Many of you are busy making plans for travel, arranging summer activities for the kids, and hoping June "gloom" won't be too long so that it will be worth going to the beach or to the Del Mar Fair. Speaking of the Fair...those are the Doyle kindergarten children featured on some of our street banners. I hope to see many of you at the Standley Park 4th of July "Celebration". It will be as always a fun-filled day full of exciting activities, booths, (and snow slides for our ten and under children), ending with a great evening band concert.

On Thursday, June 21, 6:00-8:00pm, at Standley Park, there will be an important Park and Rec. community meeting focused on the new Rec. Council organizational structure. Future plans for our park improvements at Doyle, Marcy, and the "ImagineUC 2020" will also be discussed.

UPDATE RE: Sewer pipelines, (a.k.a. "pure water") - UCCF (University City Community Foundation) has initiated legal action challenging the EIR, citing CEQA flaws, (Calif. Environmental Quality Act), to request time for the City Water Dept. to review alternative routes for the proposed major sewer lines. One is a large pipe forcing raw sewage up to the plant, the second adjacent pipe will carry sludge back down to the Morena plant for additional treatment before release into the ocean. There will be lane closures along Genesee/Nobel/Town Center Dr. during the construction. Our July newsletter will have up-to-date information related to any announced court "findings".

UCCA is very hopeful it will be a recipient of a San Diego County Community Enhancement Grant next month. We have asked for funds to provide all-color monthly newsletters for one year, plus money to initiate monthly "podcasts" to better inform our community about major issues affecting our quality of life. Please plan to attend our June 13 meeting...we welcome your participation. Remember, University City is "more than just a neighborhood". ~Barry

## UCCA Meeting Synopsis

- Battalion Chief Lane Woolery of San Diego Fire/Rescue spoke about fire season, and Officer Brandon Broadus of San Diego Police Department addressed homeless activities in canyons.
- UCCA President Barry Bernstein made remarks on behalf of Ruth DeSantis, President of UCCF, regarding the Pure Water pipeline and efforts to fight the pipeline alignment. For those interested in being further involved with the Pure Water project, contact Bridger Langfur of Councilmember Bry's office to learn more about the proposed Pure Water Working Group. Bridger noted, however, that a lawsuit had been filed related to the Pure Water project.
- Bridger also announced that a traffic light at Governor and Lakewood has been included in this year's budget, and the City is updating its Master Park Plan.
- President Bernstein also shared information regarding a recent community member meeting with Congressman Peters and Miramar officials. UCCA Vice President Diane Ahern outlined the safety issues associated with aircraft not making the climbing right turns out of Miramar.
- UCCA heard a funding request for Everyone A Reader at Curie Elementary and awarded a grant to the 4th of July Celebration at Standley Park.
- Melissa Martin with the UC Library branch announced a summer reading program for June 1-August 1.
- Corrine Busta with County Supervisor Kristin Gaspar shared that the Supervisor will soon meet with President Trump on SB 54, and the County is investigating the use of reclaimed asphalt pavement (RAP).
- Diane Ahern announced that UCCA's banner program was granted a permit from the City to continue operations.

## FREE TREES FOR UC RESIDENTS

University City has become a construction zone, on all sides. The new trolley line, bridges, streets, and the Westfield rebuild have made it tough to get around and are having a dramatic impact on those who live and work in this bustling community. One big loss is the uprooting of mature trees, hundreds of them. By our count, so far approximately 600 trees have been destroyed. Up to 1000 may be lost by the time the dust settles from all the construction.

This loss has not gone unnoticed. A new non-profit organization plans to "re-forest" University City beginning this summer. It's called, appropriately, Trees 1000, funded by private donations. Trees 1000 kicks off its effort on July 4 at Standley Park, giving away free trees, free planting, and launching a communitywide effort for a greener UC. Look for the Trees 1000 booth at the 4<sup>th</sup> of July UC Celebration, and sign up early for your tree.

## Council President Pro Tem Barbara Bry District 1 Update

I wanted to share with the University City community a few updates. First, I am happy to report that the City has awarded the North University City Fire Station 50 design-build contract. This brings us closer to getting a much-needed fire station in North University City. I will continue to push to get this fire station constructed!

This is budget season in the City of San Diego and I want to thank everyone who came out to our District 1 Budget Forum. Special thanks to Independent Budget Analyst Andrea Tevlin for spending her Saturday with us. We received some great feedback about the budget priorities and the City services that matter most to the community.

There have also been multiple City Council budget hearings (including an evening meeting) which provided all San Diegans with an opportunity to let their voices be heard. The community feedback that the Council received included an appreciation for Arts funding, a continued need for graffiti abatement, lifeguard support, increased code enforcement and funding for trees.

The Parks and Recreation Department is beginning a Master Plan study of all City parks and facilities. The last Master Plan was completed in 1956 and the City recognizes that many facilities and park spaces need to be repurposed. The new plan should be completed in 2020, and will guide the City's programming and park uses and expenditures for the next 30 years.

The first piece of the study will be workshops in each Council District to obtain community input. The workshops will address citywide issues as well as area specific interests. Our first district workshop will take place on June 21 from 6:00 to 8:00pm at the Standley Recreation Center. I encourage you to take part in this process since this plan will guide are park decisions for the next three decades.

Lastly, my staff and I celebrated Earth Day by taking part in I Love a Clean San Diego's 16th Annual Creek to Bay Cleanup. At our Scripps Pier site, we had 107 volunteers who removed 146 pounds of trash from the coastline. Throughout San Diego County, an estimated 6,000 volunteers were at 116 cleanup sites and removed 175,000 pounds of trash and debris! It was encouraging to be among so many volunteers who are committed to a cleaner environment.

## University City Community Foundation

University City Community Foundation (UCCF) was established in 2013 as the fundraising arm of UCCA for the purpose of undertaking community improvement projects. Initially focused primarily on the Standley Park improvement project ("ImagineUC 2020") in partnership with the School Board. And hopefully the ImagineUC 2020 project is currently on track to break ground on a new pool and track in late 2018 or early 2019.

More recently, UCCF has made the improvements that you see to Marcy Park. The new Jacaranda trees are beginning to bloom and six more trees will be planted in the next month. It's nice to see people using the new benches and the water fountain in the front of the park. These improvement could not have been possible without donations from generous UC residents. We will continue to advocate for Marcy Park and encourage the City to adopt our plan for new playground equipment, an expanded playground area for older children and ADA access.



The Board is also looking into how to improve the medians on Regents Road and Genesee Avenue, as well as pushing the City to expedite undergrounding of our overhead utility lines. Beyond the aesthetics, this is a safety issue for our community in the event of an earthquake or wild fire.

Another safety concern facing our community is the Sewer Pipeline, also known as Pure Water, that is slated to run through our community; north on Genesee Avenue, east on Nobel Drive and north on Town Center Drive. After attempting to move the routing by speaking with the Councilmembers, the Mayor's office and the Water Department, City Council still voted unanimously to approve the project. With the support of UCCA and enough resident donations, UCCF was able to file a lawsuit within the 30-day deadline to try to send the EIR back for alternate route analysis. We have concerns about the pressure of the raw sewage pipeline relative to how it is to be constructed and health concerns about the gases that will be released from the raw sewage. The GoFundMe account is still active and all donations are tax deductible. UCCF would not be able to undertake community improvement projects without the support of generous resident donations. ## Girl Scouts Helping to Remove Invasive Crayfish from Rose Canyon Streams

As part of our Girl Scout Bronze award we decided to tackle the crayfish problem on the rise in Rose Canyon. With approval from the Ranger and partnering with Debby Knight, president of Friends of Rose Canyon, we were able to catch almost 200 crayfish from Rose Canyon streams.

It is thought that Louisiana crayfish (also called crawdads) were brought to Rose Canyon many years ago by fisherman who where using them as bait. The problem may have been made worse by students releasing crayfish into the canyon after receiving them from their science classes.

We fish out the crayfish because the crayfish are invasive and eat our native Baja California tree frogs, including the eggs, tadpoles and adult frogs! Invasive crayfish disrupt the food chain and the natural canyon ecosystem.

Fishing crayfish is hard muddy work with lots of poison oak hazard. But it was also really fun, both fishing and learning more about our canyon. We take our catch to Project Wildlife to feed rehabilitating animals such as seagulls and possums. We were excited to be part of a project that stops crayfish from damaging the Rose Canyon ecosystem!

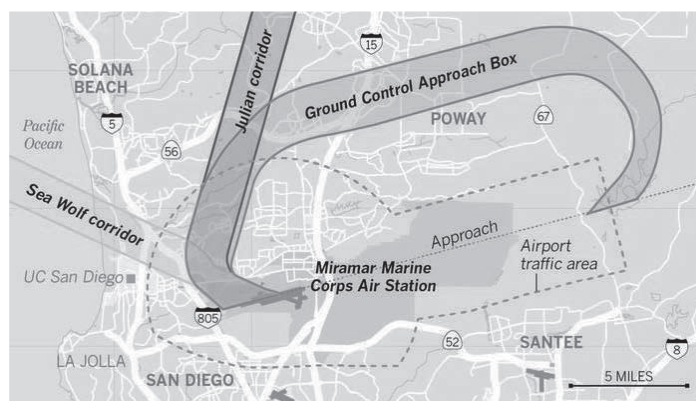

## UCCA Shares Safety Concerns with Scott Peters and Col. Jason Woodworth

After months of making requests, UCCA President Barry Bernstein, former Navy pilot Ron Belanger and I met with Congressman Scott Peters and Col. Jason Woodworth, commanding officer at Miramar, in May, to discuss neighborhood safety concerns. Colonel Woodworth also presented and took questions at the May UC Planning Group meeting.

The area of MCAS Miramar has been a military installation since 1917, long before University City was developed. Our community was planned and built out in the 1950s and 60s after departure paths were established by the FAA in conjunction with the Navy/Marines and San Diego County. These departure paths specify that fixed wing aircraft make a climbing right turn as soon as they are airborne. When properly executed, the climbing right turn keeps aircraft safely east of I-805 and away from homes, schools and the heavily populated areas of University City and UTC. The departure routes, altitude and speed limits are mandated by FAA regulation.

UCCA is asking for ongoing monitoring of departures for safety including noise and flight path; compliance with established departure routes and speed limits; and regular meetings with Miramar command staff to discuss safety concerns.

At both the Scott Peters and UCPG meetings, Col. Woodworth reiterated that Miramar wants to be a good neighbor to University City. He encouraged those who have questions or concerns about operations at MCAS Miramar to contact the Operations Duty Officer (ODO) by phone at the time of the incident at 858.577.4277 and provide details about the incident including date, time, location and type of aircraft.

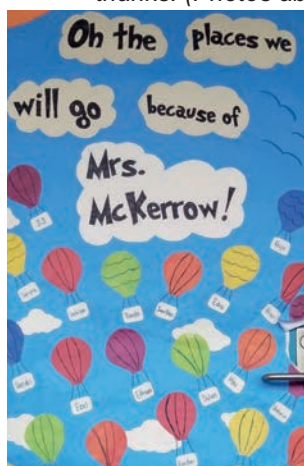

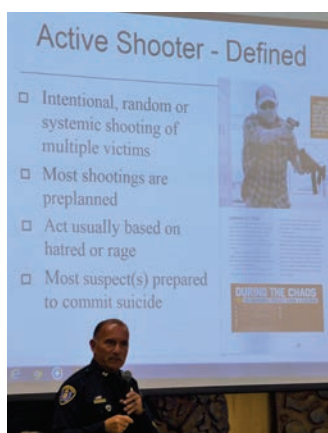

## OPINION: UC RESIDENTS SHOULD BREAK THEIR SILENCE ON STVRs

Logan Jenkins' recent article in the San Diego Union Tribune sang a familiar tune when it comes to short-term vacation rentals (STVRs) – most people don't have a strong opinion on the matter until a nearby whole unit or home is converted into an STVR on a full-time basis. I think this is the case of University City residents – there have been no recent posts on Nextdoor and I have yet to hear a neighbor complain about a mini-hotel in their area (mini-dorms, however, are a different story). But just because the impact is not as obvious as a sewer pipeline down our main corridor does not mean we shouldn't be vocal and call for action from the Mayor and City Council.

It's time to break our silence.

While our coastal neighbors lament the booming impact of STVRs (sometimes literally when a vacationer parties too hard), I have noticed a more silent, slow damage to University City which may be attributed to STVRs (note that I live in North UC and my observations reflect my immediate area). Young adults and families cannot keep pace with the skyrocketing rent and housing prices.

Research out of other US cities suggests that the rise of STVRs applies upward pressure to rent and home prices. While that initially sounded like a win for me as a homeowner, I now see it as a major loss because some of my dearest neighbors (you know, the ones that keep an eye on your place when you're traveling, help with minor household chores like moving a piece of furniture, celebrate birthdays with you, etc.) started moving, and their reasons for doing so pointed to challenges with increasing rents and housing prices in San Diego.

So, what can we do?

First, if you haven't been following the STVR debate, please start. A good place to start is the STVR Working Group website ([www.lajollatowncouncil.org/short-term-vacation-rentals](http://www.lajollatowncouncil.org/short-term-vacation-rentals)). UCCA is a member of the STVR Working Group, and our point person is Mack Langston.

Write the Mayor asking that his office publicize their STVR plan as soon as possible. Delaying the plan's release is a disservice to the residents and homeowners of San Diego who deserve a chance to weigh in on this discussion.

## Miramar Operations Update

Increased operations at MCAS Miramar expected throughout the month of June. This was announced at the May Community Leaders Forum and is in support of their training mission. Increased operations include day, evening and weekend hours, increased fixed wing (jets) and increased rotary wing (helicopter and osprey) flights. Visiting squadrons will train with Miramar Marines.

Training will support combat readiness with air to boat/sea training (off the coast) and air to ground training (primarily at 29 Palms). On some evenings, field carrier landing practice (also known as Touch & Go training) and other operations could continue as late as midnight.

## Shift Program Construction Update

The Shift program collects construction information and transportation resources in one place to assist businesses and commuters in University City and La Jolla who will continue to be impacted by the major public, private and transportation infrastructure projects underway in the area. In this column, we're excited to share updates on some of the major projects that will bring access to new community amenities and resources in your neighborhood. Please note, construction schedules are subject to change. To confirm the information below and other work schedules, contact Shift at 844-SHIFT-SD.

**I-5/Genesee Interchange, SANDAG/Caltrans Project:** This project is expected to be completed this month. Follow @ShiftSanDiego on Twitter and let us know which of the project's upcoming amenities you're most excited to try out:

- Improved east-west connectivity and access to and from Interstate 5.
- A new, separated and protected bike path linking the Sorrento Valley Coaster Station to UC San Diego, Scripps Memorial Hospital and Westfield UTC.

**Mid-Coast Trolley Construction Along Genesee Avenue, SANDAG Project:** Drilling on Genesee Avenue is now complete, while column work for the section of the viaduct, the bridge structure that will carry the trolley, from La Jolla Village Drive to Regents Road on Genesee Avenue continues. Once completed, the construction team will bring in pre-cast tubs for further assembly of the viaduct. While this work takes place in the median, motorists are encouraged to follow signage indicating the appropriate speed in active construction zones. For more information visit [KeepSanDiegoMoving.com/MidCoast](http://KeepSanDiegoMoving.com/MidCoast).

**Mid-Coast Trolley Construction Bike Path, SANDAG Project:** Construction crews have temporarily relocated the Rose Canyon Bike Path to the west side of the train tracks east of I-5 and north of Santa Fe Street to construct a new, permanent path. Sections of the permanent path will be reopened as they are completed.

**Gilman Drive Public Sewer Improvements, UC San Diego/ City of San Diego Project:** Construction activity is anticipated to begin on Gilman Drive south of the current work area from the southbound I-5 off-ramp to La Jolla Village Drive and La Jolla Shores Drive/Gilman Drive off-ramp. Work is expected to start at the intersection of Gilman and Via Alicante and then continue north toward the current work zone. Continued impacts are expected for Gilman Drive, from La Jolla Village Drive to Via Alicante, until late summer 2018.

**North Torrey Pines Living & Learning, UC San Diego Project:** The Living and Learning Neighborhood, located on the west campus between Muir College and Marshall College, just east of North Torrey Pines Road, will be a vibrant, mixed-use community. Construction is slated to begin this month, with new student housing expected to be move-in ready by Fall 2020. As part of construction, campus parking lot P207 and P208 will be permanently closed starting June 17, 2018. ### June 5 Statewide Direct Primary Election

June 5 is the regularly scheduled election date for the Gubernatorial Primary Election. This election determines the nominees for the voter nominated offices (Statewide Offices, Congress, State Senate and Assembly). The top two candidates will have a run-off in the November 6th General Election.



The California Voter Guide can help voters make informed decisions. It includes impartial analysis, arguments in favor and against numerous ballot measures, declarations of the candidates, the Voter Bill of Rights and other important information. This guide is available online on the California Secretary of State website at [www.VoterGuide.sos.ca.gov](http://www.VoterGuide.sos.ca.gov).

If you did not register to vote by the May 21, 2018 deadline, you may still conditionally register to vote and cast a provisional ballot. To do that, you must visit the San Diego County Registrar of Voters office during the 14 days before the election or on Election Day. Once your voter registration is processed and determined to be eligible, your registration becomes permanent. Then the provisional ballot you cast can be counted. ### Spray and Pay Graffiti Rewards Program

The City's Spray and Pay Rewards Program rewards citizens up to \$500 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of graffiti vandals. Remember, vandalism is a crime. If you see a graffiti crime in progress, call 9-1-1. Do not confront the vandals. Although they may appear to be harmless, they may be carrying weapons. The police will respond based on the priority of the crime compared to others for which they have calls at the time. 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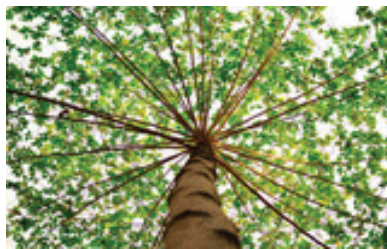
