

In the Meantime:

Pure Water Update

Construction continues in the University City area for the Morena Northern Pipelines & Tunnels project, part of Pure Water San Diego Phase 1 construction. As of January 2024, more than 50% of the pipelines have been installed.

Genesee Ave., south of Governor Drive On Genesee Avenue, south of the Governor Drive intersection, all pipes have been installed. The contractor has continued restoration in the area. In the SR-52 area, the contractor is currently working on work plan for the steel casing and pipeline installation.

Genesee Ave., north of Governor Drive

Construction at the Genesee Avenue and Drive intersection Governor completed in late 2023 and crews have since moved onto northbound Genesee Avenue between Governor Drive and Centurion Square. For this section, the contractor switched all traffic to the northbound lanes of Genesee Avenue. Crews work during the day, primarily Monday to Friday, 7:00am to 5:30pm. The construction team has coordinated with UC High School in advance of this work. Due to the traffic control plan, the student gate will be closed in the morning and all student traffic is being diverted to Centurion Court. The student gate reopens in the afternoon for school departures.

Looking ahead on Genesee Avenue: Once the base pave has settled, crews will finish trench paving then the road will be striped according to standards by the City of San Diego Transportation Department.

Towne Centre Dr. near Excalibur Way (see photo top right)

The pipes in the corridor of Towne Centre Drive and La Jolla Village Drive to Excalibur Way have been installed. The next phase of construction in this area is from Excalibur Way to Renaissance Avenue.

Additional Construction

Ongoing construction in other areas of the alignment include the tunneling work at the I-805 shaft on Executive Drive and work for the San Clemente Tunnel located at the Genesee Avenue lot at Marian Bear Memorial Park. This parking lot is closed for construction alternate parking can be located at 5233 Regents Road.

SUMMARY OF UCCA MEETING

January 10, 2024, in-person at UC Library by Katie Rodolico, UCCA Secretary

President's remarks: Thanks to the volunteers for the holiday lighting, with special thanks to Darlene Ventimiglia's 20 years of organizing this event. Jemma will have office hours to hear from the community. UCCA meetings will be in person every other month, 2nd Wednesday of the month at 5:30pm at the University Community library on Governor Drive. Special UCCA One & One events during alternate months.

Public Safety: Officer Brown reported a grant was received to fund police presence at local religious institutions. Traffic violations due to traffic detours for Pure Water construction. The police are citing violators. He discussed some of the metrics of what type of calls come in. Kent Lee's office donated six new neighborhood watch signs. There was discussion about the homeless at All Saints church. The police and church are engaged to find a solution.

Pure Water Update: Sarah Bowles, Clem Wassengerg presented current status. Current work is happening north of Governor Dr. towards UCHS and on Towne Centre, south of LJ Village moving towards Nobel. Work on Towne Center should wrap up in February. Base paving on Genesee south of Governor has been installed. It is bumpy or wavy, but cars will compact it. Eventually the final coat of paving will smooth it out. The tunneling portion of projects are behind schedule. A second tunneling contractor is being brought on to work on the tunnel at SR 52 and Genesee. When complete they will move to the Rose Canyon Creek tunnel. The contractor working on pipes at Genesee under SR52 is developing a plan to address quality issues. Construction along Nobel, between La Jolla Village and Towne Centre is expected this summer and fall. The total project should be complete in 2025. [Special Pure Water One & One meeting - see page one.]

Alison Apfeld from Congressman Scott Peters' office. Rep. Peters was working in the district during December. As part of the San Diego caucus he is working to fund fixing the cross border sewage treatment. Zach Burton from councilmember Kent Lee's office: thanks to Officer Brown & Barbara Gellman about neighborhood watch. Lee now chairs the Budgeting committee as well as the Land Use and Housing subcommittee. CM Lee's office is hosting a forum on the search for a new police chief, Question from audience regarding the proposed high rise towers at Nobel and Genesee. ZB: they will be presenting to UCPG as things move forward. This project will only require ministerial approval because it falls under the Complete Communities program. However, since the towers are more than 100 feet tall, a public hearing will be required. The developer is Wilmark, who manages some of the senior housing on the east end of Governor Drive.

Mariah Kallhoff: from Assemblymember Tasha Boerner office: AM Boerner's current focus on getting the two-year bills through. She will continue to chair the Communications and Conveyance committee as well as continuing to chair the select committee on sea level rise. She is also on the committee that deals with CPUC.

UCPG Chris Nielsen: UCPG submitted new governance documents to the city in December. The planning dept confirmed that there are no competing planning group applications for the University community. UCPG will operate under the existing bylaws until new 'operational procedures" are approved. Elections for UCPG board positions will take place in March. There are seven seats for up for election. residential seats, one for each district, and three business seats, one for each distinct. Additionally, the representative for one of the northwest UTC district is termed out. The non-termed out incumbents for the residential seats are running for re-election. Deadline to announce Candidates can give a two-minute candidacy is February 13. presentation at the February meeting. Ballots and instructions will be on the city website. In person voting at 9880 Campus Point Drive, 3rd floor patio, at the March meeting.

UC Library: Melissa Martin: The library will be hosting a FAFSA blitz on 1/20, 9:00am-1:00pm. There is a flyer by the door. Make a reservation if you are interested.. The library received funds from CM Lee's office. The library is hoping to start Ma-Jong and Oasis programming. The library will be an in-person site for early voting for the primary elections in March.

North UC Library: Azalea: Library is running a reading challenge open to those ages 0-infinity. Kids get a backpack. Also giving away museum tickets.

The Ballot is in the Mail

The date of the Presidential Primary Election is not until March 5, 2024. However, under the California Voter's Choice Act, every active registered voter in San Diego County will receive a ballot in the mail the week of February 4, 2024. According to the San Diego Registrar of Voters, here are your voting options:

- MAIL IT: You can complete your ballot in the comfort of your home and return it through the U.S. Postal Service. Your signature is required on your return envelope for your vote to count.
- DROP IT: Starting Tuesday, February 6, voters have the additional option of dropping off your ballot at any official ballot drop box located around the county.
- VISIT: If you would rather vote in person, that option is available too. Avoid long lines by taking advantage of early in-person voting.
- UC LIBRARY: will serve as an early voting center March 2-4 for the Presidential Primary Election in March and will serve as a Polling Place on Election Day, March 5, 2024. Ballots may be dropped off inside the community room on these dates. A permanent ballot box, located outside the public entrance near the parking lot, will be available for ballot drop-off in the weeks leading up to Election Day.

Vehicle Theft - A Crime of Opportunity

Auto theft is a common crime in San Diego County that affects victims in many ways. Across the county, there were more than 11,300 auto thefts last year, representing about \$140 million in losses, according to statistics from the San Diego Association of Governments. In fact, last year our office filed more than 850 cases against 900 defendants for auto theft-related charges.

Thankfully, our region has a Regional Auto Theft Taskforce (RATT), that works to reduce vehicle theft in San Diego County. They have taken down many criminal auto theft rings that have led to prosecutions and ultimately jail time for criminals.

Auto theft uniquely disrupts the victim's life, especially in a vehicle-centered city like San Diego where almost every aspect of your daily living revolves around your vehicle. From being unable to get to work, school and doctor's appointments to buying food, the theft of your vehicle can be devastating. But there are ways to be proactive, so you do not become a victim of auto theft. Here are some simple tips that can reduce your probability of becoming a victim of auto theft:

- Do not leave your vehicle doors unlocked. Criminals are opportunists and they will find their way into an unlocked vehicle sooner or later.
- Do not leave items of any value in plain sight in a parked vehicle.
- Do not leave your keys in your vehicle.
- Do not leave keys hanging on a hook in your garage.
- · Do not leave your garage door open.
- Do not store a spare key in your garage or second vehicle.
- Do not leave your vehicle unattended while it is running.
- Do not assume your vehicle is safe to be left unlocked because you live in a gated area or have an enclosed parking garage.
- Do not leave car keys in a lockbox attached to your vehicle while at the beach or on a hike.
- To avoid becoming a victim of identity theft in addition to auto theft, do not leave valuable items in your vehicle.

The harm to victims is compounded when valuables, wallets, checkbooks, or phones are left in a vehicle, and it is stolen. If a thief gains access to the personal identifying information such as your driver's license or credit card, they can illegally use your personal information to make purchases and steal your identity. Some thieves may try to re-sell your vehicle, and if you leave the vehicle title in the vehicle, the bad actor can attempt to transfer title or sell your vehicle to an unsuspecting innocent buyer.

Earlier this Summer, RATT completed a two-year investigation involving 50 defendants. The undercover operation recovered 172 stolen vehicles, drugs, and firearms. RATT's mission cannot be fulfilled without the help of the public. If you have tips or information on vehicle thefts, please let RATT know on the anonymous tip line: 1-888-TELLRAT (888-835-5728). As your District Attorney, I'm committed to increasing communication and accessibility between the DA's Office and the public in order to keep you safe. I hope these consumer and public safety tips have been helpful.

Selected Excerpt: Outreach Workers Guide People Out of Homelessness



Outreach is a critical tool for ending people's homelessness. Outreach teams work to build relationships with people experiencing homelessness. The teams use a person-centered approach to resolve their homelessness through the offer of services tailored to the specific needs of individuals.

One of those teams is operated by the City's nonprofit partner, People Assisting the Homeless (PATH). In San Diego, PATH provides a variety of services for neighbors experiencing homelessness that include outreach, housing navigation, interim housing, rapid rehousing, and permanent supportive housing. UCHS Receives EdUCate! Grant

Focus is on Mental Health

University City High School was awarded a \$50,000 grant to support mental health needs in the form of free therapy for UCHS students, by EdUCate!, non-profit organization dedicated to providing additional funds to University City public schools.

UCHS Principal Mike Paredes explained, "\$25,000 of it was a grant that they applied for, and received from Google with the intention of supporting mental health at our UC schools. Additionally, they raised more than \$5,000 at last year's Taste of the Triangle event for the sole purpose of supporting mental health." In addition, \$3,000 came from a private donor, Dr. June Kubli, and \$2,000 was from a San Diego County grant. A little more than \$14,000 is part of the annual EdUCate! Principal's grant that is based on enrollment numbers at UCHS.

EdUCate! President Kendra Cole said, "We received an invitation from Google Foundation to apply for the \$25,000 Google Grant. We believe EdUCate! came onto Google Foundation's radar because we received the 2023 California Non-Profit of the Year award."

The funds will be used to "...add three additional days of clinical therapist support on campus through Wellness Together," according to Paredes. Wellness Together is a non-profit organization that offers a school-based therapy program that provides support both on-campus and online.

The Wellness Together organization utilizes an evidence-based approach to provide intervention "...for students facing social and emotional challenges impacting academic performance, attendance, and behavior at school." Clinically-trained therapists meet with students to provide individual or group counseling weekly for 40 minutes to provide care, without the need for insurance papers, allowing for immediate mental health needs to be met (wellnesstogether.org).

Cole said, "We [EdUCate!] hope by supplementing funds for the mental health program at UC High and providing more availability for therapeutic services, students will reach out when they need help working through their difficult issues. And, most importantly, we [EdUCate!] want our kids to know they are not alone; they have a safe place to go; they can find support at school for free. There are tools, skills and resources that can help reduce stress and can make decisions more manageable."

Paredes explained that the San Diego Unified School District (SDUSD) provides funding for one full-time clinician. He said, "Each day of clinical service allows for five students to be seen by a clinician. With three additional days of service, 15 [more] students can be seen per week at any given time. Paredes said, "Essentially, because of the generosity of EdUCate!, as well as our partnership with Wellness Together and School Link, we hope to provide health support to anyone who wants or needs it without delay."

While the grant from Google is a one-time award, Paredes said, "Our amazing community, along with EdUCate!'s committed efforts, will continue to generate funding to support this cause." Cole said there will be an opportunity this year to donate with mental health support in mind. "At this year's Taste of the Triangle event on March 22, EdUCate! will give participants an opportunity to fund-an-item, Wellness Together," said Cole. Curie Elementary's 60th Anniversary

On November 30, 2023, Mr. Elwell and Ms. Wallace came to our 3rd grade classroom, B-11 with Mrs. Rodriguez, at Curie Elementary. They came to tell us how Curie was 60 years ago. Curie,

right now, is an enormous school that is protected very securely. It was made for education, fun, and more. But back then a handful of things were very different. The topics we learn are math, science, art, music, writing, reading, social studies, P.E, and more. The grades start at UTK and goes all the way up to 5th grade. Green play structure for UTK and kinder, Blue for second grade, and Red for 3rd, 4th, and 5th.

On the first day Curie opened, a heap of students ran through the front gate. Compared to now, Curie was no more than 30 classrooms and a field of gravel and rocks. To get there, most students walked or cycled. There was an option of cars, but many of the roads were not paved. Some parents did not go to work or they did not know how to drive. Curie opened with 3rd, 4th, 5th, and 6th grades. One of the surprises was that there were lizards and giant snakes on the field. Boys would often play a game to catch these critters. Another change was that there was a dress code for both girls and boys. For girls, they were not allowed to wear shorts or pants. Girls usually wore a skirt/dress with a shirt or sweater. Boys could not wear shorts either. So, they wore long pants. School started at 9:00am and finished at 2:50pm. At lunch time, they went to the lunch harbor which was located at the garden we know today. There was no free school lunch. But, you could buy a carton of milk and a straw for only 6 cents. There were also children workers that were rewarded with popsicles. After that, it would be play time.

The choices for sports were: baseball, dodgeball, volleyball, and four squares. There wasn't any blue or red equipment. There was only a gray metal structure.. Now Curie has four square, wall ball, soccer, basketball, tetherball, pickleball, Gaga ball, and the equipment areas. In class they learned a variety of things. These included: math, music, art, and more. They also had to do a lot of book reports. Math time isn't like it is today. They didn't write in the math work books. They copied the problems and answers onto a piece of paper. The pencils they used were sized 7! They were bright blue and were called the Blue Bird Pencils. They used that for their everyday subjects. Art and music were done in the classrooms. There was no after school program, so usually they would run home. Some of the things they did frequently after school was go to the book mobile. Back then, there was no library in school. So the best resource for books was the book mobile. There was a heap of books in a gigantic van. It came every other week. Those are only some of the differences from back then and now.

Curie was nothing like it is now. As time passed, more classrooms were built and more teachers were hired. The education quality has gone up as well. Curie wasn't the only one changing either. Pip's was a local hangout, and now we have Carl's Jr. The bookmobile is gone, and now there are libraries everywhere you go at Curie. This could have only happened because of the changing world. As the community changed, Curie needed to as well. As our school grew, so did our community. Curie Elementary school has now existed for over 60 years.



UC Planning Group Meeting Update

New UCPG Governing Documents The UCPG submitted CPG governance docs to the city in mid-December and was told that the application was received by the Planning Department. In early January we were told that there was no competing application to represent the University Community received by the Planning Department, so going forward the UCPG will be representing the University Community. The City has our application under review and may or may not require further changes. When it is approved by the city council, perhaps in March, we will be able to operate under the new Operational Procedures, the new name for the UCPG's bylaws. Until then, we must operate under our current bylaws, including the upcoming March UCPG election. We will start planning for the inclusion of UC San Diego residents, doing outreach and engagement, and holding elections as soon as possible once the new Operational Procedures are approved by the City Council. Adding elected UC San Diego resident board members will not change the representation of the existing three districts on the UCPG board.

Revised Community Plan Update and Draft Environmental Impact Report The revised University Community Plan Update and Environmental Impact Report are expected to be released in the first quarter of 2024. In an email to me, Coby Tomlins, the Planning Department's Director of Community Planning, had the following to say about the Plan Update. "As discussed when we met last when Nancy was still with us, we anticipate [the Revised Draft Plan and Draft EIR] will both be released at the same time. I believe the comment period per CEQA is 45 days for the EIR. As always, we will take your feedback on an ongoing basis. While I don't have a specific release date given a number of variables, I would say, at the moment, let's work towards a March presentation from the City, with a recommendation from you in April if that works. As we get nearer releasing though, we will definitely be in touch because we want to work with you closely on this." We will continue to discuss the process and timing for the plan update with the Planning Department to provide the maximum amount of time for the community, the Plan Update Subcommittee, and the UCPG to provide input on the Plan Update and the Draft EIR.

Around the University Community Community members are wondering what the Mayor's executive order regarding city departments to process housing permits in 30 days for Complete Communities housing projects means for a project like the one proposed for Nobel and Genesee. Robin MacCartee, Project Manager with Development Services, explained, "The comments by the Mayor refer to the Building permits only, not the Discretionary Review. As such, the timeframes I originally provided (6-8 months) for the current review still apply. As for the building permits, they will be expedited, but even with Staff subject to new review timeframes, a project this complex is going to take longer than 30 days for sure." We still do not have a project timeline or final development plan for Alexandria's Costa Verde development.

Upcoming at the UCPG in February There will be an in-person event sponsored by the UCCA on Monday, February 12 at 5:30pm at the Nobel Rec Center, where Pure Water will give a presentation followed by the Traffic Department's presentation on the restriping of bike lanes on Genesee. These presentations will be repeated at the next day's UCPG meeting. In addition to our candidate's forum, we expect a presentation on a proposed People Mover system between downtown and the airport.

UCPG Announces Annual Elections for March 12, 2024

UCPG Elections will be held on March 12, 2024, under the current UCPG bylaw provisions if they do not conflict with the new Council Policy (October 2022) governing Community Planning Groups. The following seats are up for election:

UCPG "District 1" is south of Rose Canyon, North of SR-52, and between I-5 and I-805. UCPG "District 2" is north of Rose Canyon, west of Regents Road, and east of Gilman Drive, and south of UCSD. UCPG "District 3" the remaining portion of the UC Plan Area, excluding UCSD. UCPG "District 4" will be UCSD campus residents when the new UCPG Operational Procedures are approved by council.

Potential candidates are **NOT** required to attend **ANY** UCPG meetings to run for a board seat (conforming to the new Council Policy 600-24). Candidates must reside or have a business located in the district (1, 2, or 3) in which they run. The deadline for announcing candidacies is the end of the February 13 UCPG meeting.

There will be a candidate's forum at the February UCPG meeting. All candidates may give a two-minute presentation. We request each candidate to submit a 100-word statement in writing a few days after the February UCPG meeting for publication the on-line and printed University City News.

We will use the same voting procedures as in the past few years. Drop-off ballot voting boxes at the two UC Libraries will be available approximately one week prior to March 12. UCPG members will be able to cast a ballot according to the instructions posted here:

sandiego.gov/planning/community/profiles/university/agendas

In person voting will also be available at the UCPG meeting location, 9880 Campus Pointe Drive, third floor, on the covered patio outside of the Terra Nova Conference Room, from 5PM to 8PM. This has the additional advantage of providing an outdoor, but covered, voting location in case of rain. Thanks to Alexandria for the use of this multi-purpose location in its GradLabs building.

All current members of the UCPG are eligible to vote for candidates of their membership type (residential or business) in the district in which they reside or where their business is located.

However, per the new Council Policy 600-24, any eligible member of the community (a resident or business owner) may join the UCPG at any time up to and including the day of the election and be eligible to vote in this election.

Finally, remember that your UCPG membership does not expire.

Results of the election will be announced at approximately 8:00pm on March 12.

Our guest speaker will be a representative from Power San Diego. San Diegans pay the highest electricity rates in the nation to SDGE. SDGE extracts more than \$1 million from the City of San Diego ratepayers a day, meanwhile, one in four San Diegans are behind on their bills by \$600 or more. Publicly-owned utilities across California and country-wide consistently have significantly lower rates and higher customer satisfaction than for-profit utilities (see the graphic below) - it's time for San Diego to have a public electric utility that serves its ratepayers, not shareholders.



Power San Diego is a grassroots ballot initiative that aims to replace SDGE with a not-for-profit, publicly-owned electric utility with lower rates. The Campaign is currently collecting signatures to get on the ballot for November 2024. The goal is to collect 120,000 signatures by May 14.

What will this initiative do?

- Terminate the current franchise agreement the city holds with SDGE, purchase the electrical grid from SDGE, and implement public management of the electricity distribution.
- Provide significantly lower rates without having to pay expensive delivery fees, rates will be significantly lower, even after paying for public ownership of the grid.
- End the attacks on rooftop solar and promote local solar through fewer fees and better rates for excess energy that is given back to the grid.
- Focusing on local energy generation and storage as the most economical, resilient, and environmentally friendly option for our electricity.

Free Wildlife Preparedness Home Assessments in February

From the SD County Fire Safe Council:

The Resource Conservation District of Greater San Diego County has been awarded a CAL FIRE Defensible Space Assistance Grant through California Fire Safe Council that will allow them to bring a new pilot Home Assessment Program to residents of San Diego County in partnership with the Fire Safe Council of San Diego County and the 39 community Fire Safe Councils including the University City Fire Safe Council.

Through this program, participants can receive a free wildfire prevention home assessment that will include a review of the vulnerability of the home and landscape to wildfire and ember ignition. Defensible Space Inspectors will provide participants with information about defensible space zones, home hardening principles, and landscaping suggestions to assist homeowners in understanding how to meet wildfire resilience goals.

Additionally, residents will receive resources and referrals to assistance programs which can further aid in achieving defensible space compliance and wildfire resilience. Programs and resources are available to support residents who need assistance creating defensible space or disposing of materials generated when they performed defensible space landscaping activities.

Pre-registration is required and time is limited. In University City, free wildfire preparedness home assessments will be scheduled from Monday, February 5 through Friday, February 16.
