UCCA Meeting Synopsis July 10

- Officer Melanie Bognuda took questions about speeding and traffic enforcement and mentioned that officers have to see the violation in order to provide enforcement.
- Battalion Chief Erik Windsor with Fire Department Battalion 5 (at Station 35 on Eastgate Mall in University City) stressed emergency preparedness in light of recent nearby earthquakes and upcoming fire season. In response to questions and brush management and eucalyptus trees, Chief Windsor provided an overview of the SDFD's Risk Reduction division.
- Dr. Robert Brown from UCSD mentioned that the Design and Innovation Building will begin construction soon adjacent to the Pepper Canyon Trolley Station.
- Erin Magee with Congressman Scott Peters introduced intern Ari Weizman, recent UCHS graduate, and explained the intern application process. Congressman Peters is accepting Service Academy Nominations and seeking participants in the Congressional APP Challenge.
- Bridger Langfur with City Councilmember Barbara Bry's office announced that Council District 1 was able to provide almost \$10,000 in additional money to the Marcy Park Project. Bridger announced that he was leaving Councilmember Bry's office to enter the UCSD graduate program in International Studies. Chris Nielsen, Ruth DeSantis and Barry Bernstein, representing UCPG, UCCF, and UCCA respectively, thanked Bridger and presented him with a plaque in appreciation for his service to University City.
- John Hartley with Neighborhoods for Clean Elections spoke of the clean elections initiatives which allow for full public funding of campaigns to give neighborhoods more voice and clout. He referred interested people to their website at http://www.sdcleanelections.org/
- Chris Nielsen reported there were between 1500 and 2000 community plan update surveys returned, more than any other community plan update survey. The comments will take a while to tally and evaluate.
- Ruth DeSantis from UCCF showed a concept illustration of a pedestrian walkover connecting Regents Road across Rose Canyon. The Pure Water EIR lawsuit is in settlement talks and will be discussed in closed session with City Council in September.
- Diane Ahern reported that MTS would like to rent 26 light pole banner spaces to promote their October 2nd free ride day. Request approved unanimously.
- Barbara Gellman announced National Night Out plans as well as the SDGE lighting safety program for those who wish to add additional lighting on their street; and Stop the Bleed, a nation-wide effort to reduce the number of trauma-related deaths.
- Barry Bernstein spoke of the cost sharing arrangement with Our Mother of Confidence Church, Chabad of UC, UC Marketplace, Carl's Jr, and La Jolla Property Management to clean up the medians on Governor, Genesee and Regents. The UCCA board unanimously approved additional cleanup costs for the median on Regents Road near the 52 entrance.
- Barry Bernstein asked for a motion to approve payment of the \$100 registration fee to the League of Women Voters forum (to be held in January). Request approved unanimously.
- Deanna Ratnikova, on behalf of Doyle Recreation Council, submitted a \$800 request to help cover the cost of musician and performer fees at their annual Art in the Park celebration featuring music and art from around the world. Request approved unanimously.

The next UCCA Meeting will be on Wednesday, September 11 at the UC Library, located at 4155 Governor Drive.

All are invited and welcome; networking begins at 5:30pm; meeting is called to order at 6:00pm.

September has gotten here so fast! I hope all of our families had a safe and fun summer...and our kids are all back to school and "hitting the books" or whatever it may be called these days. July/August were busy times here in UC...Our community 4th of July "Celebration" at.Standley Park, was a huge success as was the annual "Banana Split" event, Neighborhood Watch "National Night Out", Movies at the Park, and of course the Sunday "Concerts in the Park", all provided us with great family activities.

UCCA began a coordinated street median clean-up campaign, but at last sighting it was obvious that maintenance is more than just a one-time thing. The new "West End" homes had a very well attended "open house" and are putting on finishing touches.

The "Pure Water" (raw sewage pipelines through UC) project has run into some headwind...a second lawsuit, filed by a City employee group, and the very recent departure of the project director, have contributed to recent delays. UCCF's pipeline lawsuit related to a faulty EIR is scheduled to be heard in January. There has been some disturbing "not so good happenings" in UC which included "hate" graffiti at one of our condo complexes (SDPD working the case), and lots of aircraft noise and encroachment out of Miramar this summer...just wait until the F-35's arrive!

SoCal had a big earthquake in July. UCCA, Neighborhood Watch, along with our public library, sponsored an "Emergency Preparation" class taught by San Diego Fire/Rescue on Saturday, August 24. (see pg. 14). A small recent canyon fire in West Rose Canyon (which was quickly brought under control), brought attention to the need for all residents to be aware of the fire danger possibility and that having additional access over the railroad tracks will allow first responders to provide needed safety for our residents.

UCCF sponsored a very well attended CPR class in August, and will be having a second class this month, along with a movie in Marcy Park early in September, which will be cosponsored by Costa Verde/Regency Centers. Then on Sunday, August 25, UCCA honored its many volunteers at the summer's final concert at Standley Park. Coffee Bean gift cards were distributed to those volunteers attending the event, and Greg Zinser and Tom Ventimiglia were co-recipients of this year's special volunteer awards for their many years of community service, and in particular for their original "University City, More than just a Neighborhood" song.

A special welcome to Dr. Cynthia Smith-Ough, the new principal at Curie Elementary. Next month, EdUCate!, will be sponsoring the annual Fall "Oktoberfest"...so be sure to read all about it on page 9. Congratulations to Mark Salata, the newly elected president of EdUCate!, who will have big shoes to fill as Bonnie MacRitchie, who was "termed out" was such an effective and well respected leader.

UCPG's Community Plan committee will be meeting on September 17 at UC High School...results from the June online survey will be on their agenda for review/discussion. UCCA was pleased to announce receiving approval from the San Diego County Board of Supervisors for funding our full color newsletter, updating our street banners, and continuing our UC Talks podcasts this coming year.

UCCA will be electing officers at our scheduled November meeting. UCCA members that may be interested in running for one of our four elected offices (President, Vice-Pres. Treasurer, Secretary), need to have attended at least two regular meetings this past year to qualify as candidates. Officers are elected for two-year terms. Neighborhood Policing

info from Capt. Tina Williams and Lt. Corissa Pich, SDPD

Lt. Pich stressed that the mission of the Neighborhood Policing Division is "PROGRESSIVE AND COMPASSIONATE ENFORCEMENT". The City and County have a new joint program called Prosecution and Law Enforcement Diversion Services ("PLEADS") which provides NPD Officers a resource to offer homeless people with drug addiction rehab over jail. McAlister Institute (a recovery center) is trying to accept pets at their shelter to remove one of the barriers that keep individuals from accepting help.

QUESTION: Are fires legal in canyons?

ANSWER: ANY fire in a canyon, whether it's a campfire on the ground or a fire in a barbecue container, is illegal and one should call 911.

San Diego Fire Rescue sends notices to the San Diego Police Department on every fire. Camps should always be reported using the "GET IT DONE San Diego" App which can be downloaded (or reported online at https://www.sandiego.gov/get-it-done).

Calling for a Moratorium on Electric Scooters in San Diego

San Diegans deserve a safe, unobstructed and accessible public right of way. Electric scooters have posed challenge after challenge on our City sidewalks, boardwalks, and pedestrian walking areas. Last year, I was open to working with scooter companies to provide a new affordable transit option as I hosted a Dockless Vehicle Working Group. As time progressed, we have witnessed the situation worsen. In May, the City Council approved a permitting and regulatory program that went into effect on July 1. We believed these rules could help reestablish order on our sidewalks. Instead, we are left with companies willfully ignoring staging restrictions and geofencing requirements. Emergency rooms and urgent care centers are filling up with severe injuries. City resources are being wasted to collect and store inappropriately parked devices, and we don't even know if the fines cover our costs. In addition, private companies are picking up scooters left on private property. Thousands are piling up in at least one scooter graveyard, posing a long-term environmental hazard. Enough is enough scooter companies have had their opportunity. I am now calling for a moratorium on electric scooters in San Diego until we demonstrate that we can develop a fiscally responsible, well-thought out plan that ensures public and environmental safety.

A Busy Summer in UC

This summer, I have enjoyed some fascinating and fun events out and about in University City which included watching multicultural celebrations during UC's 4th of July celebration in Standley Park. I learned about new technologies at a drone workshop at the UC South Branch Library. Cities need to be proactive in regulating new technologies, which is why it is important to provide information and get feedback from the public on how we use commercial and police drones. I also spent time with old and new friends during National Night Out which brings the community together with local law enforcement to help foster and maintain safer neighborhoods.

Bidding Farewell to a Member of our Team

I have some bittersweet news that affects University City. My UC Community Representative, Bridger Langfur, will be attending graduate school at UCSD in the fall and will be resigning from his post. My office and I will miss Bridger, but we are excited for him. His replacement will be our veteran Community Representative, Justine Murray, who can be reached at JRMurray@sandiego.gov. Justine graduated from UCSD and has been the community representative for the Torrey Pines-Del Mar Heights community.

UC Schools Off to a Successful Start John Lee Evans, SD Unified Trustee

Once again we are starting a new school year in University City. UC has some of the highest performing schools in San Diego Unified. Each of our schools has its own unique characteristics. Doyle Elementary is an international school with students speaking 30 different languages. Spreckels is a bilingual magnet with multicultural events and Curie has many enhanced programs in the arts, science and physical education. The elementary principals work closely together to prepare the students for Standley Middle and UC High. Standley has been awarded by the school district for its Positive School Environment, as well as its character development program and extra support for math students. UC High, has national recognition with its Silver Medal rating by US News. It has college and career pathways that include biomedical, IT, visual arts and child development. All of the schools have outstanding music programs.

As a district we have an increasing number of students across the city successfully entering college and technical careers. Outcomes have improved significantly for the underperforming groups in a district which celebrates its diversity. We are proud to serve a diverse population in University City at a time of increasing national polarization. In the coming year there will be an increased focus on students with disabilities and English Learners. We will continue to develop a growth and development model to improve results for students and teachers. We will give priority attention to high priority schools, so that in San Diego students will succeed no matter their zip code.

We also realize the connection between student health and academic achievement. First, vaccination requirements prevent the spread of disease in our schools. Second, breakfast programs ensure that all students are able to learn with proper nutrition. Third, next year we will implement healthy start times in all of our high schools, as recommended by the Centers of Disease Control and all major medical associations, with all high schools starting between 8:30 and 9:00am.



County Supervisor Kristen Gaspar

At the August 6 Board of Supervisors' meeting I asked County staff to develop a countywide lactation policy for employees and nursing mothers who do business at the County Administration Center. We will also identify rooms where nursing mothers can breastfeed their babies in a comfortable and private setting. The number of California mothers who nurse their children is impressive - 87%. It's even higher in San Diego - 96.

Next Spring, San Diego will have its own human milk bank that will be a valuable resource for hospitals and mothers. Research shows that breast milk is crucial for sick and premature babies, dramatically reducing their chance of suffering from a devastating intestinal disease that could be deadly or require invasive surgery. Full-term babies also greatly benefit from human milk. Studies indicate they are less likely to die from Sudden Infant Death Syndrome and are significantly healthier.

Dr. Lisa Stellwagen, a UC San Diego Health Pediatrician, is the Executive Director of the new Mothers' Milk Bank. She has worked tirelessly to raise funds for the new facility and to raise awareness of the link between a child's health and being fed breast milk. I was so impressed with her vision and passion during my visit to the site that I committed \$95,000 from my Neighborhood Reinvestment Program to this important community service. And, in honor of August being Breastfeeding Awareness Month, I was thrilled to present Dr. Stellwagen with a County proclamation for her leadership to the creation of the San Diego Mothers' Milk Bank.

Our region is grappling with the critical need for all types of housing opportunities for our most vulnerable populations. The county has dedicated \$50 million dollars to an Innovative Housing Trust Fund and spent over \$225 million last year on housing and services for people experiencing homelessness. Despite these large investments, there are areas of extreme vulnerability that still exist.

In late June, I brought forward an action to make three strategic investments to address critical areas of vulnerability and immediately increase emergency housing for three vulnerable populations. The action will assist the Palomar Family YMCA in purchasing a property for transitional youth housing. It will assist Interfaith Community Services in purchasing a facility for recuperative care and temporary housing and dedicate funds to a safe emergency shelter for minors who are rescued from sex trafficking.

I believe we must continue to make investments in the capacity of organizations that provide these essential programs and services to our community. We must allow them the flexibility to offer care in a personcentered way to foster individual success.



CPUS Meeting Report - July

Barry Bernstein asked if the results of the survey were available. They should be available at the September meeting.

Info Item 1: Pedro Valera and Claudia Brizuela of the City of San Diego presented on the topic of Mobility Strategies and Existing Conditions. They then distributed packets for people to mark up on mobility improvement suggestions. The packets focused on Pedestrian, Bicycle, Transit, and Roadway improvements. These packets were collected and the results should be available at the September meeting.

Action Item 2: The board discussed and voted to add an additional statement to the vision statement approved at the June meeting. It added a statement that recognized the different natures of North and South University City.

A question was asked about what happens if the plan update subcommittee drafts a plan that does not meet the needs identified by the city (such as increased density near traffic priority areas.) The planning commission would potentially reject the plan if this happens and the existing plan would stand until an acceptable plan was drafted. The next meeting will be September 17 at University City High School.

Shift Program Construction Update

Westbound State Route 52 to Northbound Interstate 5 Auxiliary Lane, Caltrans Project: A new auxiliary lane will be built from the westbound SR-52 to northbound Interstate 5 (I-5) freeway connector to the La Jolla Colony Drive off-ramp. Signage will be in place to alert drivers when that connector is closed for work and will indicate recommended detours. Crews will be conducting work on the site during the day behind a protective barrier.

Trolley Underpass at La Jolla Colony Drive: To accommodate work on the Trolley underpass, lanes of La Jolla Colony Drive have been widened and restriped to provide one lane of traffic in each direction on what was previously the northbound side of the road. During the second phase of work, traffic will be moved to the southbound side of the road. The traffic switch for the second phase is anticipated to take place in September.

Along Genesee Avenue: Mid-Coast Trolley work at the intersections along Genesee Avenue will require some upcoming overnight closures to allow for concrete deck pours and falsework removal. Teams are hoping to complete work planned north of La Jolla Village Drive before the winter shopping construction moratorium, taking place between Thanksgiving and New Year's Day. UCCF/Marcy Park Updates

Marcy Park is finally getting the attention it deserves thanks to the efforts of area residents with the support of University City Community Foundation (UCCF), the University City Planning Group (UCPG), San Diego City Park & Rec and our District 1 Councilmember Barbara Bry. I am happy to report that engineering plans for the renovation of the existing play structure, the addition of an older child play area and regrading to allow for ADA access are in process at the City. Councilmember Bry was instrumental in getting this project off the ground by allocating approximately \$40,000 of her discretionary funds to get the ball rolling with the City. Then, UCPG President Chris Nielsen and Member, Roger Cavanaugh, made sure the UCPG board considered Marcy Park in their capital improvement list and in the end, it was placed as the #2 project, right behind the expansion of the south UC library.

Even if we were lucky to get Marcy Park fully funded today, it would still take several years before it was completed. Therefore, UCCF has continued to push to complete the Phase 1 renovation of the park. You may have noticed the new sand that was recently added to the play area to replace the old sand and soon the School District will be replacing the chain link fence. We are happy to see more and more neighbors visiting Marcy Park, volleyball teams practicing on cool afternoons and kids kicking soccer balls around. The new purple Jacaranda and yellow Cassia trees bloomed for the first time and we welcomed neighbors as they came out for ice cream and a movie in the park in June. The next MOVIE will be THE GREATEST SHOWMAN at 7:30pm on Saturday, September 14, and while we can't promise you a sunset and double rainbow like we saw at the last movie night, September nights are historically beautiful and it will be a great night to watch a movie under the stars.

While we are still a few years away from completion of the big Phase 2 renovation of Marcy Park, it does finally seem that it will actually happen. Meanwhile, we need your help to protect and preserve the improvements we have made so far. Recently some new trees were vandalized and tire marks were burned into the grass. If you see suspicious activity or vandalism in progress, please take a photo with your cell phone and call the Police. Also, we have had some unfortunate incidents with off leash dogs and worse, disrespectful owners. We want everyone to feel welcome at the park, whether they have 2 feet or four. Marcy Park is a leash-only park and will remain a leash-only park due to its size and logistics. While many accept the occasional off leash dog who is well trained and running without bothering anyone, some pets are not well trained. The pack mentality of offleash dogs makes it impossible for some pet owners to feel safe visiting the park with their leashed dog. Please don't let a handful of people spoil it for everyone. Furry friends should not be running loose anywhere near the play area and certainly not relieving themselves in the new sand. Lastly, any group gathering in the park requires a City Permit. This includes small parties with an inflatable jumpy, team sports events and hash gatherings. Permits can be obtained from the Standley Park Rec Center and the fee is minimal. Call Roger at 858-552-1652 for more info or stop by the Rec Center on Governor Drive.

LAWSUIT UPDATE

The CEQA lawsuit that was filed by UCCF alleging the Pure Water EIR did not fully consider alternate routes is still pending. A second lawsuit was filed in June by Associated General Contractors to stop the project from requiring project labor agreements, which drives costs higher.

The County Board of Supervisors has approved Community Enhancement Program allocations to several University City nonprofits for the 2019-2020 fiscal year. READY, SET, GO UC

The UC Library experienced a packed room last month when Charles Butler, Code Compliance Officer SD Fire-Rescue Dept., shared a wealth of information to educate UC residents on preparing to go when a wildfire endangers the area. A key element presented included preparing your family and home, such as having a Family Disaster Plan and preparing an emergency kit to last at least three days. Special focus was placed on creating defensible space around your home, including having tree canopies at least six feet above the ground and not over your roof.

When is it time to go? Officer Butler noted that if you hear the helicopters above announcing that residents should leave, it's probably too late. Try to determine which way the winds are blowing towards your home, and if you can see the fire five miles away -then it's time pack up and go. Embers can be carried from as far away as two/three miles. Don't forget any medications, important computers/software, and make sure you have cash and at least a half tank of gas.

Where do you go? As part of your disaster plan, have a designated place outside the fire area where your family can meet. During the evacuation discussion, it was noted that the UC area does not have a Fire Safety Council which can help determine an evacuation center in advance. UCCA members will work with Officer Butler to create a council in order to help the residents and community get ready for hopefully an incident that will never happen. SAFE GUN STORAGE PROTECTS OUR KIDS

Gun violence often begins at home. Firearms are a leading cause of injury-related deaths among children, second only to motor vehicle injury deaths. Most of the 7,000 children killed and injured each year are shot are in their own homes. Usually these deaths happen when a child is playing with a gun, mistakenly thinking it was a toy, or was unloaded or locked. Studies show that 46% of gun owners with children at home do not secure their firearms. Among children 9 and under, 73% know the location of their parents' firearms, and 36% admit they've handled the weapons.

Protecting children from these horrific accidents is why I proposed the Safe Storage of Firearms Ordinance. It requires that firearms in a residence be stored in a locked container, or disabled by a trigger lock, unless they are carried on the body or are in the immediate control of an authorized user. Fifteen other California cities have adopted Safe Storage Laws because studies show they are highly effective at saving lives. The Safe Storage of Firearms Ordinance is easy to follow and does not infringe on a gunowner's rights to carry weapons or to use the weapon for self-defense. Firearms need not be locked if they are being carried by, or are within the immediate control of, a person who is legally authorized to use or possess the firearm.

Importantly, safe storage does not prevent quick access. More than 1,700 devices are available to stop unauthorized users from accessing guns, and owners can choose one that best suits their needs.

Like other common-sense safety measures, such as seat belt laws and child-proof caps on prescription drug containers, safe storage practices prevent tragedies from occurring. Before California's 1986 seat belt law was enacted, only 20% of Californians wore seat belts. After the law was enacted, seatbelt use doubled. After 25 years, 96% of California motorists and passengers were wearing seatbelts, making all of us safer.

university City "Parks Council" in the Formative Stages

On December 20, 2017, City Council approved R-311478 which (among other things) cancelled the recreation council special use permits, effectively forcing the existing recreation councils to dissolve. As of July 1, 2018, the City of San Diego's Parks and Recreation Department, under the direction of the San Diego City Attorney, formally separated the Standley Park Recreation Council from the City's Recreation Advisory Group. Since that time, the University City recreation councils (Doyle, Nobel, and Standley) have been taking steps to form a 501(c)3 Parks Council to support all University City parks.

The Parks Council meets on the 4th Thursday of every month at Standley Recreation Center, 3585 Governor Drive, at 6:00pm. The Standley Park Recreation Advisory Group (RAG) meets the same day at 7:00pm. Both meetings are open to the public and all who have interests or concerns about any University City parks are invited and encouraged to attend.


