond projects include classroom technology, facilities to support College, Career and Technical Education, classroom air conditioning, safety and security upgrades, and other facilities improvements at traditional and public charter schools throughout San Diego Unified. Prop. S is a 23-year capital facilities program that is funded by a \$2.1 billion general obligation bond measure passed November 4, 2008. Prop. Z is a 15-year capital facilities program funded by a \$2.8 billion general obligation bond measure passed November 6, 2012. By law, the funds cannot be used for teachers' or school administrators' salaries, nor can they be used for maintenance or operations.

### FIRE SAFETY TIPS

There was a house fire in my neighborhood recently caused by smoking and confined to one bedroom and the attic above. But the house is not inhabitable, displacing its residents. Maybe we can help prevent some fires with the following tips, courtesy of the San Diego Fire-Rescue Department.

#### Provide Smokers with Large, Deep Ashtrays

Wet cigarette butts and ashes before emptying ashtrays into a wastebasket.

Never smoke when you are lying down, drowsy, or in bed.

#### **Give Space Heaters Space**

Keep them at least three feet away from anything that can burn, including you.

Unplug heaters when you shut them off, leave home, or go to bed.

### Be Kitchen Wise

Wear tight-fitting or rolled-up sleeves when cooking.

Use oven mitts to handle hot pans.

Never leave cooking unattended.

If a pan of food catches fire, slide a lid over it and turn off the burner. Don't cook if you are drowsy from alcohol or medication.

### Stop, Drop, and Roll

If your clothing catches on fire: Stop (don't run), drop gently to the ground, cover your face with your hands and roll over and over to smother the flames.

If you cannot do that, smother the flames with a towel or blanket. Immerse burns in cool water for 10 to 15 minutes.

If burns are severe, get medical help immediately.

### **Smoke Alarms Save Lives**

Have smoke alarms installed outside all sleeping areas and on every level of your home.

Test your smoke alarms once a month by pushing the test button. Replace the smoke alarm battery twice a year. When you change the clock, change the smoke alarm battery.

Make sure everyone in your home can hear your smoke alarms.

### Plan and Practice Your Escape from Fire

Know two ways out of every room in your home. Make sure windows and doors open easily. In a fire, get out and stay out.


#### **Know Your Local Emergency Number.**

Remember the number for emergencies is 9-1-1. Once you've escaped a fire, call the fire department from a cell phone or neighbor's phone.

#### Plan Your Escape Around Your Abilities

Have a telephone in your bedroom to call 9-1-1 in case you are trapped by fire.



### National Night Out Update

Donations to the San Diego Police Foundation from this year's National Night Out Dance Marathon received donations of \$8518 from University City and Clairemont combined. According to Capt. Tina Williams, from Northern Division, 10 ballistic plate vests will be purchased for our officers.

### OFFICER B. BROADDUS NORTHERN DIVISION, SDPD

We now have two Police Investigative Service Officer (PISO), and their sole purpose is to address the oversized vehicles.

If you see a dog that is not on a leash please call the County Animal services. We do not enforce this they do. Their phone number is (619) 767-2675.

The department is very aware of the wait times that are plaguing the non-emergency number. The City approved the addition of nine more phone dispatcher positions to assist with our admin line wait times. Most of the wait time depends on time of day. If they call during high volume 911 calls, the wait time will be longer. When calling the non-emergency line please stay on the line even though the wait time may be long.

Now that summer is coming to an end the officers that were taken from the Quality of Life Team to support the summer beach team will be returning. This will help with the ever-increasing issues that we have seen from the homeless. The Quality of Life Team is normally staffed with four officers.

Mid-October SDPD will be implementing new Computer aided dispatch software. Our current software is over 25 years old. The new system will be call Mobile for Public Safety (MPS). This new system will give officers some tools that will help them with their day to day patrol operations.

The City of San Diego is asking for the public's help to find a replacement for outgoing Police Chief Shelley Zimmerman. Zimmerman will retire in March 2018. The new chief should be selected by January 2018.

### RESCHEDULED POLICE CHIEF REPLACEMENT MEETING


The new date is Thursday, October 5, 6:00 at Standley Park Recreation Center.

The City of San Diego has initiated the recruitment for the next Chief of the San Diego Police Department. Chief Shelley Zimmerman is retiring and will conclude her service with the City in March 2018. Recognizing the critical ongoing importance of community policing and neighborhood engagement, the City will host six community meetings and unveil an online survey to capture the priorities and comments of San Diegans for the next Chief of Police. San Diego Charter section 57 provides that the Police Chief is appointed by the Mayor and the appointment is confirmed by a majority of the City Council. The community workshops are being conducted solely by Mayoral staff, to assist the Mayor with his decision making in appointing the City's next Police Chief. All input received will be used throughout the recruitment and selection process, which will be managed by the City's Chief Operating Officer Scott Chadwick, on behalf of Mayor Kevin L. Faulconer. The City will be hiring an executive recruitment firm to assist in the process.

### LT. DAN GRUBBS NORTHERN DIVISION, SDPD

The Northern Division Crime Suppression Team (CST) is comprised of uniform officers who work proactively to address chronic problem locations and career criminals throughout Northern Division. CST accomplishes this task through the use of several different techniques; saturation, bicycle, ATV, and 4X4 vehicle patrol on the beach and streets and in canyons throughout the division. The team conducts compliance checks of local probationers and parolees and conducts operations with the San Diego Police Narcotics Division targeting drug sales and use. CST has shut down several chronic narcotic sales houses and locations and continues to monitor them for repeat activity. The team works closely with private loss prevention officers at the University Town Center Mall, Clairemont Town Center and shopping centers along 5500 Balboa Avenue. The team was recently involved in a long-term investigation regarding a violent organized crime theft crew who was hitting these retail locations for \$4,000 - \$14,000 per theft of electronic items and clothing. In September, CST served a search warrant on the two main suspects in conjunction with several other search warrants throughout Orange, Riverside and San Diego counties. A total of 18 suspects were taken into custody and booked into jail, with arrest warrants issued for 10 more suspects. A significant amount of stolen retail merchandise was recovered.

CST conducts outreach attending community meetings, meet and greet walks, and provides static displays of vehicles and equipment at events in Northern Division. The team acts as an evening hours quality of life team offering services to reported homeless individuals and taking enforcement action when appropriate. CST conducts traffic enforcement operations at locations in response to community complaints. All of this activity has a significant impact reducing calls for service for patrol officers and improving the safety and quality of life for Northern Division communities.



### Barbara Bry City Council, District 1

On August 19, my office released draft regulations for short-term rentals in the City of San Diego. My proposal protects the rights of those who wish to participate in home sharing by renting out a room in their home to help make ends meet. It further allows individuals to rent out their primary residence for up to 90 days per year on a short-term basis (time periods less than 30 days). As a high-tech entrepreneur, I embrace the sharing economy as an innovative and integral part of our overall economy.

A recent report by the University of San Diego's Burnham-Moores Center for Real Estate showed that short-term rentals contribute to the depletion of San Diego's housing stock. My goal in drafting this proposal is to allow for unique and affordable accommodation options for San Diego's many visitors, while also preserving our precious housing stock for the families who live and work here.

My office sought extensive community input in developing my proposal and will continue to do so until the Council takes action on this issue. We presented the draft regulations at a town hall meeting in La Jolla on August 30 to get feedback from the community. I thank the hundreds of community residents who came out to share their perspectives on my draft proposal. At this meeting, I heard many concerns about the lack of enforcement. The annual permitting fees collected under my proposal will fund reliable, 24/7 code enforcement. It is the responsibility of local government to enforce the law, and I believe that once we have passed fair regulations we will be able to do so effectively.

This matter is expected to come before the Council in late October. As the District 1 councilmember, it is my duty to ensure that we maintain the quality of life that we all love about San Diego.

I look forward to working with my colleagues on the City Council to pass fair and sensible short-term rental regulations for the residents and visitors of our beautiful city. To view my proposal, visit: sandiego.gov/citycouncil/cd1/policymemos.

### Finishing a year, starting a year John Lee Evans, SD Unified Trustee

We evaluate the Superintendent at the end of each school year. The evaluation of the Superintendent is synonymous with the evaluation of



the entire District. Here are some of the highlights of the Board's review of the District's performance in 2016-17:

- Maintaining a graduation rate with rigorous requirements above 90% with the number of students meeting California college admissions requirements increasing by 50% in the past five years while significantly narrowing achievement gap for African Americans and Latinos
- An increase in the number of English Language Learners who are proficient in English in less time and those students are outperforming native speakers by graduation
- Increase in the number of students taking AP courses and community college courses
- Increased access to Career Pathway courses linked to San Diego growth industries
- Dramatic expansion of enrollment in District early childhood education programs
- Clear definition of the role of principals and Area Superintendents as instructional leaders with the bulk of their time in the classroom supporting teachers
- In collaboration with teachers in the process of developing a breakthrough approach to teacher evaluation focused on growth and development
- Strong anti-bullying programs and restorative justice programs resulting in a decline in student suspensions and expulsions and a more positive school climate
- Integration of construction and instruction to ensure that the new facilities match our academic needs
- Continued development of our nationally recognized itechnology program for individualized and small group learning
- Stabilizing the District's finances by nearly eliminating our structural deficit in a very difficult budget year with increased pension and other costs
- A strong focus at the school sites on the goals of Vision 2020 for Quality Schools in Every Neighborhood

Areas in which we need to improve in 2017-2018:

- Focus on literacy in K-3 to achieve Vision 2020 goal all third graders proficiently literate by 2020
- Improved integration of students with special needs into mainstream classrooms
- Greater diversity in our staffing to more closely reflect the diversity of our students
- Need to decrease chronic absenteeism by a subset of students
- Develop a more comprehensive strategy of what our neighborhood schools offer to increase the percentage of students enrolling in their neighborhood school
- Better explanation of the budget process to stakeholders allowing for greater input from the community

In University City we are off to a good start for the 2017-18 school year. Everyone in the community is encouraged to attend the meetings of the University City Cluster, which is comprised of all the schools in UC. 

### **UCSD Columbus Day Lecture**

The Crisis of Commemoration: First Contacts in the Americas

The UCSD Institute of Arts and Humanities is sponsoring a lecture on October 5 that is both timely, controversial, and local. For over a year they have been planning to hold this discussion about Columbus Day versus Indigenous Peoples Day in California. It was set it up prior to Charlottesville making this topic a national story about how we remember or celebrate foundational yet problematic moments in the past.

The panel that will discuss Columbus more broadly, but then focus on Juan Cabrillo and how we remember first contacts in California. Ray Ashley at the Maritime Museum will discuss the controversy surrounding the building of the San Salvador, the first ship to sail into San Diego harbor in 1542, making it a pivotal founding moment in American history, yet one that was not positive for all involved. Other speakers include Mark Salazer, Imperial Valley Desert Museum, and Dr. Kevin Terraciano, UCLA Professor of History. ### **North City Update**

The City of San Diego is moving forward with Pure Water San Diego, a phased, multi-year program that will provide one-third of San Diego's water supply locally by 2035. Multiple Pure Water facilities will be constructed throughout San Diego in phases.

The first phase of the Pure Water Program is located in the North City area and includes a new Pure Water Facility across the street from the existing North City Water Reclamation Plant on Eastgate Mall. To convey additional wastewater supplies to North City for purification, a new pump station is proposed to be constructed at Sherman Street and Custer Street, along with two proposed 11-mile-long wastewater pipelines through Clairemont and University City. Improvements will also be made to the water distribution system on a segment of Morena Boulevard. Construction will occur in phases between early 2019 and late 2021.

The North City Project is currently undergoing environmental review, and the Draft Environmental Impact Report (EIR) is available for public review and comment through November 7, 2017. The public is invited to attend a public workshop on Wednesday, October 11, from 4:00 to 8:00pm, at the City of San Diego Public Utilities Department located at 9192 Topaz Way, San Diego, 92123. (\*UCPG has raised concerns over the pipe/sewer line placement in University City.)

The public is also invited to the **Pure Water Day Open House**, on October 21, from 10:00am to 3:00pm. Bring the whole family to learn more about Pure Water, enjoy free snow cones, kettle corn and face painting! Visit www.purewatersd.org/openhouse to reserve your tour spot.

The Raptor Institute will showcase raptors that are native to San Diego, including to Rose Canyon and Marian Bear Park. You'll see these birds up close, perched on the trainer's glove. You'll learn about what they eat, how they hunt, what habitat they need, the role they play in our environment, and the importance of their conservation. Bring your questions.

Rose Canyon is a greenbelt that provides habitat for numerous birds of prey, including many others besides the ones you'll meet at this event. Friends of Rose Canyon is dedicated to the protection, preservation and restoration of Rose Canyon and the Rose Creek watershed.

### THE UC PLANNING GROUP REPORT

Nancy Groves, UCPG Rep District 1

REPORT OF SEPTEMBER MEETING. Announcements: Chair, Janay Kruger announced the topics for coming meetings in October: Illumina expansion, Pure Water San Diego, Alexandria 9880. October 12 is the big UTC opening.

UPDATES: UCSD announced the Mesa Nuevo Housing draft EIR online: <a href="https://physicalplanning.ucsd.edu/environmental/pub\_notice.html">https://pub.notice.html</a>. The public comment period ends October 9 at 5:00pm. The proposed project consists of two campus student housing developments Mesa Nuevo West with 802 student beds and 82 UCSD Family House beds, as well as a 1,228-space parking structure. UCSD is working with the city on the plans for a campus fire station which will be built by the university, but manned and sustained by the city.

Todd Gloria's representative reported on AB 187 which maintains Medi-Cal managed care for Children's Services, and on SB2, SB3, and SB35 which provide assistance, appropriations, and streamlining of the building process to address the housing crisis.

INFORMATION ITEM: A) CALTRANS reported that each new freeway bridge takes 18 months to build. The North bound ramp from Genesee to I-5 are complete and by March 20, 2018 the Genesee bridge will be completed. They are currently connecting all the utilities and fiber optic cables. B) The Gilman bridge false work is being completed now and should join the East and West campus of UCSD by early 2017. C) There are currently 50 construction projects in University City. D) A question was raised about the reported possible tunnel under UTC for the train. It was explained that this is a state required study to see only if it would be feasible and cost effective. The study results are due in one year from now. E) Considering Pure Water's attendance at the meeting next meeting, the UCPG would like to find an alternative route for the 46" pipe water line which is currently proposed to go down Genesee and would involve digging up Genesee again. We would like to get an exception to use an easement down the 805 freeway and 52 to the Morena Pump Station. This would have to be an exception since state law does not allow the use of utilities on freeway easements.

ACTION ITEMS: Community Choice Alliance has asked that UCPG support the concept of CCA and send a letter to the city. This topic was discussed at the July UCPG but action was deferred until we received the results of the City of San Diego Community Choice Aggregate Feasibility Study. The CCA program would supply energy that is 100% from renewables and meet the minimum performance criteria for Green House Gas reductions to meet CAP targets. The study concluded that it is feasible that the CCA program would have electric rates that are competitive with the incumbent utility. The SDG&E shareholders' representative presented a letter listing three conditions that they thought must be met if CCA was implemented. These three are: equal benefit for all the region's customers, provide additional environmental benefits, and must reduce greenhouse gas emissions. In the various scenarios examined, the CCA program rates remained below those projected for SDG&E. A major motive for developing CCA's is to bolster local economic development by encouraging manufacturers to stimulate jobs. The study of CCA's concluded that "lower utility costs would enhance the City's economic competitiveness, particularly for large power users such as the military, biotech/medical device. aerospace/defense, electronics/ telecommunications and international trade/logistics manufacturers." UCPG voted and approved a motion to send a letter of support to the city with a mention that the CCA also meshes well with the mayor's environmental plan for the city.

INFORMATION AND UPDATE: Fire station 50 on Nobel had small problem with the MSCP land parcel and the city had to buy back part of the parcel from Fish and Game. The site development permit is in the works and the MSCP land will become 'dedicated' park land. The design build/teams' proposals will be sent in Oct. with a 30-60-day review period and 3-4 months for award proposal. Construction should be completed by summer 2019.

### What You Can Expect at Westfield UTC

Westfield UTC and the north Genesee Avenue corridor will soon look and feel noticeably different to shoppers and drivers. Although the Mid-Coast Trolley-related construction continues on Genesee, most of the shopping mall construction will have cleared by mid-October to feature additional retail and restaurant space.

Multiple gardens, an art-walk and outdoor plazas, including one with a pop jet water fountain for kids, are meant to be focal points for visitors. Plus, the new Westfield UTC will come with indoor and outdoor event space, as well as a palm-tree lined valet drop-off area.

Perhaps the most noticeable change, however, will be the center's mostly single-level retail strategy. There are still different tiers, but the overhauled section will consist of additional underground parking on the first tier and a row of retail stores located just above the parking garage, now contiguous with the rest of the mall's outdoor space.

In a recent announcement that surprised many shoppers, Westfield UTC revealed that unlimited free parking will end next year. Referred to as "protected parking" for mall customers, shoppers will get the first two hours free and have to pay thereafter.

And construction in the immediate area continues. Westfield broke ground in September on a \$200 million, 23-story building, with 300 apartments, to be completed by 2019. The project is located at the corner of Nobel Drive and Lombard Place in a former Westfield UTC mall parking lot.




