UCCA Meeting News



Janay Kruger, UCPG chair, addressed the audience at the November UCCA meeting. She explained the major concern to the proposed City Water Dept. plan to trench a very large sewer pipeline through University City. UCPG and UCCA Boards have sent letters of disapproval of this plan to the City of San Diego, and have asked for alternative pipeline alignments to be considered.



Laurie Joniaux, Deputy Director, Department of Animal Services for San Diego County, provided an overview of animal complaint priorities and the complaint rates for parks in University City. Laurie noted that loose dogs (like the one at Marcy Park that was heavily discussed via NextDoor) are a lower priority than animals hit on streets and animal abuse. Compared to other communities, UC is a very compliant area. City residents should note that the County of San Diego's Department of Animal Services contract with the city will end June 30, 2018. Then a new provider will handle complaints.



Mitchell Booz, UCHS Boys Water Polo Parent Committee thanked UCCA for a recent donation towards the purchase of team swim parkas. These parkas are very sturdy and will serve UC student athletes involved in aquatics for many seasons to come. Thanks to your memberships, UCCA can support community groups.

- 7. Hey, your car is parked in the driveway, I will use the garage door opener in your car to activate the garage door. You may want to turn your garage door opener (power) off from inside the garage when you are home.
- 8. Those yard toys your kids leave out always make me wonder what type of gaming system they have.
- 9. I always knock first. If you answer, I'll ask for directions somewhere or offer to clean your gutters. (Don't take me up on it.)
- 10. You're right: I won't have enough time to break into that safe where you keep your valuables, but if it's not bolted down, I'll take it with me.
- 11. I love looking in your windows. I'm looking for signs that you're home and for flat-screen TV's or gaming systems. I'll drive or walk through your neighborhood at night, before you close the blinds, just to pick my targets.
- 12. I love homes that are not well lit! Or homes with overgrown bushes and shrubbery so I can hide if someone walks or drives by. Have adequate exterior lighting. A motion-sensitive light is recommended for backyards.
- 13. I love computer laptops; they're easy to carry and easy to sell. But, I fear that you had enough sense to install a locater program to locate your laptop such as LoJack for laptops, MobileMe for an Apple computer, iPad or iPhone.
- 14. And I love neighborhoods where the neighbors do not talk to one another. They have no idea what's going on!

One more suggestion heading into the holiday season; FedEx deliveries. Know when it's coming and if not going to be home, ask a trusted neighbor to get it from your front door quickly to prevent strangers from stealing them; many follow a FedEx truck on their deliveries.

FIRE SAFETY

As part of our Neighborhood Watch and in light of the recent fires in northern California, Neighborhood Watch Coordinator Barbara Gellman and I met with Battalion Chief for the San Diego Fire-Rescue Department, David Connor, to talk about fire safety. We primarily wanted to discuss a fire-retardant product called Therma Gel.

Our focus was how we can best be prepared for and avoid wild fires. Our meeting just happened to fall on an extremely hot Santa Ana day when the risk of brush fire was high. It prompted a more comprehensive discussion than we ever expected. Wild fires will continue to be part of our lives and Chief Connor would like to see us actively and continually manage our properties. Here are the key points from our very enlightening meeting:

- Remove dried brush and dead trees.
- Keep weeds and trees trimmed, especially palms. The mesh-like material that palm trees have can catch an ember. The mesh ignites and the wind then blows that burning ember miles away to start more fires.
- Check your property monthly for new fire hazards as landscape conditions change.
- Remove stacks of firewood near your home.
- Move plastic sheds away from your home as they catch fire easily.
- Remove flammables such as fertilizers and chemicals and discard appropriately.
- Box-in open eaves that lead to the attic whenever possible and use fine mesh over ventilation openings in the eaves to prevent embers from entering.
- If you live on a canyon, maintain brush that is 100 feet from your home's back wall. For complaints contact the Fire Hazard Advisor at 619.533.4444.
- Watering down your property is helpful BEFORE the Fire Department is in your area. Please refrain from doing so when the Fire Dept, needs water pressure to fight fires.

Above all, when you are asked to evacuate, do so quickly. Delaying puts not only your life, but also the lives of the first responders in further jeopardy. It would be helpful to have a sign printed and ready to hang on your front door that reads, "EVACUATED. NO PEOPLE OR ANIMALS INSIDE". When you evacuate, place that sign on your front door. Wasting seconds during a fire can be fatal so helping our firefighters to save time is important.

Products like Thermo Gel are a good enhancement to fire prevention but they are only another tool in our arsenal. They must be applied correctly and ONLY if there is enough time. Once you can see fire or are being asked to evacuate, it's too late.

Fire Chief Connor said the fire department does use fire retardants in their aerial drops and they do work, but they want to stress that no one should attempt to ride out a fire or delay evacuating in order to apply such products.

Councilmember Barbara Bry District 1 Update

Traffic and Pedestrian Safety in UTC

On October 26th, our office hosted a Commuter Roundtable at BIOCOM. We met with more than a dozen of the area's major employers, such as Illumina and UCSD Health, to discuss the transportation needs of the UTC/Torrey Pines area--the largest employment center in the region. By fostering public-private partnerships, we can provide more transportation options to make commutes easier for working San Diegans.

The following action items emerged from the roundtable conversation:

- Employers will work in partnership with MTS toward a reliable shuttle network that would connect commuters to public transit systems, including the trolley when it is completed in 2021.
- Employers will promote transit management programs offered by icommute to their employees.
- Employers will provide incentives for employees who use alternative modes of transportation, such as bus routes, Waze Carpool, uberPOOL, and Lyft Line.

Our office will continue to meet with this group to support these companies in their efforts to get commuters get out of single occupancy vehicles.

At the request of local residents, the timing of the traffic light at the intersection of La Jolla Village Dr. and Torrey Pines Rd. has been updated to make the pedestrian indication cycle more frequent. This change will be effective during high foot traffic intervals--Fridays between 6:00-9:00pm and on Saturdays from 8:30-10:30am and from 12:00-2:00pm.

Next Steps for the City's Climate Action Plan

San Diego is a leader in innovation, sustainability, and alternative energy. Our Climate Action Plan harnesses those qualities and puts us at the forefront of combating climate change. Central to the success of our Climate Action Plan is the Community Choice Aggregation (CCA) program. A recent study commissioned by the City confirmed that CCA is viable for San Diego, and I applaud the Mayor for moving forward with a business plan to advance this program.

While the City is also exploring an alternate plan proposed by San Diego Gas & Electric (SDG&E), CCA is the most efficient and cost-effective way to reach our commitment to 100% clean energy in San Diego. I urge the City to fully implement CCA, because it leverages our region's strengths as an innovation hub, creates energy competition in the marketplace, stimulates job creation, and keeps costs low for consumers.

Supervisor Kristin Gaspar, 3rd District SD County Board of Supervisors

Doing things the same way and getting the same mediocre results just isn't my style. I recently took part in the Solutions Empowerment Summit. The goal was to explore a new vision for how to address our region's most complicated issue homelessness. While SD struggles County with



poverty, homelessness, and employment challenges, our region has also developed innovative solutions to lift up the hardest to reach and help them overcome dependency. Solutions for Change addresses poverty and the root causes that led to homelessness.

Clarence Carter works in the White House as the Director of the Office of Family Assistance in the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Clarence learned about Solutions for Change and wanted to be part of the summit. He and I agree that "Housing First", an approach adopted in San Diego and around the country, isn't addressing the root causes of homelessness. That approach suggests the "only intervention that ends homelessness is housing." However, we cannot "house" our way out of homelessness. That is an incremental and pragmatic approach. While it will reduce the number of people physically sleeping on the streets, it does not address the root causes of homelessness.

For me, success is providing people the resources to rebuild their lives and increase their personal capacity. Chris Megison, founder of Solutions for Change, has faced significant pushback and the loss of hundreds of thousands of dollars in federal funding for not conforming to the "Housing First" approach. Instead, Solutions for Change requires accountability and sober living which leads to transformation and a life of self-sufficiency. He is thriving and forging ahead with bold initiatives that invest in human capital, strengthen families, and empower our neighbors and communities to live well.

Latkes

Ingredients:
2-3 peeled medium
potatoes (Yukon Gold or
White Rose)
1 large egg
1/4 cup chopped onion
1 tsp of salt
flour, cooking oil, two
medium size frying pans

Directions: Grate potatoes, squeeze out the starchy liquid. Mix in the whisked egg, chopped onion, 1 tsp. salt, and one tablespoon of flour. Add enough canola/vegetable oil to fill entire bottom of the pan, and then some. When oil is popping hot, using a large tablespoon, place one over-sized tablespoon in frying pan smoothing it down to somewhat rounded. Be careful of the hot popping oil! When golden brown underneath flip over for two minutes or until lightly brown before taking out. Place the latkes on a thick paper towel and dab off extra oil. Best served with a side of applesauce or sour cream. Enjoy!

A traditional favorite in the Philippines, lumpia is a favorite for any occasion. Gather a group together and make it a time to gather around the table and catch up with family and friends.

Ingredients:

- 4 packages of lumpia or spring roll wrappers (99 Ranch Market)
- 1 large onion
- 2 carrots, skinned
- 1 medium bell pepper
- 2 stalks celery
- 3 stalks green onions
- 18 oz. can water chestnuts
- 2 pounds each of ground beef and ground pork (ask butcher)
- 8 oz. cooked tiny salad shrimp
- ½ pound of sliced ham
- 4 eggs

salt, pepper, MSG (optional)

Directions: Finely chop all vegetables and sliced ham. Mix all together with ground meats and shrimp. Add salt, pepper and MSG (optional) to taste. Add in raw scrambled eggs. Roll wrappers with meat filling. Fry in cooking oil until golden brown and crispy. Drain and eat. You can make ahead and freeze until ready to use. No need to defrost if frozen. Chocolate Peanut Butter Stacks

If you need an easy, no-bake dessert for a party, holiday cookie exchange, or just have a spur of the moment craving for chocolate and peanut butter, this is a perfect recipe. What I love about these little cookie, or cracker, stacks is that they're salty and sweet, crunchy from the crackers yet creamy from the peanut butter, and gooey from marshmallow creme. Every awesome dessert quality has been rolled up into one little bite-sized bundle.

Ingredients:

- 48 Ritz crackers or buttery golden round crackers
- 1/2 cup creamy peanut butter
- 1/2 cup marshmallow creme
- 1 pound chocolate, coarsely chopped and melted for dipping holiday sprinkles, optional but recommended

Directions:

- 1. Line a baking sheet with parchment or wax paper.
- 2. Lay 24 crackers on a baking sheet; set aside.
- 3. To a medium bowl, add the peanut butter, marshmallow creme, and stir to combine.
- Evenly spread a thin layer of the peanut buttermarshmallow mixture on the 24 crackers on the baking sheet.
- 5. Top with the remaining 24 crackers, creating 24 sandwiches; set aside.
- To a medium microwave-safe bowl, add the chopped chocolate and heat on high power in 15 to 30 second bursts, stirring after each burst, until chocolate can be stirred smooth.
- Dip each stack into the chocolate using one or two forks, allowing the excess to drip off. Place dipped stacks on baking sheet. Optionally add

sprinkles, to taste.

 Place baking sheet in the fridge or freezer until chocolate has hardened before serving.

Stacks will keep airtight at room temp for up to 2 weeks, in the fridge for up to 1 month, or in the freezer for at least 4 months. I store them in the fridge because it's warm in San Diego and they get a bit too soft at room temp.

Construction Information and Transportation Solutions for a Community Moving Forward

Over the next several years, nearly 50 major public, private and transportation infrastructure projects are anticipated in the University City and La Jolla area. While many of these projects were in the planning phases, the community asked that a single information source be developed for updates about all the work in anticipation of the cumulative impact it would have on the surrounding neighborhoods.

So, at the urging of the community, the agencies responsible for the biggest projects –Caltrans; City of San Diego; MTS; SANDAG, and the University of California, San Diego – came together to expand a helpful program that provided access to multiple sources of construction information. Since the program was first presented to the University City Community Association in 2015, it has now grown to include an expanded website and increased community outreach.

The Shift program is designed to provide residents, businesses and commuters impacted by construction with information and resources in one website. Communication from the program will help University City and La Jolla residents understand what projects are underway, how they can better navigate larger impacts like lane and street closures, and what alternative transportation resources are available to them to make their commute easier. On the website, residents can find a map of projects, notifications of street closures and trip planner to help find different ways to get around the community.

An Update on Miramar Landfill Odors

The SD County Air Pollution Control District has been responding to concerns from local resident s about odors from the Miramar Landfill. In an email I recently received from a City of San Diego representative, I learned that the Stipulated Order of Abatement (SOA) was signed by the City (Scott Chadwick) and has been in place since September.

The City has met all conditions of the SOA including the use of the new cover system from EPI Inc. The City must also upgrade the existing gas collection system to include a larger compressor/blower station and 110 additional gas collection wells. This is on track to meet a completion date of December 2018. In addition, the City purchased and installed three mobile vapor odor mitigation units and has been using them as well but these units are not required by the SOA.

The County is also in the process of installing 6,000 linear feet of horizontal gas collection piping, due to be completed by December 22, 2017, but on track for an earlier completion date. Keep reporting odor concerns to SD County at 858.586.2659. Reports are being used as evidence to compel the City to mitigate the odors. THE UC PLANNING GROUP REPORT

NOVEMBER MEETING

UTC: Ryan Perry from Westfield UTC gave an update for the center with emphasis on additional events for the holidays. Just a few of these events are "live reindeer" near Macy's Dec. 2-16 with real snow to play in and laser light shows 5:00-9:00pm Friday and Saturday only. Winter Night performances from 5:00-8:00pm Dec. 2, 9, 16 and the lighting of the Menorah at sundown about 6:00pm on Dec. 12. These events and others are in addition to the many new eating establishments and stores/shops. Go to: www.wesfield.com/utc for more info.

UCSD: Three new projects being planned at UCSD: 1) N. Torrey Pines Living /Learning Neighborhood with Draft EIR period through Dec. 15. This project will redevelop a 13-acre site for 6 buildings around a central community open space. 2) Fire Station Project east of N. Torrey Pines Rd between its intersections with Genesee and North Point Drive. 3) Voigt Parking Structure will be a four-story, parking structure.

DISTRICT 1: Council woman Bry's representative reported on her support for housing for the homeless. Provided information that sewer maintenance in Rose Canyon will be done so as not to impact the surface of the canyon.

SANDAG: General update given with notice that the concrete pour for the Gilman Bridge over I-5 will be done at night with only one lane closed at a time. Any closings will be listed on ShiftSanDiego.com. The North bound ramp from Genesee to I-5 is complete and by March 20, 2018 the Genesee bridge will be completed.

COMMUNITY COMMENTS: 1) SIO graduate student presented a message in support of preserving coastal resources. 2) Another student made a statement in support of the Pure Water Project.

ACTION ITEM: Illumina Campus Expansion. Illumina presented a new view of the building with stories 8,9,10 in a different color to emphasize the reduction in height. A motion was approved for a 7-story, 130' height limit and an expansion from 350,000 sq ft to 400,000 sq ft footprint for the new building with 3.5 parking spaces per 1,000 sq ft of new area added.

ACTION ITEM: Pure Water DEIR Review. The UCPG discussed the Pure Water Project last month and after hearing from community members, alternate routes for the Morena Pipeline were suggested since the DEIR failed to provide alternatives to the pipeline alignments and failed to seek community input. The UCPG subcommittee proposed a letter to the City Water Dept. that outlines 3 alternatives:

- 1) The Morena Pipeline follows the path laid out in the DEIR from the Morena Pump station through Clairemont to Route 52. At the 52 it would head east along San Clemente Canyon/Marion Bear Park in the Caltrans easement, to I-805, and then north along the easement on Miramar.
- 2) The Morena Pipeline follows the SDGE easement path as outlined in "NC01 10% Final EDR –Report _20160323.docx" as Alternative 2.
- 3) The Morena Pipeline follows the path laid out in the DEIR from the Morena Pump station along Clairemont Drive, East to Clairemont Mesa Blvd. and Genesee Ave. and head east on Clairemont Mesa Blvd to I-805, tunnel under I-805 head North on Hickman Field Drive, tunnel under SR 52, to the LFG pipeline easement and follow LFG to the Pure Water Plant.

This third alternative is the preferred but all three alternatives are certainly better than the proposed alignment through the UC community that includes hazardous conditions during construction, significant traffic impacts, noise, and diminishing air quality. The proposed alignment adds to the cumulative UC/UTC projects adverse impacts: the Mid-coast Trolley, redevelopment of Westfield/UTC, MTS Transit Center, Construction of the 23 story Westfield luxury apartments at Nobel, redevelopment of Costa Verde. The DEIR failed to provide alternatives to the pipeline alignments and failed to seek community input. These alternative alignments must be included in the final EIR. The UCPG approved the drafted letter with the addition of the 3rd alternative and the elimination of the three other alternatives proposed by community members.

NEXT MEETING: None in December. Next meeting is January 9 at a NEW LOCATION-4225 Executive Square #150, with a separate parking garage.

The University Community Planning Group (the six South UC elected representatives are pictured above), meets monthly to review various building/road construction permits and plans impacting growth in the larger University Community.

UCPG is one of many City of San Diego officially recognized community advisory groups. Some of their other responsibilities include the development of our Community Plan as well as recommendations for expenditure of funds collected by the City from issued building permits.

UCPG boundaries go as far north as Torrey Pines Rd, west to the Pacific edge of UCSD, and South to San Clemente Canyon, with 805/Miramar MCAS as the eastern boundary.
