UCPG, (University Community Planning Group), will be having elections at their March meeting. Longtime serving chair, Janay Kruger will be "termed out", as well as two South UC representatives. Councilmember, and San Diego City Council president pro-tem, Barbara Bry addressed her constituents at University City High School on January 25. Our congratulations go out to CA State Senator, Toni Atkins on her election as president of the CA State Senate, and to CA State Assemblyman Todd Gloria for his appointment as the Democratic whip. Governor Brown recently released his proposed 2018-19 budget, which included a \$13 billion reserve fund. Hopefully some of the monies allocated for K-12 public schools, (which were increased), will provide San Diego City Schools with much needed relief to avoid or at least minimize necessary future reductions in educational services.

LT. STEVE WALDHEIM, an officer who grew up in University City, joined Northern Division last month. He supervises sergeants and officers in Clairemont and University

City and serves as a liaison between the community, its officers and Captain Williams.

Lt. Waldheim is a proud graduate of UCHS, class of 1995. As a young child at Doyle, he knew he wanted to be a policeman and continues to show genuine enthusiasm for his job after 20 years on the force. He has worked all over the city; internal affairs, community



outreach and training young recruits at the police academy. He loves helping people and waking up each day to new challenges. The community is the best source of information so call and report crimes or suspicious activities.

As a child in University City he knew about a car theft close to his home. The victim should have called 911 but instead he went after an armed man who shot and killed the car owner. It is not worth dying over a material item, Lt. Waldheim reflected. Dial 911 for a crime in progress and 619.531.2000 for a nonemergency. Long waits on the phone will soon be a thing of the past once the new system is in place. (February, most likely). We are thrilled to have Lt. Waldheim back home in University City.

OFFICER PAUL PEREGUD has been at Northern for 27 years, 12 years at the front counter. He writes about 500 reports per year: hit and run accidents, identity theft, credit card fraud, landlord/tenant items head the list. His uncle, a policeman in Chicago, was a good role model for Peregud and influenced his career choice.



Educating people as honestly and realistically to what the police can do to help is his main goal. He likes his job, has patience and a great sense of humor. "I try to put myself in other people's shoes," he says. Walking at lunchtime helps him defuse any stress.

Officer Peregud is on duty Tuesday/Friday from 8:00-4:00. The counter is closed 11:00-12:00 for lunch and all day Monday. You can call the front guestions or concerns

Reflecting on a productive 2017 and looking ahead to a safe, clean, and prosperous 2018

I was sworn is as San Diego's First District Councilmember on December 12, 2016, and as I reflect back on 2017, I am very proud of what my team and I accomplished during our first year in office. Here are just a few UC and citywide highlights from 2017:

- Installing pylons at the intersection of Governor and Edmonton to prevent dangerous and illegal turns.
- Working to make the pedestrian walk signal timing more frequent during high foot traffic intervals at the intersection of Torrey Pines Road and La Jolla Village Drive.
- Convening a commuter roundtable at BIOCOM with more than a dozen of the area's major employers that focused on how to increase the use of public transit.
- Defeating an unnecessary special election for the Mayor's flawed convention center measure and the Soccer City Initiative, saving the taxpayers \$5 million.
- Securing an independent search firm for the selection of a new Police Chief and advocating for police pay raises to foster recruitment and retention.

I have ambitious goals for keeping San Diego safe, clean, and prosperous in 2018, and I look forward to working with the residents of the UC community to get things done this year. Here are a few of the priorities on my agenda:

First is setting regulations for short-term rentals in San Diego. In December, we fell one vote short of passing our proposed ordinance, but we were able to block unfettered proliferation of minihotels. This year, I remain focused on preserving our precious housing stock and maintaining the integrity of residential zoning in our neighborhoods. I have no doubt we will succeed.

Another issue I am focused on is climate change. The environmental impacts to San Diego's beaches and bays and waterways could be catastrophic. With one of the most ambitious municipal Climate Action Plans in the country, San Diego is poised to be a national and global leader on climate change. Our success depends on our ability to act swiftly to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

The next critical step is to move forward with a Community Choice Energy program, which would allow the City of San Diego to set up a separate non-profit organization that could invest in local sources of renewable energy and provide ratepayers with clean energy options at lower costs. We can set an example as the largest city in the country to achieve 100 percent renewable energy reliance, and CCE is how we are going to get there. I am committed to working with my colleagues on the Council to advance a CCE program in San Diego this year.

Finally, I have been frustrated by how long it is taking to build a new fire station at UCSD. Discussions between the City and UCSD have been ongoing for the last 8 years. I view public safety as the first responsibility of local government, so my team and I have been working over the past year to get this project on track. Moving the UCSD fire station forward is a top priority for my office.

REAL ID and Air Travel

The California Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) will now offer federal compliant REAL ID driver licenses and identification (ID) cards. The REAL ID Act established minimum security standards for state-issued driver's licenses and ID cards. This optional card is being made available to Californians who want to continue to use their driver license or ID card to board a domestic flight or enter secure federal facilities when new federal requirements take effect October 1, 2020. Californians will have the choice to apply for a REAL ID driver license or ID card, or renew or apply for a federal non-compliant card.

There is no need to rush into a DMV field office. Until October 1, 2020, a valid California driver license or ID card can be used for federal purposes, including boarding a domestic flight and entering military bases or secure federal facilities. After that date, only a REAL ID card or other federally approved documents will be accepted, such as a U.S. passport, passport card or military ID.

To obtain a REAL ID, you will need to make an appointment to visit a DMV office, and show documents such as: proof of identity (U.S. Birth certificate, passport, resident card), proof of California residency, and proof of your Social Security number. For more information on obtaining a REAL ID, go to www.dmv.ca.gov/portal/dmv/detail/realid. Make sure to review the list of documents you will need to apply for a California REAL ID driver's license or ID card.

If you know you will not be boarding a domestic flight or visiting secure federal facilities or military bases, you do not need a REAL ID driver license or ID card. You do not need a federal compliant REAL ID to do the following: Drive; Apply for or receive federal benefits; Enter a federal facility that does not require ID (post office); or Visit a hospital or receive life-saving services.

REAL ID and federal non-compliant cards are both valid forms of identification. All driver licenses, including REAL ID driver licenses, cost \$35 and ID cards cost \$30. Beginning January 22, all California driver licenses and ID cards will also have a new card design. The new card features include a gold miner image on the right side of the card and California poppies on the bottom left. Under ultraviolet light you can see an image of the cardholder's photo, birth date, Golden Gate Bridge and Coit Tower.

The standing room only crowd listened intently to Bry as she discussed a number of issues she plans to focus on, including:


- Recruiting of new police officers and officer retention programs

THE UC PLANNING GROUP REPORT

Nancy Groves, UCPG Rep District 1 JANUARY MEETING

Chair Janay Kruger announced: She met with University City developers and John Leonard to update the use of the FBA funds for community library, parks, or buy open space. For instance, if the residents above the 5802 Regents Rd. don't purchase the 3-acre lot, then UCPG could buy it. The Costa Verde EIR is due by January 23, and the update will be on the next UCPG agenda. There is now a Marijuana production facility in Sorrento Valley. The Pure Water Project has not gotten back to the planning group about the proposal to reroute the pipes east of Genesee rather than have Genesee dug up again. Todd Gloria's representative, reported that Gloria has had 16 bills signed, is now the majority whip, and is working on drug pricing and "Real I.D."

SANDAG update was given on the construction of the mid-coast trolley: On Gilman, south of La Jolla Village Drive from January-June there will be drilling for the sewer pipe which is needed for the new UCSD 6th college area. Drilling will be from 7:00pm-7:00am six days a week to interfere with traffic as little as possible; during this time, there's no parking on Gilman.

Membership: Reminder to sign in on the attendance sheet if they wished to run for a position on the UCPG board in March. Those who wish to run for the board must advise Janay Kruger and John Bassler by midnight February 13. Each candidate running will make a short presentation at the February meeting. Current members up for re-election are Andy Wiese, Alison Barton, Roger Cavnaugh, Caryl Lees Witte, Rebecca Robinson, and Ross Caulum. Chair Janay Kruger has termed out and cannot run.

Illumina (Alexandria): action taken at the last UCPG meeting and the subsequent City Planning Commission position was reviewed. Illumina had met with the UCPG subcommittee and agreed to the 7-story limit but with a larger footprint. A motion was approved for a 7-story, 130' height limit and an expansion from 350,000 sq. ft. to 400,000 sq. ft. footprint for the new building with 3.5 parking spaces per 1,000 sq. ft. of new development. Though Alexandria had agreed to the UCPG terms, the city planning commission voted against UCPG. It was pointed out the UCPG vote was only 8 Yeas, 6 Nays, 2 Abstentions and that a majority was required for a plan amendment, plus UCPG had added in two additional amendments which were not in the original plan. These additions were that the city require a Process 2 for any Substantial Conformance Review - i.e., that a permit condition will be that the UCPG can review any new guidelines or substantive changes. That exterior sign guidelines be included in the publicly available design book and that they will be reviewed by the UCPG through a neighborhood application. A new vote was taken on the plan amendment limiting it to just a 7-story limit (with no height determined), to change the parking ration for any new development to 3.5 per thousand, and the plan remain a process 2. The vote was 15 Yea, 1 Abstention.

Action item on the sale of two city owned parcels, one in north UC and the other in south UC. The first parcel is the 15 acres at Governor and Gullstrand behind University Gardens Park. It adjoins the park on two sides and can be an asset to the park. A resident asked if the water department land could be used for a fire station in south UC. Janay said that the city had been asked and said no; it is close, by freeway, to the new Nobel station being built. The other is the 45-acre parcel on Town Center Drive, (North end) all of which is in the MHPA and part of the 150 acre Roselle Canyon. We need to preserve green space at the edge of the community. Under city code if we wish to purchase, we must pay fair market value but since it is all wetlands and habitat it would have a lower price. In 2012, the UCPG voted both parcels as dedicated open space but the city did not change the plan then since the Water Department owned the Governor Drive parcel. UCPG voted 12 Yea, 2 Nay, 2 Abstentions to send a strong message to Council Person Bry to get the city to pull the sales. We would like to use FBA funds to purchase the parcels and preserve them as dedicated open space and for future conservation, as well as become part of the comprehensive plan update.

Shift Program Construction Update

For the next several years, University City and La Jolla residents, businesses and commuters will continue to be impacted by the major public, private and transportation infrastructure projects underway in the area. The Shift program has construction information and transportation resources in one place to assist the residents, businesses and commuters who are and will be impacted by the nearly 50 projects underway or planned for the area.

We're excited to share updates in this column on some of the major projects in your neighborhood that will bring access to new community amenities and resources.

Regents Road, City of San Diego project: Crews will be conducting night work south of Eastgate Mall on a gas line that will serve UC San Diego graduate student housing. Final paving along Regents Road is expected to occur at the end of January, with final completion of the project estimated for February 2018. Additionally, the City of San Diego is working to ensure the timing of the streetlights is optimized for variations in traffic flow throughout the day.

I-5/Genesee Interchange, SANDAG/Caltrans project: Eastbound traffic is now flowing on the new segment of the I-5/Genesee overpass. Crews are now constructing the raised concrete median that will separate the eastbound and westbound lanes on Genesee Avenue. Median construction should not impact traffic flow. Crews have also begun constructing the falsework - the temporary framework structures used to support the bridge during construction - for the pedestrian and bicycle bridge that will go over Genesee Avenue. The major installation of the falsework over Genesee Avenue is occurring now and requires overnight closures of Genesee Avenue. You can check the weekly closure list at shiftsandiego.com/improvements/Notices. Please feel free to sign up for I-5/Genesee Interchange Project updates at KeepSanDiegoMoving.com/transnet-contact. The project is expected to be completed Spring 2018.

Mid-Coast Trolley Construction Along Genesee Avenue, SANDAG project: The majority of work to widen Genesee Avenue, from Regents Road to La Jolla Village Drive, is now complete. In early January, crews began shifting traffic to the outer lanes from La Jolla Village Drive to Nobel Drive. Crews have also begun the work to construct the viaduct — a bridge structure that will carry the trolley down the middle of Genesee Avenue. This work will be focused on Genesee Avenue, from Regents Road to Nobel Drive. For more information visit KeepSanDiegoMoving.com/MidCoast

Mid-Coast Trolley Construction Along Interstate 5, SANDAG project: In early January, crews started work to construct the viaduct for I-5. This work will be focused within the median of I-5 and will require some lane closures. To prepare for construction, crews demolished the median and restriped traffic lanes on both northbound and southbound I-5 between the Nobel Drive and La Jolla Colony Drive exits. Barricades have been installed to delineate the work area in the freeway median. This work required use of heavy machinery and generated and will continue to generate noise. Crews will minimize impacts as much as possible. For more information visit KeepSanDiegoMoving.com/MidCoast


MCAS Miramar: Increased Flight Operations Expected in February and March

From Regents Road one can see the heavy equipment moved into place on the land south of Our Mother of Confidence church. I have been in contact with the builder, Morgan Holdings. (Those of you who were familiar with Brad Tuck should know that he was bought out and is no longer involved.) They have just pulled the grading permits, and are about a week or so away from moving dirt, and about a year out from project completion. Building the steep road into the area from Renault Way must be done first. Then they will proceed to build the nine single-family houses, on the 3.87-acre site, approved by the City Planning Commission. All of the plans are congruent with the plans approved. The only design change they have made in the interterm time is an adjustment of the garage doors to be a single, double-wide (2-car) door from two, single doors. 
