- Tom Ventimiglia and Greg Zinser were acknowledged for their collaboration on our podcast melody.
- Officer Brandon Broaddus with SDPD provided an update on the front office closure at the Eastgate Mall location (due to remodeling). If you have videos of potential crime incidents (such as individuals testing doors in the neighborhood), you can send them to him.
- Mathew Gordon representing Assemblymember Todd Gloria outlined Assembly Bill 1477, which is designed to empower large California cities to confront deceitful businesses by allowing the municipality to collect all civil penalties awarded as a result of prosecution by the city.
- Corrine Busta representing County Supervisor Kristin Gaspar announced the July 28 Live Well San Diego 5K and Kids 1-mile fun run at the Waterfront Park in Downtown.
- Erin Magee representing Congressman Scott Peters announced The Climate Playbook and Congressional Art Competition.
- Bridger Langfur with City Councilmember Barbara Bry reported on the groundbreaking of Fire Station #50. He invited everyone to the next Brews with Bry to be held in University City.

UCCA Board members will be asked to approve the sponsorship of a mayoral candidate's forum in conjunction with the San Diego League of Women Voters. This is tentatively set for January 2020 and to be held at University City High School. This will be a very important election for the City of San Diego with all of the major issues facing our great City...UCCA congratulates EdUCate! on their 25th Anniversary in supporting our public schools...and also thank Our Mother of Confidence Church and the University Square Shopping location for their financial support of a one-time median clean-up project on Genesee and Regents. And finally, a big thank you to Barbara Bry for her announcement to support C.A.S.A.'s efforts in reaching out to Miramar, MCAS.

I am cutting short my typical "local" chat in this column to ask you to take a moment to read and consider a much more important topic. The UCPG subcommittee is developing our new Community Plan update that will be a blueprint for the next twenty or so years. This plan will address many important issues affecting all of us. Perhaps none as important as having the potential to UNIFY our community...that being, in my opinion, agreeing to a reasonable solution/compromise to the decades old "REGENTS ROAD BRIDGE" controversy.

At a previous Plan Update meeting, Ruth DeSantis, "Improve UC/UCCF" president, noted a number of issues seen as important areas for discussion, which included new bicycle paths and pedestrian walkways spanning Rose Canyon. I would like to expand on that. Those who live in UC know the issue of connecting the South and North rims of Rose Canyon has unfortunately caused divisiveness amongst our locals. Not quite the "Hatfields and McCoys"... but pretty close. There have been rational and reasonable reasons, pros and cons, expressed...and they all make sense to me.

I believe it's time to act and consider a compromise that focuses on SAFETY, AND a genuine improvement of the quality of life for our residents. Call it what you like...a canyon crossover, a railroad overpass, a UC safety connection, or be it so bold, a Rose Canyon Community Bridge. Here's what I am proposing to present to the Community Update Committee meeting on May 21 during public comment:

A UNIVERSITY CITY "COMPROMISE TO UNIFY

Build a beautiful stone, or contemporary expansion over the railroad tracks, that is designed to accommodate the needed and safe bike paths along with a wide scenic pedestrian walkway, (which could possibly connect the newly proposed canyon overview parks). Along with this beautiful community enhancement, and most importantly, the construction of an adjoining SINGLE EMERGENCY VEHICLE LANE, (not for regular vehicle traffic). This single emergency vehicle lane for City first responder's vehicles only, would be designed to include electronically controlled gates. In the event of an earthquake, canyon fire, or other catastrophic event the emergency lane could serve as an evacuation route. This emergency vehicle lane only would not only provide UC families with needed additional SAFETY, but also our Clairemont and La Jolla neighboring communities. Please plan to attend the scheduled May 21, Community Update committee meeting, and bring YOUR ideas forward for discussion. We can't let this opportunity pass us by. ~ Barry

How To Prevent "Crimes of Opportunity"

A "crime of opportunity" is a crime that is committed without planning when the perpetrator sees that he/she has the chance to commit the act at that moment and seizes it. In other words, given the

opportunity, a crime can be committed with little or no premeditation. Suggestions on how to prevent:

- Keep all doors and windows locked. If you have an alarm, activate it. Keep side gates locked.
- 2. Never leave keys in doors near glass. hang spare keys out of reach from doors and windows.
- 3. Never leave your purse in the cart at the supermarket or department store; on the floor next to your chair; hanging from the back of your chair or on the chair next to you in restaurants or public transportation or in an unattended desk at work.
- 4. Never leave strollers, bikes, lawn mowers, tools, sporting equipment or any other valuable items sitting unattended around your home.
- 5. Never leave laptops, purses, keys, cameras or other valuable items next to a door or visible from a window or in a car, place them in the trunk before you reach your destination.
- 6. Do not leave exterior lights on during the day, but do leave them on all night. Put lights on a timer. Put inside lights on timers when away.
- 7. Never give your Social Security Number, Medicare number, Birth date, bank account number or pin number to anyone who asks for it on-line or on the phone. A bank will never ask you to do so. This is a scam!
- 8. Never send money to someone who claims to be traveling and without money. This is a scam!
- 9. I-phone, I-pad and I-pod are prized by robbers. If they see it, they will want it. Do not show them out in public.
- 10. Wear only one ear bud when listening to music or messages so you can still hear what is going on around you. Pay attention to your surroundings.
- 11. Try to go to the ATM inside the bank or during the daylight hours, not at night. Block the screen when putting in your pin number so others don't see it.
- 12. Don't carry large sums of money with you while walking on the street and don't count money in public.
- 13. Have your car VIN (vehicle Identification Number) etched to prevent auto theft.
- 14. Get to know all of your neighbors so that you can recognize those who don't belong on the block and ask a neighbor to take in mail and papers while you are away.
- 15. Install a peep-hole in your front door and do not open to strangers, talk through the door. Add dead-bolt locks to all doors.
- 16. If the subject line of an email reads: Delivery Confirmation, Do not open it-unless you know you are expecting a package, it is an infection that can damage your computer.
- 17. If you witness a burglary or other crime in progress, call 911 and report. Write down everything you see and keep notes in a safe place. Non-emergencies call 619.531.2000, push the *star key when you reach the phone tree to connect to a dispatcher quicker.
- 18. Participate in Neighborhood Watch: be part of the solution. Contact me at bggellman@yahoo.com to find out if you have a street Captain and be part of the crime prevention team in partnership with our police. Help protect your family, property and neighborhood.

Community Plan Update Subcommittee April 16 Meeting Notes

The meeting started with public comment: Matty Wuest spoke on the issue of flight corridors at MCAS Miramar and the impact of flights outside of these corridors; Diane Ahern spoke of the MCAS Miramar F35 flights coming to Miramar, and the heavy lift helicopters coming in a few years, and their impact on the University City community; Joe LaCava advised the sub-committee to be careful, when writing the plan, to use strong language like "require" rather than "prefer" in laying out the plan for the community.

Dan Monroe, City of San Diego, reviewed the progress on the plan so far. The results of the "vision" workshop held in March will be available at the May meeting. The community survey is being finalized. It should be circulated to subcommittee members within a few days, and the broader community in early May. The results of this survey will be discussed at the May meeting. He then turned the meeting over to Rajeev Bhatia to lead discussion on land use.

Mr. Bhatia presented a new generated map of "potential" land use changes. The map identified areas that could have increased density or land use changes. The meeting then broke up into smaller groups to identify and comment on this map. Unfortunately, the map did not have current information and much of the discussion was spent noting the areas that already had new or planned densification in progress. Dyett and Bhatia agreed to do 'ground verification' before the next meeting.

The groups presented their ideas. The ideas included several ideas for the light industry area west of 805 off of Miramar road. Discussion of the Coastal Overlay Zone height limits for the areas around La Jolla Village Square, and discussion of the need for segregated bike lanes on Genesee, Nobel, and Governor Drive.

Next meeting: May 21, 2019. Location TBD.

District | Updates from Council President Pro Tem Barbara Bry

What do you need from the City of San Diego?

I ran for public office for one sole purpose — to work on your behalf to get things done for our community. After successfully tackling a wide variety of issues, I now need your input as we approach our next budget season. Mayor Faulconer's five-year financial outlook projects a \$74 million deficit for FY 2020 which starts July 1 despite a strong economy and revenue increases. Your voice is vital to ensuring that your priorities are seen and heard.

As Chair of the City Council's Budget and Government Efficiency Committee, I am determined to address issues that are important to you and not just "special interests."

Some of the issues I'm undertaking include: developing new sources of revenue related to scooters, examining where the city has vacancies and how to prioritize filling them, improving how the City of San Diego connects with small businesses, and making sure our streets are in good repair.

For the fourth year in a row, the number of San Diegans who died from unintentional drug-related deaths went up. According to the San Diego County Prescription Drug Abuse Task Force, 273 people died in 2017. The report card also revealed that four in ten teens who have misused or abused a prescription drug say they stole it from their parent's medicine cabinet, a loved one or a friend's parent.

We cannot sit back and allow this problem to get worse every year. On April 6th, together with Sheriff Bill Gore, the Safe Homes Coalition and the San Diego Association of REALTORS, we launched the "Keep Kids Safe" program. The goal? To reduce access to dangerous opioids.

More than 150 real estate professionals went door-to-door around the county explaining how unused prescription medications languishing in medicine cabinets can end up in the wrong hands. The volunteers provided pre-paid, pre-addressed envelopes in which San Diegans can discreetly place unwanted prescriptions that will be shipped to a facility and incinerated. Others were given a plastic bag to transport their prescriptions to a designated drop box at a later time.

Many of those who end up addicted get their opioids and other prescription drugs from the home medicine cabinet. When those drugs run out or no longer provide the high they want, they often turn to harder drugs like heroin, cocaine, meth or fentanyl. As a mother of three children, this terrifies me. That's why I contributed \$100,000 of District 3 funds to help launch the "Keep Kids Safe" program. I want every parent to know about the silent danger that may be sitting in their medicine cabinet. If you have expired or unused prescription medications, please take them to a designated drop box. Makeitasafehome.org has a list of locations around the county. And if you still need your prescriptions, please consider locking them up. The hope is for San Diegans to be proactive and make prescription drugs less accessible to children.

New Human Trafficking Prevention Education Program

FBI data indicates that San Diego ranks as one of the top 13 worst regions for human trafficking and San Diego County ranks in the top three areas in the state for human trafficking. Victims can be anyone – women, men, children, U.S. citizens, or foreign nationals. However, in the area of sex trafficking, minors are particularly vulnerable targets. Social media is one way traffickers access and exploit children. To help combat this problem the San Diego County Office of Education and the San Diego County District Attorney's Office are now part of the San Diego Trafficking Prevention Collective.

This newly developed program aims to bring human trafficking education, prevention, and awareness training into every public school in San Diego County and protect children from exploitation. The Collective empowers students in elementary, middle, and high school and teaches them about human trafficking in schools and neighborhoods, through a three-pronged approach: in-school prevention education, after-school intervention, and interactive multimedia training. Human trafficking is the second largest criminal industry in the world in which traffickers profit by preying on unsuspecting children, luring them right out of their schools and homes with deception and lies. This first-of-its-kind human trafficking prevention education collective will arm our kids with the knowledge and tools they need to protect themselves and to engage with trusted adults to help them remain free of abuse and exploitation.

The ugly truth is that schools across San Diego County have confirmed that traffickers actively recruit children on or near school campuses and use social media to lure and manipulate victims. In fact, 90 percent of high schools studied in San Diego County identified cases of human trafficking involving students, according to a 2016 study done by Point Loma Nazarene University and the University of San Diego. The San Diego County Office of Education is dedicated to supporting local school districts in prevention and intervention best practices to address the potential or actual victimization of students. By taking a proactive approach to address the commercial sexual exploitation of students, we are more likely to reduce the incidents of human trafficking in our schools. Young students are particularly at risk to commercial sexual exploitation and human trafficking so schools must play an essential role in addressing it. So far, the school districts are using the free curriculum include the San Diego County Office of Education, The San Diego Unified School District, Sweetwater Union High School District, Escondido Union High School District, San Dieguito Union High School District, Poway Unified School District, and San Pasqual Union Elementary School District.

Miramar Matters: Aviation Plan 2019

The Marine Corps recently unveiled its updated Aviation Plan. This year's plan includes information about upcoming changes at Miramar related to construction, operational support, and to airframes based at Miramar including the F-35 Joint Strike Fighter, the CH-53K heavy-lift cargo helicopter, the MV-22 Osprey tilt rotor, and the KC-130 Hercules cargo plane. The plan also includes information about other Marine Corps installations and their relationship to MCAS Miramar. A link to the 2019 Aviation Plan is available on UCCA's website at UniversityCityNews.org.

The single engine Joint Strike Fighter F-35 aircraft will begin operation out of Miramar this year. The first F-35 squadrons will arrive in 2020. According to the Marine Corps, the F-35 will sound different than the F/A-18 aircraft that they will eventually replace. Miramar flight operations primarily follow longstanding approach and departure corridors; however, aircraft sometimes fly outside their normal routes and over the highly populated areas of University City. Rose Canyon Trunk Sewer Repair Update

Last year, the City's Contractor completed the Rose Canyon Trunk sewer rehabilitation from east of Genesee Ave. through the Rose Canyon and worked his way down Santa Fe St. With the onset of the rainy season the project was shut down in late November as scheduled to avoid capacity issues in the sewer system. Now that the end of the rainy season is here, the Project Team will coordinate with the North City Water Reclamation Plant to start the project back up in May. As off right now, work is approximately 85% complete and we hope to finalize the project by July/August. Even though the Contractor has a few work items left in the canyon, impacts should be minimal and the trails will be open bikers and hikers like last year.

THE 5G EXPERIMENT

5G, the next generation of wireless, will operate at speeds up to 100 times of our current network as well as allow lower power devices more connectivity. All kinds of devices can be connected to the internet, creating the "Internet of Things". Networks of all kinds and even communities can become "smart", meaning more efficient and integrated.

So far, so good. What are the problems? First, enormous amounts of data and increasingly complex networks will be ever more vulnerable, and more of our personal information will be available to massive entities that have their agendas and not necessarily our interests at heart. Recognition technologies to prevent or solve acts of terrorism and crime, massive connectivity, growing use of Al, and government and corporate monitoring let others know where we are, what we are doing, who we associate with, and what we have to say.

Mayor Faulkner's recent press release, citing the public safety and business benefits of wireless innovation, announced an agreement with Verizon for 5G deployment: "The City has agreed to work with Verizon to streamline its permitting process to cut red tape, reduce review times and get these technologies installed faster." Does that mean minimize or ignore community input and radiation safety concerns, and set aside a good measure of the transparency and consent of the governed that are integral to our democratic norms? In countries with strong public involvement in technology issues, 5G deployment is being debated since radiation levels are estimated to increase 10 to 100 times. Scientists and public interest groups are urging caution and research to establish safety standards. In rejecting 5G the City of Brussels said, "The people of Brussels are not guinea pigs". In the U.S. when an organized public has questioned wireless safety, providers have been willing to compromise in locating antennas. For details on 5G risks Google Dr. Martin Pall.

How pervasive will 5G be? 5G requires many more antennas, several for every neighborhood, many thousands for San Diego and at least, say industry sources, 800,00 for the U.S. - all located on structures that make them closer to people. Wireless industry documents assert 20,000 new satellites broadcasting 5G will be needed to ensure global coverage. Amazon alone will launch 3,236 to cover deliveries to 95% of global population, and Space X plans a 12,000 satellite network. Other competitive providers and countries have their own plans. In other words, it will be impossible to opt out of the substantially increased radiation that 5G and the Internet of Things will bring. In effect, the entire human population is participating in a long-term experiment with significant risks.

It remains to be seen how much 5G adds to electronic pollution and the toxic burden on our health. Next month we will look at safety standards and what we can do as individuals and communities to minimize radiation exposure.

A Sustainable Water Supply for San Diego

Although San Diegans had a wet winter, it's not if we will experience another drought, but when. The need for a sustainable water supply remains critical. San Diego currently imports about 85% of water from the Colorado River and Northern California Bay Delta, and only a small amount of water is supplied locally. Pure Water San Diego (Pure Water) will provide a sustainable supply, meeting one-third of our demand by 2035.

Pure Water will create a local, drought-proof supply using proven technology to clean recycled water to produce safe, high-quality water. More than 50,000 laboratory tests have shown the purified water meets or exceeds all federal and state drinking water standards. Pure Water ensures we have water to support our economy and communities, while reducing water discharged into the ocean at the Point Loma Wastewater Treatment Plant. Pure Water produces renewable energy, supporting the City's Climate Action Plan.

Pure Water will use the same types of technologies as Orange County's Groundwater Replenishment System, which has produced purified water since 2008. San Diego is a leader in water reuse and now is the time to secure a local supply. After years of planning, environmental review and design, construction will start this year on Phase 1 of Pure Water, which will produce 30 million gallons a day of purified water after completion in 2023.
