SUMMARY OF UCCA MEETING

November 8, 2023, in-person at UC Library by Jim Beshears, UCCA Secretary

San Diego Police Department Officer Brown introduced Lt. Matthew Botkin of SDPD, the new commander of the Northern Division. Lt. Botkin, has worked for the SDPD for 22 years. He said UC has been active in supporting the police and improving the community. With regards to homeless people on the trolley, he said the SDPD is working with trolley officers and reviewing cameras to monitor.

Pure Water Report - Sarah Bowles and Clem Wassenberg reported that 8,762 linear feet of pipelines have been installed. The first section on Towne Centre Dr., south of La Jolla Village Dr. is expected to be finished in December 2023. In the tunnel under San Clemente Creek and Hwy. 52, workers are installing the two pipes inside casings already installed. The section on Genesee, south of Governor Dr., is finishing up, with curbs and asphalt almost complete. The area of Genesee north to Centurion Square at UCHS is underway. The south entrance to the school will be closed while work is progressing in front of the school. The City arborists have inspected four pine trees on Genesee, north of Governor Dr. and all are expected to survive. Further inspections will occur as trenching continues northwards. The project will be completed by 2025 to start pumping about 7.5 million gallons per day to Miramar Reservoir and increasing capacity to 30 million gallons per day.

Sewer Project- Vic Salazar, Project Coordinator, reported the project is mostly for the area north of Governor Dr. and east of Genesee. There will be 3.8 miles of new water mains, sewer connections and replacement of old lines. Workers are now on Huggins St., replacing a main sewer line. Work is usually 7:30 am to 4:30 pm.

Libraries - Misty Jones, the Director of San Diego Libraries, reported a Master Plan that has been completed. It is a comprehensive plan, and construction will be over the next 10-30 years as funds are available. The North UC Library is to expand to 20,000 sq. ft. from 16,000 sq. ft. The South UC Library on Governor Dr. is expected to expand to 20,000 sq. ft. with the possibility of two stories. Some short-term improvements of painting, new carpets, computers and improving restrooms are being considered. To help pay for improvements, a ballot measure is being considered, along with enforcing a law that requires the city to fund 6% of its budget for libraries. Helen Liebowitz, Friends of the Library, requested \$500 from the UCCA, of which the City will match 50% for a total of \$750. The request was approved unanimously.

Legislative and Community Reports

Allie Apfeld, aide to Congress member Scott Peters reported: (1) People wanting to apply to the military service academies should obtain application forms from their office and complete soon. (2) Their office is working on a supplemental funding request to address the polluted water crises at the border. (3) Their office is seeking funding for housing the homeless and is supporting plans to increase housing close to transit centers.

Evan Bridgham, aide to Supervisor Terra Lawson-Remer, reported: (1) Their office was working with the Office of Military Affairs to coordinate housing benefits for veterans. (2) A plaque a was presented to Diane Ahern for her service on the UCCA Board.

Marc Schaefer, aide to State Senator Brian Jones, reported numerous bills have become law, including SB 566 regulating surveying practices, SB654 addressing airport regulation issues, and a Senate Bill controlling child trafficking. The Governor vetoed bills that decriminalized some hallucinate drugs, prevented caste designation, prevented surcharges being added to bills, and changed regulations of E-bikes.

Fatima Maciel, aide to Mayor Gloria, reported: (1) The City's Draft Community Plan Update and Draft Environmental Impact Report will be released some time in February 2024. (2) The tent camp for homeless people has opened at the "O" Lot by Balboa Park, with space for 360 tents. It will have bathrooms, showers, and laundry facilities. (3) A shelter on City property at the north end of the airport is under construction to rehabilitate former military barracks.

Zach Burton, aide to City Councilmember Kent Lee, stated their office

Chris Nielsen, Chair of the UCPG, stated the UCPG was working on revisions to its bylaws to reflect new City requirements, and rules on procedure. (The next UCPG meeting will be on December 12 via zoom.)

Correction: CM Lee's office is not sponsoring a dumpster day in December. However, he and his staff will attend the Holiday Celebration at Standley Park on Friday, December 8. This is UCCA's content error and UCCA regrets the error.

REFLECT ON GRATITUDE: We are so grateful for finding Casey at C&S Painting and Fine Finishes for our reflective address curb painting. They were professional, detail oriented, committed and supportive of our community project. There were a few glitches along the way, but overall, they were successful in applying the addresses to almost 400 residential curbs in University City. Communication was primary and Casey and his staff receive a "10" for all their efforts. Thank you to all who participated; your patience was appreciated.

CITIZENS ADVISORY BOARD REPORT

This group for November was comprised of Capt. Manansala, Lt. Botkin and Officer Anderson Brown along with inland representatives from Westfield Mall, JCC, Bay Ho and the University City Neighborhood Watch Coordinator. The purpose is to discuss problems and concerns within the community with our SDPD, for example:

1. Shoplifting and "Smash and Grabs": SDPD Is coordinating with local retailers and regional law enforcement agencies to address shoplifting through investigative operations within the SDPD. The Target on Balboa is one of those "hit" the most. A recent Northern Division Investigation operation resulted in four suspects being arrested for stealing merchandise. Extra patrols are being used in many areas of the city where this is prevalent.

2. Northern Division is increasing the frequency of police patrols by officers and Retired Senior Volunteer Patrol by providing more coverage for the churches, synagogues and mosques.

3. In October, there was an increase in catalytic converter thefts usually between the hours of 2:00-4:00am. No suspects caught yet. Below are some tips to help reduce the likelihood of being a victim (Source: Allstate Insurance)

- Know if your car is a likely target: hybrids, SUV's and trucks have valuable or easily.
- Removable catalytic converters. Etch your license plate number or VIN onto your catalytic converter, this may help alert a scrap dealer that it was stolen and make it easier to identify the owner.
- Park in well-lit areas close to public entrances, regularly move your car's spot or use a closed garage.
- Install an anti-theft device.
- Install motion-sensitive lights and cameras in your parking area.
- Paint your catalytic converter to deter buyers.

4. Fentanyl is still prevalent in San Diego County. Training and resources to mitigate the risks of fentanyl are available for those interested in learning more. Please Contact Officer Brown for more details, email at: Anbrown@pd.sandiego.gov.

5. Westfield Mall security is working with SDPD who will be providing extra officers and patrol on foot through the mall. They will have a heavy presence before and during the holiday season. Retailers are organizing and will work with regional agencies regarding loss prevention in their stores.

Facts for a Safe Holiday Season

Of all the stories we share over the holidays, there is one we need to retire, and it has nothing to do with reindeers or elves. Every holiday season, millions of our fellow Americans tell themselves they are fine to drive after using cannabis or a prescription drug. The story they tell themselves goes like this: cannabis is a safe, natural product; prescription drugs are also safe, or doctors would not prescribe them; and, driving under the influence only applies to alcohol; you can't be convicted of a DUI, unless you have been drinking. That story is wrong.

Our Office aggressively prosecutes drugged drivers -- people driving under the influence of drugs, often in combination with alcohol. The reason is simple: almost half of all injury accidents in California involve drivers who used legal or illegal drugs. On some holidays, one in every four drivers on the road is impaired. Most have been drinking and often have both alcohol and drugs in their system. The most detected drug, other than alcohol, is cannabis, which people use more frequently and less cautiously since it became legal.

San Diegans need to know people using cannabis are more likely to be involved in crashes. Alcohol, which is a depressant, slows normal brain functions and impairs hand-eye coordination. Cannabis alters perception. The THC in cannabis impairs psychomotor skills, impedes the ability to multitask, disrupts lane tracking and cognitive functions, divides a driver's attention, delays the ability to react, and may also increase risktaking behavior like speeding. Combining alcohol and cannabis can heighten the effects of both on the body and brain.

The misuse of prescription drugs and illegal drugs, often in combination with alcohol, is dangerous. Some medications cause drowsiness, and can lead to aggressive driving. All can affect your reactions, especially when they are mixed with alcohol. We have seen a significant increase in drugged driving cases involving the anti-anxiety drug Xanax, which is used to treat depression and panic disorder, but can cause dizziness or drowsiness, effects that can be exacerbated by alcohol.

Psychologists say 38% of people suffer from increased stress over the holidays, which can lead to depression, anxiety, and substance misuse. The average American drinks 27% more during the holidays compared to the rest of the year. Misconceptions about the dangers of driving under the influence of alcohol, cannabis, prescription drugs and illegal drugs can prove deadly. Anyone inebriated can have a designated driver, take public transportation, or utilize a rideshare app. Remember:

- Don't mix alcohol and drugs. If you do, don't drive. The use of cannabis and other drugs in combination with alcohol makes driving even riskier than using either drug by itself.
- Many prescription drugs particularly those with a warning to refrain from operating machinery – can have a huge impact on your ability to operate a two-ton automobile.
- Even without alcohol, the use of cannabis or prescription drugs can lead to a DUI arrest.
- You can lose your license, possibly go to jail, and spend thousands of dollars on your defense and fines.

The holidays can be stressful, but they can also be joyous. As a mother, there is no greater joy than having my family together to celebrate each important milestone. I hope your holiday season is filled with love and good memories you can remember for years to come. Please share the facts on driving, drinking and drug use with your loved ones. Through education, we can keep our entire community safe.

Homelessness Updates

Safe Sleeping Program

The safe sleeping program provides people who were previously sleeping in unsafe and unsanitary sidewalk encampments with access to clean new tents, cots (so they are not on the asphalt), sleeping bags, daily meals, bathrooms, as well as access to showers, laundry and supportive services that will help put them on a path to permanent housing.

"O" Lot located on the outskirts of Balboa Park, near the Naval Hospital, opened on October 21 and currently has 106 individuals with a capacity of 366 tents. The 20th & B Operations Yard safe sleeping site is also still activated with 101 individuals and a capacity of 136 tents. Mental Health Beds and Reform

In August, local cities and counties called for \$6.4 billion to the Behavioral Health Infrastructure Bond Act of 2023 to fund thousands of additional mental health and drug treatment beds. Governor Newsom and California legislators approved this increase on September 13, but this bond measure will need voter approval in the March 2024 ballot.

The Library Master Plan

During the UCCA November meeting, San Diego Public Library Director Misty Jones announced that the Library Master Plan was recently approved by City Council on November 6, 2023 with much support from community members. The Master Plan serves as a "GPS" to guide the City in its planning with an aspirational goal of 2040. The Department's last Master Plan occurred in 2002 and it proposed one-size-fits-all recommendations for all locations. The Department strives to be adaptive as communities change.

The Master Plan makes facility recommendations for all City library locations divided by Zone and profiles Central Library and each of the 35 branch libraries, including University Community Library and North University Community Library. The North University Community Library is currently 16,000 square feet and the plan recommends that the branch be expanded to 25,000 square feet. The University Community Library is currently 10,000 square feet and the plan recommends that the branch also be expanded to 25,000 square feet.

Senator Toni Atkins previously secured around \$1.9 million in state grants to help expand this branch. Director Jones explained that this would only cover the building design, as construction would cost even more millions of dollars. Designs must be implemented within six months or risk becoming immediately outdated. The Library Department is looking for alternative ways to ensure that this grant continues to benefit University Community Library through facility the improvements. 


Volunteer Crisis Interventionists Needed


Curie Students Learning about the School and University City History

HOUSING ACTION PACKAGE 2.0 WILL RETURN TO CITY COUNCIL IN DECEMBER

On November 13, the Mayor's package of incentives to increase housing inventory for San Diegans including homeless individuals, college students and middle-income residents, was rejected by City Council. The plan drew controversy because it would allow developers to build marketrate and required affordable housing in different areas, potentially reinforcing existing patterns of low-income housing. The package also drew criticism from residents of single-family neighborhoods who oppose higher-density development.

In a joint statement released on social media a week later (on November 20) Mayor Todd Gloria and City Council President Sean Elo-Rivera announced that they will bring an amended H.A.P. 2.0 proposal for San Diego City Council consideration in December. Turkey and Gas-Fueled Deep Fryers by William Beck, Former Fire Chief

Many people like to use a deep fryer to cook their holiday bird as the fryers cook up juicy turkeys in a fraction of the time it takes to roast one in an indoor oven. However, they do pose a hazard. Outdoor fryers heat gallons of cooking oil to very high temperatures, making the risk of the oil and/or vapors igniting, resulting in a fire and potentially severe injuries. Here are some tips from the National Fire Protection Association regarding using a gas-fueled deep fryer.

• Always use the deep fryer outdoors and at least ten feet away from a building.

- · Be sure that the oil is at 350 degrees and not hotter.
- · Make sure that turkey is totally thawed.

• Be sure there is no water associated with it as having any residual water will react with the oil and possibly cause some to spill out, igniting on the burners.

· Never drop the turkey into the oil - go slowly.

Have a proper extinguisher handy and be sure you know how to use it.

· If a turkey deep fryer fire occurs, call 911 immediately.

Making Hydrosols at the UC Garden Club

We learned that hydrosols, water-based solutions, are better for when a small or medium amount of aroma is needed, such as room sprays, facial mists, and personal skin sprays. Whereas, essential oils are better for higher aroma needs, such as perfumes. Jana's demonstration used lavender and we all soon fell under the spell of the wafting lavender aroma.

UC Planning Group Meeting Update

There is some important news from the Planning Department: Nancy Graham has moved to a planning position at the City's Capital Projects and Infrastructure Department, a promotion for her. She expects that this move will have no effect on the timing of the release of the updated community plan, Program EIR or subsequent passing of the plan. Community input will still be taken after the release, expected in the first few weeks of January. The UCPG appreciates the hard work and contributions to the Plan Update by Nancy and wishes her the best. Planner Suchi Lukes will remain on the project which will be managed by Coby Tomlins, Community Planning & Housing Program Manager.

The Tentative Map Waiver project was continued until December due to the inability of the applicant's representative to explain the implications of recommending the split of the Aventine property into two parcels, a "hotel condo", and a "lab/office space condo". We have asked the applicant to return with answers to the questions raised in the meeting.

The Healthpeak project was unanimously recommended for approval. This project replaces an existing 42-year-old building with two new buildings totaling 122,000 sq. ft.

UCPG approved several changes to the governing documents for the UCPG, one of which was adding a fourth UCPG District, District 4, comprising the UC San Diego campus. At the November UCPG meeting, we approved an additional change permitting any voting member [board member] elected from one of the four UCPG districts to keep their seat for the remainder of their term if they move to another location in the UC Plan Area. Joining a planning group requires a significant time commitment that may not be worth it to some if they expect to lose their voting seat if they move. Removing this barrier should help both renters and students decide it's a good investment of their time to join the UCPG.

Last week, the City noticed a project located at 4249 Nobel Drive. The proposal is for three residential towers of 40, 40, and 23 stories, totaling 1315 units with 1300 parking spaces in underground and lower story parking. The project has affordable housing based on the "Complete Communities" formula that uses the current low-density RM-2-5 base zoning (29 Dwelling Units / acre) to calculate the project's required affordable housing, proposing approximately 2% for low, and very low income. While we don't know what the affordable housing percentage will be for the new Community Plan Update, it is expected to be at least 10%. The 2% affordable for this project and displacement of current residents is very disappointing given that the site currently has the most affordable rental housing in our planning area and has among the most diverse social composition with about two-thirds people of color. For comparison, the planned density of this parcel under the community plan update would be about 109 DU / acre, versus the proposed project's density of more than 350 DU/acre. The developer is listed as Wilmark Corp, the owner of the Avia development at Gullstrand and Governor.

UCPG will meet on Tuesday, December12, to rehear the Aventine project, Tentative Map Waiver and to finalize the document package for the UCPG's recognition by the City. Upcoming in January, we expect an information item by the city traffic engineers regarding the restriping plan for Genesee on completion of the Pure Water Project. We will also form an election subcommittee for the March UCPG elections.



Pure Water Construction Heads North Towards Luigi Court and Centurion Square

This new section of pipeline construction will include traffic control setup and pipeline construction on Genesee between Governor and Luigi Court. Working hours for this segment of pipeline installation will be Monday through Friday from 7:00am to 5:00pm. Work started in November and will continue through Spring 2024. Two-way traffic will be maintained, and there will be no intersection closures as part of this work.

Construction teams will install one 48-inch wastewater pipeline and one 30-inch brine pipeline in a 16 foot-wide trench in the southbound lanes of Genesee with through traffic being shifted into the northbound lanes around the construction zone to maintain two-way traffic on Genesee Avenue at all times.

Plan extra time when traveling on Genesee Avenue. University City High School students and parents are to use the entrance at Centurion Square during the morning school commute/drop off. The student entry will be closed in the morning and the gate will reopen in the afternoon for school dismissal/exit.

The City and project team are committed to completing construction as efficiently as possible with safety as our highest priority, and the community's patience and coordination are appreciated. California Assembly Bill 530 to Create e-Bike License Program

Existing law defines an electric bicycle (e-Bike) and classifies electric bicycles into 3 classes with different restrictions. Under existing law, an electric bicycle is a bicycle and rules pertaining to the operation of bicycles apply to

electric bicycles. Existing law prohibits a person under 16 years of age from operating a class 3 electric bicycle. A violation of the Vehicle Code is a crime.

Assembly Bill 530 (AB 530) would prohibit a person under 12 years of age from operating an electric bicycle of any class. The bill would state the intent of the Legislature to create an e-bike license program with an online written test and a state-issued photo identification for those persons without a valid driver's license, prohibit persons under 12 years of age from riding e-bikes, and create a stakeholders working group composed of the Department of Motor Vehicles, the Department of the California Highway Patrol, the Transportation Agency, bicycle groups, policy and fiscal staff, and other relevant stakeholders to work on recommendations to establish an e-bike training program and license.

Because the bill would prohibit certain persons from riding electric bicycles, the violation of which would be a crime, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program. For the current status of AB 530, visit: legiscan.com/CA/text/AB530/id/2834086



Road Repair Projects in University City

Roads are being repaired in neighborhoods such as University City as part of the Transportation Department's ongoing Slurry Seal program. Slurry seal is often completed in phases over several days or weeks, and multiple slurry seal projects are happening across the City simultaneously. The latest work as part of Slurry Seal Project 2322 will be completed, weather permitting, through the month of November and the first week of December.

In University City, the following roads are scheduled to be resurfaced: Barkla Street, Bloch Street, Bothe Avenue, Curie Place, Lebon Drive, and Soderblom Court. For more information, visit the Street Resurfacing and Pothole Repair tab at: sandiego.gov/street-div



Cooking, What are the Risks?

According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) cooking is the leading cause of home fires. The NFPA reports that two out of every five home fires started in the kitchen and more than 150,000 fires a year are related to cooking. Can you guess why most of these fires occur? If you said it's leaving cooking unattended, you got it right.

From Thanksgiving through Christmas, fire departments see more unattended cooking fires than other times of the year. However, the facts in this article apply anytime you are cooking. Hopefully this holiday season, you won't need to call the fire department unless your inviting them to join you for dinner.

Think back, how often has the doorbell or telephone rung or a child interrupted you while you were cooking, causing you to forget about the chicken you left sizzling on the stove - until smoke filled the house? If this sounds familiar, I hope you'll read on, because you're running the risk of having a dangerous fire.

Often when there is a cooking-related fire, the owner says they only left the kitchen for a few minutes. Sadly, that's all it takes! Regrettably, there's really no safe period of time for the cook to step away from a hot stove. So, when your cooking – Stand-By Your Pan!

Here are some important things to remember when you are cooking:

- Never leave food cooking on the stovetop unattended.
- Keep a close eye on food cooking inside the oven.
- Be sure cooking areas are clean and clear of combustibles (e.g. potholders, towels, rags, drapes and food packaging).
- Enforcing a "kid-free zone" of three feet around the stove.
- Keep pets from underfoot so you do not trip while cooking.
- Never use a wet oven mitt, as it presents a scalding danger if the moisture in the mitt is heated.
- If there is an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed to prevent flames from burning you and your clothing, get everybody out and call the fire department.
- With a grease fire, you never want to use water! Either turn the heat off and smother it, or let it start to cool down.
- If there is a microwave fire, keep the door closed. If possible unplug it or turn off the circuit breaker. Call the fire department and make sure to have the oven/microwave serviced before you use it again.
- Food cooked in a microwave can be dangerously hot. Remove the lids or other coverings from microwaved food carefully to prevent steam burns.
- Do you have an up-to-date fire extinguisher handy? Know when and how to use it and check your smoke alarms twice a year.

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
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


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
