



- Appreciation plaques were presented to Costa Verde/Regency Centers and Scripps Health thanking them for their corporate sponsorships of UCCA.
- Officer Brandon Broaddus with SDPD answered questions on delivery truck parking and red light running.
- Chevelle Tate with State Senator Toni Atkins outlined new laws that went into effect on January 1, 2019.
- Bridger Langfur with City Councilmember Barbara Bry announced an agreement to build a fire station on UCSD's campus. He also discussed micro-mobility solutions (dockless bikes and scooters).
- Samantha Hurst with the newly created University City
 Democratic Club invited all to attend their upcoming
 community mixer on January 21. In giving of "equal
 time", Barry has extended an invitation for a representative
 of a local Republican organization to give an organizational
 update at our February meeting.
- Members of C.A.S.A. reported on the December 8 crash memorial event and expressed concerns that aircraft from MCAS Miramar are not following DoD prescribed flight paths and procedures. C.A.S.A. has sent a letter in response to questions from MCAS Miramar personnel about the DoD FLIP mandated procedures.
- Katie Rodolico reported on the first community plan update meeting (a subcommittee of UCPG). Andy Weiss was elected chair and Rebecca Robinson was elected vice chair. The next meeting is February 12, 5:30-7:00pm, preceding the UCPG meeting.
- Diane Ahern announced that there is a community cleanup in the planning stages. More will be announced in the coming months.

SOCIAL SECURITY CALLING? NOPE, IT'S SCAMMERS

Latest impostors ask for personal info to grab your cash

This article submitted by Susan Tompor appeared in the Sunday, December 23, 2018 Union Tribune; she writes for the Detroit Free Press.

Her report states that crooks are impersonating an official from the Social Security Administration, making harassing calls similar to the annoying Internal Revenue Service calls.

In the Social Security scam, they're spoofing the 800-number for the Social Security Administration. The crooks have the ability to spoof caller IDs to make it look like you're being contacted by a legitimate source.

What to look for regarding this scam:

- Sometimes the number on your caller ID can show up as (800)772-1213. It's a legitimate number but that doesn't mean the call isn't from a scammer.
- If someone asks for information in order to make sure that you get a bigger Social Security check each month, it's a fraud.
- Social Security also isn't going to call and threaten that your benefits will be terminated.
- Some crooks claim that the Social Security computers are down and they need you to help to provide some information. A huge red flag - Social Security already has your Social Security number and won't be calling to ask you to hand over that number to them.
- If you receive a suspicious call from someone alleging to be from the Social Security Administration, you should report that information to the Office of the Inspector General for Social Security at (800) 269-0271 for the Social Security fraud hotline. Or you can make a fraud report online at oig.ssa.gov/report.

Also be aware of someone going door-to-door offering "better Medicare plans" They will ask to see your old Social Security card, taking that information for their system. A phone caller may claim to be returning a call about an inquiry involving Social Security benefits, hang up.

Be alert to any of these scenarios, hang up and report; do not give any information and let seniors, who are living alone or you feel vulnerable, know what to do.

REMINDER

It is recommended, by first responders, to mark your curb with your address and make sure you have a visible address on your home to save time in an emergency.

UCSD Fire Station

The UC San Diego Fire Station moved one step closer to construction. I was happy to make the motion when it was both at the City's Public Safety and Livable Neighborhoods Committee and the full City Council where it was unanimously approved.

UC San Diego will provide the City of San Diego \$20.6 million and land for the new station on North Torrey Pines Road at Northpoint Driveway, just south of

Genesee Avenue. In exchange, the City of San Diego will build a 10,500-square-foot station and pay for the equipment and the annual costs of operation.

This fire station is long overdue and I am appreciative of UCSD for their patience and commitment throughout the process. The UC San Diego Fire Station is a much-needed infrastructure addition which will greatly benefit the surrounding community.

Capital Improvement Funding to University City

Fire Station 50 was awarded \$1 million in funding for a fire engine. These funds are from a facility benefit assessment (FBA) which are development impact fees (DIF). DIF are one-time payments that must be paid prior to building or construction permit issuance.

Also, \$27,141 is being allocated for design upgrades for Marcy Park which could include the replacement of trees, upgrades to the park benches and tables and revamping the play structure. Marcy Park is an asset to the University City community and it definitely deserves the design upgrades.

San Diego County has an opioid and prescription drug problem that unfortunately continues to get worse. A few months ago the San Diego County Prescription Drug Abuse Task Force released the 2018 report card and it revealed that the number of San Diegans who died from unintentional drug-related deaths rose for the fourth year in a row. Fentanyl and heroin continue to be public enemy number one, infiltrating our borders at a record pace. Prescription drug abuse is an equal opportunity killer and can affect anyone, crossing socio-economic status, ethnicity, gender and age.

Last October, I introduced an initiative at the Board of Supervisor's meeting to fight opioid and prescription drug abuse in the County. We have partnered with the "Safe Homes Coalition" and the "San Diego Association of REALTORS" – which has 20,000 members. On April 6, real estate agents and anyone who would like to volunteer, will walk neighborhoods all around the county providing homeowners with bags to collect expired and unused medications in their homes. The process is anonymous. Postage on the bags will be pre-paid and the prescriptions will be shipped to a DEAcompliant disposal facility where they will be weighed and then incinerated. Our San Diego region has a long history of proactively addressing community problems. As government, we cannot solve complex issues alone and we must work with our community partners to realize this vision. Our coalition is working hard to plan this event in April and need as many boots on the ground as possible. From Vision 2020 to Vision 2030 John Lee Evans, San Diego School Board

Back in 2009 when we began working on Vision 2020 the Class of 2020 was in first grade. Next year they are going to graduate being better prepared for college and career than previous classes. This year's first graders are the Class of 2030 and we need to begin focusing on Vision 2030. We need to make sure they are prepared to navigate world in which they will be doing jobs that do not even currently exist. These students need to be a very creative and innovative generation to succeed.

Right now we are concentrating on K-3 literacy. We increased the graduation rate by paying attention early in high school to those students who were at risk. But we need to look even earlier. Not being proficient in reading by third grade is a strong predictor of future failure in school.

We are facing two achievement gaps. The first is the gap between Latinos, African Americans, English Learners and low income students compared to the other students. But even our best performing students are not performing nearly as well as their peers from other countries on international tests. Our students need to be prepared to compete in a global economy.

Singapore is an example of a country that went from being quite poor to a world class economy by focusing on education. By looking at a few countries that are producing stellar results there are several common factors. There is a focus on early literacy. In San Diego we are in the middle of our K-3 literacy focus. These countries also provide quality preschool for all students. We are gradually moving towards universal preschool in California. Extra resources and attention are dedicated to those most disadvantaged in the successful countries. Our Local Control Funding Formula provides extra funds for low income, English Learners, foster and homeless youth. In all of the successful countries the position of teachers is quite prestigious with competitive entry, internships and early career support and pay commensurate with the prestige of the profession.

One area in which we excel in San Diego is in the broad curriculum and extracurricular activities. Our music programs are expanding across the district and earn many awards. We have a wide variety of sports in our athletic programs, which resulted in a many of our teams participating in CIF championships.

Full and fair funding is also a key element for a world class school system. Money itself does not automatically produce academic improvement (our district has plenty of examples of no or low cost improvements), but insufficient funding does hold us back from the progress we could achieve with all of our students. Stay tuned as together we continuously transform our schools to meet the needs of all of our students.



UC SPOTLIGHT: THOMAS LEVY, Ph.D. It's ALL ABOUT ROOTS

Who are we and where do we come from? For UC resident Thomas Levy finding answers to these questions have driven him across continents, beneath oceans and beyond millennia in a career spanning 40 years. Thomas Levy is a Distinguished Professor of Anthropology and holds the Norma Kershaw Chair in the Archaeology of Ancient Israel and Neighboring Lands at UCSD. Author of 15 books and hundreds of scholarly research papers, he was elected a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 2008.

Growing up in Los Angeles, Levy was captivated by the stories of a family friend and anthropologist, Count Taylor, who had done field work in West Africa. "He was an influence. I was convinced by the age of 12 that I wanted to become an archaeologist," he said. In no time Levy volunteered for a dig in Pacific Palisades, and then all through high school he went on digs in Arizona and New Mexico. After a year at college, the 17-year-old volunteered for his first serious dig in Israel at Tel Gezer, a famous Biblical archaeological site. Professor William Dever, who would become one of the most prominent American archaeologists of the Middle East, organized the project. Fatefully, after transferring to the University of Arizona in Tucson, Levy met up with Professor Dever who had begun teaching there. Dever eventually became one of Levy's important mentors.

Earning a Ph.D. in Prehistory & Archaeology and the University of Sheffield in England, Levy spent the next 13 years doing field work in Israel, while holding Assistant Directorships at the Nelson Glueck School of Biblical Archaeology at the Hebrew Union College and the W.F. Albright Institute of Archaeological Research — both American research centers in Jerusalem. In 1992, he joined the Anthropology department at UC San Diego.

While the image of the archeologist as a collector of old things is thankfully a thing of the past, some may still wonder if archaeology speaks to modern people. Enter Tom Levy! Colleagues say he is not only a great field archaeologist but also a technological innovator, combining traditional best practices with the latest advances in technology. Levy uses tools, such as GPS, virtual reality and others, to analyze, archive and disseminate the things our human ancestors created, used, changed or discarded.

Armed with these powerful tools, he and his colleagues are expanding the boundaries of their discipline into cyber-archaeology and marine archaeology. "Today, we can us IT [information technology] to control the context of all the stuff we excavate," he said. For example, Levy and Steve Savage, a research associate at the California Institute for Telecommunications and Information Technology (Calit2) — Qualcomm Institute at UC San Diego, developed an interactive digital archaeology atlas of the Holy Land with over 40,000 sites.

In 2016 Levy received a \$1 million grant from the UC Office of the President to use virtual-reality technology to archive and safeguard 10,000 years of the cultural heritage of some of the most at-risk cultural objects in Greece, Turkey, Jordan, Israel, Egypt and Cyprus. "Large-scale virtual-reality kiosks [showcasing the ancient sites] have been set up in libraries and museums on four university campuses, including UC San Diego," he said.

Levy's most recent endeavor is in marine archaeology. He and Richard Norris, a Professor of Oceanography at Scripps Institution of Oceanography at UCSD, have conducted underwater expeditions is Greece and Israel to study how ancient people adapted to climate change, especially rising seas. In February, Levy is off to Israel for a marine archaeology project along the Mt. Carmel coastline.

Levy and his wife Alina, who has collaborated on many of his projects, coauthored a book with him about traditional bronze casters in India. They have two adult sons, Ben and Gil.

For some archaeology is an interest, for others a job, but for Tom Levy it has been the adventure of a lifetime. "It's about discovering our roots and how we adapt to our natural and cultural environments and look at it from a deep-time perspective," Levy said. "That has always fascinated me."



Girl Scouts Paint Electrical Box

In January, Standley Middle School eighth-graders Lyla Thygerson and Tatiana Nagai, from Girl Scout Troop 3333 in University City, painted an electrical box as part of their Girl Scout Silver Award, which is the second highest honor a Girl Scout can earn. The Silver Award is a project that addresses a community issue and leaves a lasting impact.

The painted electrical box, which is located in the Marketplace shopping center near the intersection of Governor Drive and Regents Road, displays how trash from mountains and rivers goes into the ocean, harms animals, and causes pollution. Lyla and Tatiana believe it is important that people are aware of this issue because it affects everyone, and the fish and seafood we consume are affected by the trash dumped in the ocean. The painted electrical box reminds the community to "reduce, reuse, and recycle" so that the ocean and its wildlife are preserved for the future.

The first meeting of the University Community Plan Update (CPU) subcommittee was held on Tuesday, January 8, 2019. The group is a subcommittee of the University Community Planning Group (UCPG). The goal is to update the existing community plan, which is the document used by UCPG and the city's planning department for our community. It addresses topics such as land use and transportation in the area.

The subcommittee was selected in October. It is made up of ten UCPG board members and nine members of the community who are not on the UCPG board. Andrew Wiese was elected as the subcommittee chair. He is a UCPG representative for South UC. Rebecca Robinson was elected as vice chair. She is a business representative for the La Jolla area. Andy Hosch, UCSD student representative, was elected as the recording secretary.

There was extensive discussion on when the public meetings should take place. Agreement was made for the next meeting to take place prior to the UCPG meeting on Tuesday, February 12, from 5:30-7:00pm. The UCPG meeting will start at 7:00pm to accommodate this. The meeting will be held in the conference room above Green Acres restaurant at 10300 Campus Pointe Drive. The meeting in February will include a presentation on the feedback received from the Community Plan Update open house held on September 26, 2018. There will be discussion of what the vision of the community will be in 20-30 years.

The March meeting will discuss land use. Specifically looking at what parcels/areas are ripe for change from the existing community plan. Discussion will include open space and public facilities (parks, libraries, fire stations), as well. Spring will bring discussions of multi-modal traffic: auto, public transit, pedestrian, and bicycle. Land use will be revisited in the summer.

These meetings are open to the public and is the primary manner to provide input to the community plan. Flight Information Planning (FLIP) at MCAS Miramar

Citizens Advocating Safe Aviation (CASA) is a watchdog group that came together as a result of the December 2008 F-18 fatal crash that took the lives of four neighbors in University City. At the December 8, 2018, Victims' Memorial and Tree Dedication, representatives of MCAS Miramar asked CASA representatives to substantiate community claims that Miramar aircraft departing Miramar airport are not permitted to fly west of the 805 until north of Carroll Canyon Road.

On January 7, 2019, we sent an email response to our contacts at Miramar with 8 specific assertions about DoD mandated Miramar flight operations derived primarily from the current DoD Flight Information Publication (FLIP AP/1). MCAS Miramar plays a vital role in the operations, training and readiness of our military forces and is proudly supported by our community. It's our belief that adherence to existing procedures will enhance the safety and efficiency of operations and training at MCAS Miramar with no reduction in readiness or increase in costs. At the same time, that discipline will enhance the safety of surrounding communities while also reducing noise impacts.

While our focus is on safety, we know that the procedures and regulations, when followed, also yield a reduction in perceived noise.

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
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
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
