SUMMARY OF UCCA MEETING

May 10, 2023 (Held via Zoom) by Jim Beshears, UCCA Secretary

President's Report - Diane Ahern reported: (1) Organic waste recycling program will start by July. Those who have a Monday trash pickup will be contacted by the City to receive bins for organic waste removal. (2) 21 UC High School graduating seniors will be featured on banners throughout the UC area.

Legislative and Community Reports

Sarah Bowles/Clem Wassenberg of the City Pure Water project provided construction updates as follows: (1) Tunnelling under San Clemente Creek at Hwy 52 and Genesee is underway. (2) Laying the two pipelines is proceeding North on Genesee towards Governor Dr. (3) Tunnelling under Fwy 805 is proceeding. (4) Laying the pipes south on Town Centre Dr. towards La Jolla Village Dr. is under way with work at the intersection expected to start in June 2023. Bike riders and pedestrians will be detoured. (5) Ms. Bowles is meeting with local businesses to coordinate work schedules and minimize interruption. (6) Mr. Wassenberg said the "Welcome to University City" sign in the median on Genesee north of Hwy. 52 will not be affected by the construction. (7) Mr. Wassenberg also said they were trying to protect the trees in the median on Genesee between the High School and Governor Dr. but will need to have the City's arborist confirm if possible. If required, the trees will be replaced. (8) While under construction, it will not be possible to turn left on north bound Genesee at La Jolla Village Dr. (9) A water pumping system will be installed at Hwy. 52 and Genesee to prevent flooding of the tunnel.

Chris Nielsen, chair of the UCPG, reported: (1) The City is generating a map of sustainable development areas showing walking distances to transportation. (2) He said that SB10 applies to both multi-family and single-family, with the number of units possible for single-family properties set at one unit/1000 square feet of lot size. (3)Parking is not required within a mile of a present or future transit location. (4) Once SB10 is implemented, the zoning action cannot be undone (state law). Linda Beresford, a leader of "Help Save UC", said their organization was also responding to the City to change the proposed community plan to: (1) Limit units on high rise developments to 105 per acre rather than around 285 proposed by the City; (2) Limit residential units at the Sprouts center to 29 per acre with buildings 40 ft. tall; (3) Limit residential units at the Vons center to 54 per acre with buildings 50 ft. tall; (4) Zoning for the centers must "require" that commercial uses be retained; (5) There must be one parking space per unit in the centers (the City has proposed 0); (6) Governor Dr. would stay 4 lanes; (7) Some of the residential units must meet affordable housing requirements.

Kendra Cole. of Educate!, reported it won the Non-Profit of the Year award for the district of State Senator Brian Jones.

Azalea Ebbay, from San Diego Public Library, announced the north branch UC library is now also open on Sundays, 1:00-5:00pm.

Dustin Nguyen, aide to City Council Member Kent Lee, reported the Councilmember was going to Washington DC to seek funding for infrastructure costs.

Marc Schaefer, aide to State Senator Brian Jones, reported the following: (1) The senator sent a letter to the PUC re fixed rate utility charges based on household income, with \$180,000 the cutoff for subsidies. (2) He proposed SB 14 regarding public safety and trafficking of minors. (3) He is working on contractor licensing and those without licenses. (4) Bills proposed to toughen laws regarding fentanyl dealing are held up at this time.

Evan Bridgham, aide to County Supervisor Terra Lawson-Remer, reported: (1) The Supervisor will be at a "Meet and Greet" at Nobel Recreation Center on June 26 at 6:15pm. (2) Supervisor District 4 will have a special election on August 15. If no candidate receives 50%, a runoff election will be held. (3) The County is working on housing for the homeless, including hiring mental health professionals to help in transition. (4) The grant for \$15,000 to UCCA was announced with proceeds to be used for communication (newsletter, letters).

Barbara Gellman, of Neighborhood Watch (NW), reported: (1) NW was replacing several signs that were weathered and having "street meetings". (2) It is time to sign up for address curb painting at uccurbpainting@gmail.com. (3) New style of socks as of June 1 are available with funds going towards NW. (4) If reporting a crime, do not use the Next Door app but call the SDPD.

To help you prepare for the June meetings, we have included May meeting summaries and the details of the upcoming June meetings in the pages of this June print newsletter and on UCCA's UniversityCityNews.org website. Please submit comments and suggestions to the Planning Department by emailing your comments to planuniversity@sandiego.gov. Suggestions will be accepted on the first draft until June 30, 2023, with additional opportunities for feedback to come.

June is also the month that the Fire Department is preparing for wildfire by increasing training and outreach to remind us to prepare ourselves, our families, and our homes in case of fire in our area. We are also looking forward to July summer events such as Summer Movies, 4th of July UC Celebration and the Summer Concerts.

Have you seen them? UCHS student leaders have been chosen by school staff to represent University City and the High School on the San Diego County Fair banners which are now displayed on Governor and on Genesee. Congratulations to the UC Library on Governor for celebrating its first 50 years and to EdUCate! for another successful Taste of the Triangle and for being named the Nonprofit of the Year by State Senator Brian Jones.

If you have garbage collection by City crews from Environmental Services with Monday pickup, watch for the notice in the US Mail about the new kitchen pail and organic waste recycling. June could be known as construction season in University City as Pure Water crews are hard at work on Genesee and on Executive Drive as well as Towne Centre Drive and (coming soon) on La Jolla Village Drive. Sarah Bowles and the Pure Water team will provide a construction update at the June UCCA meeting.

Our University City News print newsletter is unique. It is the only source of hyperlocal news in University City. You'll find news and features here that you won't find anywhere else. BUILDING CONFIDENCE, TEAMWORK, RESPONSIBILITY AND TRUST

This is what Officer Dante Romano and Officer Cody Wolf are doing through the School Safety Patrol program that is run by the San Diego Police Department Juvenile Services Officers and Administration. There are over 80 schools and approximately 1,800 5th grade students who participate in this program across the city of San Diego. Curie and Spreckels



Elementary schools are just two of the 15 schools who participate within Northern Division.

The teachers select the students who then go into training. Typically, four students are assigned each day for morning and after school patrols. The patrol controls traffic by using stop signs placed 50 feet on both sides of the crosswalk and using whistle commands that lets vehicles know when to stop and pedestrians know when to cross. They wear a uniform on the day they are assigned. The program runs from September to June. The officers meet with each school once a week and monitor the morning and afternoon patrol shift/traffic. Every month they put on events that are offered to the students as a reward for their hard work; sometimes it is Padres or Gulls games, Rockin' jump, Midway event and others.

The children of School Safety Patrol give hundreds of hours of their own time during their commitment to the program. They are dedicated, confident and strong role models for their peers. They are truly proud of being a member of this program. This also gives them the opportunity to know, at an early age, that our police care about them and community safety; it sets the stage for a more positive relationship with law enforcement and encourages volunteerism at an early age.

We thank Officers Romano and Wolf for their commitment to these children with just one of the many programs available through the SDPD.

UPDATES FROM OFFICER BROWN

as provided at the May UCCA Meeting

Officer Brown, Community Liaison Officer of the SDPD reported:

- (1) SDPD has been monitoring rallies in Clairemont and UC to make sure there were no illegal activities occurring.
- (2) An outreach team was contacting homeless people in the area and providing contacts for assistance.
- (3) The SDPD was having a higher presence by schools to help prevent incidents.
- (4) The Northern Division of the SDBD has three new officers and two new detectives. Also, seven new officers have been assigned to tourist assistance and regulation.

Gift Card Season is Here; What to Know about Scams by District Attorney Summer Stephan

You've likely seen the rows and rows of colorful gift cards at the supermarket. But as with anything, there is a dark side to having gift cards hanging within easy reach of fingertips and scammers have found a way to exploit the convenience through card skimming or card swapping. Before you buy that graduation or wedding gift card, keep reading.

Card skimming is when the fraudster has already copied the unique gift card bar code number and PIN from the gift card. When an unsuspecting consumer buys and activates that gift card, the fraudster, who already has the barcode number and PIN, uses those funds before the legitimate consumer makes a purchase or the fraudster siphons the funds from the card.

Tip: Make sure the PIN number on the card you purchase has not yet been scratched off.

Card swapping involves a scammer stealing a stack of physical cards from the retail store outlet and then replacing original barcode with a counterfeit barcode sticker. The scammer will then return the cards to the store and re-hang them on the rack. When a consumer purchases and loads one of the cards with cash, the money goes directly into the fraudster's bank account rather than the gift card. When the consumer tries to use the gift card the balance is \$0. The consumer will have no idea the funds they loaded were stolen until they attempt to use the card. The business will show the funds were loaded on the card but be unaware it was actually loaded to a counterfeit account. *Tips:*

- When buying a gift card, opt for the ones that are kept under lock and key by the retailer.
- Always check that the barcode is original and does not appear to be tampered with.
- There should not be a sticker on top of the original barcode.



Preserving the Campgrounds

It's almost summer and camping season is coming up. It's important to take care of our campgrounds so we can protect and preserve them for other generations. The Leave No Trace seven principles can help ensure that we do just that. 1) Know Before You Go. When you go camping, you need to know what the campground and environment rules are before you arrive with something that might be banned from the area. 2) Choose the Right Path. This is important because you should be prepared for all kinds of weather and terrain, but if you are not. it's safest to choose the right path suited for your gear. 3) Trash your Trash. We need to keep the campgrounds clean. Littering can harm the wildlife and hurt the environment. 4) Leave What You Find. This is important because removing something natural might have some effect on the environment. It could be an animal's home. Plus, if you take it, someone else won't be able to find it and enjoy it too. 5) Be Careful with Fire. When using fire for things such as a campfire, be sure to watch it carefully, because if it gets out of control, it can start a wildfire and even destroy an entire forest. 6) Respect Wildlife. When camping, you may see animals like deer, birds, and even elk. It's important to stay far enough away from them so you stay safe and so do they. You must remember this is their home, not yours. 7) Be Kind to Other Visitors. The more people that know and respect the ecosystem the better. It's helpful to teach others about the campgrounds and the rules that come with it so that they can help teach others too. Use these principles when you go camping this year to have a fun and safe time. Remember, Leave No Trace!

UC Planning Group Meeting Update

Among the items heard at the May 9 UCPG meeting were:

- An update from the Pure Water construction team describing the upcoming modifications to the Towne Centre Drive and La Jolla Village Drive as the pipeline crosses this intersection.
- UC San Diego gave an information item regarding a new development to be built in their East Campus Science Research Park, consisting of about 1.1 million square feet, to get feedback on the development proposal.
- A sign project for the La Jolla Commons office building complex.
 The owner was seeking a recommendation for approval from the UCPG after receiving approval from the Development Services Dept. UCPG voted to recommend approval, voting 11 Yes, 1 No.
- The 11011 Torreyana Road development of 203,000 sq. ft. building
 for biotech research and development. There were significant
 questions raised about the plant palette proposed and proximity of
 visitor parking close to the canyon edge. The project was
 conditionally approved on a vote of vote of 5 Yes, 4 No. The
 developer was sent letters from Isabelle Kay and Debby Knight
 outlining a native plant palette appropriate for the project location.
- A proposal from SANDAG for a Rapid 41 bus service was heard.
 This route does not have funding but SANDAG is conducting community outreach for it.
- An information item on an Alexandria redevelopment project called "One Alexandria Square 7" was given. This project is located at 10995 Torreyana Road and proposes a 110K sq. ft. building to replace an 85K sq. ft building. It will be heard at the UCPG on June 13 for a final project recommendation.
- An information item from Alexandria regarding a mobility initiative in the Campus Pointe area. The project includes a new parking structure, transit hub, adaptive signals, and two cut throughs from Campus Pointe Drive to Genesee Ave.

Comments to Planning Commission by Chris Nielsen

The San Diego Planning Commission hosted a workshop on the University Community Plan Update (CPU) in May. I attended the workshop to share feedback from the Plan Update Subcommittee and the community regarding the Plan Update Community Discussion Draft. The Plan Update Subcommittee will continue discussions this month and provide a series of recommendations on the Draft to the University Community Planning Group (UCPG) in June. The UCPG will make its set of recommendations to the Planning Department in July. Here is a summary of the comments I made to the Planning Commission:

- Pointed out the positive parts of the Draft Plan: fair housing, housing near transit and jobs, affordable minimums, open space, regulations, for shopping plazas, regulations adjacent to open space, and implementation specifications.
- Pointed out issues with housing: displacement, affordability, and density.
- North UC around Nobel: proposed mixed-use yields to more competitive biotech and tech use. Recommended community village rather than mixed-use to protect uses including retail, small service, and housing.
- South UC shopping plazas: preserve grocery, pharmacy, with careful setbacks, step backs in building height, development scaled to adjacent community of one and two-story uses, and a lower height limit than 100 feet.
- Maximum of 143 DU/A, for a 6 to 10 story limit, use Mesa Nueva UCSD model with multiple bedroom types.
- Focus on displacement of most vulnerable in community on SW corner of Nobel and Genesee.
- · Support for three linear parks and the Executive Drive Paseo.
- Serious concern for the large Park's deficit of 4,900 points, a shortage of facilities for 49,000 people.
- Recommended the city do actual traffic studies prior to street changes, even if this means delaying implementation.
- Recommended separate bike infrastructure throughout to assure meeting Climate Action Plan goals.

Non Agenda Public Comment:

Roger Cavnaugh (RC): Divisiveness causes fear. Unity and focus is needed.

Jen Dunaway: 17 community plans are older than ours, why us? City should provide specific answers to questions asked. Schools won't have enough space with proposed density.

Rachel Graham: Bike and Transp. Study shows people with disabilities use public transport.

Michelle Yean: Density next to a fault line. Need for emergency service access.

Chris Nielsen: Summarized planning commission workshop.

Agenda

Andy Wiese (AW): Subcommittee will conclude work after June and submit a report to UCPG. Introduced subject of commercial plazas. Require adequate parking for customers and residents. Setbacks and stepbacks needed when adjacent to existing residential. Height limits needed. Need to be interconnections between businesses. Less density at Sprouts because of lack of transit. Consensus among subcommittee on height limits and density proposed by Help Save UC for Sprouts and Vons.

Linda Beresford: presented proposals from Help Save UC. Proposal would double population without funding parks. No funding for increased transit. 50' height limit, 54 du/acre at Vons. 30' height limit, 29 du/acre at Sprouts. Don't reduce lanes on Governor because of school traffic.

Petr Krysl (PK): Need to remember pocket parks. Transit is a part of the Climate Action plan.

George Latimer (GL): Vons and Sprouts should have similar density. Keith Jenner (KJ): Sprouts lacks transit. Density across from Curie is problematic.

AW: Move to La Jolla Village. Consensus that appropriate area for more density if coastal height limits removed. Should be a mix of retail and residential, not office/biotech. Parking for customers and residents. There is consensus of 143 du/acre. Height limit of 85-100' with appropriate setbacks and stepbacks adjacent to existing residential. Pedestrian and bike safety important. Keyser Marston is looking at the subcommittee's request to increase inclusionary housing percentage. Bad policy to remove existing housing and replace it with expensive market rate housing.

Laurie Philips (LP): Doesn't want more density at LJV. Area needs a park. Supports height limit of 30-50'. Increase in retail to serve added population.

DK: Bikeability terrible in area. concerned about displacing residents near transit. Lower income more likely to use public transit.

PK: Need to have higher buildings to carve out land for parks and plazas

RC: Developers should pass through/protect lower rents to the displaced households.

Jesse O'Sullivan (CirculateSD): Higher percent of inclusionary units required will discourage developers. Is ok with in-lieu fees and offsite inclusionary units.

Susan Baldwin: Former planner, worked on last plan. Stronger language should be used. Would like to see Land Value Capture used to fund community public works.

Joann Sellick: Need to plan for older and/or disabled residents.

AW: Switching gears to <u>parks</u>: City should be required to follow the parks master plan. JCC is on public land - when its lease is up it should be more publicly available.

DK: Add the word "restore" in discussion of open space. Wildlife corridors are important. Urban design and parks should use native plants. Linear Parks should be run by Park & Rec's departments. Many comments on parks section of discussion draft.

PK: University is well below points by Parks master plan metrics.

RC: Parks and open space important to avoid Nature deficit disorder. Isabelle Kay: Would like all parks to have public restrooms and add in community garden space.

The next meeting will be from 5:30-8:30pm on June 20, 2023, in person, at the Nobel Rec Center meeting room.

Help Save UC Comments on Community Plan Draft

On April 11, the City of San Diego Planning Department issued the Discussion Draft for the University Community Plan Update. On May 4, volunteer community organization Help Save UC submitted its written comments on the proposed Plan. A copy of these comments can be found at www.HelpSaveUC.org.

The comments focused mostly on the Vons and Sprouts shopping centers on Governor Drive, and included requests to 1) lower the proposed density at both shopping centers; 2) reduce the 100-foot height limit for each shopping center to 50 feet at Vons and 40 feet at Sprouts; 3) include at least 30-foot setbacks from rear and side property lines; 4) require at least one parking space on site for new residents; and 5) include language to protect existing commercial services and require such services to be included in future projects.

Help Save UC presented these comments at the May 16 Community Plan Update Subcommittee meeting. After reviewing the written comments and hearing the presentation, most Subcommittee members indicated support for Help Save UC's proposed changes.

Help Save UC also raised concerns about the general increase in density (potentially doubling the community's population), considering the lack of significant additional park space and the uncertainty that the City can implement the infrastructure necessary to support such increased density.

Earthquake!

Over the past few years, there have been a few minor earthquakes in our area however, many of us may not have felt or even been aware of them. In this article, I will try to give you important things you need to know if a larger earthquake happens.

Earthquakes are the sudden, rapid shaking of the earth, caused by the breaking and shifting of underground rock. They can happen anywhere and without warning. They can cause items to fall, buildings to collapse, fires to start, landslides, avalanches and tsunamis resulting in injuries and property damage.

Just as with fire drills, prepare how to stay safe by practicing "Drop, Cover and Hold On!" Drop to your hands and knees. Cover your head and neck with your arms. Crawl only as far as needed to reach cover from falling items. Hold on to any sturdy furniture until the shaking stops.

To be prepared, secure heavy items, such as televisions, furniture and other such objects with specially designed straps. Store heavy and breakable objects on lower shelves. Create an outdoor family meeting location. Assemble a supply kit that includes: enough food and water for at least three days per person, a flashlight, a fire extinguisher, and a whistle. Consider each person's specific needs, including medication. Do not forget the needs of your pet. Have extra batteries and charging devices for phones and other critical equipment. Most standard homeowner's insurance policies do not cover earthquake damage so, if affordable, consider obtaining an earthquake insurance policy.

After an earthquake, expect aftershocks. Check yourself and love ones for injuries, if you have the training, provide aid to others. If you are in a damaged building, go outside and quickly move away. If you are trapped, try to cover your mouth with a wet cloth. Send a text, bang on a pipe or wall, or blow that whistle so rescuers can locate you. Save cell phone calls for emergencies. Once you feel safe, monitor local news via battery operated radio, TV and cell phone for emergency information and instructions. Use extreme caution during post-disaster clean-up of buildings and around debris.

Maximizing Transit Investments

Editor's Note: On April 4, the City of San Diego released the University Community Plan Update Discussion Draft for public review. The updated Community Plan will guide the area's development over the next 30 years. This article continues the City's discussion of the five priorities of the plan.

In November 2021, the MTS Blue Line Trolley service running from downtown San Diego to the University City community opened to riders. This marked a momentous occasion and a significant investment in regional infrastructure that we must make the most of, along with the other high-frequency transit stations.

The updated University Community Plan can make the most of this regional investment by providing more efficient transportation connections, focusing new development near transit, and creating public spaces where people can hang out and enjoy the company of others.

While public transportation is an asset, better walking/rolling and biking connections between transit stations and activity centers are needed to encourage more people to use public transportation. The last-mile connection, which is the path between a transit stop and a person's final destination, is especially important in encouraging people to use transit. Last-mile connections should offer a safe and enjoyable path for transit riders, which can include sidewalks and bike lanes, rideshare services, micromobility and amenities like parcel delivery lockers, public Wi-Fi and convenient passenger loading areas.

An updated University Community Plan will also emphasize creating transit-oriented development, which focuses on placing new homes and jobs near transit. It promotes healthy and active lifestyles, offers convenient access to neighborhood resources, and promotes a safe and clean environment with reduced greenhouse gas emissions and traffic congestion.

When creating transit-oriented development, it's important to ensure the design focuses on the people who will be using it. In particular, the first two floors of a building are important because they determine how people will perceive the building in relation to its surroundings. These floors can shape the way the building interacts with the surrounding neighborhood and can affect people's experiences. Finer details like lighting, art and seating should be offered at a human scale. Spaces in and around transit stations should be filled with the amenities, resources, spaces and infrastructure people need to connect.

Incorporating these priorities into an updated University Community Plan will help provide safe and inviting spaces to use and enjoy while also capitalizing on the Blue Line Trolley Extension and other high-frequency transit stations.

The City values community feedback and uses it to help inform how the plan can best guide the future of the community to improve the lives of all San Diegans.

MCAS Miramar Opens Base for Community Tour

At the invitation of Community Plans and Liaison Officer Kristin Camper, I visited MCAS Miramar last month. Commanding Officer CL Marty Bedell made some welcoming remarks. He talked about integrating the base into the surrounding communities as a way of improving the quality of life of the approximately 4000 Marines living in the barracks and give the communities a better opportunity to understand what goes on at the base. He talked about his use of noise complaints to correlate with flight activity to identify squadrons that do not follow the flight rules. Visiting squadrons that do not follow the rules are not invited to return.

The Airfield Operations Officer, Major Justin Campbell, provided a flight operations brief. He displayed a graphic of an overlay of flight paths covering 24 hours of take-offs and landings. I was surprised at the number of flight tracks on the graphic and that they were grouped into several tight twisting bundles. We learned that the weekly average of take-offs and landings at MCAS Miramar exceeds 200 per day including both fixed wing aircraft and helicopters; and that most of the take-offs and landings from Miramar were following the same routes.

We heard details about how the Miramar tower handles non-military traffic passing through Miramar air space. This air traffic typically includes city and county police helicopters, air ambulances, and both commercial and private flights originating at airports such as Montgomery Field, San Diego International, and Gillespie Field.

Our group then took a tour of the base with an emphasis on F-35B with a description of its capabilities and the extent of Marine training with our NATO partners. The pilot who showed us around the F35 had flown F35s from a British aircraft carrier. This was my first time on the base; it was much larger and the maintenance facilities and hangar areas were much more extensive than I expected.

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

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
