University City Begins Return to "Normal"

June brings about a stage where the city, county, and state begin relaxing COVID-19 related restrictions and the re-opening of restaurants, retail businesses, and other services. Restaurants began offering dine-in options, although at a reduced capacity. Queenstown Bistro (UTC) seated large brightly colored teddy bears around certain tables to help keep diners socially distant. Retail businesses were allowed to have customers shop with curbside pick-up, including the reopening of Westfield UTC at the end of May. And churches will soon welcome parishioners back for in-person religious services, although many will still continue offering online options to keep those who are sick and vulnerable at home. All while maintaining the county guideline to wear masks in public.

Many essential workers and businesses continued to stay open and remain on the frontline – healthcare workers and medical staff, grocery store clerks, and delivery workers are some that come to mind. Plus our police officers and fire/rescue teams continue to put their lives at risk, while adding on the added need to keep themselves and others safe from COVID-19.

While the city and our community is still unsure about whether Standley Park will open up in time for Summer Concerts or Banana Split Day, our parks and local trails are open for walking and biking. And it is quite evident that our local flora and fauna have thrived during a time of less traffic and pollution. Families are taking group bike rides, neighbors are enjoying driveway concerts, and sidewalk chalk has become a valued art form. We don't know what the fall school system will look like, but we've all learned the importance of family time, via in-person or through Zoom gatherings.

UCCA Meeting Synopsis May 13, held via Zoom

COMMUNITY LEADER REPORTS:

- Barbara Bry, City Council member and candidate for mayor, reported the City was revising its budget as result of the COVID-19 shutdown.
- Mark Salata, EdUCate Pres., reported the Taste of the Triangle was cancelled. Other fundraiser programs were being investigated.
- Randall Tonini, Chair of the 4th of July committee, reported the celebration was cancelled due to COVID-19 shutdown.
- Don Hotz announced the 2020 summer concert series may be cancelled, depending on if Standley Park is closed. The decision has not yet been made.
- Ruth DeSantis of UCCF reported details of the settlement with the City for the Pure Water settlement. Construction is expected to start by the end of 2020.
- Chris Nielsen, Chair of the UCPG, reported the sub-committee was submitting a comment letter for the Environmental Impact Report for the Costa Verde redevelopment project including concerns about traffic, visual impact, storm water runoff and noise issues.
- John Lee Evans, SDUSD Board President, reported on Imagine UC 2020 project. The first part will be the new pool, pavilion, and turf field for Standley Park.
- Joe LaCava, a candidate for City Council District 1, reported on a forum for candidates this fall and an update for the community plan. He discussed how the City was working on getting homeless people in housing.

LEGISLATIVE REPRESENTATIVES

- Miller Saltzman for State Senator Toni Atkins, reported on what the State was doing to combat COVID-19 and efforts on a new budget.
- Jessica Brown for Congressman Scott Peter, reported on his efforts on COVID-19 issues, mental health, the Heroes Act, SBA funding and remote voting in Congress.
- Matthew Gordon for Assemblyman Todd Gloria, reported on efforts to expand food distribution as a result of COVID-19.

COMMITTEE AND MEMBER REPORTS

- Diane Ahern reported on obtaining funding from the County for new banners for the neighborhood. She also reported the Air Force Thunderbirds were flying on May 15, 2020 to celebrate Memorial Day. She also reported the documentary regarding the plane crash in 2008 in UC, Two Miles East, was available at pacarts.org.
- Barbara Gellman reported there were three new captains for Neighborhood Watch, the Zoom meetings for the program "Coffee with Chief Connelly" that is open to the public would continue this summer though not yet scheduled, and SPDPD was monitoring UC to watch for drag racing.
- Mack Langston reported that the San Diego Community STVR Working Group will generate a report on short term rentals.
- Barry Bernstein reported that weed removal on the medians would commence with a contract with a contract landscaping firm.

Broadcastify Police & Fire Scanner:

Keep up with Public Safety incidents as they happen

Are you wondering how to get real-time information about police and fire-rescue activity in our area? Listen to the "police scanner" audio feed of the San Diego Police and Fire Department dispatch through Broadcastify, the radio communications industry's largest platform for streaming live audio for public safety and related communications. Police and fire helicopter activity is often displayed on commercial flight trackers (no audio). San Diego Fire Department active calls are displayed on the PulsePoint app. All have desktop versions as well as mobile apps available in the Apple App Store and the Google Play Store. Basic service is free.

What to do about street-racing in University City?

Neighbors on Nextdoor have been reporting drag-racing activity on Greenwich and on Governor. According to Community Relations Officer Melanie Bognuda, street racing is not permitted nor sanctioned by SDPD. The "Car Clubs" use social media to put out a meet up location. Very often, the sites used are private and/or they wait until the very last minute to publish the location which leaves the police department without notice of the event. Officer Bognuda says the police department asks that community members call the nonemergency line at 619.531.2000 to report when these groups are seen or heard gathering. This will create a radio call for service and allow officers to respond to shut down the illegal activity. The faster and more consistently we can do this, the less desirable a location will become to the "Car Clubs". Please share this information with your neighbors so we can all work together.

coffee with chief connelly

On May 5, Assistant Chief Paul Connelly provided a "Zoom" meeting for the public and he covered many issues that I will summarize. He is the Assistant Chief and in charge of Neighborhood Policing; a unit initiated by Chief Nisleit to handle homeless issues and other community concerns. The conversation was professional, calm and educational by all who tuned in and others are being planned to keep us all in the loop and give us the opportunity to have our questions and concerns addressed.

Challenges:

- 1. Police are focusing on education and using discretion when addressing COVID-19 regulations. Police are asking citizens to comply with public health orders regarding social distancing. If you see groups without masks and not social distancing, citizens can call 211 unless it is a chronic issue...then citizens can call the police non-emergency line.
- 2. Protecting officers from exposure. Officers are provided with goggles, N95 masks, rubber gloves and sanitizers to protect them from hands on contact.
- 3. Anticipating possible budget cuts due to COVID-19 with financial impacts on training and equipment.

Regarding the four police academies per year of 50 new recruits each; he is hopeful that they will continue since it will help us reach the budget level of 2043 officers. It is a challenge since the department loses approximately 13 officers a month due to normal attrition (retirement, career changes and moves to other agencies etc). It may take up to two years to reach the goal if the training sessions are decreased.

The RSVP volunteers are making calls from home to their list of folks who have needs; they are not calling on them fact to face right now, hopefully by mid-summer it will change.

The police are currently working their normal 10 hour shifts, have limited time off and have all the PPE equipment needed. A company has been hired to sanitize their patrol cars and police stations as necessary. They are tested if symptomatic and have had 10 test positive .Officers who test positive can either quarantine at home or in a provided hotel .All officers who tested positive have recovered fully and are back at work. Their morale is good.

Domestic Violence and Child Abuse reports have not increased but, in many cases it is because the victims are afraid to report so, if you know of a situation that needs attention, please contact the police at 619.531.2000.

Homeless: The end of January 2020, the annual Point in Time count identified 2283 unsheltered homeless living in the City of San Diego, a 12% decrease from the previous year. Those who tested positive for the virus and have symptoms are isolated in a hotel until they have been cleared by a doctor.

Due to sanitation and safety issues, the police do not allow homeless encampments; they break them up, offer services and encourage those experiencing homelessness to be transported to the convention center that has 1,500 beds available. Unfortunately, only 2-3 out of 10 will accept help. When the homeless camp is removed, environmental services is called in to clean and sanitize the area.

Final FY21 Budget Priorities

Last month, I crafted my final budget priorities for fiscal year 2021 starting July 1.

Some of these priorities include:

- restoring the 16 fulltime employees to the Code 2 Enforcement Department
- restoring funds to open our libraries and recreation centers
- restoring the South University City Fast Response Squad
- · funding the first phase of construction for Marcy Park
- allocating funding to begin design of the South UC library expansion

My highest priority is to protect our core services, which includes public safety, libraries, parks and recreation (including our lakes and reservoirs,) tree trimming, and code enforcement. The funding I have requested to be restored to the budget totals \$20,475,618.

These revenues are available if the city completes the sale of the Mission Valley Stadium site to San Diego State University, extricates itself from its 101 Ash Street lease, eliminates the smart streetlight program and freezes general-fund hiring through Sept. 30 (except to replace employees who leave).

By identifying other cost-cutting measures — such as shifting the City to a permanent distributed workforce, terminating and/or renegotiating all real-estate leases to align with new work-from-home and flex-work opportunities, and examining the top-heavy, high-salaried management from Assistant Chief Operating Officers to Deputy Directors — I have identified sources of funding totaling \$43,939,901.

It is unclear how long it will take to recover from this public health emergency which has created a financial crisis. What is clear is that we, as elected officials, must chart the course for an equitable and inclusive economic recovery.

Keep up the Good Work!

Thank you for all you've done to follow county guidelines on social distancing and wearing a face mask. As we open up our economy, I'm optimistic about San Diego's future. Please continue to support our local small businesses and restaurants which are now starting to open up.

Reimagining Youth Sports Post COVID-19

As we chart an uncertain course to reopen San Diego, I am urgently calling on our Governor to approve the San Diego pilot program for youth sports that I recently sent him in order to get our kids back on the field. It is time that we save local volunteer-driven sports organizations, youth sports facilities, and ensure that young people have access to sports in a safe environment and receive the physical, emotional and character-building benefits that organized sports provides.

In the last several weeks I have spoken to more than 200 youth sports leaders from around San Diego County. With their input, I crafted a comprehensive protocol that would allow our children to return to practice fields and gyms as quickly and safely as possible. The initiative is called "Game on San Diego" and it was created with a comprehensive set of guidelines to assist sports organizations and leagues in developing sport specific physical distancing and safety plans. As a mother of three and a youth coach, I have seen the impact of not being able to play or even practice and it is disheartening. Our kids desperately need this outlet for the physical, emotional and character-building benefits that organized sports provide.

Local sports leaders and organizations have experienced, or are facing, layoffs, bankruptcies and facility foreclosures. Without a coalition, sports families and organizations will struggle, and a return to play will be further delayed, if not fail.

Former Padre and sports analyst for 97.3 FM Tony Gwynn Jr. said he fully supports the Supervisor's plan. "As a baseball player, coach, and youth sports advocate, I believe it is important for the community that we take this time re-opening operations carefully. The Youth Sports Protocol has designed a plan to do so in a safe way that allows the community to start to integrate some normalcy back into the routine of youth sports. The first concern will always be the safety of those parents, guardians, youth participants, employees and volunteers. This outlines a way to slowly mind those safety protocols while also allowing youth sports to practice. "

Protecting Our Children's Safety Online

As families across San Diego shelter in place to protect against coronavirus, children are spending more time online. As a mother of school-age children, I recognize the role of the Internet in providing entertainment and interaction. As your City Attorney, I want to protect all



kids from the potential harm that can result from this unprecedented increase in online engagement. Here are some tips for protecting your children online:

- Educate yourself. Keep up on current technologies and know how your kids are using the Internet.
- Educate your children. Explain that people might fake who they are online, and stress the importance of not engaging with strangers.
- Establish open communication. Encourage children to tell you if someone online is making inappropriate comments, tries to humiliate or threaten them.
- Set rules. Limit online time and platforms. Let your children know these rules are because you love them and want them to be safe.
- Discuss risky behavior and unhealthy relationships. Talk about the dangers of online flirting. Contact should end immediately with anyone who pressures your child to keep a relationship secret, or asks questions that are too personal or sexually suggestive.
- Talk about sexting and intimate photos. Warn teens to never share pictures or messages that they wouldn't want their family, classmates, teachers, or future employers to see.
- Monitor Internet use. Approve the apps your child uses and know their account passwords. Review their Internet activity, and enable parental controls on all devices.
- Report online predators. Take a screenshot and report it to the platform where the contact occurred, then block the offender and contact police. Keep calm and don't blame your child.

I know how hard it is to juggle work and parenting. We can get through these trying times together.

What We Want for Next Year in San Diego schools

To have our students in our schools on the first day of fall semester is our primary goal. But we are at the mercy of the tax money that we receive. The Governor has announced his revised budget, which cuts about \$10B from schools. He has appealed to Congress to provide more federal stimulus money. At this point only ½ of 1% of stimulus money has been allocated for public schools.

We are developing a robust plan to open our schools. Many details are being worked out right now. We will likely need to have significant social distancing, a focus on personal hygiene and a system of testing and tracking to respond to any potential outbreaks. Our economy cannot fully open without our students in school. Of course, all of this will be done in tandem with our local public health officials.

We will need to have fewer students in the classroom at a time and will need to accommodate the other students elsewhere on the campus, particularly the younger children while their parents are at work. There may be more flexibility in high school schedules to accommodate social distancing. Details will be worked out this month.

We will also need to provide distance learning options for the families that do not feel comfortable sending their children to the brick and mortar school yet. We will also have to make special arrangements for students with special needs, particularly the medically fragile.

All of this depends on extra funding from Congress for Covid related expenses. The City of San Diego has received \$250M in federal stimulus for Covid and San Diego Unified is so far scheduled to receive only \$25M. Our costs will increase (not decrease!) by about 20% above the normal budget for additional teachers' aides and other supervisors on campus, additional public health nurses and counselors and additional custodial staff. This is a time when we need to add, not cut, staff for the safety of our children.

Our seniors will graduate this month in a non-traditional graduation. Details are being worked out at each high school. The seniors who I have talked to are intelligent, flexible, and resilient. They are setting an example for all of us. Congratulations to the Class of 2020!

Once again in the fall we will welcome our new group of kindergarteners, the Class of 2033. We must not let anything get in the way of their first day.

UC Planning Group Report

On May 12, the UCPG met via Zoom to elect board officers and consider one agenda item, approving a comment letter for the Costa Verde Draft EIR to the City by from the UCPG.

The UCPG Board elected Chris Nielsen (pictured above) as Chair, Roger Cavnaugh as Vice Chair, Anu Delouri as Membership Secretary, and Kristie Miller as Recording Secretary (pictured below in order from left to right).







The original comment letter deadline for the Costa Verde draft EIR to be submitted was extended twice for a total of 28 days until May 26. Thanks to Regency, Alexandria, the City Development Services Department, and Councilmember Bry for their help obtaining the second EIR comment letter extension during a difficult period.

The Costa Verde Subcommittee met five times via Zoom over the past month to analyze and discuss the Costa Verde Draft EIR with the objective of producing a draft comment letter for the UCPG. Four main project impacts were discussed: Traffic, including circulation and parking, Visual impacts, Noise and Dust, and Storm Water.

We began with a meeting to review the entire project. Representatives from Regency and Alexandria were present at this meeting and all other subcommittee meetings. The subcommittee formed working groups to consider each of the four impacts. The next meeting was held on Traffic (with the largest impacts) and one on Visual, Noise, and Storm Water. A fourth meeting began the comment letter draft, and a fifth generated the final subcommittee draft.

At our regularly scheduled UCPG meeting on May 12, a final version of the UCPG's Costa Verde Draft EIR comment letter was unanimously approved. Some primary concerns about the Costa Verde project include significant increases in traffic in an already congested area and a significant increase of noise and dust from heavy trucks

to residences on the south side of Nobel from Genesee to Towne Center Drive, where the residents have suffered through sequential large construction projects.

The City is expected to publish the final EIR by late July. The UCPG then will make a final project recommendation, after which the project will go before the Planning Commission and City Council.

Anyone can write a comment on an EIR. This procedure is described in the first pages in the EIR, available at www.sandiego.gov/ceqa/draft under "Costa Verde Revitalization". Comments are due by Tuesday, May 26.



2020 UC Celebration 4th of July cancelled

In alignment with the State of California's Stay-at-Home Order prohibiting large events and gatherings, and prioritizing public health, the University City Parks Council (UCPC) and the UC Celebration Committee (UCCC) jointly announce that the 2020 UC Celebration will not go on as planned on the 4th of July at Standley Park.

At a Parks Council board meeting on May 11, 2020, UCPC president John Schindel and UCCC chair Randall Tonini noted that the UC Celebration attracts thousands of residents and visitors to Standley Park at the day-long event. The UC Celebration has been a tradition in University City for over 30 years. They understand that area residents will be disappointed that the annual tradition will be interrupted this year.

Ultimately, however, the UC Celebration event sponsors decided that public health is most important, and they must follow state public health directives which say large public events are not allowed and aren't likely to be allowed for some time. 

It all started with one woman, UC resident Karen Gomez, who wanted to bless the hospice that had cared for her mother.





Fire Safe Council of UC South

The Fire Safe Council of University City South will be concentrating on education to the UC community about fire safety during 2020. The following "GET SET – As the Fire Approaches" checklist is part of a year-long series of fire safety articles. Look at previous UCCA Newsletters for previous articles, or go to universitycitynews.org. Info provided by the San Diego Fire-Rescue, sandiego.gov/fire. Save the info below for reference.

GET SET As the Fire Approaches Evacuate as soon as you are set! Alert family and neighbors. Dress in appropriate clothing (i.e., clothing made from natural fibers, such as cotton and work boots). Have goggles and a dry bandana or particle mask ready. Ensure that you have your emergency supply kit on hand that includes all necessary items such as a battery powered radio, spare batteries, emergency contact numbers, and ample drinking water. Stay tuned to your TV or local radio stations for updates, or check the fire department website. Remain close to your house, drink plenty of water and keep an eye on your family and pets until you are ready to leave. **INSIDE CHECKLIST** Shut all windows and doors, leaving them unlocked. Remove flammable window shades and curtains and close metal shutters. Remove lightweight curtains. Move flammable furniture to the center of the room, away from windows and doors. Shut off gas at the meter. Turn off pilot lights. Leave your lights on so firefighters can see your house under smoky conditions. Shut off the air conditioning. OUTSIDE CHECKLIST Gather up combustible items form the exterior of the house and bring them inside (e.g., patio furniture, children's toys, door mats, etc.) or place in your pool. Turn off propane tanks. Don't leave sprinklers on or water running - they can waste critical water pressure. Leave exterior lights on. Back your car into the driveway. Shut doors and roll up windows. Have a ladder available. Patrol your property and extinguish all small fires until you

Seal attic and ground vents with pre-cut plywood or

commercial seals if time permits.

RED CROSS ADJUSTS ITS DISASTER RESPONSE IN LIGHT OF COVID-19 RESTRICTIONS

The Fire Safe Council of San Diego and the Red Cross are anticipating a dangerous fire season this year. The Red Cross will continue to supply services to those with home fires but they are now concentrating their efforts on preparation for wildfires.

- Due to COVID-19 restrictions, the Red Cross is investing heavily in communication technologies such as phones and video conferencing and mobile devices.
- They anticipate providing more support services virtually instead of in person.
- The Red Cross will provide meals for first responders and for evacuees, but they no longer serve cafeteria style. All meals are pre-packaged in individual containers.
- Shelters cannot accept private donations because of concern about contamination.
- In the event of a large-scale evacuation, there is no congregate/group sheltering due to COVID-19 restrictions. The Red Cross is partnering with county hotels and dormitories for temporary housing.

Although some operation protocols have changed, the bottom-line message to residents and the public remains the same: prepare for wildfire, put together your go kits, plan a family evacuation and gathering place, stay informed, and download the Cal Fire and the SD County Emergency apps. In the event of an evacuation, follow the police department's evacuation orders ... knowing that the emergency responders and the Red Cross are using COVID-19 safety measures as they respond to the disaster.

Because costs are higher this year due investment in communication technology and the need to find alternate forms of shelter that comply with COVID- 19 restrictions, financial donations to the Red Cross are always welcome. 


Have you heard? UC Talks – Podcasts featuring conversations, interviews, and news of University City, are now available on both YouTube and SoundCloud.

Mid-Coast Trolley Construction, SANDAG Project

Along Genesee Avenue - Over the next several weeks, Mid-Coast Trolley crews will be performing exterior finish work on the Trolley bridge. Overnight closures will continue along Genesee Avenue, between Regents Road and Nobel Drive. Construction schedules are subject to change. Voigt Drive Improvements Project, SANDAG, Caltrans, and UC San Diego Project

The Voigt Drive Improvements Project will expand transportation capacity to better accommodate existing and future traffic demand in the East Voigt Drive area, particularly for peak-period commuting. Additionally, the project will provide a direct route to the future Voigt Drive Trolley station, improving transit access to and from local medical centers, schools, businesses, and other nearby facilities. Lastly, the project will bring underground utility improvements to the campus, a bicycle lane along Voigt Drive, and new sidewalks. The improvements are anticipated to be complete by the end of 2021, which aligns with the opening of the UC San Diego Blue Line Trolley extension.

This multi-phased construction effort requires road closures which will last approximately 14-18 months and are necessary to expedite project work, lessen the overall impact, and ensure public safety.

A new phase of work began on June 1 and will continue into next year. Beginning this month, the northbound lanes of Campus Point Drive will be closed between Genesee Avenue and Medical Center Drive. Southbound lanes leading into the UC San Diego Medical Center will remain open. Additionally, Voigt Drive will be closed between the entrance to parking lot P701 and Campus Point Drive. Fire Station 50, City of San Diego Project

Fire Station 50, to be located on the southeast corner of Nobel Drive and Shoreline Drive, is anticipated to open in November 2020. In the coming weeks, contractors will install the elevator, begin concrete work on the east driveway and median on Nobel Drive, and connect the station alert system and fire alarms. Eastbound and westbound traffic may be impacted along Nobel Drive for the concrete work.

Additionally, crews will begin off-site underground trenching and conduit placement for the SDG&E gas line along Shoreline Drive, which may impact parking in the cul-de-sac and adjacent condominiums through mid-June.

COMMUNITY PLAN UPDATE SUBCOMMITTEE (CPUS) UPDATE

Agenda and supporting documents for this meeting, and previous meetings can be found at the new plan update website: planuniversity.org. The meeting was held as a webinar.

Public Comment:

Lou Rodolico spoke of missing bridges, fire safety, and paid lobbyists. He suggested that the large parking garages could be sheltering locations in a fire.

Barry Bernstein spoke of the need for at bridge at Regents Rd to allow for emergency access, bikes and pedestrians. He requested that the planning process be able to consider this.

Roger Cavnaugh suggested a subcommittee be formed to the CPU subcommittee to specifically brainstorm on safety issues.

Rajeev Bhatia and Tait Galloway spoke to the fact that the EIR process would specifically look at fire safety..

Agenda Items:

Katie Witherspoon reviewed the progress to date and upcoming steps.

Rajeev Bhatia started the discussion of land use by presenting the deficit of housing relative to jobs in the University community. Subcommittee members discussed that the numbers included UCSD students, but didn't include dorms at UCSD. It was discussed that as students move into the new and planned dorms that housing rented to students would open up for workers in the area.

Discussion moved to land use in the area east of Genesee between Eastgate mall and Campus Point. Mixed use was accepted as viable. Housing along Genesee would have noise issues with the trolley. It was suggested that La Jolla Country Day be contacted to see if they are interested in that area for expansion of their campus. It was pointed out that housing was not going to be walkable or transit oriented because of the canyons.

The discussion moved to the area southern near UTC. Subcommittee members pointed out the inaccuracies on the map, and that any increased density would need to address the traffic issues for cars, pedestrians, and bicycles. It was pointed out that much of the area between Eastgate Mall and La Jolla Village is controlled in a CC&R that restricts use and heights.

Katie Witherspoon discussed holding an extra meeting in early June to continue discussion of the land use focus areas. Tentative date of June 2, 2020. 


