ONE & ONE: PURE WATER

February 12, 2024

The University City Community Association held its first One & One event on February 12 at the Nobel Rec Center on the Pure Water construction topic. The One & One events will be spent on one topic or with one person for one hour. They are intended to spend more time discussing important issues, rather than a short report at a regularly scheduled public general meeting.

Clem Wassenberg, Pure Water Project Manager, presented some general information about the project, as well as the current status of construction. Two pipelines are being placed, one going north carrying wastewater to the North City Wastewater Reclamation Plant, and one heading south bringing brine water to the Point Loma Wastewater Treatment Plant. Three tunnels are being built in the process, under SR52, Genesee at Rose Canyon, and at I805.

Next construction plans are continuing northbound on Genesee, and Towne Center Drive from Excalibur Way to Nobel. Lots of coordination with UC High School and residential apartments along the way are in place. There is no parking allowed in the current construction areas, and residents may experience possible road closures if needed. The current phase is expected to be completed in March 2024, while we don't expect the project to be operational until sometime in 2025.

Of big concern when the project was first publicized were the longstanding pine trees along Genesee Avenue. Wassenberg reported that the project arborist has determined them to all be safe at this point, and that none need to be replaced. Also, while the Marian Bear parking is closed at Genesee, the lot at Regents Road is available and the trails continue to be open to the public.

Everett Hauser, Transportation Department, spoke on the bikeway coordination and enhancements once the Pure Water construction is complete. Towne Center Drive and Nobel Ave will have continuous lanes, with a wider bikeway buffer and posts. On Genesee, the bike lanes will become 7-feet wide with post barriers. All will keep the same number of lanes.

Although not part of the Pure Water project, it was shared that west of Genesee, along Governor Drive, that the restriping of the bike lanes after a future project may lead to single lanes. Many of those in attendance voiced their concerns about the already heavy traffic around the neighborhood schools.

POLICE BAIT PROGRAM

Catching Bike Thieves

The San Diego Police Bait Bike Program was implemented in 2014.

What is the Police Bait Bike Program?

Bait bikes have a GPS device embedded in their frames. When

they are stolen, the police can track the theft happening in realtime and apprehend the criminal. Authorities say there is a 100% chance of bait bike thieves being caught and prosecuted. The police have several Bait Bikes placed strategically placed and have been successful in catching bike thieves. Since October 2023, the program has made 27 felony arrests. Most suspects have narcotics and property from burglaries. Some have warrants. Three of the bike thieves were parolees at large.

Do many bike owners receive their stolen recovered bikes from the police?

Almost half of the stolen bikes are eventually recovered by the police. The only reason that just 5% of stolen bikes are returned to their owners is that the police can't link the bike to the owner.

What can bike owners do, in case their bike is stolen?

Always taking a picture of your bike, and writing down the manufacturer and serial number is important. You will have a better chance of recovering your bike by doing this. If your bike is stolen, always file an online police report. There are also a few sites to register your bike's serial number. One of these is a free site called Bike Index.

How does it work?

You register your bike with your name, serial number, and manufacturer of the bike. If your bike is stolen, you would report it missing to Bike Index. Next, they will post the stolen bike on their website, and help you recover it.

What else can you do?

- Lock up your bike secure your frame with a heavy duty lock, and use an locking system as a secondary to secure your wheels. Do your research and find a type that you will actually use.
- Secure your bike components replace your quick release skewer or bolt that holds your seat post or wheels with a locking skewer.
- Park your bike correctly, use the bicycle rack when locked outside, it's only as secure as the thing you've locked it to.
- Take your accessories with you thieves want nice accessories too, and will look for good they can easily grab and go.
- Store your bike inside store inside your residence or garage, and out of sight. Do not store on your front porch or balcony.
- Know your bicycle information if your bike is stolen, you will need to be able to provide the make, model, Serial Number, color, and other distinctive features which make it stand out. File a police report, call 619.531.2000.

(CO) alarms too. Put in fresh alkaline batteries if your alarms use them, and replace the alarms if they're out of date. Working smoke and CO alarms are essential home safety tools. They should be installed on every level of your home and tested every month.



Mayor's Office Reports

Selected Excerpt: Potholes

With the series of recent storms, our roads are taking a hit. Rain exacerbates the formation of potholes in roads through water seeping into cracks in the road surface. Repairing potholes is part of routine maintenance at the City of San Diego, and especially during this time of year. Timely and effective pothole repair is imperative to ensure road safety and prevent escalating infrastructure deterioration in the wake of these weather events.



On a normal day, we have nine dedicated Patch Trucks with two-person teams repairing potholes. With the effects of recent storms, our Transportation Dept. has augmented our teams with additional 2-person crews repairing potholes. That's 90

people dedicated to repairing potholes on a daily basis! Additionally, we've had crews working extended shifts into the early evenings on weekdays and full workdays on Saturdays to help get things done. I ask residents to please help us identify the potholes in your community by reporting them through the City's Get it Done app; online at: sandiego.gov/get-it-done

The March 2024 Presidential Primary Election Day is Tuesday, March 5. Registered voters have been able to



use the US Mail to return their mail ballot for the March Presidential Primary Election or to use any one of the official ballot drop boxes located around the county. On March 2, 218 vote centers will open throughout San Diego and will be open daily from 8:00am to 5:00pm through March 4. On March 5, all vote centers and official ballot drop boxes will be open from 7:00am to 8:00pm. Avoid long lines by taking advantage of the early voting. Voters have the option of casting their ballot at any vote center around the county. To celebrate Curie Elementary's 60th anniversary, we interviewed Mrs. Sullivan and Ms. Hambright to learn about what the school was like a long time ago. Mrs. Sullivan started teaching at the school in 1968 and she taught 5th grade for almost 30 years. She had 35 kids in her class. Ms. Hambright started teaching at Curie in 1973 and taught for more than 40 years. She taught kindergarten through 4th grade. She had 24-35 kids in her classroom.

Curie had only bungalows when it opened. There was dirt everywhere and no grass field. Sometimes, there were rattlesnakes that the principal had to catch! The school had four tracts so there was always a group of students on vacation. The school year was year round and they went to school for nine weeks and then had three weeks off.

We also learned that there were no computers, smart boards, or white boards in the classrooms. They had chalkboards, overhead projectors, and the playground equipment was made out of metal and wood. The classrooms had no walls in between them, so you could see the class next door and hear them. It would be noisy. After lunch they would have an uninterrupted reading time where the students and the teachers would be reading their own books. There were fun field trips to Balboa Park, camp at Palomar Mountain, and San Clemente Canyon. Some classrooms would bake bread in the cafeteria oven. They would also cook in the classroom and make applesauce and pancakes. It was fun learning about the history of Curie!

GARDEN CLUB LOOKS UP TO THE OWLS

The rain gods stayed away long enough in late February for the University City Garden Club to gather in Ruth De Santis backyard overlooking Marcy Park and the canyons below. The featured speaker was Robert Weingard, UC resident since 1963 and local owl expert. He has built owl boxes for every park in UC and eight more in the neighborhood, plus countless more in Southern California and other states

The approximately 40 attendees also learned about the differences between Barn Owls, that live in owl boxes, and Great Horned Owls that do not and which is a predator to the Barn Owls. In fact, Ruth became interested in the owls when she found a Great Horned Owl on her patio. Robert pointed out that one owl can eat up to 900 rodents a year and hunt at night. A very eco-friendly way to protect your garden. Owls mate for life, which is about 4-5 years, and can lay up to 13 eggs. The owlets leave the nest at about six months, then the owl box or nest may be empty for five to six months until the cycle is repeated. Owl boxes can be put up in a tree or a pole, and can last 15-20 years. Owl box owners do have to monitor the boxes, as bees may swarm in and turn them into their beehive. The owl boxes are very popular in wineries, where Barn Owls are known as "protectors of the vine."

UC Planning Group Meeting Update

February 13 UCPG Meeting

Revised University Community Plan Update Draft EIR comment period. The revised University Community Plan Update and Draft Environmental Impact Report are expected to be released soon. The minimum duration comment period for an EIR for a CPU is 45 days, By a unanimous vote, the UCPG asked for a 90-day comment period for the DEIR. Members of the UCPG feel that the size and scale of the Draft EIR justifies a longer comment period, especially when considering that the draft Plan is being released simultaneously, there are many stakeholders from which we need input, the size of the DEIR will be massive, and the document technical. Our community's organizations, including the Plan Update Subcommittee and UCPG, need this additional time to respond.

There was a Candidate's Forum at the February 13 UCPG meeting. Candidate statements may be found elsewhere. March voting procedures will be as in the past few years. From March 4 to March 11 a ballot box will be available at each of the two UC libraries to cast a ballot. Ballots and instructions will be posted no later than Friday March 1 and may be found here: sandiego.gov/planning/community/profiles/university/agendas

In person voting will also be available at our UCPG meeting location: 9880 Campus Pointe Drive, third floor, from 5:00 to 8:00pm. We'll use the patio area outside. This has the additional advantage of providing an outdoor, but covered, voting location in case of rain. Thanks to Alexandria for this location!

All current members of the University Community are eligible to vote for candidates of their membership type (residential or business) in the district where they reside. Any member of the community who is not yet a UCPG member may sign up and vote in person on March 12, 2024, between 5:00 and 8:00pm at 9880 Campus Point Drive. Results of the election will be announced at approximately 8:00pm on March 12.

Bicycle Lane Striping along the Pure Water Route Everett Hauser presented an item describing the city's plans for restriping Genesee Ave., Nobel Dr., and Towne Centre Dr. along the Pure Water route once the project is finished. This will involve reduced-width vehicle travel lanes and wider bicycle lanes but no loss of vehicle travel lanes. The UCPG also voted to recommend changes to Nobel Drive eastbound at Towne Centre Drive and Towne Centre Drive northbound just south of La Jolla Village Drive to improve bike safety along these segments which are not scheduled to be restriped after completion of Pure Water.

Automated People Mover Project between Downtown and the Airport The UCPG heard an information item on an Automated People Mover project between Downtown and the Airport that would feature two-minute frequencies. The presenter, from non-profit RideSD, asked for a recommendation, but the UCPG declined due to a need for additional information.

Around the Community

Here is information of interest around the community.

- There is no news on the Tentative Map Waver for the Aventine property. This has not been rescheduled.
- The Miramar-Sorrento double-tracking project is delayed at the UCPG until the SANDAG consultants respond to MSCP and Parks & Rec comments from DSD and DSD in turn responds. This will give the UCPG substantial information on important environmental issues for the project needed to evaluate the project.
- I have tentatively scheduled an "extension of time" request by Alexandria for its Costa Verde redevelopment project for the March UCPG meeting.
- The 4249 Nobel project, located between Cargill and Genesee is under review by DSD which issued its first assessment letter for the project. It consists of about 28 pages of issues to be addressed by the applicant. At present, there is one issue (height > 95 ft) requiring a Process 2 (decision by DSD). The UCPG should get this in 6 months plus or minus, but it is unclear at this point which points of the project will be reviewed. The current timeframe on this project is 10-12 months for a project of this size.



UCPG Residential Seat 2B Candidate Statement for Joann Selleck

My name is Joann Selleck, and I am running for re-election as the incumbent R2 candidate. I have served for the past 6 years on the UCPG board and wish to continue to do so for the balance of the period for which I am eligible under our Bylaws.

CALIFORNIA INSURANCE COMPANIES ĀRE CANCELLING FIRE INSURANCE

All across California insurance companies are cancelling homeowner policies due to fire losses. Homes within 500 feet of a wild canyon have seen the highest number of cancellations. Building flammability, volatile landscaping, distance to fire hydrants and fire equipment access are all factors.

If you think a conflagration cannot happen here you are mistaken. Had the winds persisted a few hours longer in the 2003 Cedar Fire, University and Clairemont neighborhoods would have caught fire. Like Maui the entire community could have been destroyed. Government will soon implement additional fire safety requirements. Homeowners can prepare by switching out to non-combustible exterior building materials. Within five feet of homes; remove plants and anything combustible, use non-combustible ground cover. Large trees should be at least 20 feet from a house. Fences that touch the house should be non-combustible as well. Soffit vents should be fire rated. To learn more got to: fire.ca.gov

Fire upgrades will improve the chance that you will have a livable house to return too after a firestorm. The Fire Safe Council will hold a public presentation; 1:00pm Saturday, March 23 at the UC library on Governor Drive.



Miramar Matters – Tour of MCAS Miramar by Ron Belanger and Matty Wuest from Citizens Advocating Safe Aviation (CASA)

Colonel Thomas M. Bedell, commanding officer of Marine Corps Air Station Miramar, invited community members to tour the base last month and more than 20 UC residents took advantage of the opportunity. We toured the ramp areas for F-35, F-18, C-130 aircraft and multiple helicopter types. We then visited an F-35 maintenance hangar and the shaded parking pads with support equipment for each F-35, with Marines briefing us.

We finished at Base Operations where they explained the changes made so that departing aircraft follow mandated routes and procedures on departures. San Diego has the busiest, densest air traffic in the world.

It's vital for safety that all departures follow mandated routes, which are designed to minimize noise on departure. They ensure all squadrons at the base follow the mandatory departure routes. But, many safety and noise concerns are caused by transient aircraft which visit to use the desert and ocean training areas and aren't used to such strict departure routes.

Col Bedell took direct and effective actions. Visiting aircraft, once they have landed, now cannot take off again until the pilots attend a mandatory briefing on the course rules. Pilots who don't follow the mandatory departure routes, speed limits and altitudes are sent home. For more information, visit: miramar.marines.mil/Departments/Operations/
