## City of San Diego Dismisses Planning Group Concerns on Pure Water Pipeline

The city has big plans for a water reclamation program known as Pure Water. The final Environmental Impact Report (EIR) was recently released and City Council will be voting whether to approve the project on April 10. Phase One of this water reclamation project could produce 30 million gallons a day of potable water. It is hoped that when the entire project is complete, it would provide up to one third of San Diego's drinking water by 2035. Phase One of the project is scheduled to be complete in 2021 and cost \$1.2 billion. The entire project is expected to cost \$3 billion, of which \$2.3 billion would be provided by the EPA in low interest loans to the city of San Diego. This project serves two purposes: reducing dependency on imported water; and reducing the amount of solid waste being processed at the Point Loma Sewage treatment facility.

The Pure Water project consists of pump stations, pipelines, solid waste recovery, and the water reclamation facility. The water reclamation processing will take place at a facility just east of 805, between Miramar and Eastgate Mall. The Morena Pump station will be located just northeast of the I-8/I-5 interchange. Map shown above are of the Pure Water proposed alignment and alternative routes proposed by UCPG. The red Pure Water proposal will have a valve and water hammer condition at the top of every hill, including Governor and Genesee. In order to purge air in the sewer lines the valve will periodically and without warning emit a potentially noxious, toxic sewer stench at the intersection. Water hammer, which is a loud banging sound will also occur at every hill, some may assume that an earthquake is in progress. There are several of these hills with the red Pure Water proposal. The yellow SDGE alternate has very few hill conditions because it is a straight, deep, underground run. The yellow solution is the only one that encloses the sewage pipes within a larger pipe and has a built-in safety feature that contain sewage spills. Many consider yellow both the conservation and environmental choice.

### A CALL TO ACTION FOR ALL UNIVERSITY CITY

On April 10, the San Diego City Council is scheduled to hear the case for approving the City's Pure Water Project at 2:00pm (Council Chambers, 12<sup>th</sup> Floor, 202 "C" Street). UCCA, UCPG, and UCCF have all voiced opposition, not to the project itself, but to the sewer pipe alignment along Genesee Ave/Town Center Drive. Please read the article above, which continues on page 3, to see how YOU can show your support to have this project postponed until other pipeline location options are fully explored.

- Battalion Chief David Connor of San Diego Fire/Rescue reported that response time for the recent fire near Regents and Governor was 2 minutes and 40 seconds.
- Officer Brandon Broaddus of San Diego Police Department discussed the staffing changes at Northern Division.
- Erin Magee, Scott Peters' representative, announced legislative priorities and the 2018 Congressional Art Competition for high school students. More info is available at scottpeters.house.gov/artcompetition.
- Bridger Langfur, Barbara Bry's representative, announced that the 47-acre parcel in north UC that was under consideration for sale has been reserved for future mitigation projects. Councilmember Bry's office is partnering with I Love a Clean San Diego on a clean-up at Doyle Park in April.
- Boy Scout Troop 11 shared the news that their trailer and gear were stolen and invited community members to support their fundraising efforts to replace the stolen items.
- Representatives with Regency Centers presented on the Costa Verde Revitalization project. Stephanie Boudreau with Vi La Jolla asked attendees to express support for Alternative 2.
- Representatives from the San Diego Coalition of Town Councils shared their history and goals. They have invited UCCA to join the organization.
- Ruth DeSantis, the new president of University City Community Foundation, spoke of the priorities of the organization that is commonly known as "Improve UC".
- UCCA heard a funding request for the high school's Grad Night celebration and awarded grants to UCHS Music Boosters and UC Little League.

Information related to the proposed Sewer pipeline on Genesee was discussed. UCPG and UCCA are opposed to its current alignment and will be meeting with Councilmember Barbara Bry to seek her support.

## **Citywide Town Council Coalition**

At the March UCCA meeting representatives from the Clairemont Town Council, Eden Yaege and Lynn Haims, announced the formation of a Citywide Town Council coalition. The first order of business for this new group will be to focus on the major issue of "short-term vacation rentals."

Informing and influencing City Council members on key community/citywide issues is a key objective of this coalition. UCCA has been invited to join this coalition and will be discussing the implications of membership at our next meeting on April 11.

### Con't from page 1: Pure Water Project

The portion of the force mains that impacts us here in UC is the part that runs north from Clairemont along Genesee, then east on Nobel, and north on Town Center Drive. Most of the pipeline will be placed by trenching the roadways deep enough to place the 48" pipe and the 30" pipe 5-8' below the surface, and below existing utilities. The trench is expected to be 12-16 feet wide and will require lane closures during construction. Additionally, there will be tunnels bored to run the pipeline under San Clemente creek at the Genesee and 52 intersection, and under Rose Creek and the railroad tracks near Centurion Square, and another tunnel under I-805 from the end of Executive.

Of specific concern are the intersections of Genesee and Governor and the corner of Nobel and Genesee. Genesee and Governor is a critical intersection for South UC. Governor is the only East/West connector for emergency vehicles. There is also a high risk to encounter contaminated soil from leaking underground gas storage tanks. Three of the four gas stations at the intersection have active status for leaking underground storage tanks. If the trenching encounters contaminated soil, additional steps must be taken to handle this soil. The risk of contaminated dust being generated increases. This intersection is adjacent to Curie Elementary School, Regency Villas Senior community, All Saints Preschool, and Standley Middle School. Seniors and children could be at risk if contaminated soil is encountered. EPA processes would be triggered.

At Nobel and Genesee there are two residential communities on the south side of Nobel that have already had major impacts of construction from the trolley construction and Westfield renovation. The Westfield residential tower is currently under construction, impacting traffic, creating dust and making noise, and not be completed till late 2019/early 2020. If approved the proposed Costa Verde expansion is slated to start in 2019. The cumulative impact on the residents was minimized and misrepresented in the final EIR.

The construction along Genesee will be done at night between 9:00pm and 5:00am. It will be between 8:30am and 3:30pm on Towne Center between Nobel and La Jolla Village, and between 7:30am and 4:30pm on Nobel. Once the pipeline is under operation there is a risk of rupture or leak of the pressurized sewage. There is also the risk of noise due to 'water hammering' as the pressure changes when it goes up and down the canyons. And there is a risk of odor at the relief valves. One of the valves will be just north of Governor Drive.

The local planning group, UCPG, formed a subcommittee to review the draft EIR and submit a response. They submitted a letter produced by the subcommittee expressing concerns about construction impacts and whether it was appropriate to run this pipeline through a residential neighborhood and risk of sewage spill if the pipeline breaks or leaks. The city dismissed these concerns. The draft and final EIRs did not present alternative pipeline alignments and the Morena pipeline alignment was not presented to the public till the draft EIR proposed several alternative UCPG stage. pipeline alignments, including one that the city had studied prior to the draft EIR, which would run under the SDG&E high power lines. (See front page map.) The city rejected all alternatives in their final EIR.

The Morena Pipeline is scheduled to commence construction in April 2019 and last through October 2021. The Final EIR is at: www.sandiego.gov/water/purewater/purewatersd/reports

Mail fraud is a scheme to get money or something of value from the victim by offering a product, service or investment opportunity that does not live up to its claims. Ricky Vida, from the Postal Service, advised residents to be suspicious of mail notifications of 'free' prizes and 'free' vacations, government look-alike mail, solicitation letters disguised as invoices or checks, unsolicited merchandise and reshipping offers, and fees charged for normally free services. If you believe you or a loved one has been victimized by a scam involving the U.S. Mail, report the incident to the United States Postal Service.

UCCA presented Mr. Gloria and his community representative, Javier Gomez, with an "I Love University City" T-shirt. Assemblyman Gloria had a surprise attendee at this UCCA/Library co-sponsored event...his grandmother, who like himself, was born in San Diego.

Located in the UC Marketplace, the original library housed 5,000 books and was open 33 hours per week.

The permanent building, located at 4155 Governor Dr., was dedicated on April 10, 1978 by District One Councilman Bill

Mitchell with Master of Ceremonies and Chairman of the Library Commission Hal Fletcher. Since then, the library has grown and changed in many ways. Computers and automation were introduced in the 1980s and eBooks and online databases came along in the 2000s which have enabled users to enjoy library services at the touch of a finger without ever stepping into a building.

## UC Resident Completes Girl Scout Gold Award Project About Water Wise Gardening

California has experienced periodic droughts throughout its history. During these times, we have made great sacrifices to reduce water use to an appropriate level. An important part of conservation efforts has focused on gardening practices to move away from using thirsty plants that are more common in damper parts of the country. The problem is that in between droughts, the population drifts back to previous practices and forgets lessons learned about water conservation.

University City Girl Scout, Lydia Cosford, designed this Gold Award Project with the aim to educate youth and children about the varieties of succulents, their cultural and environmental significance, and the science and artistic value behind gardening with them. Working with Sue Boudreau, UC resident and Expert Gardener, she developed content for the educational program. Kelsey Gogarty, a local Educational Therapist, provided recommendations to hold the interest of a variety of age groups and attention spans. The project culminated in a copyrighted Activity Booklet and Leader Guide, which Lydia used to hold several workshops at the Jewish Community Center, and at the La Jolla United Methodist Nursery School. Lydia was grateful for the help of UCHS volunteers such as Stephanie Dunlap, Savanna Hicke, Santino Arellano, and her family. Lydia says, "I hope my project can inspire people to plant beautiful gardens that are also good for our fragile environment."

Fertilizers will feed the plant but must be applied every 2 weeks to be effective.

The next Garden Club meetup is scheduled for Sunday, April 8, from 2:00 to 6:00pm. The featured speaker is a professional cacti and succulent grower; the highlight will be the various plant varieties found in the gardens.

## THE UC PLANNING GROUP REPORT

Nancy Groves, UCPG Rep District 1 MARCH MEETING

The UC community, both North and South need to unite to have the City Council force the water department to change their proposed route from Pt. Loma treatment plant to the new Pure Water plant being built on Miramar Road. The current plan is to trench through University City down Genesee Avenue to install a 48" raw sewage pipe pumped under pressure and a 30" brine pipe. This will take up 1 1/4 traffic lanes and will have to pass through the Genesee and Governor intersection opening soil with toxic gas station waste. We should all oppose this. The alternate routes east of 805 were proposed to the water dept. by the UCPG using the SDG&E easement or the Miramar land location, and both were rejected. Now the City Council needs to hear from the community. What can you do?

As an elected member of UCPG and a UCPG representative on the UCSD Community Advisory Group, I dutifully do my homework and review all plans brought before the group, attend and participate at all meetings. I am also a member of UCCA and previously gave a UCPG report at that meeting, but these two worthwhile organizations each have their own different unique role. However, I do not see everyone understanding, or even wanting to know the differences between the two groups. The roles should be complimentary, not duplicative. It was unfortunate that strong accusations were made at the March meeting casting doubt on the legitimacy of voting and membership criteria. The By-laws of UCPG which are posted on line by the city, were followed. The people on the UCPG are volunteers from your community and should not be denigrated. Let's not divide, let's all stand together to make positive improvements in U.C. I urge everyone to attend the UCPG meeting once a month on the second Tues. of the month and participate.

You can read the minutes of the UCPG meetings a month after the meeting after approval at the subsequent meeting. Minutes are not explanations of the issues, they follow Robert's Rules of Order and simply list the topics brought up, the motions made and record the votes on these motions. I do not take the minutes; you can read the UCPG minutes at SanDiego.gov, search for "Community Planning Group Agendas and Minutes."

NEXT UCPG MEETING: April 10 at the 10300 Campus Point Drive. Pass the old meeting place and pass the Lilly building; meeting upstairs above Green Acres Restaurant. The agenda will include the seating of new members, the election by the UCPG members of a new Chairperson, an update on the Pure Water route, and cell towers.

## **Shift Program Construction Update**

For the next several years, University City residents, businesses and commuters will continue to be impacted by the major public, private and transportation infrastructure projects underway in the area. The Shift program has construction information and transportation resources in one place to assist the residents, businesses and commuters who are and will be impacted by the nearly 50 projects underway or planned for the area.

La Jolla Village Drive and Regents Road Intersection, Westfield project: As part of an off-site improvement, Westfield will be relocating MTS station 10793 from the northeast to the northwest corner of the La Jolla Village Drive and Regents Road intersection. This work is being done in advance of creating a larger right turn lane from La Jolla Village Drive onto Regents Road.

I-5/Genesee Interchange, SANDAG/Caltrans project: Crews recently installed new lighting on the south section of the bicycle path from Voigt Drive to Genesee Avenue and installed a chain link fence on the north section from Genesee Avenue to Sorrento Valley Road. Crews are currently working on placing the forms and reinforcing bars for the deck of the pedestrian/bicycle bridge. Additionally, crews are working at the pedestrian connection at the corners of the interchange, installing utilities, and will then construct a curb to provide access for pedestrians to sidewalk sections. Crews are also constructing the raised median along Genesee Avenue. The project is expected to be completed late May/early June 2018. Once completed, the project will improve east-west connectivity and access to and from the freeway, and create a new separated and protected bike facility linking the Sorrento Valley Coaster Station to UC San Diego, Scripps Memorial Hospital and Westfield UTC. Mid-Coast Trolley Construction Along Genesee Avenue, SANDAG project:\_Drilling and column work for the section of the viaduct, the bridge structure that will carry the trolley, from La Jolla Village Drive to Regents Road on Genesee Avenue is underway and is expected to be completed in Spring 2018. Once completed, the construction team will bring in precast tubs for further assembly of the viaduct. While this work takes place in the median, motorists are encouraged to follow signage indicating the appropriate speed in active construction zones. **Gilman Drive Public Sewer Improvements, UC San Diego/ City of San Diego project**: The casing and installation of carrier pipe is currently taking place on UC San Diego property from the southbound I-5 off-ramp to La Jolla Village Drive, to the La Jolla Shores / Gilman Drive off ramp. Impacts are also expected on Gilman Drive from La Jolla Village Drive to Via Alicante. 

She witnessed neglect of the Park's maintenance over the years and could no longer stand by when she witnessed a large eucalyptus branch fall dangerously close to children playing.

Ruth partnered with Don Hotz, another long-time community activist, and together they are responsible for the park improvements that you see today. As Ruth admits, working with any government entity is a slow process, but with a background in law and real estate development, she is up to the challenge.

The 2018 UCCF Board is diverse and benefits from both seasoned and new volunteers this year. Don Hotz sits as Treasurer of UCCF & UCCA and Mike Alston enjoys his 6th year as Secretary. Mack Langston remains as the UCCA liaison, and is joined this year by his wife, Merle Langston, a designer well suited to be in charge of beautification. Also joining the Board is long-time resident historian and activist Sandy Lippe, as well as some new blood, educator Mark Salata and Realtor Ryan Ahearn.

Together this Board of eight hopes to complete some ambitious goals, the greatest of which is re-unifying the community in the wake of the Battle of the Bridge.

They are pushing to bring south UC into the 21st century with things like underground powerlines, improved parks, beautified medians, an improved library and speed reduction improvements, to name a few. One of their first challenges this year is stopping the Water Department from running a raw sewage line down Genesee. With her eye keenly on the ball, the Board is lucky to have Ruth leading the way and UC is lucky to have all these volunteers fighting for the benefit of south UC residents.
