
POST OFFICE CELEBRATES 9-21-22 DAY

The University City Post Office celebrated a once-a-century alignment of the date on the calendar - 9.21.22 - with its zip code 92122. Residents were invited to come by for refreshments, obtain the commemorative cancellation and to purchase special envelopes. Councilmember Joe LaCava stopped by to visit with postal workers and purchase his own souvenir envelopes. Former postal workers stopped by pictured from left to right: Mayra Elena-Hernandez, Kathy Latham, and Beth West (above right); and families stopped by the Sweet Treats Truck (above left) on an early dismissal day. "We're excited and honored to host this rare event," said University City Station Manager Yousif Healu. "It recognizes the unique ties between USPS and our Community. We are committed to serving the changing needs of our customers nationwide, from Utica to University City." The Postal Service generally receives no tax dollars for operating expenses and relies on the sale of postage, products, and services to fund its operations.



DATE MEETS ZIP COMMEMORATIVE STAMPS AND ENVELOPES

On 9-21-22, the University City Post Office offered a special postmark, with some residents mailing envelopes to themselves. Commemorative envelopes were also sold, and are still available while supplies last. The artist who created the postmark is Andrew Sanchez, who designed many of the University City banners, the Sunset California mural at Standley Park, and the UC utility box on the corner of Governor & Genesee. This custom design was one of many entries and was chosen in a competitive process by the US Postal Service.

SUMMARY OF UCCA SEPTEMBER 14, 2022

(via Zoom)

Diane Ahern announced that the UCPG approved UCCA's request to expand street banners to include Nobel Dr. and adjoining. The City Council is scheduled to approve the expanded district on 9/20/22.

PURE WATER

Sarah Bowles and Sean McCarty from the City of San Diego provided an update on construction for the Pure Water project. Phase I is to be completed in 2025 and will deliver 30 million gallons per day with an ultimate capacity of 85 million gallons. Clem Wassenberg, Construction Mgr., said that trenching and pipe installation is underway on Executive Dr., and a tunnel under Hwy. 805 is starting. The next street for construction will be Town Center Dr. by yearend. Work is being done both day and night, and there will not be closures or detours. Tunnels will be built under Rose and San Clemente Canyons.

ORGANIC WASTE RECYCLING

Megan Browning, Recycling Specialist, Environmental Services Dept., City of San Diego, described how the City will comply with new state laws requiring the recycling of food scraps, food soiled paper products, coffee filters, yard waste, and related items. There will be new green waste containers that will be picked up by trash haulers every week. Details of what is included will be provided before the program starts. mdbrowning@sandiego.gov.

LEGISLATIVE AND COMMUNITY REPORTS

Spencer Katz, aide to Supervisor Terra Lawson-Remer reported the Board of Supervisors was spending a lot of time to develop programs for the homeless population, including acquiring housing and creating programs to address drug addiction and mental illness.

Ansermio Jake Estrada, aide to Assemblymember Chris Ward, reported the state passed legislation allowing the State to sue gun manufacturers for the sale of certain guns and get them registered. He also reported on legislation allowing multiple housing developments to install solar panels on joint properties.

Krissy Chan, aide to City Councilmember Joe LaCava, reported the light at Lakewood Drive and Governor Ave. will soon be in full operation. New rules for Community Planning Groups to expand and diversify membership has been approved by the City. Expansion of the banner district for UCCA is likely to be approved at the 9/20/22 Council meeting. Cole Reed, aide to State Senator Toni Atkins, reported on bills approved by the legislature: 1) exempt non-profits from sales tax; 2) allow trained nurses to perform abortions; 3) expand conservation of watersheds; 4) establish a statewide library system for children.

Rachel Dugan, aide to US Congressman Scott Peters, reported two bills: 1) streamline of authorizations for medical care, and 2) to accelerate home repair and building after fires and natural disasters. His congressional district was redrawn, splitting the UC area into two different congressional districts.

Chris Nielsen, Chair of the UCPG, reported: 1) The City will present a revised Community Plan on 9/20/22; 2) The UCPG will have a booth at Octoberfest; 3) Changes to the development process will include design plans submitted to the City first, before asking for whole project approval to increase chances of the project being approved.

Kendra Cole, President of EdUCate!, reported that Octoberfest will occur on 10/8/22 at Standley Park. There will be a car show, trolley transportation, beer and wine garden, games for children, vendors, and live entertainment. UCCA, approved \$1,000 to sponsor the event.

A request for funding was made by **Spreckels Bilingual Magnet Elementary School-PTA** to support their annual Jog-a-thon. The Board approved \$500.

Valerie Upham reported there will be a 92122 celebration on 9/21/22 at Standley Park. There will be food trucks. Profits benefit Educate.

Barbara Gellman reported: 1) "Stop the Bleed" training for emergency first aid will occur 9/22/22; 2) Socks for Safety will have a booth at Octoberfest; (3) 21 street captains for Neighborhood Watch are needed.

UCCA welcomes Julie Nydam as our new membership chair; she may be familiar to many as a long-time resident, school administrator and volunteer. We are glad to have her on our team. We anticipate an opportunity to fill the volunteer position of newsletter distributor, the role that Don Hotz currently fills. UCCA prints a newsletter 10 times a year; the distributor position requires a lot of effort for approximately two days a month, 10 times a year, to coordinate the delivery of newsletters. WATER- install device that prevents others from turning on outside water;

ELECTRICITY- install device that prevent others from using outside outlet:

MONEY- secure trash cans, bottles and cans until trash pickup. Shred credit card bills and other documents with personal information.

RETIRED SENIOR PATROL VOLUNTEERS WANTED

The San Diego Police Department's Northern Division is seeking additional members for its Retired Senior Patrol Volunteer (RSVP) Team to serve the communities of La Jolla, Bay Park, Bay Ho, **University City**, Pacific Beach, Mission Beach, Mission Bay, East and West Clairemont as well as the Torrey Pines, Mission Bay and UTC areas.

We know firsthand how busy our San Diego Police Department (SDPD) Officers are and the RSVP Team supports them by patrolling your neighborhood on a daily basis thereby allowing these officers to attend to acute situations. You can be part of the RSVP team and help patrol your own neighborhoods to keep them safe.

RSVP Team duties assist the SDPD and include patrolling neighborhoods, serving as additional eyes and ears for the Police Department, using police radios when necessary to report into the SDPD. RSVP officers assist sworn, uniformed officers with diverting traffic at accidents, crime and fire scenes as well as supporting disaster preparedness and homeland security efforts. They're authorized to issue citations for vehicles violating legal parking in disabled spaces and red zones.

RSVP volunteers provide an extraordinary community service by visiting elderly residents (as part of the "You Are Not Alone" program) to check on their welfare and safety. RSVP officers also perform daily home security checks for residents on vacation as requested.

Volunteers must be at least 50 years of age and possess a valid California driver's license. You will also be required to pass a background check. There are flexible



schedules with a minimum of 3 days per month service in addition to a short, 4th training day.

Message from District 1 Councilmember Joe LaCava

Expansion of the UC Banner District

A special shout-out and thank you to Diane Ahern and Bill Beck of UCCA for their work to expand the UC Banner District. City Council adopted this resolution on September 20th, 2022. The expansion along Nobel Drive will promote cultural and civic events, and community activities of general public interest within University City.

Community Planning Groups and Council Policy 600-24

Community Planning Groups (CPGs), like your University Community Planning Group, have a long and rich history in San Diego. They consist of 500+ volunteers and provide a structured forum for residents, property owners, and business representatives to advise the city on a variety of projects and priorities within each community.

In 2019, the City Attorney issued a legal analysis calling for structural change of CPGs. The analysis outlined options in which CPGs could operate legally under the Charter, our city's constitution. On one end of the spectrum, CPGs would be required to have all 500+ volunteers appointed by the mayor, eliminating their autonomy to elect their own leaders. At the other end was the elimination of all ties between CPGs and the city. Neither option was acceptable to me. Therefore, I brought forward a reform package that preserved CPGs and brought them into compliance with the law.

My personal journey is tightly linked with my own CPG experience and I wanted to preserve local voices in the planning of their community's future. I brought forward a reform package that upheld CPGs' vital role in community planning and complies with the Charter. The proposal also preserves CPG autonomy to elect their board members, encourages greater community participation, and continues the city's technical, educational, and financial support.

After 20 months of collaboration with the Mayor's Office, City Attorney's Office, Planning Department, and dozens of presentations to multiple CPGs (including UCPG), the Community Planners Committee, Planning Commission, and City Council Land Use & Housing Committee, my proposed amendments to Council Policy 600-24 were adopted by City Council on September 13th. CPGs will have more than one year, until December 31, 2023, to transition to the new rules.

Fiscal Year 2024 Budget Season

On June 27th, 2022, Council unanimously voted to accelerate the due date for Councilmembers' Fiscal Year 2024 Budget Priority Memoranda from January 2023 to September 30th, 2022. This also moved up the due date for Councilmembers to submit Capital Improvement Project (CIP) priorities to October 7th, 2022. This measure was put forth to better ensure that Councilmembers' budget priorities are considered as city departments and the Department of Finance begin work on the budget. I am grateful for your community input this budget season and for the UCPG submission of the community's priorities. I am coordinating with District 6 Councilmember Chris Cate to ensure that your community's budget priorities are not lost in the transition. Councilmember Cate has been welcoming and a good partner as we transition from District 1 to District 6.

Farewell and Welcome

Thank you, Captain Wahl, for your dedication to UC and all of SDPD's Northern Division. It has been our pleasure to work with you. We wish you all the best in your future endeavors and look forward to collaborating with and supporting you in new ways. Welcome back, Captain Erwin Manansala. We are well aware of your experience and esteem with UC residents and business. We also look forward to partnering with you as you assume command of Northern Division.

UC Residents Learn to Stop the Bleed

On Thursday, September 22, Scripps Memorial Hospital La Jolla and members of the Trauma Research Education Foundation (TREF) partnered with the UCCA Neighborhood Watch to hold the first in-person Stop the Bleed training class in over 2.5 years, with 26 participants. The Stop the Bleed Campaign is a public educational program that is the product of a collaborative effort of many organizations and represents the current best practice recommendations for how to manage life-threatening bleeding.

One of the most common causes of preventable death after traumatic injury is uncontrolled bleeding. With the right training, YOU can help save lives! Data from the Hartford Consensus states that 20% of traumatic deaths are preventable. It is estimated that in the state of California, the lives of 3,811 people could be saved each year with the use of effective bleeding control techniques.

In response to the pandemic, the Stop the Bleed campaign developed an online version of the program to learn the didactic or classroom portion of the training. You can access the online training at www.stopthebleed.org/training/. After the online portion is completed, it is vitally important to learn the hands-on portion of the class where participants can learn how to effectively use the techniques of Pressure, Packing, and Compression. Participants also learn the proper use of tourniquets for uncontrolled bleeding.

Community Planning Update Subcommittee 9/20/22 Meeting Summary

Agenda and supporting documents for this meeting, and previous meetings can be found at: www.planuniversity.org/. The meeting was held via ZOOM, with agenda and presentations at www.planuniversity.org/meetings

Public Comments:

Linda Beresford asked the planning dept to answer the previous questions submitted. The FAQ response on the website changed the questions and did not provide data.

Diane Ahern announced the 9-21-22 celebration and the Miramar Airshow's return.

Suzy Shamsky has made several public records requests. The planning department responded with incomplete responses and the Mayor's office has not responded at all. Public records requests legally require responses.

David Broide The planning departments FAQ to previous asked questions was vague and too general. Requested that chair and subcommittee work on alternative land use proposal.

Jen Dunaway: Will the community be given input to land use? Will the city answer the questions asked. This should be a collaborative process.

Jess O'Sullivan: (CirculateSD) - wants more homes and transit oriented development.

Vedant Patel: wants increased housing. Housing development has lagged job growth.

Debby Knight: no information was received prior to the meeting to allow subcommittee members to prepare. City needs to provide presentations in advance.

Andy Wiese: Reiterated need for data in advance of meetings. Rachel Graham: supports zoning changes for more housing. Agenda Items:

Nancy Graham: Smart growth study is a deliverable to SANDAG due in Oct. Presenting it to CPU as promised prior to delivery.

Diego Velasco: Reviewed urban design concepts, placemaking, and five focus areas.

Nancy Graham: Presentation on inputs to land use scenarios. Existing conditions, community input, travel behavior, per capita vehicle miles traveled (VMT), mode choice report, Climate Action Plan goals.

Suchi Lukes: Presentation on Blueprint SD. Land use options based on transit opportunities. Said updated plan needed as an input to predict growth needs.

Agenda item comments fell into three categories:

Resident concerns: Concern about new plan first to model future growth is wrong order of operations; concern about scale of density proposals; concern that models being presented are not transparent and assumptions and data should be made available. Transit should not be driving growth. Need for actual parks, not just 'placemaking' areas that may not be kid friendly. Concern that new housing being proposed would be expensive, vs moderate priced, and new residents less likely to be transit users and bike riders. Concern that one of the maps presented shows need for growth in open spaces.

Student concerns: Need more housing.

Business concerns: Like the plan, agree with density along the trolley line.

The draft proposal will be presented to the Planning commission as a workshop on 9/29/22 at 9:00am. The next Plan Update meeting is scheduled for 10/8/22. Location and format to be determined. To register for notifications on CPU meetings go to www.planuniversity.org/contact.

University Community Planning Group Meeting Report

The UCPG was pleased to recommend approval of the revised UCCA Banner District to our Councilmember in a unanimous vote on September 13, 2022. This revision to the existing Banner District expands it to include Nobel Drive from Lebon to the I-805, Genesee from Centurion Square to Nobel, and Towne Centre Drive from Nobel to Excalibur Way. A City Council resolution on September 20 was made to commemorate this achievement. Congratulations to the UCCA!

The UCPG voted to secure a booth at Oktoberfest, Saturday October 8, 2:00-6:00pm, at a cost of \$70. The UCPG will be doing membership outreach, so stop by at our booth!

The UCPG was asked to provide a list of five to six "Budget Priority Projects" to our council office. Our current and new District 6 councilmember will use this list when setting budget requests for the year beginning in July 2023.

The Board agreed with Ruth DeSantis that the best strategy is to place items on the Budget Priority List that are "design" requests rather than requests for an entire project. Once the city has a design for a large project, it greatly increases the chance that the project can be funded by the city or through grants. The south UC library and Marcy park are recent examples. The vote was unanimous to recommend the following projects:

Priority Project Title & Specific Funding Request

- Vista La Jolla Streetlights Fully fund the streetlights at \$150,000
- Genesee and Governor Safe Crossing Fund Project Items 1 and 2 at \$28,000
- 3. Marcy Park Maintenance and Improvements Fund further maintenance and improvements
- University Community Library Renovation and Expansion -Fund further renovations, building on initial \$1.6 million funding
- Standley Park Recreation Center and Playground Upgrades - Fund design and engineering plans at \$500,000



Traffic Light Operational at Governor & Lakewood

There's a new traffic signal in town at the interaction of Governor and Lakewood. The traffic light will make it easier for pedestrians crossing Governor Drive to get safely to and from ball fields and playground at Gardens Park on the north side of Governor. It will also make it safer for motor vehicles to enter and exit Lakewood. The signaling is programmed to stay green for Governor Drive traffic until either a pedestrian activates the crosswalk light or a motor vehicle is detected stopped on Lakewood waiting to travel onto Governor. If the traffic light is red to vehicular traffic on Governor Drive, it is because either a pedestrian or a motor vehicle is attempting to cross the intersection.



Fire Prevention Week - October 9-15

What is fire prevention? It is a proactive method by which the public is educated on how to take precautions to prevent potentially harmful fires, and to be educated about surviving them. In 1922, the National Fire Protection Association designated the second week of October, FIRE PREVENTION WEEK in commemoration of the Great Chicago Fire which began on October 8, 1871, and burned until early October 10. Over 300 people lost their lives, 3.3 square miles of Chicago was destroyed and more than 100,000 residents were homeless.

Fire Prevention Week is dedicated to raising fire safety awareness, and to help ensure your home and family are protected. Can you answer YES to all these questions?

- Have you installed smoke and carbon monoxide detectors on every level of your home and/or outside sleeping areas?
- Do you test these alarms every month and change their batteries when you adjust your clocks?
- 3. Do all family members know your family's fire escape plan and practice it?
- 4. Do you know that smoke is poisonous and that in a fire, it is best to get down on your hands and knees and crawl to the nearest exit, closing doors behind you?
- 5. Did you know more home fires start in the kitchen than any other room in the home and that the number one cause of these fires is unattended cooking?
- 6. Do you have and know how to use a fire extinguisher?
- 7. Do you know that if there is a fire in your home you should get out, stay out - never go back and only call for help once you are out?
- Did you know that the best defense against a fire is to be prepared? ARE YOU PREPARED?

How to use an extinguisher

Having a fire extinguisher won't help you much when you need it most if you don't also understand how it works and how to use it. "PASS" is a simple acronym used to describe the four basic steps in using a fire extinguisher:

PULL the pin. All fire extinguishers have a pin at the top that has to be removed before the extinguisher can be used.

AIM at the base of the fire. Never aim at the flame itself.

SQUEEZE the handle. That releases the fire retardant in the extinguisher.

SWEEP from side to side. Again, keep aiming at the base of the fire until it is out. Even then, keep the extinguisher at the ready and your eye on the area in case the fire re-ignites.

A portable fire extinguisher can be a life and property saver if used to attack a smaller, still contained blaze. However, a fire that has begun to spread will overmatch even the most powerful portable fire extinguisher. In such cases, the most important thing to do is to look first to your safety and the safety of others by conducting an orderly retreat until you are out of harm's way.

Don't let a natural disaster destroy your legacy. While wildfires are a year-round threat to the San Diego region, fall is peak fire season. But that's not all. In addition to wildfires, San Diego faces other natural disaster hazards such as earthquakes and flooding.

Creating a personal disaster plan helps people consider how and where families will reunite if phone lines are affected and they are separated. It also helps gather important phone numbers for quick reference if phone lines are not affected. Families or individuals can plan how they would respond to an earthquake in various locations such as home, work or school, and determine which areas in each room would be safest to drop, cover and hold on in. In the case of a house fire, families can discuss how and where to escape.

Gathering emergency supplies such as water, nonperishable food, medications, and special dietary needs as well as flashlights, batteries, a radio and first aid materials will also be a critical part of your plan.
