SUMMARY OF UCCA MEETING

June 14, 2023 (Held via Zoom) by Jim Beshears, UCCA Secretary

Officer Anderson Brown, of SDPD, reported: (1) There will be a Neighborhood Watch event at Standley Park on August 1. (2) On June 11, at Governor and Mercer, two males got into an altercation, and one pulled a gun. The gun bearer was taken into custody. (3) The homeless encampment ordinance goes into effect on July 31. No camping in parks and schools will be allowed. Police may remove campers from public sidewalks if shelter beds are available. Police officers will be provided updated information on availability.

Sarah Bowles and Clem Wassenberg, of the City Pure Water Project, reported: (1) Community outreach with businesses and homeowner associations are underway for each area affected by construction. Meetings with UC High will occur as construction gets close to the school. (2) Installation of the two pipes is underway at La Jolla Village Dr. and Town Centre Dr., with the intersection expected to be completed by July 2. No left turns through the intersection are allowed during construction. (3) Work will continue south on Town Centre Dr. (4) The repaving of Genesee to Appleton Street in Clairemont to Hwy 52 is completed. Tunnelling under San Clemente Creek is in progress, as is work on Genesee from Hwy 52 to Governor Dr. (5) Updated status of construction is available at 833.882.7973.

Louis Rodolico, Chair of the Fire Safe Council ("FSC") for UC reported: (1) The brush Management report by Merkel & Associates is completed.

(2) The FSC will try to get the City to clear high risk areas on its land.

 $\hbox{(3) Property owners are responsible for clearing their property. (4) It may take 10-15 years to clean up all high-risk areas, but the brush }$

management is proceeding.

Chris Nielsen, chair of the UCPG, reported: (1) The CPUS approved the project by Alexandria on Torrey Pines Road. (2) The response to the City's proposed Community Plan Update (CPU) will be submitted by the CPUS and the UCPG by July 11th. Community input is requested. (3) The City has announced revised rules, and continues to revise rules for Community Planning Groups, including changes to bylaws, ethical guidelines, attendance requirements (attendance at 2/3 of meetings), and diversity requirements to reflect the community. The City also is regulating Planning Groups to comply with the Brown Act and only have public meetings. (4) He said the new owner of the former Costa Verde Shopping Center will make the site safer by doing additional demolition. (5) The owner of the property in South UC with the old golf course is attempting to remove the requirement to keep a golf course on the property and the City is considering allowing the property to be used for storm water retention.

Katie Rodolico, UCCA liaison to CPUS, reported: the CPUS is preparing a response to the City's 200 page "Discussion Draft" of a new CPU addressing some of the following issues: (1) The density, and heights of housing for the Vons Center and the Sprouts Center should be lowered and one parking space per unit should be required (the City proposed no parking for the residential units. (2) City parks need to be expanded to accommodate more people. (3) The impact on schools impacted by more people needs to be addressed.

Legislative Representatives

Michaela Valk, aide to Mayor Todd Gloria, reported (1) Safe parking and safe camping sites for homeless people are being established at two locations east of downtown that are available regardless of shelter status. (2) The new City budget provides for \$140 million for road repair and maintenance, \$50 million for parks and playgrounds, and \$25 million for the police department to hire more administrative personnel to free up officers to do more policing. (3) The City will re-start "Smart Street Lighting" for more cameras and security at selected locations.

Rachel Dugan, aide to U.S Congress Member Scott Peters, reported the Congress member was opening a new office in San Diego, was conducting a webinar on housing, and was providing instructions on how to file application for grants community organizations. Discussions are underway about increasing housing on base at MCAS Miramar.

Community Members

Melissa Martin, of UC Library, reported the library was waiving fees for overdue books and related items. As part of a program with the Padres, new library cards will have Padre logos.

Helen Liebowitz, of Friends of the Library, reported there have been attacks on librarians across the United States, for controversies on the types of books in libraries.

In July, University City is a month of meetings and events. The Planning Group (UCPG) meets on Tuesday, July 11 with both an in-person and Zoom option; the Community Association (UCCA) meets on Wednesday, July 12 by Zoom.

To help you prepare for the July meetings, we have included June meeting summaries and the details of the upcoming July meetings in the pages of this June/July print newsletter and on UCCA's UniversityCityNews.org website.

July is also the month the of UC Celebration on the 4th of July; the return of the Summer Concerts and Summer Movies, and the first ever Standley Summer Safety Splash at the Aquatic Center. Don't Get Conned by a Scam Text

You may have stopped answering calls from unknown phone numbers long ago to avoid fraudsters, but con artists can still sneak into your finances through scam text messages, in a scam known as "smishing" or "phishing." Scammers are impersonating organizations and financial institutions you know and trust to get you to click on links. They use fear and doubt to convince you that if you don't click on a PayPal link, for example, an enormous charge on your account will go through.

According to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC), there were \$330 million in losses to scam texts in 2022 — more than double compared to the previous year. Texts offering free gifts or warning of dire consequences are hard to ignore and scammers know this. This scam is a new flavor of what is commonly referred to as "social engineering." Their goal is to trick you into providing personal information such as your account number, password or Social Security number. Other messages might install harmful malware on your phone that steals your personal or financial information without you realizing it or will give access to the bad actor, allowing them to control your device or install other malware.

The top text scams according to the FTC are:

- Bank fraud prevention alerts
- · Bogus gifts from retailers
- · Fake package delivery problems
- Phony job offers
- Scam Amazon security alerts

Common red-flag tactics in scams texts include:

- You're told to act quickly (urgency is a hallmark of these types of scams).
- You're told there is a problem with your account, so you should click on a link.
- · Spelling errors in the message.
- Offers of free gifts or paid off loans.
- You're asked for personal information from someone you don't know.
- Texts arrive in a group text format.

To avoid these and other text scams, follow these tips:

- Don't click on links or respond to unexpected texts.
- If you think a text might be legitimate, contact the company using a phone number or website you know is real. Don't use the information in the text message.
- Report text scams. Forward them to 7726 (SPAM).
 This helps your wireless provider spot and block similar messages.

The DA's Consumer Protection Unit is composed of Deputy District Attorneys, Investigators and Paralegals dedicated to protecting consumers and law-abiding businesses from fraudulent or unfair business practices. To report a consumer complaint, you can call 619.531.3507 or email consumer@sdcda.org.

New Program: Dolly Parton's Imagination Library

- The statewide expansion of Dolly Parton's Imagination Library launched on Monday, June 5. This expansion, made possible by bipartisan legislation that Senator Atkins authored called SB 1183, allows all California children under the age of five to be eligible to enroll in the program to receive a free book every month in the mail
- The program is currently active in areas across 30 counties in California and this expansion is expected to fully cover the entire state by 2028.

Nonprofit of the Year

- Goodwill Industries of San Diego County was chosen by Senator Atkins to be the 2023 Nonprofit of the Year for the 39th Senate District. The organization was honored on June 7 at a special event in Sacramento for nonprofits selected by the California Legislature.
- In 2022, Goodwill San Diego, which operates 28 retail stores throughout the county, employed nearly 1,600 individuals, over half of whom were people with disabilities or other barriers to employment, and assisted 5,330 San Diego County community members. Through the collection of donated items, Goodwill San Diego diverted over 65 million pounds of materials from landfills, and almost 6 million pounds of electronics were recycled.

Legislative Update

- Friday, June 2 was the floor deadline this year for legislation to move from their house of origin to the opposite house. Pro Tem Atkins' bills that have advanced to the State Assembly include:
 - SB 385, which would expand training for physician assistants to allow them to perform first trimester abortions under their scope of practice was approved by the Senate with 28 "Yes" votes and 8 "No" votes.
 - SB 447, which replaces the state travel ban with a program to encourage acceptance of the LGBTQ+ community. This bill passed with 31 "Yes" votes and 8 "No" votes.
 - SB 487, which strengthens protections for abortion and gender-affirming care for health care providers in our state. This piece of legislation also passed with 31 "Yes" votes and 8 "No" votes.

Circuit / Link+: Now available!

LINK+ is a consortium of libraries in California where patrons can request an item not available from the San Diego Public Library (SDPL). LINK+ is a free service and may be accessed directly at linkencore.iii.com or while using the local catalogs of participating libraries. Materials may be borrowed if they are listed as "available" in the Link+ catalog and items may arrive in as little as 2 to 4 days. Materials will be held for up to 10 days for check-out, with a 21-day loan period and a 21-day renewal. Some of you may be familiar with the San Diego Circuit (circuit.sdsu.edu/) which works the same way as Link+ and is a consortium of San Diego-area public and academic libraries. Both Link+ and San Diego Circuit items may be requested through the online catalog when SDPL items are not available or by using the direct links. Library staff are happy to assist patrons in using these systems.

NEW ORGANIC WASTE RECYCLING

California State Senate Bill 1383 (SB 1383), requires the reduction of organic waste disposed of in landfills. Organic waste is food scraps and food-soiled paper from kitchens and food operations and yard waste such as garden and landscape waste, organic textiles and carpets and wood waste.

In order to comply with SB 1383, and to make San Diego a more sustainable and



thriving place for everyone, the City of San Diego is pleased to introduce a new Organic Waste Recycling program for all City residents. The program – which represents the biggest change to trash and recycling in San Diego's history – supports the City's Zero Waste and Climate Action Plan goals.

In University City, organic waste collection services for households serviced by the City of San Diego's Environmental Services Department is expected to begin by July. As we enter summer, 2023, with more blue skies and warmer temps, I am encouraged by the improved management of aircraft flyover activity at MCAS Miramar since Colonel Bedell assumed command of the base. I was given the privilege

Bedell on June 13 before he addressed the UC Planning Group meeting to express some of my ongoing concerns re: the continued low flying and loud fixed aircraft and jets flying close to my residence near La Jolla Village Drive and Lebon Drive, intermittently day and night. I began the meeting by stating how much I understand and respect that the priority of the military is to be "mission ready 24/7." Kristin Camper, who kindly facilitated the meeting, was also present during the meeting.

I also thanked the colonel for the noticeable improvement in flyover activity since he assumed leadership at MCAS. He expressed his appreciation and extended an invitation to take a tour of the base in the future as Diane Ahern and others did recently. The colonel also stated that he anticipates less flyover activity during 2023 as MCAS is engaged in building projects on the base creating less space for visiting training programs.

I must add that I felt the colonel was genuinely interested in listening to my concerns and came away from the meeting feeling "heard" by Colonel Bedell. I also think the colonel genuinely cares about the safety and competency of the military service members and the concerns of the communities, especially related to safety, who live in close proximity to MCAS. Have fun and learn about water safety at the Standley Summer Safety Splash on Sunday, July 23, from 11:00am to 3:00pm at the Standley Aquatic Center. This free event will feature booths about CPR, life jackets, Parent & Tot Swim Safety Workshops, and have an inflatable obstacle course and foam machine. "We are thrilled to host the Standley Summer Safety Splash to promote lifesaving water safety education while bringing the community together for a fun day at the pool," said Nicole McNeil, District Manager for San Diego's Parks & Rec department.

Teaching local families about water safety is also a mission close to heart for Kevin Makinson, Paramedic Field Supervisor for Falck, the city's 9-1-1 ambulance provider. He grew up in University City and enjoyed swimming at Standley. "Growing up in UC, Standley Pool and Rec were the main hangout spots. I learned so much at both places I felt this was my way of paying it forward," said Makinson, who is helping plan the event. As part of the program, first responders will hold a full simulated emergency response to a drowning incident.

Drowning statistics are trending upward in the County. The Medical Examiner's office reported at 56% increase in drownings from 2020-2021, the last available years' data. Drowning also remains the leading cause of unintentional injury death for infants and toddlers 1-4 years old.

The Standley Summer Safety Splash is put on by the City of San Diego, Falck, the Prevent Drowning Foundation of San Diego, San Diego Project Heart Beat and California Coast Credit Union. The Standley Aquatic Center and Swanson Pool is located at 3605 Governor Drive. For any wishing to stay and make it an evening, the event will be closely followed by a Summer Concert at Standley Park with the Siers Brothers Band scheduled to perform at 5:00pm.

UC Planning Group Meeting Update

The June 13, 2023, UCPG meeting began with a short informal talk by the Base Commander, Col. Thomas Bedell, from MCAS Miramar. He reviewed his own background as a pilot, previewed some upcoming base activities such as the Miramar Air Show, scheduled for September 22-24, and a 5K run on the base runway. He also emphasized quality of life issues for the Marines on base involving upgraded housing and gardens.

Karen Martien gave a CIP Subcommittee report detailing recent emails with the Traffic Department that discussed the restriping of bike lanes along Genesee and addition of bike boxes at Governor and Genesee. These are anticipated to be added after the Pure Water project is finished. She is verifying what will be included in this restriping.

Pure Water presented (see article on page 14 for details).

Steve Pomerenke from Alexandria was replaced as business member by Ana Bryan from Alexandria on the UCPG Board in Business Seat B3C.

The UCPG heard and unanimously recommended approval of a new development in the North Torrey Pines area.

Chris Nielsen gave an overview of the changes the UCPG will have to make as a new Council Policy 600-24 replaces the old one. Among the noticeable changes are meeting attendance requirements to run for the board are eliminated, attendance requirements to retain a seat is 2/3 of meetings in 12 months, and term limits are 8 or 9 years consecutively followed by two years off. Appointed seats are non-voting. Board membership must reflect the makeup of community and should include homeowners, renters, individuals with and without school-age children, and individuals from diverse age groups. CPGs such as the UCPG must refile to retain their right to represent the plan area with the city. Meeting community representation and outreach goals are key measures the city will use to determine if a group should represent a plan area. Competing groups can file. The City Council will make the final determination; the new rules take effect on January 1, 2024.

Finally, Andy Wiese gave a comprehensive review of a draft report by the UCPG's Plan Update Subcommittee detailing areas of consensus and disagreements with the Discussion Draft of the Updated Community Plan. It was presented as an information item. This is a substantial document covering almost all the topics in the Draft except for Mobility and Affordable Housing. Mobility will be addressed at the CPUS meeting on Tuesday June 20, and Affordable Housing will be addressed when Keyser + Marston's housing analysis is presented to the city. This presentation was both to familiarize the UCPG board with the plan update issues and to provide Andy with a trial run for the plan update meeting on Tuesday June 20.

On June 20, the Plan Update Subcommittee voted unanimously to send the report by Andy Wiese, Subcommittee Chair, with modifications made at the meeting to the UCPG, as its recommended comment on the Discussion Draft of the plan. The UCPG will consider the subcommittee report at its meeting on July 11 and make its report to the Planning Department immediately after. This will be the only item on the agenda for the July 11 UCPG meeting.

The UCPG will call a special meeting for Tuesday, August 1, to hear the Torrey Pines State Parks ADA and Utilities project as an action item from the State Parks capital improvements department. This is being finalized as an agenda item as this article went to press. It is anticipated that the meeting will be held in the same venue as the regular UCPG meetings, including the hybrid meeting component over Zoom.

Andy Wiese (AW) opened the meeting by thanking various community members for their assistance in this process, including UCCA for providing the Facebook live streams. He then reviewed the areas of consensus, with noted alternative views, that had been achieved at the previous meeting.

Non Agenda Public Comment:

Katie Rodolico (KR): Announced Meet and Greet with Supervisor Lawson-Remer.

Peter Krysl (PK): Thanked AW for creating the consensus document and chairing the subcommittee.

Barry Bernstein: Announced 4th of July and UC newsletters. Several audience members thanked AW and Chris Nielsen. Agenda:

Andy Wiese (AW): Asked for subcommittee member input on the consensus document and opened the topic of mobility.

KR: Need a traffic study on Governor, Genesee first.

Joanne Selleck: traffic studies should occur periodically/regularly.

Laurie Phillips (LP): Traffic study should be done by an independent party and should also address wildfire egress and emergency response. Keith Jenne (KJ): Traffic study needed on Nobel, near Whole Foods.

AW: Appears to be consensus on need for new data traffic study for Genesee, Nobel, and Governor; bike lanes vs starting/stopping.

Linda Bernstein: Shared bike lines are ok, slow traffic on Governor and improve pedestrian crossings.

Bill Beck: The wide sidewalk in front of Standley can accommodate both bikes and pedestrians, same width as paths in Mission Bay park.

AW: I think we have consensus on two more items: A second connection from Campus Point to Genesee for emergency exit. Alexandria (property owner) is ok with this. Also bike lanes and connectors to run parallel to North Torrey Pines along John Jay Hopkins Drive and Cray Ct. Add this as a policy in the plan.

PK: We have a parks points deficit. City only expects 50% compliance with plans mandate to provide public access park amenities on new development.

Janis Deady (JD): Existing golf course off of Gullstrand removed by property owner. Should be required to be put back due to park deficit. RC: Other infrastructure needs like libraries. Need to require phased development to ensure infrastructure is built before building more.

AW: Would like to see consistency in commercial/residential requirements for onsite public access areas/parks. Would like to see a sliding scale of requirements based on development lot size.

Tom Mullaney: Not a plan since city required elements start at a deficit. Susan Baldwin (SB): Need to look at land value capture since property owners will get a bump in land value when the plan is released. Capture a percentage of that increased value to pay for parks and bike lanes.

Jason Morehead: Comments from Alexandria on the discussion draft plan. Dislikes the specificity of the CPIOZ overlay zone. SDRs don't belong in the community plan. Recreation requirements don't work for every life science tenant. For example: Illumina campus is a secure campus...no public access.

George Lattimer (GL), LP, and SB: discussion of FBA funds, DIF fees under the old system (developer fees stayed in the area) and new city system (fees are used where there is most need). GL is ok with area specific fees since it improves the functionality of the development.

Tom Ruff: Plan should require that land be purchased for parks.

Aiden Lin (AL): Wants transportation options. Multi Family generates more tax revenue than SFR.

AW: Consensus items: Plan needs to address how infrastructure will be paid for. How land will be acquired for parks. City should study strategies to pay for mandated infrastructure like parks. City should protect the easements along major corridors so that future bike lanes can be built. Plan calls for activation of street corridors, which might be in conflict. Vote was taken and subcommittee members present voted unanimously in favor of the consensus items.

Next steps. The updated consensus document will be presented to UCPG on July 11, where they will vote to approve or reject it. The city should have the Draft community plan and draft EIR sometime in late summer. The subcommittee may meet when it is released.

Editor's Note: On April 4, the City of San Diego released the University Community Plan Update Discussion Draft for public review. The updated Community Plan will guide the area's development over the next 30 years. This article continues the City's discussion of the five priorities of the plan.

Providing a range of options for new homes keeps the University Community a welcoming area for existing residents and future generations. The draft University Community Plan Update addresses the need for homes that are affordable to people and families at different income levels and for those who work at the community's growing high-tech and biotech job center.

Living in the University Community would be desirable for many people in our region, but too many people have been priced out. The community is considered a high-resource community since it has easy access to high-paying jobs, high-performing schools and good air quality when compared to other areas in the region. An updated Community Plan will look to create more opportunities for homes, including affordable ones, to allow more people to enjoy the community and call it their home.

Homes for families can also be difficult to find. People with children or intergenerational families, such as grandparents, parents and grandchildren living together, may not be able to easily find homes within walking distance of public transit, schools, parks and everyday needs. The updated draft Community Plan encourages new homes for all income levels that include three or more bedrooms to better accommodate families

The updated draft Community Plan also envisions a greater variety of home types and sizes to meet community members' changing needs. This includes homes that are accessible for people with disabilities and seniors. As San Diego's population ages, creating accessible homes provides additional opportunities for people to continue living in the University Community. To help guide this part of the Community Plan Update, along with the four other priorities, the City of San Diego values public feedback.

City Planning staff will revise the first draft based on public comments received so far and will then release a second draft Community Plan. The second draft will then be available for further public comment in the fall, which will again be updated based on further feedback before it is presented to the City Council for approval. The process to approve the Community Plan Update will begin with a Planning Commission hearing before the end of the year. University Community Plan Update

The Community Plan Update (CPU) has been ongoing for over four and a half years. The process began in October, 2018 with a well-attended community workshop. The members of the Community Plan Update Subcommittee (CPUS) of the UCPG began meeting publicly in January, 2019.



Subcommittee selection included ten representatives from the UCPG (three business and three residential seats as well as a representative from MCAS Miramar and three from UC San Diego (faculty, student, and UCSD planning). In addition, the selection process included three community/business organization representatives (UCCA, Friends of Rose Canyon and Biocom), and six at-large representatives from the local business and residential communities, whose names were drawn from a hat (well, a box) from a vetted list of volunteers.

The CPUS has been working with the city to organize community feedback and has held over 40 public meetings. The process has been dynamic, including the involvement of two mayors, three city council members, three planning directors, and three community planners, in addition to multiple planning section directors, urban designers, traffic engineers and other city staff.

Through it all, the CPU Subcommittee has been the one consistent body engaged with the process. The June CPUS meeting was the third of three public meetings to establish Subcommittee recommendations on the Community Discussion Draft. After three hours of discussion, the subcommittee unanimously approved a list of recommendations and directed the Chair to prepare a report summarizing them for the UCPG. The UCPG will review these at its July 11, 2023 meeting and prepare its own recommendations for the City.

The City will use these recommendations to prepare a revised draft of the Community Plan for Environmental Impact Review (EIR) later this summer. That process will include additional opportunity for public feedback, which may also be incorporated in the Plan. The Planning Department hopes to present the University Community Plan and Final EIR for approval by the City Council before the end of 2023. That process will include final recommendations and a vote by the UCPG, the Parks and Recreation Board and the Planning Commission before review by City Council. Pure Water San Diego Update by Sarah Bowles, City of San Diego

Construction continues in the University City area for the Morena Northern Pipelines & Tunnels project, part of Pure Water San Diego Phase 1 construction.

On Genesee Avenue, crews continue to work from State Route 52 to Governor Drive. Work hours for this project are Monday through Friday from 7:00am to 5:00pm through November 2023. Two-way traffic is maintained, and there will be no intersection closures as part of this work.

Crews began working on Towne Centre Drive from Executive Drive to La Jolla Village Drive in May. Crews completed the intersection of Towne Centre Drive and La Jolla Village Drive in early July and will continue southbound on Towne Centre Drive from La Jolla Village Drive toward Golden Haven Drive throughout July 2023.

Ongoing construction in other areas of the alignment include the tunneling work at the I-805 shaft on Executive Drive and work for the San Clemente Tunnel located at the Genesee Avenue lot at Marian Bear Memorial Park.






