It's nearing the end of summer, and our schools are all in session. Please watch for our children crossing streets. UCCA hopes this Labor Day Holiday will give you time to relax and prepare for the coming Fall months. It's been a busy "banner" year so far...as I'm sure you've noticed all the beautiful new street banners on our major streets. This month new Fall banners publicizing EdUCate! and University City will be proudly displayed along Governor Drive. Money for these and other new banners has been provided by a San Diego County Neighborhood Enhancement Grant award to UCCA.

This summer, preoccupation with serious National events may have caused some of us to become TV news addicts, real or "fake". (On the local front, "a huge crowd watching the solar eclipse surprised our library staff this past August, as there were hundreds of interested families standing in long lines all the way down the sidewalk to Carl's Jr.") UCCA was proud to participate and support the annual Standley Park 4th of July "Celebration", and the Summer Concerts. Barbara Gellman and your neighborhood watch captains organized the UC National Night Out/"Dance Marathon" at Standley Park in early August to honor and support our local police. Major donors to this event include Costa Verde Shopping and University Square shopping malls. And on Sunday, August 13th, UCCA honored its many community volunteers. (see photos) Our councilperson, Barbara Bry provided a commendation for all UCCA's volunteers. Barbara Gellman and two local police officers, (Officer Crawford grew up in UC), thanked the Neighborhood Watch captains for their support of their neighbors and the SD Police. Our many newsletter volunteers were also recognized. In acknowledgment of their community service all volunteers were given a specially designed pen featuring the UCCA logo and motto. Don Hotz, UCCA treasurer, Improve UC treasurer, Standley Park Board member, and Co-chair of "Marcy Park Improvements" was designated as our "Volunteer of the Year".

If you've dared to drive north on Genesee, north of Nobel, up to the UCSD campus entrance/Scripps Hospital this summer, you are aware of the current construction taking place...and it looks like the various street and building projects will be continuing for a year or so. Then along will come the Mid-coast trolley line...which it too will create traffic congestion some time. Westfield has begun construction of their 24-story apartment building, and that has created additional traffic around the UTC area. A proposed major water/pipeline to the purification plant off of 805 will begin next year...coming north of Clairemont Mesa Blvd on Genesee up to Nobel and turning east. Costa Verde Regency Center will be submitting their environmental impact report to the City Council in October, as they begin their planning for a major renovation. And, there are plans for two more high-rise apts. to be built at La Jolla Village Drive and Genesee.

The acknowledged gridlock on Genesee at commuting times is a fact, and most likely will only get worse. But what happens when the inevitable traffic accident occurs on Genesee. How would commuters and those of us who live in UC get from one place to another? Would our first responders be able to attend to emergency situations in adequate time? In my opinion, when it comes to 'safety" in our community, all options should be available. to consider. That leads me to my final comments...the legal case against the City for removing the Regents Road Bridge and Widening of Genesee from our current Community Plan has begun. Attorneys met on August 11 to set the procedural calendar. UCCA will continue to keep you informed of the current status on its website, NextDoor postings and of course in our monthly newsletter.

My best wishes to those Jewish families in our community who will be celebrating Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur this month. UCCA and Standley Park Rec. Council have created a beautiful "I Love University City" tee-shirt for everyone to celebrate and reflect pride of the community we live in...a "donation" of only \$5.00 is suggested. Tee-shirts are available at our monthly meetings at our Community Branch Library the second Wednesday of the month.

Volunteer LeWayne "Lee Lorang, UC resident for 41 years, will miss "more than just a neighborhood."

Lee Lorang, age 94, died peacefully five months after suffering a hip fracture. Her husband of 70 years,

Alphonse Lorang, lovingly supported her throughout life and through her latest health challenge. Lee and AI, originally from the same small farming community in Minnesota, moved to San Diego's South Bay in 1955 as part of AI's nomadic Navy career. They came to UC in 1976 to postpone empty nesting. Their youngest child, Marge, had commuted to UCSD during freshmen year at UCSD, but was contemplating an apartment hunt. Professionally, Lee worked as a registered nurse at Paradise Valley, Villa View, and Balboa Naval hospitals. She retired in 1988 after a breast cancer diagnosis and successful treatment.

Lee and Al were magnets and three of their kids moved to UC themselves. (A fourth, Phil, just moved back to San Diego as well, after time in Michigan and North Carolina.) Seven of their eleven grandkids went through UC public schools: Matt and Katie Anderson; Melissa, Karen and Jeremy Lorang; and Daniel and Charlie Spinosa. The grandparents were fixtures at UC Little League games, youth soccer and water polo games, and countless UCHS sporting events. They never missed Taste of the Triangle, Oktoberfest, a July 4th Pancake Breakfast or a Concert in the Park. Lee raised a close-knit family, who will try to help Al carry on. Lee's cremains were interred at Miramar National Cemetery.

UC residents Mary and Paul Croft have been long time volunteers in our community. Among their numerous contributions is their keeping Park 'n Ride weed free and litter free for the last ten years. UCCA is part of Adopt-A-Highway program by Cal Trans at the east end of Governor near 805. Mary and Paul have worked hard to keep the weeds and litter down.

SAN DIEGO POLICE LOOKING FOR NEW CHIEF

The City of San Diego is asking for the public's help to find a replacement for outgoing Police Chief Shelley Zimmerman. Zimmerman will retire in March 2018. The new chief should be selected by January 2018.

"Under Chief Zimmerman San Diego has become a leader in community policing and remained one of the safest big cities in America. Our next police chief must build on her commitment to excellence and continue to forge strong bonds with our neighborhoods," said Mayor Kevin Faulconer.




Daisy Crazy: Another neighborhood beautification project sponsored by UCCA

A Long-Term Solution for San Diego's Short-Term Rental Problem

The following was an Op-ed by Councilmember Barbara Bry Published in the Union Tribune on Sunday, August 20, 2017

Our beaches, bays and open spaces make San Diego a desirable place to both live and visit. Balancing the needs of the residents who live here and the tourists who come to visit requires political will and leadership. After years of discussions and failed proposals, it is time for clarity on an issue central to San Diego's housing and tourism markets — short-term vacation rentals.

Through a March 15, 2017 memo, City Attorney Mara Elliott opined that short-term rentals are illegal under the current city zoning laws. The city is now awaiting regulatory guidance from the City Council before taking any action to enforce the city attorney's memo. My proposed regulatory framework respects the rights of property owners, upholds current zoning laws and creates a workable compromise.

My proposal protects the rights of homeowners who wish to participate in home sharing by renting out a room in their home to help make ends meet. It further allows property owners to rent out their primary residence for up to 90 days per year if they want to go on vacation or make extra income during special events like Comic-Con. As a high-tech entrepreneur, I embrace the sharing economy as an innovative and integral part of our overall economy. I know it is here to stay and that it will continue to grow.

While my plan preserves homeowners' ability to rent out a room or even their entire primary residence, it prohibits absentee investors from commercializing single-family homes by turning them into full-time mini-hotels in residential zones. To put it simply, I propose to enforce the current law that prohibits these short-term rentals in residential zones, and I believe that a short-term rental is any time period less than 30 days. We can uphold the current zoning law, maintain the character of our neighborhoods, consistently collect Transient Occupancy Taxes from both home sharing and legal whole-house rentals, and preserve our precious housing stock for families who live and work in San Diego. Simultaneously, we can offer San Diego visitors unique and affordable options for accommodations.

San Diego has a severe housing shortage that makes it difficult for residents to rent, let alone purchase a home. If we want a future for our children and grandchildren here, we need to move quickly to address this issue. Advocates, experts, elected officials and associations all agree that we must increase the housing pipeline. My proposal both protects housing stock and allows residents to supplement their income.

The City Council recently took steps to remedy the housing shortage by passing a package of legislation aimed at creating more units, lowering construction costs and encouraging transit-oriented growth.

That package included eased regulations for building companion units, affectionately known as granny flats. While legislation at the state level went into effect in January to make building companion units easier, the City Council's new policy went even further to streamline regulations. During the council discussion of this item, an important amendment to limit the rental of these units to no less than 30 days was added. This 30-day minimum requirement makes it clear that this policy is meant to incentivize the creation of units to make housing more affordable for San Diegans. The policy's intention is not to make it easier to build commercial enterprises in our backyards, and the City Council recognized this by passing the companion unit legislation with an 8-1 vote.

The proliferation of mini-hotels in residential communities is an issue I've been hearing about from community members since I began my campaign for the District 1 council seat. Understandably, residents are concerned about the character of their neighborhoods and quality of life. When you purchase a home in a residential neighborhood, you are not signing up to live next to a Marriott. My office sought extensive community input in developing my proposal and will continue to do so until the council takes action on this issue. We will present a draft ordinance for community review at a public town hall meeting on Wednesday, Aug. 30, from 6 to 7:30 p.m. at the La Jolla Community Center.



Assemblyman Todd Gloria Holds Community Meeting

On Saturday, August 5th, CA Assemblyman Todd Gloria held a community meeting at our Community Library. Residents from UC and surrounding areas were there to have their questions answered and for Mr. Gloria to review current legislation around the issues of affordable housing, single payer health, and infrastructure. The 30 plus attendees were appreciative of the CA Assemblyman's explanation and candid opinions. Javier Gomez, will be the University City representative from the Assemblyman's office and will be at our September meeting.



Kids Explore Nature in Rose Canyon

Every year Friends of Rose Canyon free, small-group nature offers exploration walks in Rose Canyon and Marian Bear Parks for students from 11 nearby schools. This vear hundreds of students from Kindergarten through high school participated, including numerous classes from Curie, Spreckels, Doyle and UC High.

A special feature of our walks is that we divide into small groups. Our goal is to have 3-5 students per guide so that the kids become active explorers. Our guides (paid by grants) are excellent naturalists and share both their passion for nature and their knowledge with the kids. Each group becomes its own party of exploration, and each discovers different things. We catch insects and spiders in bug boxes, study them under magnification, then let them go. We examine animal tracks, trees and flowers. We watch lizards, rabbits, squirrels and birds. We see hawks and ravens in aerial combat, and woodpeckers bringing insects to their babies in a hole in a tree. Each group has a different experience, and each day is different.

Again and again we hear from both kids and teachers that they love these nature explorations. Many teachers bring their class year after year. We welcome parents to attend, and we often hear the same from them. Children no longer explore nature as part of their daily lives. Our goal is to provide experiences that give children and adults the pleasure and excitement of exploring the natural world, that teach them how it works, and that inspire their curiosity.

Regents Road Bridge Status

Regarding the removal of the Regents Road Bridge from the Community Plan, the scheduled August 11th Case Management Conference with the attorneys for both sides and the Judge took place as scheduled. The Court set future dates for the filing of Opening Briefs and Reply Briefs in October, November and December, 2017, pending the Certification of the Administrative Record by September 6.

The Trial (in the form of a Hearing before the Judge where both sides present their arguments) is scheduled for January 4, 2018. We will inform the community of any future developments through the newsletter.



THE BIG CLEANUP AT MARCY PARK

The concerns of UC residents are being heard through UCCF/Improve UC board members who met with City officials several times to discuss the improvement of Marcy Park. With the help of our UC Park and Recreation leadership, Johnny Chou and Roger Hughes, numerous cleanup details have been at work. Dead vegetation on both sides of the park was cleared, trees laced, animal nests removed and an unhappy rattlesnake relocated. In total, four 40-foot containers were filled with debris and hauled away! The park is looking healthy again and the work continues.

Funds that were raised (MarcyParkProject.com) will be replacing several lost trees, old trash cans and replacing the old drinking fountain with a dog friendly version. An additional park bench is also being considered for the entrance and soon the existing play equipment will be given a face-lift with new paint. We are hopeful that the City will set aside funding for grading, drainage and new playground equipment for Marcy Park in the 2019 budget. It's amazing what we can accomplish when we all work together!

UCPG SHOCKED! NO one is listening!

We are under siege with too much CONSTRUCTION!

It is very concerning to read in the newspaper* that Cal Trans has been negotiating in the courts against the wishes of the University Community. UCPG has invited the Director of Cal Trans District 8 to our September 12 meeting at 6 pm at the Scripps Office building to hear community concerns. No charge for parking, all residents, workers and property owners are welcome. The address is 10010 Campus Pointe Drive, first floor, meeting room.

THE UC PLANNING GROUP REPORT

Nancy Groves, UCPG Rep District 1

UPDATES: 1) Genesee Highlands HOA is reconsidering their Open Space issue, which was discussed at the last UCPG meeting. 2) Pure Water will return to a future meeting to discuss digging up Town Center Dr., Regents and Genesee again in 2019-2021 for water pipes. 3) Westfield apartment construction will begin in the next 3 weeks; they are currently working on the turn lane off Genesee. 4) The I-5 Genesee Ave Interchange is delayed until March 2018.

SANDAG: Mid-Coast trolley construction update: I-5 and L.J. Colony Dr. working on utilities from 10:00pm-5:00am, constructing bridge columns on the UCSD east campus, then Pepper Canyon and the playing field. The focus on Genesee uses four subcontractors working 24 hours. Eight days are needed to pour the driveway off Eastgate to apartments so they can alternate sides to keep access. (Audience comments: Make sure the area is well lit at Genesee and Eastgate; use extra temporary lighting. Need flagmen during the construction.) The wall at Country Day will be completed by mid-August. They are combining all trench work done at one time so widening can be completed. They have access to all properties on Genesee even though negotiating dollars have not been decided. They will cut and cover under LJ Village Drive in order to keep one lane open in each direction. The Rose Canyon bike path to Pacific Beach will be closed while they build a new one and bikes will be rerouted after 9:00pm.

SHIFTSanDiego.com announced that they bring all construction in the Golden Triangle area to one spot. SHIFT is funded through SANDAG.

ACTION ITEM: "Raised by Wolves" has requested a process 3 for alcohol sales in the Westfield Mall where they are also opening a tasting room. The permit is needed for sales only, not for tasting. (This is to be in the new area where Cozumel's used to be.) The Tasting room will be by reservation only and they will not sell food but there are 11 restaurants nearby. There will be no TV's and no live entertainment in order to encourage conversation. Looks very upscale with library and has an educational component. Approved.

ACTION/INFORMATION ITEM:

1. Community Energy Choice (CCE) requested the UCPG endorsement with a letter to Mayor Faulconer and the City Council. The City's Climate Action Plan meshes well with the CCE to get to 100% clean energy. CCE is a public-private partnership to give local control over energy sources, make rate setting transparent and introduce competition into the market to stabilize and reduce future rates. If adopted, the City Council would vote to establish a CCE program to have the city purchase the power supply and set rates while SDG&E continues to deliver the power safely and reliably over their power lines. Residents can choose to purchase their electricity from the local CCE or opt-out to SDG&E. CCE is not-for-profit and self-supporting. If you have solar, CCE often pays customers more for the excess electricity they generate. CCE is already working in 70 cities and 9 counties in California and 7 other states.

2. SDG&E shareholders organized a Sempra Services group to hire a consultant, Peter Norvee. (SDG&E itself is not allowed to lobby.) The consultant spoke in opposition to CCE. He noted that 43% of SDG&E energy is renewable. There will be a power adjustment fee or "exit fee" for leaving the system (a one time only fee). The feasibility study will be out on Thursday of this week and the decision will not be made until late this year. In San Diego 115,000 already have solar. Bill SB 100 might mandate the amount of renewable energy required. After hearing both the CCE and the Sempra Services presentation a motion was made to delay the UCPG decision until the Sept. meeting since the technical study is due on Thurs. and will need to have a 60-day review. Vote was 9 in favor of delay on vote and 3 in opposition to the delay.

UCPG CIP NEW REQUESTS: There is a point system and we are competing with 40 other communities for projects. 1)Traffic signal at Nobel Dr. & Via Las Rambas. 2) Stanley Park jogging trail. 3) Doyle Park improvements. 4) More trees along Regents Rd. north of La Jolla Village Dr. 5) More trees along Genesee Ave. from Nobel Dr. to I-5. 6) Additional street lighting on Eastgate & Town Centre.




