We, UCCA and UCPG, have requested a different sewer line route that would not impact our already congested Genesee Ave. (It would take up one lane on the west side of Genesee from Clairemont Mesa Blvd north to Nobel, where it then heads east to Town Center Drive.)

As noted on our front page, the Regent's Rd. Bridge and Genesee Widening options, have been removed from our Community Plan. Plans for a new University City Community Plan will begin this calendar year and there will a number of public meetings held. The dates and locations for these meetings will be announced later this Spring.

If you missed the February "Senior Scam Seminar", UCCA and our community library will be hosting a second session provided by CA Assemblyman Todd Gloria's office at our library on March 16. After much discussion, the recycle bins in front of Swanson Pool, will be removed! Thank you to Standley Park Rec. - Battalion Chief David Connor of San Diego Fire/Rescue and Officer Brandon Broaddus of San Diego Police Department both addressed the recent shooting in Florida. Other safety topics included rattlesnakes, fire, and car break-ins.
- Javier Gomez, Todd Gloria's representative, announced that there are two free "Senior Scam Seminars" scheduled. - Jelita Mayville, Senior Property Manager at University Square (Governor Dr. & Genesee Ave.), announced that there will be weekly live music events at the shopping center in May, June and July.

1. UCPG - On Tuesday, March 13, representatives from Costa Verde will be discussing their latest renovation plans. The meeting starts at 6:00pm at 10300 Campus Point Drive, above Green Acres Restaurant.

*There will also be representatives from the City's Water Dept. (Pure Water project) to review plans/EIR for a new sewer line.

2. UCCA - On Wednesday, March 14, representatives from Costa Verde will be discussing their latest renovation plans. Also, the Pure Water project will be discussed as it relates to its planned impact on Genesee traffic/noise/pollution and its effect on residents, schools, and businesses. The meeting starts at 6:00pm at the UC Library, 4155 Governor Drive (next to Carl's Jr.).

CANDIDATE STATEMENTS FOR UCPG RESIDENT 1B

There is one contested position for the University City Planning Group for the Resident 1B position. Candidates are incumbent Andrew Wiese and challenger Katie Rodolico.

Andrew Wiese

A UC resident since 2007, I am a professor and chair of the History Department at SDSU, where I write and teach about the history of urban development, planning, and politics in the U.S. My son, Lucas, is an 8th grader and band member at Standley Middle. As a father, dog owner, soccer coach and player, reader, walker, and



birder, I use the parks and public facilities of UC every day. As a member of the UCPG since 2012, I have focused special attention on the protection of our parks and open spaces, on fire safety, improved transportation, and preserving our quality of life for the next generation through smart growth choices.

I am proud of my work on subcommittees reviewing the new North UC Fire Station 50 (set to break ground this year), and the community plan amendment to remove the damaging Genesee widening AND Regents Road bridge from our community plan. I believe that the hallmark of good planning is balance, and I see my role as a representative to listen carefully, to communicate respectfully, to advocate forcefully, to pay attention to details, and to seek solutions that can work for the greatest benefit. In my two terms on the UCPG board, I have learned a lot about our city planning process "that they don't teach in school," and I want to use that experience to the advantage of UC if I am elected to a third term.

Katie Rodolico

I grew up in University City and attended Curie Elementary as a child. I am active in the community: attending UCPG and am a member of UCCA; I am an active participant in the UCPG Pure Water subcommittee; I have coached and mentored robotics teams; and cheered my kids at UC games. I worked as an engineer for Motorola for 20



years and am a problem solver. I'm an environmentalist and member of Sierra Club. I'm a wife, and mom to two teenagers.

I'm very concerned about the development that has been approved, and is in the approval process. The impacts on our neighborhoods need to be considered. We need to find a balance between economic growth and gridlock.

I am in favor of merging the development impact fees between North and South University City, using the funds for parks, median beautification, traffic calming measures along Governor and a Fire Station in South University City.

Governor Drive Safety and Transformation



Governor Drive has two large public parks, three schools, two shopping areas, and multiple houses of worship. Pedestrians find motorists driving dangerously above the speed limit of 35 mph (near schools it's a 25mph speed limit when children are present). There are several intersections which pedestrians have had multiple near hits and there was even a death of a cyclist.

I had small group gatherings at my home to discuss safety concerns for pedestrians, cyclists, and motorists along Governor Drive. We discussed a variety of ways to calm traffic, encourage cyclists to use the road instead of the sidewalks, improve emergency vehicle times, and even improve all home values within South UC. A similar successful project was done for La Jolla Boulevard in Bird Rock. Among several changes, lanes were reduced from five to two and mini-roundabouts were put in appropriate intersections.

The results: speeds were reduced from 40-45mph to 20mph; traffic crashes fell by 90 percent; noise levels dropped 77 percent; and motorists no longer waited 24 seconds for pedestrians to cross, they waited only 3 seconds, if at all - due to safe islands for pedestrians. Interestingly, the traffic count is about the same, but it takes less time for motorists to travel.

Of course, the specific solution for Governor Drive won't be exactly the same, but there are ample opportunities for improvements. If you would like to be part of conversation and improvements, then contact: marksalata@gmail.com.

Public Utilities Department Billing Audit & Policy Change to Maintain Water Service

Our office has been receiving complaints from District 1 residents regarding abnormally high water bills. Our team has been meeting with constituents and connecting them with the Public Utilities Department (PUD) to have their individual situations investigated. Based on conversations with my Council colleagues and recent news reports, it is clear this issue is having an impact citywide.

In order to ensure the water bills San Diegans are receiving are accurate and precise, I have asked our City Auditor, Eduardo Luna, to conduct a comprehensive audit of the PUD's data acquisitions and billing procedures. I am grateful that Mr. Luna has agreed to expand the scope of an already scheduled FY 2018 audit of the PUD's Customer Support Division to include this additional review, and I look forward to seeing the results of this audit. The Mayor has announced his support for this audit and is seeking to expedite the process so that ratepayers will get answers faster about the reasons for these dramatic increases.

In addition, I have requested that the PUD not require full payment if the account holder is contesting the amount of their bill until the department completes its investigation and provides a response. At that time, the customer should be given a minimum of 30 days to pay or make arrangements for payment. If the customer still believes the billing is inaccurate, they should be allowed to delay full payment until the City Auditor has completed their report. During this time, residents who are challenging their bills should pay an amount based on their average usage or the usage reported for that particular billing cycle during the previous year. We must ensure that San Diegans retain access to water during this investigation.

I am pleased that the PUD has adopted our proposals to protect ratepayers' water service and will work with those who are contesting their bills on appropriate payments until the audit is complete.

Congressman Scott Peters

In February, I helped pass the Strengthening Protections for Social Security Beneficiaries Act of 2018, to ensure program beneficiaries are not being taken advantage of, nor that they are targets of scams. The Social Security Administration's Representative Payee Program assists approximately eight million Social Security beneficiaries with financial management of their Social Security benefits. The bill I helped pass will improve this program by increasing oversight and protections for beneficiaries, reducing reporting requirements that can be burdensome for caretakers, and preventing individuals with certain criminal convictions from serving as representative payees.

Since coming to Congress, I have hosted dozens of Senior Scam Seminars to give San Diego seniors and their loved ones the tools they need to identify when someone is trying to take advantage of them. Taking advantage of people who need assistance with their federal benefits is a terrible crime that targets some of the most vulnerable Americans. Many seniors and disabled beneficiaries need help managing their finances and rely on their family, friends, or caregivers to manage their benefits for them. This bill will help make sure that individuals who offer to help Social Security beneficiaries with financial management are doing just that – helping them, not stealing from them. Social Security benefits are earned and paid into over a lifetime of hard work, and I'm glad Congress took bipartisan action to safeguard this benefit.

UC Artíst Receives Príze for Príntmaking



Please Pass Me Samoa Toffee

- 2 packages Samoas®
- 2 cups butter
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 dash salt

Pulse two packages of *Samoas*® cookies in a food processor until crumbled. Sprinkle one-third on a baking sheet lined with foil. In a large saucepan over medium heat, cook butter, sugar and salt, stirring frequently, until mixture reaches 300°. fourths. Place each piece 2 in. apart on a parchment paper-lined baking sheet. Top with one caramel. Bake 5-7 minutes or until caramel just starts to soften. Immediately press one pecan half on one side for head; press four pecan halves onto each corner for legs. Place one *Tagalongs*® cookie over the top of each candy, pressing down to secure. Let stand until set. Yield: 1 dozen. Prep: 10 min. Bake: 5 min. + standing.



Peppermint Chip Cheesecake

CRUST:

- 1 package (10 ounces) Thin Mints[®] Girl Scout Cookies, crushed
- 3 tablespoons butter, melted

FILLING:

- 3 packages (8 ounces each) cream cheese, softened
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 5 teaspoons cornstarch
- 3–4 drops green food coloring, optional
- 3 eggs, lightly beaten
- 1 egg yolk, lightly beaten
- 1/2 cup heavy whipping cream
- 2 teaspoons peppermint extract
- 1 1/4 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1 cup miniature semisweet chocolate chips

In a small bowl, combine cookie crumbs and butter. Press onto the bottom and 1 in. up the sides of a greased 9-in. springform pan. In a large bowl, beat the cream cheese, sugar, and cornstarch until smooth. Add eggs and egg yolk; beat on low speed just until combined. Stir in the cream, extracts, and food coloring if desired. Fold in chocolate chips. Pour into crust. Place pan on a baking sheet. Bake at 325° for 50–60 minutes or until center is almost set. Cool on a wire rack for 10 minutes. Carefully run a knife around edge of pan to loosen; cool 1 hour longer. Refrigerate overnight. Refrigerate leftovers. **Yield:** 12 servings. Prep: 20 min.; Bake: 1 hour + chilling.

THE UC PLANNING GROUP REPORT

Nancy Groves, UCPG Rep District 1 FEBRUARY MEETING

Announcements: The 15-acre lot at Governor and Gullstrand owned by the City Water Department has been pulled from the sale list. We are still pursuing information on the north UC posted 45-acre area for sale. The Pure Water EIR deadline for comment is March 13; UCPG has already replied with an alternate route. The Costa Verde renovation sub-committee will prepare a UCPG response to the city for the next UCPG meeting. Illumina must take forward what the planning commission reviewed without UCPG and Illumina agreed upon changes. The City Council can allow changes by Illumina thru design guidelines which could reduce 10 to 7 stories as agreed upon.

Elections: Candidates for UCPG who are running for re-election uncontested with their district are Roger Cavanaugh (res. 3B), Caryl Lees Witte (bus. 1B), Rebecca Robinson (bus. 2B), Ross Caulum (bus. 3B); Andrew Wiese is being challenged by Katie Rodolico for the resident 1B seat, and two new candidates are also running Chris Nielson (res. 2A) and JoAnn Selleck (res. 2B). In March, we will appoint a partial term replacement for Donna Adonia (res. 3A) whose term expires in 2020. We will also have to reappoint Ryan Perry (bus. 3A). Voting will be at the March meeting.

SANDAG: Terry Martin gave an update on the mid-coast trolley progress and the Gilman bridge over freeway 5. He was asked to see if improvements could be made at the dangerous 52 entrance to 5 north where there is little room to merge; he will address this immediately. Councilperson Bry's representative brought up the complaints about the Gilman to campus traffic lane changes and the noise as the new sewer pipes are installed. The north end of Regents Road which exits to Genesee has been in progress for 14 months and should soon be completed. City Planning representative Dan Monroe referred questions for improving property to Mary Carlson, Real Estate Assets Dept.

UCSD: Robert Clossin, Director of Campus Planning, gave a presentation on the UCSD Long Range Development Plan (LRDP) and updates on near term projects. The university is increasing on campus housing to eventually house 65% of its students. Near term projects include the completion of the Ostler Parking structure (at the Gilman entrance) by August 2018, building the Voigt Parking structure (in the heart of the Engineering School, west of the library) by Fall 2019, and completing the Living/Learning Center on north campus by Fall 2020, which will house Sixth College. The site for the campus Fire Station has been mapped out at the corner of North Torrey Pines Road and Genesee. It was decided that the university will provide the money to the city to build; then the city becomes responsible for its planning and completion.

BioMed Realty gave an update of their demolition and construction of buildings previously approved. They had transferred 800 ADT's from another BioMed Realty property with an approved plan amendment. They will come to the April meeting to report on concerns raised, i.e., bird strikes from reflecting glass, lighting which might impinge on wildlife in canyon below, and the plant pallet for the landscape plan. Marcy Park: An information item on the new improvements to the park was presented by UCCF with nice plan pictures. There was also a request for funds for the park from the UC DIF (development impact fees.)

Costa Verde Retail Project: Regency, owner of the area, wants to build a 10-story 200-unit hotel, 120 apartments, and an additional 125,000 sq. ft. of retail space for a total of 303,000 sq. ft. of retail which will include Bristol Farms grocery, a drugstore, gym, offices and shops. The center will also keep the McDonalds and the gas station. Comments are due by March 19, but UCPG will ask for an extension. Various members of the sub-committee are researching noise and dust pollution during construction, greenhouse gases and air quality, lack of a park for housing, traffic ADT's and circulation (mitigation on Costa Verde Blvd.), and parking, to report at the next sub-committee meeting. John Murphy has been invited to present at the next UCPG meeting so the community can see the plans.

NEXT MEETING: March 13 at the 10300 Campus Point Drive above Green Acres Restaurant and voting for UCPG seats will be outside from 5:00-8:00pm. The agenda will include the expansion of Costa Verde, Pure Water Plan, and cell towers.

Shift Program Construction Update

For the next several years, University City and La Jolla residents, businesses and commuters will continue to be impacted by the major public, private transportation and infrastructure projects underway in the area. The Shift program has construction information and transportation resources in one place to assist the residents, businesses and commuters who are and will be impacted by the nearly 50 projects underway or planned for the area.

We're excited to share updates in this column on some of the major projects in your neighborhood that will bring access to new community amenities and resources.

Regents Road, City of San Diego project: Paving along Regents Road was completed in late February and traffic is now directed to navigate the fully expanded lanes. SDG&E is expected to conduct additional storm



water improvements through March 2018 to the east of Regents Road that should not impact the north and southbound lanes. Final paving of the intersection at Regents Road and Executive Drive is anticipated in May 2018.

I-5/Genesee Interchange, SANDAG/Caltrans project: Crews are now constructing the raised concrete median that will separate the eastbound and westbound lanes on Genesee Avenue. Median construction should not impact traffic flow. The major installation of the falsework, the temporary framework structures used to support the structure during construction, for the pedestrian and bicycle bridge over Genesee Avenue is now completed. Concrete pours were anticipated to begin at the end of February. You can check the weekly closure list at shiftsandiego.com/improvements/Notices. Please feel free to sign up for I-5/Genesee Interchange Project updates at KeepSanDiegoMoving.com/transnet-contact. The project is expected to be completed June 2018. Once completed, the project will improve east-west connectivity and access to and from the freeway, and a new separated and protected bike facility linking the SRV Coaster Station to UC San Diego, Scripps Memorial Hospital and Westfield UTC.

Mid-Coast Trolley Construction Along Genesee Avenue (from Regents Road south to Nobel), SANDAG project: Drilling and column work for the section of the viaduct, the bridge structure that will carry the trolley, from La Jolla Village Drive to Regents Road on Genesee Avenue is underway and is expected to be completed in Spring 2018. Once completed, the construction team will bring in pre-cast tubs for further assembly of the viaduct. While this work takes place in the median, motorists are encouraged to follow signage indicating the appropriate speed in active construction zones. For info: KeepSanDiegoMoving.com/MidCoast

Mid-Coast Trolley Construction Along Interstate 5, SANDAG project: As of February 2018, construction crews continue viaduct construction from La Jolla Colony Drive to Voigt Drive. Drilling, column, and drainage construction work between La Jolla Colony Drive and Voigt Drive began February 20 and is focused within the media of Interstate 5, requiring some closures. This work requires heavy drilling machinery and will generate noise. Work hours for the drilling operation are Sunday through Thursday, from 9:00pm to 5:00am. Regular work hours are Monday through Friday, from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Traffic controls will remain in place 24 hours a day. For info: visit KeepSanDiegoMoving.com/MidCoast

MCAS Miramar, as a part of the Marine Corps' Mobility Transformation effort, is exploring innovative options to make transportation smarter, cheaper, more accessible and more efficient. This initiative seeks to engage industry stakeholders, collect market research, execute and analyze demonstrations catered to installation characteristics, and share information to enable installations to create local solutions. MCAS Miramar is scheduled to host a number of projects that will showcase the installation's commitment to mobility transformation, energy security, resilience and innovation. A collaborative agreement facilitated by SSCPAC in San Diego initiated the first project. In this project MCAS Miramar will facilitate autonomous vehicle testing by industry stakeholders, to include Qualcomm Technologies.

Fight the Online Outlaws: Savvy Steps to Stay Cyber-Safe by Garry Kachkovsky

Americans lose tens of billions of dollars each year to financial fraud. In the digital frontier, many crimes – including identity theft, tax fraud and elder abuse – are committed by online outlaws, making cybersecurity all the more important. As cybercrime becomes more prevalent, learn how to defend yourself with simple, everyday practices that can help protect your identity, your accounts and your devices.

Fighting Fraud: Familiarize yourself with common scams to help protect your assets and your identity. Post-Theft Protection: The Federal Trade Commission reports that 11.7 million people are victims of identity theft each year. Should your information be compromised, contact the Federal Trade Commission to report the issue or access the online complaint form; file a police report, and retain a copy as proof; contact your creditors' fraud departments, close affected accounts and notify credit card companies and banks in writing.

Talk to your financial advisor about these and other ways you can protect yourself and your accounts. Together, you can explore options like secure file sharing, fraud and consumer preference text alerts, and two-factor authentication.

Change your Clocks, Change your Batteries

Daylight saving time will begin at 2:00am on Sunday, March 11. It's time to spring forward and move your clocks ahead one hour. It's also a great time to

spring into action and change the batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. After all, only working smoke and carbon monoxide alarms can save lives.

Here's more ways you can spring into action:

- The Consumer Products Safety Commission recommends that smoke alarms be placed on every level of your home, outside sleeping areas and inside bedrooms.
- Carbon monoxide alarms should be installed on every level of the home and outside each sleeping area.
- Test smoke and carbon monoxide alarms once a month to make sure they are working.

And, don't forget to have a fire escape plan and practice it with your family.



Updating the City's Utilities Undergrounding Implementation Plan

There's good news and bad news in the proposed undergrounding plan. San Diego is accelerating how quickly it buries utility lines across the city, shrinking the size of projects to boost efficiency and creating more accurate schedules so neighborhoods know when to expect such work. That's the good news.

The bad news for University City is that we'll have to wait until 2020/2021 for undergrounding work to be completed in our area. That's according to the City's proposed five-year implementation plan for 2018-2022.

The Undergrounding Master Plan is a guiding document that outlines the scope of work and provides a prioritization sequence of projects for citywide strategic placement of electrical and communication utility lines underground. The proposed plan must be approved by City Council. More information is available on the City's website at www.sandiego.gov/undergrounding.

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
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
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
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
