International Coastal Cleanup Day 2021:

San Diego County's Largest Environmental Cleanup Returns on September 18, 2021

Free online volunteer registration opens September 1, 2021 at <u>CleanUpDay.org.</u>

What:

Nearly 6,000 registered volunteers expected to participate in cleanups within their own neighborhoods and in groups at over one hundred litter hotspots for the 37th annual International Coastal Cleanup Day in San Diego County on Saturday, September 18, 2021. The event is officially produced by I Love A Clean San Diego County for the region. Free online registration opens on September 1, 2021. **All volunteers must register to participate and complete the online litter survey to be counted in the global results.**

Since the event's inception in 1985, over 269,000 volunteers in San Diego County have removed over 5.4 million pounds of litter and debris from local communities. Despite the effects of the pandemic in 2020, San Diego County stood out. The region's effort accounted for one percent of international litter totals, nearly six percent of the national totals and 20 percent of California's results.

When:

Online Registration: Opens September 1, 2021 at CleanUpDay.org

Event: Saturday, September 18, 2021. Volunteers can dedicate time for their cleanup time at any point during the day.

Where:

Any location in San Diego County volunteers choose to clean and protect close to home. **Or,** volunteers can visit <u>CleanUpDay.org</u> on September 1 to view the **litter hotspot map** and clean up at one of more than 100 litter hotspots.

Why:

No matter where people live in San Diego County, we all live in one of its 11 watersheds that lead to the coast. About 80 percent of ocean pollution begins inland. By 2050, it is estimated there will be more plastic pollution by weight than fish in the world's oceans. Increased packaging and takeout containers are still litter and pollution problems. Cigarette butts continue to be the most littered individual form of plastic pollution.

Litter enters our local watersheds and flows to the Pacific Ocean, ruining soil and water quality. Litter also becomes a harmful threat to the health of both marine wildlife and people. This event serves as a learning opportunity to show how damaging litter and pollution are for our environment and to encourage protection of the region we call home.
