UCCA Receives County Grant for Full-Color Newsletter and Podcasts

The San Diego Board of Supervisors has awarded UCCA a \$10,960 grant to produce a full-color newsletter (10 issues) for one year, to produce a series of podcasts, and to replace and install street banners. This issue marks the first time in its 16-year history that the newsletter has been printed in full-color.

UCCA thanks Supervisor Kristin Gaspar and University City community representative Corrine Busta for encouraging the organization to apply for a Community Enhancement Program grant and for approving its grant application.

- Chris Neilson, chair of the University Community Planning Group (UCPG) joined the meeting and reported that the largest issue on the docket for UCPG is the update of the Community Plan.

PURE WATER/SEWER PIPELINE LAWSUIT UPDATE

The UCCF lawsuit, supported by UCCA, against the City Public Utilities Dept., (Pure Water Project) which challenges the EIR, had an initial settlement conference in early July. As of August 20, there has been no discussion of alternative pipeline routes. In April, the City Council ordered the formation of "working groups" to provide oversight and safety recommendations related to the Pure Water pipeline construction. Up to now these groups have met four times. The groups, two in Clairemont, one in University City, and one in Scripps Ranch will have the opportunity to continue their oversight responsibilities once construction begins in May/June of 2019.

As many of you know, amongst the many issues/problems our City Council and Mayor have on their plates, the STVR, (short term vacation rentals) was one of huge importance to the character of our city. It's stringent restrictions, (crafted by Councilwoman Barbara Bry), are planned to be implemented next July. UCCA supports this ordinance and our Mack Langston and Diane Ahern played an important role in supporting and publicizing its adoption. Please be sure you carefully read and understand any petitions where signatures are being solicited related to this issue.

Hopefully you have noticed that this September edition is our first full-color UCCA newsletter. A San Diego County grant, approved by Supervisor Kristen Gaspar, has provided UCCA funds for 10 editions to be published in full color. The grant also allows for special additional community topics of interest to be communicated via "podcasts". UCCA Board is looking forward to establishing our first podcast in the next few months. *Supervisor Gaspar is scheduled to be a guest speaker at our September 12 UCCA meeting...please plan to attend.

Once again, welcome to our many new University City families. I hope you will become involved as active UCCA members when our 2019 membership drive begins and support our efforts in making and keeping University City, "more than just a neighborhood".

Working with the K9s

I attended SD Police Department's very informative "Inside K9" two-hour program that started with an intro by SDPD Chief David Nisleit, Sgt. Adair who's been with K9 unit for 16 years, and by Sara Napoli of the SD Police Foundation that funds the K9 program. Our K9s are not part of the City of SD budget.

Next, we visited four different K9 training stations, which were each staffed by two SDPD K9 Officers:

- SDPD's K9 dogs cost an average of \$13,500 each, are highly trained, and have a service life of 6-8 years. Our K9 unit has 35 teams of an Officer and his/her dog for our city of 1.3 million and 2,000 SDPD officers. There are 32 dogs in our K9 unit.
- K9 dogs reduce the use of force needed to subdue suspects. The dogs keep our Officers safe and the people with whom they come in contact safe as well. Dogs are trained to bite and to hold onto suspects until the Officer calls off the dog.
- SDPD's K9 Unit works 24/7 to support SDPD's patrol and to answer calls. The K9 Unit is called in when either a dangerous call is in progress, such as a burglary, robbery, or vehicle pursuit. The dogs clear areas before officers approach on foot and perform area, canyon, or building searches for fleeing and hidden suspects. Our K9s can also sniff out and find narcotics, explosives, weapons, and articles like clothing.
- Most K9 dogs are Belgian Malinois and German Shepherds. Many are originally trained as "sport dogs" in Europe such as in Germany, Holland, and Czechoslovakia.
- SDPD Officers thus often give commands to their dogs in the language of their original handlers.
- SDPD selects from among these imported "sport dogs" to go through their basic 10-week K-9 program. About 30% of the dogs selected don't make it through this rigorous program; many have never been in a vehicle such as an SDPD vehicle.
- Trainers use positive reinforcement to train the dogs, who go home with their assigned Officer each night.

This is the 20th anniversary of the non-profit San Diego Police Foundation that aside from funding the SDPD K9 program also buys bulletproof vests for our Officers to wear over their soft body armor.

Three K9s will retire in 2018 and an estimated 12 more K9s will retire in 2019.

STVR REGULATIONS PROTECT RESIDENTIAL NEIGHBORHOODS FROM MINI-HOTEL INVESTORS

City Council held a second reading of the amended version of our Mayor's proposed regulation of short term vacation rentals (STVR's) on August 1st. The Council reaffirmed its decision of July 16 to legalize home sharing. The vote was 6-2, with Councilmembers Bry, Zapf, Ward, Kersey, Gomez and Cole in favor; and Councilmembers Alvarez and Sherman opposed. Councilmember Cate was absent.

Some will dispute the "primary residence only" provision. The Coastal Commission will need to determine that the laws of the State of California guarding the rights of The People to access the coast have not been infringed upon. And there are currently paid petition signature gatherers, primarily funded by Airbnb, working to secure the 35,000 signatures required to put a repeal of the short-term rental ordinance up for a referendum vote.

Unfortunately, there is much inaccuracy in the pitch made by many of the uninformed petition gatherers; for instance, the right of homeowners to continue renting out a room or two is being continued, not prohibited as claimed by Airbnb, in the new ordinance.

I became involved in the fight when I realized that my neighborhood was likely to see additional unwelcome investment by outside interests. True, the flow of investment is unlikely to amount to that of any of the true coastal neighborhoods, but nevertheless, according to several Realtors here, the encroachment has begun and will accelerate based on recent advertisements by several real estate agents.

Neighborhoods will be permanently changed if we continue to allow the slow encroachment of unchecked commercialization. Our zoning laws wisely separate commercial from residential uses, and the fact that for many years the City failed to enforce the laws, does not entitle those who chose to risk getting caught, to forever be allowed to commercialize a residential space.

So I applaud the courage of Councilmembers Bry, Zapf, Ward, Kersey, Gomez and Cole to uphold the zoning laws of the City of San Diego and to protect the City's neighborhoods from becoming overrun by de facto mini-hotels.

My hope here in University City is that we all can strive to do a bit more than in the past to leave a legacy of a vibrant, safe and caring neighborhood for future residents.

We appreciate the leadership of our Council Member, Barbara Bry, on this issue crucial to the quality of our neighborhood, and commit our support as the battle for implementation of the City's ordinance continues.

District 1 Updates from Council President Pro Tem Barbara Bry

On August 7, we celebrated National Night Out which is an annual neighborhood event that promotes partnerships between law enforcement and the community. This is an opportunity to foster and sustain positive relationships among neighbors to bring about a true sense of community among San Diego residents. I had the pleasure of spending my National Night Out evening in University City. I want to especially thank Ruth DeSantis and Barbara Gellman for inviting me to their neighborhood block parties. It's encouraging to see how this event always brings neighbors, the broader community, its leaders, and the San Diego Police Department together.

As I discussed in a previous update, I docketed an item to discuss a potential fee structure that would allow the City to establish necessary bike infrastructure and to promote the responsible use of all dockless options at the June Budget Committee meeting. My Policy Advisor, Raymond Khan presented the staff report which was well received by the Committee. We recently facilitated the first Dockless Vehicle Working Group to discuss how we can optimize dockless vehicles to meet the City's goals regarding transportation, equity, and infrastructure. This is one of several steps to engage in collaborative, creative, problem solving to develop a mutually beneficial regulatory framework for dockless vehicles in the City of Diego.

I also recently joined Mayor Kevin Faulconer at the grand opening of Doyle Recreation Center's new playground. This will be a safe place to play for all children with rubberized flooring and ADA accessibility. It is the first update to this playground since its construction in 1993. I want to acknowledge the City's Public Works Department, Parks and Recreation, the Doyle Recreation Council and its subcommittee consisting of Naomi McLean, Cynthia Roy and Sue Evens for working in tandem to complete this ambitious yet much needed project.

The Doyle Recreation Center is a flagship for public participation as it enrolls more residents in its programs that any other recreation center in the City of San Diego. Over 7,000 residents are enrolled in the programs that range from youth basketball leagues to the USA Kyokushin Karate Academy. Each month, at least 25,000 patrons come to the park for birthday parties, company picnics, room rentals, exercise opportunities or simply, to just relax and unwind. This new playground will be an incredible resource for families and their children to enjoy in this beautiful park.

We are blessed to celebrate 25 years of EdUCate, the University City foundation for public schools, which led the way in uniting our five schools. 

To keep University City commuters and businesses informed of the major public, private and transportation infrastructure projects impacting the area, the Shift program collaborates with construction partners to collect and distribute monthly construction information. Please note, construction schedules are subject to change. To confirm the below and other work schedules, contact Shift at 844.SHIFT.SD.

Construction Term A girder is a large iron or steel beam or compound structure used for building bridges and the framework of large buildings (see photo above). Pre-cast girders, the large beams used to support the trolley bridge, will be placed on top of the completed columns to build the viaduct, the bridge structure that will carry the trolley along its alignment. The girders along the Mid-Coast Trolley project are being installed from September to October.

Mid-Coast Trolley Construction Along Genesee Avenue, SANDAG Project Column work for the section of the viaduct from La Jolla Village Drive to Regents Road on Genesee Avenue is complete. Work for the installation of girders is scheduled to begin late August and will tentatively continue through October 2018. This construction will require closures of east and westbound traffic at six intersections, including Regents Rd, Eastgate Mall, Executive Dr, La Jolla Village Dr, Esplanade Ct and UTC Transit Center.

The project will require left hand turns to be closed across Genesee Avenue at each intersection, but traffic will be able to turn right onto north or southbound Genesee Avenue. On the weekend and weeknights, one northbound lane will be open on Genesee Avenue, and the impacted cross street will be closed from 9:00pm to 5:00am. On weekdays, two northbound lanes and two southbound lanes will be open on Genesee Avenue (except for Regents Road, which will only allow for one southbound lane), and the impacted cross street will be closed from 5:00am to 9:00pm. Mid-Coast Trolley La Jolla Colony Drive Cut-and-Cover Tunnel, SANDAG Project Work on the cut-and-cover tunnel at La Jolla Colony is anticipated to begin in late-

September or early October. There will be a series of full closures to expedite work on nights and weekends. The traffic configuration on La Jolla Colony Drive for work on the cut-and-cover tunnel has been narrowed to two lanes, one lane in each direction. This configuration is in preparation for work to begin creating the tunnel and to allow for grading for the installation of a wall next to the tunnel. Gilman Drive Bridge, SANDAG Project The final pour of the bridge deck, the top surface of the bridge span, is being scheduled. The pour to complete the deck for the keyway as well as the side barriers was completed in late August. For the next phase of this project, falsework will be removed this month and will require additional temporary closures. UNIVERSITY CITY COMMUNITY FOUNDATION NEWS

It's been a busy few months for UCCF board members. The lawsuit that we filed against the City Water Dept is on the calendar for hearing in January 2019, and in the interim, we are in settlement negotiations. Concurrently, Board Member Merle Langston and I have been participating in the Working Group for the Pure Water project along with other community leaders and advocates, such as UCCA President, Barry Bernstein. We are very vocal in these meetings about the construction impact to our community. These meetings are open to the public at the Water Reclamation Facility. Visit ImproveUC.org for meeting dates and times.

Mack Langston (both UCCF and UCCA Board Member) was a UC leader in the coalition to create tighter restrictions on short term vacation rentals. Our Councilmember, Barbara Bry, supported these restrictions and it was nice to see the Council approve it.



On a lighter note, UCCF partnered with its own board member, Ryan Ahearn, and his team to organize a successful Neighborhood Night Out at Marcy Park. With a taco stand, ice cream truck and luxury bathroom donated by Chariot Bathroom, the event was well attended. Councilwoman Barbara Bry and her rep, Bridger Langfur, stopped by to chat with residents, while the kids were thrilled to get gold paper badges from some friendly SDPD officers and climb in their patrol car.

UCCF received two bits of great news recently; the City has agreed to prepare a cost estimate for a major renovation of Marcy Park (Phase 2). Meanwhile, Phase 1 of the renovation is almost complete with UCCF having planted 9 new trees, purchased 5 new concrete garbage surrounds, an ADA fountain with bench, replaced the swings, purchased the paint for the play structure and had the City replace the missing table and benches. UCCF is also willing to replace the failing pines in front with a row of purple Jacaranda trees. Meanwhile, the City has agreed to replace all of the sand in the play area and to repair the broken concrete. UC Area Manager for City Park and Rec, Berenice Garcia, has been a big help in working with us. She lined up a group of volunteers from Sekesui Diagnostics, who took time out of their busy day to clean up the perimeter of the park and help UCCF board members and residents like Carrie Reichert, Chris Yusunas and Ginny Bial paint the play structure. None of this ever would have been possible without generous donations from residents like you. It really does take a village. Phase 2 should include regrading to provide ADA access, an additional older child play area along the school fence line and an upgrade to the younger play area with lots of ADA play equipment. The open green space will not be disturbed and the park will remain leash-only and welcoming to everyone to use harmoniously.

In other good news, the under grounding of overhead powerlines is back on track for south UC. We've been pushing hard for this as it is a safety concern in the event of a wildfire or earthquake. Several streets that were approved but in a holding pattern due to environmental concerns have been released from that hold, so we should see more streets being undergrounded in the near future.

Lastly, thanks to input from the community and a nudge by UCCF board member, Sandy Lippe, I was happy to support an agreement for the creation of a track and field at Curie Elementary at the last Standley Park & Rec meeting. Passionate parents, grandparents and children made it clear that it was an important improvement for their school, and an improvement to any part of our community is a win for us all.




