

## SUMMARY OF NOVEMBER 10 UCCA MEETING

#### Held in-person at the UC Library

(\*Editor's Note: the original summary has been shortened due to space constraints, see full minutes online.

President Barry Bernstein announced: (1) a community survey on UCCA's new plan is underway with results in January; (2) Assembly-member Chris Ward is meeting with community groups on standards for ADU development; (3) The community opposes a single lane in each direction for Governor Dr., west of Genesee Ave. City Council member, Joe LaCava, is asking for a new traffic study and will hold meetings; (4) New sewer lines will be installed in the area; (5) The Pure Water project is delayed because of lawsuits and disagreements with SDG&E on moving utility lines. Construction will be done at night to minimize disruption to traffic; (6) The aquatics center construction had delays, but the plan is still to open in December; (7) CASA members were meeting with the new commander on approved air routes and safety for MCAS Miramar; (8) The redistricting group is working on three plans with a new map being drawn. Multiple hearings are set.

Officer M. Bognuda of the SDPD reported that all residents should lock their houses and cars. Be on the lookout for thefts from front porches, and coordinate with neighbors. Catalytic converter thefts are still going on. Having shields installed can cut down on thefts.

The UC Fire Safe Council was given a plaque by the UCCA for their work in developing a neighborhood fire safety and prevention plan, the first approved in City of San Diego District 1.

Chris Nielsen, President of the UCPG, reported La Jolla Avia Apts. development on Gullstrand was still on hold due to the issue of continuing the golf course as part of the building permit. Code enforcement may start after December 1, 2021, if not resolved.

Amanda Berry, Assistant to County Supervisor Terra Lawson-Remer, reported the County was starting a youth environmental job corps to be operated by the San Diego Foundation.

Guest speaker Sabrina Bazzo, a San Diego School Board Trustee, reported: (1) a vaccine mandate for all staff and students 16 and up was adopted; (2) the joint use pool at Standley Park had delays but expected to open by January; (2) Spreckels Elementary is under construction to modernize facilities; (3) She visited all public schools in UC and attended the "Climate Strike" organized by UCHS students; (4) The Board has selected three finalists for School Superintendent with a final decision in January; (5) Mission Valley will receive a new school under the new school plan; (6) The Board is expanding "cluster classrooms" to group students together; (7) The planned Mental Health Day off is optional.

#### PUBLIC FORUM AND COMMITTEE REPORTS

Chris Nielsen, President of UCPG reported that two projects by Alexandria Development for north of La Jolla Village Dr. have been approved. Construction of the new project at Costa Verde has been delayed with no start date set.

Judy Bethel announced details of the Christmas/Menorah Lighting program on December 10. Volunteers are needed to help set up and run the program. December 6 and 7 at 9:00am will be set up time, and volunteers are needed. (see page 1 for more details)

**Judy Sweet**, coordinator of pickleball players at Standley Park requested assistance from the Board regarding the UC Racket Club cutting out pickleball from the courts in January 2022. She was referred to the Park Recreation Council to address the issue.

**Don Hotz** was presented a plaque for his service as Treasurer on the Board for the past 4 years, as well as **Barry Bernstein** for his service as President of the Board for the past 8 years.

Barbara Gellman of Neighborhood Watch reported people should watch out for fake Amazon deliveries which are methods for thieves to take packages from houses.

**Election results:** New officers elected via acclamation are: Diane Ahern as President, Mack Langston as Vice-President, Jemma Samala as Treasurer and James Beshears as Secretary. All are elected to serve a two-year term effective December 1, 2021. Barry Bernstein will serve as Past-President.

#### Governor Drive & **Lakewood Street Update**

Over 11 years ago, Mark Powell advocated for the installation of a traffic light at the intersection of Governor Drive and Lakewood Street. The dangerous intersection gets speeding drivers on the way to or from the 805 freeway. Recently, an update was provided by Councilmember Joe LaCava's office noting that "the Notice to Proceed (official start date) was issued to the contractor effective 11/29/2021. The contractor is required to start field work within 15 working dates of the Notice to Proceed. But please note that due to difficulties obtaining materials the construction duration is set at 200 working days."

#### Redistricting Commission: **University City** could move from Council District 1 to Council District 6



The City Charter requires the creation of a Redistricting Commission at the beginning of each decade, after the U.S. Census, to adopt plans which specify the boundaries of districts for the City Council. This process takes place independently of the City Council and Mayor's Office.

Last month, the Redistricting Commissioners voted to accept Preliminary Map 74956 as the basis for further discussion. The Preliminary Map proposes that most of University City would move from Council District 1 to Council District 6.

The Commissioners held Public Hearings about the map in November and will hold additional hearings in December. They are scheduled to vote on the Final Map on December 15. #### Monthly Message from District 1 Councilmember Joe LaCava

#### **Divestment from Fossil Fuels**

I have been working with Mayor Gloria to ensure that the City of San Diego divests from fossil fuels, an important action that aligns with our climate action plan and further protects our financial interests.

In November, my City Council colleagues, and I voted to divest from companies that engage in the exploration, production, drilling or refining of coal, petroleum, or natural gas. Following the lead of cities from around the world, we will demonstrate that climate and financial success are not mutually exclusive. Achieving our climate goals is not a singular action and the divestment movement has proven its effectiveness by focusing on the financial sector.

Divesting will help the City of San Diego reach our Climate Action Plan goals and further ensure our local environment, biodiversity, endangered species are all protected from the dangerous impacts of fossil fuels. Combating climate change also helps protect our beaches, coastal bluffs, canyons, and reduce the impact of wildfires. Moreover, while divesting from fossil fuels is an important step, there are still many actions we must take to be a truly sustainable city. As your Councilmember, I will continue to be a champion for the climate.

#### More on Climate Action

Last month, the City released an update to its ground-breaking 2015 Climate Action Plan (CAP). The update expands on our ambitious goals and timelines to reduce Greenhouse Gases. The draft is open for public input and is expected to come to full Council in February. See details at www.sandiego.gov/sustainability/climate-action-plan

#### **Reforming Community Planning Groups**

Community planning groups, like UCPG, are a fundamental part of public input in San Diego. They work with City staff to develop long term community plans as well as advise the City on land use, transportation, and infrastructure projects and issues.

Over the last year, based on a legal analysis from the City Attorney and recommendations from the City Auditor and Grand Jury, I have been working with City staff and the City Attorney to bring forward changes to Council Policy and Municipal Code sections that govern CPGs. My goal is to ensure their expertise, voice, and input are retained while complying with the City Charter, our local constitution. I am proposing changes to CPGs that will:

- retain the hundreds of volunteers and community leaders who serve;
- improve opportunities for broad community representation and transparency;
- allow for an effective and supportive use of City resources; and
- maintain CPGs' position as advisory bodies to the City.

#### Give Back and Paying it Forward this Holiday Season



The contest aims to foster civic engagement and build key leadership skills in young people and is open to all elementary and middle school students.

At age 10, Mayor Gloria entered then-Mayor Maureen O'Connor's "Mayor for a Day" contest. He was selected as the runner-up. Thirty-two years later, he now serves as San Diego's 37th Mayor.

Participants are invited to write an essay (up to 300 words) or submit a video (no more than 3 minutes) answering the prompt, "How you would make the City of San Diego a better place if you were the mayor?" The selected winner will be given an opportunity to shadow Mayor Todd Gloria for a day.





#### SANDAG Proposes Additional Lanes on 52

On Friday morning, December 10, the SANDAG board of directors is scheduled to discuss and vote on the 2021 Regional Plan which includes a proposal to add three additional Managed Lanes (ML) in each direction on State Route 52 (SR 52) from I-5 to 1-805 through Marian Bear Park. This is a Zoom meeting and the public is invited to participate. UCCA will post the agenda and Zoom meeting link on its website when available. Meanwhile, a link to the Board of Directors contacts and meeting information is posted on the SANDAG website at sandag.org.

The SANDAG Regional Plan is updated every four years and provides a long-term, 30-year blueprint for the San Diego region that seeks to meet regulatory requirements, address traffic congestion, and create equal access to jobs, education, healthcare, and other community resources.

Details of the 2021 update are included in the Draft 2021 Regional Plan, Appendix A - Transportation Projects, Programs, and Phasing; search on "SR 52" for all references. Proposed changes to SR 52 through Marian Bear Park are included in Appendix A, Table A.8, Coast, Canyons, and Trails; available at sdforward.com/mobility-planning/2021-regional-plan-draft.

#### **Pure Water Construction Update**

Beginning in early November, through 2021, the City of San Diego's contractor will be conducting nighttime underground utility work on Genesee Avenue from Appleton Street to State Route 52 as part of the Morena Northern Pipelines and Tunnels project. The underground utility work will help the City's contractor to confirm the location and depth of existing utilities in the public right-of-way. Work is scheduled from 9:00pm to 5:00am from Monday to Thursday.

After this work is complete, the next phase will start on Genesee and State Route 52 and move north on Genesee to Rose Canyon. The schedule will be made available on a section-by-section basis and posted to the Morena Northern Pipelines and Tunnels page on the Pure Water website.

The City team is continuing to work with the contractor to refine the construction schedule. Information will be distributed to the community when the schedule is ready, but it is anticipated that pipeline construction will begin in early 2022. As you may know, there are some supply challenges with steel and other materials.

As we discussed at the last meeting, we will reach out to schedule the next UC Working Group meeting when the pipeline construction schedule is available. In the meantime, if you have any questions about the upcoming underground utility work, please don't hesitate to contact me.

#### **November Meeting Recap**

At the November UCPG meeting, a replacement for termed-out UCPG board member Meagan Beale was selected from four applicants: Thomas Feerick, Tom Hekman, Lou Rodolico, and Karen Martien. Karen Martien, a 25+ year UC resident, was selected unanimously. She will serve on the board until March 2023.

In regular agenda business, the board heard two projects presented by Alexandria, the "Science Village" mixed-use facility on Towne Centre Drive formerly known as "Podium 93", and a project change at the previously approved "One Alexandria Square" project on North Torrey Pines Road. Both projects were unanimously recommended for approval by the board.

Looking ahead to what's coming up at the UCPG in the next few months, we have:

- The BIOMED project "Towne Centre View", located at the end of Towne Centre Drive. BIOMED informed me that they have encountered substantial delays in their traffic study by the city. They don't have a date certain when the study will be complete. The UCPG subcommittee for this project will meet when the traffic study results are ready.
- We will have a presentation from Rebecca Robinson Wood on her "La Jolla Village 2" housing project at the January 11, 2022, UCPG meeting. This will be an action item for a Community Plan Amendment Initiation.
- We have no news on the Robbins Way four-way lot split project.
- We will evaluate the possibility of returning to in-person meetings in February.
- We had an excellent presentation at the Community Planners Committee last month on "TREES: The inadequacies of the City's Urban Forest policies", and their request to advocate for trees by Community Planning Groups. We will have an updated version of this presentation in January.
- 6. We will have a presentation by Joe LaCava at CPC on November 30, a special date due to the Thanksgiving holiday, on revisions to Council Policy 600-24, the policy under which CPGs operate. This will be the only agenda item. Revisions to this policy will need to be passed by Land Use and Housing, the Planning Commission, and City Council. There may be significant changes to the way CPGs operate in the future. Please plan to attend if you're interested.

The UCPG will not meet in December. Happy Holidays to all!

The next meeting will be January 11, 2022, by Zoom.

Finally, the UCPG recognizes Barry's many years of leadership at the UCCA and his assistance in helping the UCPG with community input and information via the UCCA newsletter. Thank you!



# Fire Safety Tips for Kids from the San Diego Fire-Rescue Department

Don't let your kids play with anything that can cause a fire! Doesn't that sound simple? You would be surprised at how many children play with things that can start a fire not realizing how fast a fire can grow. So remind your kids:

- Don't play with matches and lighters.
- Don't play with firecrackers.
- Don't use a candle without an adult in the room.
- · Don't play with BBQ starters.
- Don't light anything on fire to see if it burns. It will and can get out of control in seconds.

Do your kids know what to do if their clothes catch on fire?

- Stop immediately.
- · Drop to the ground.
- Roll over and over, back and forth and cover your face and mouth.

# Get Ready for the Holidays with these Fire Safety Tips

During the winter holiday season period, feelings of joy and excitement reach an all-time high. Sadly, the chances of a fire happening also increases with the festive abundance of electricals and open flames.

The number one cause of home fires is unattended cooking. When you're preparing those special holiday meals, be mindful that you're working with heat and fire. It's easy to find yourself going in and out of the kitchen when you have family and friends over.

To stay safe, you can't be a part of every conversation or be able to drop what you're doing to answer every request. So, if you're cooking, focus on cooking; avoid rushing. Keep looking when cooking.

To help you keep your celebratory time free of fire risks, here are more fire safety tips:

- Avoid placing decorations near candles, fireplaces and heaters and minimize decorations in the kitchen.
- · When you decorate use ornaments that won't catch fire easily.
- If you are using the same lights year after year, check the wires.
- Use LED lights as they are lower in voltage and generate less heat.
- Be careful not to overload outlets or extension cords.
- Use appropriate rated lights and extension cords for outdoor use.
- Turn off/unplug both indoor and outdoor lights when you're not around.
- Be careful when lighting and burning candles. Make sure to fully extinguish matches and place candles in areas where they won't get knocked over and cause a fire and never leave them unattended.
- Keep your tree hydrated.
- Consider an electric menorah and avoid real candles.
- If you're using a fireplace, use a fire screen to keep embers and logs from escaping. Lastly, make sure all embers are fully extinguished before you turn in for the night.

As long as you are sensible during the holidays, there's no reason why your holiday celebrations shouldn't be fire-proof. Safety measures don't have to put a damper on the holiday, but some precautionary steps will give you peace of mind and a holiday season that's unforgettable for all the right reasons.




