University Community Plan Update Draft and EIR Released

On March 15, 2024, the city planning department released the revised Community Plan Update Draft, as well as the Draft Environmental Impact Report (EIR). They can be found at: www.planuniversity.org/. The community plan will be the policy document that shapes development in University City (North and South) for the next several decades. It defines land use as well as goals for housing and commercial space, public spaces, and transportation. The last version of this proposal, known as the discussion draft, was released in Spring 2023. Comments on the University Community Plan Update Draft should be submitted to planuniversity@sandiego.gov by April 29, 2024.

The EIR also has specific deadlines for public comment. The EIR was bundled into two other EIRs the city developed at the same time: Blueprint San Diego, and a Hillcrest Community Plan focused amendment. In general, comments on EIRs should be worded as proposed changes, rather than questions. Questions are not answered as part of the EIR, so comments in the form of a question will likely be ignored. Comments should be sent to planningceqa@sandiego.gov by April 29, 2024. Note the different email address for the EIR versus the plan.

These are lengthy, dense documents but will have a significant and binding impact on our community going forward. UCCA encourages all residents and employees in the University plan area to familiarize themselves with the proposals and engage in the process.

University City Community Association will be presenting an overview at the University Community Library on April 6 at 1:00pm. The City Planning Department will be presenting this Draft Community Plan Update at the University Community Planning Group meeting on April 9 at 6:00pm. This meeting will be hybrid, with limited in person seating, as well as Zoom access. The University Community Plan Update Subcommittee will be meeting on April 16 via Zoom. The UC Peeps group has announced that it will have a meeting sometime in mid-April. All of these meetings will be open to the public.

SUMMARY OF UCCA MEETING

March 13, 2024 at UC Library by Katie Rodolico, UCCA Secretary*

President's remarks: Thank you to Kent Lee's office, Zach, the interns, and the UCCA board member volunteers for helping at the Dumpster Day. There will be a one-on-one meeting with CM Kent Lee on April 22. During the February board working meeting we approved the January 2024 minutes, the 2024 budget, and a \$1,500 donation to EdUCate for Taste of the Triangle. A check was accepted by Laura Ravine for EdUCate/Taste of the Triangle, who provided a brief description about the event

Elected Official Representatives:

Zach Burton from **CM Kent Lee's** office announced a forum for the commission on civilian police oversight on March 16. RSVPs needed. He also thanked UCCA volunteers for their participation in the dumpster day which collected 3 large dumpster bins plus some overflow into a 4th. He mentioned that Marcy Park had received funding in the budget for parks. Mentioned again the April 22nd One-on-One with CM Kent Lee.

Evan Bringham from **County Supervisor Terra Lawson-Remers** office mentioned her website focuses on Creating Change and Delivering Impacts. Last month she voted on Evergreen Funds, which are federal funds. She supported Prop 1 which provides funding for mental health beds. There is a small business stimulus grant which expires on June 30th for small businesses that were impacted by covid. Small business is defined as 20 or fewer employees.

Community Reports:

Chris Nielsen, chair of UCPG, reported that Costa Verde is going through a revised plan. They have filed for an extension to their expired permit. Requests from the community for community amenities like a post office are needed. It was originally approved in 2018. (see page 12 for additional UCPG information)

Azalea Ebbay, North UC library manager, announced a program based on the *She Persisted* series by Chelsea Clinton at the Downtown Library. They are expecting 2% budget cuts to the library. They are hosting household organization classes and looking into owl boxes.

Melissa Martin, University Community Library manager, acknowledged that community members continue to inquire about the grant from the Toni Atkin's office for new or upgraded library. The city changed its policy to not start new construction till it's fully funded so the city and state are in negotiations as to whether the funds can be repurposed. The library is open to suggestions but is looking at upgraded wifi, more computers, fix/repair/replace the ceilings, the bathrooms, the carpet, a new circulation desk, new reference desk, and upgraded HVAC. The library was able to use a grant from CM Lee's office for senior programming and plans to start a Mahjong program. They are looking into plans for a self-defense class.

Grant Request: University City Fire Safe Council requested \$500 for outreach and education. They have hired a biologist to identify public lands adjacent to homes for fuel reduction. They encourage fire hardening in landscaping and construction. The motion passed.

UCCA Board Member Reports:

Phil Fowler presented the treasurer's report. The report was approved. It was noted that \$5,000 is additionally held in reserve to use as a general UCCA cushion.

Merle Langston gave an update on the street median project on Governor, west of Radcliffe. Work will start the week of March 20, 2024. There is no need to close lanes of traffic.

Diane Ahern reported on social media and grant status. We currently have two open grant requests. One is specific for beautification such as banners, medians and utility boxes. The other grant application is for communications such as the newsletter.

Barbara Gellman, neighborhood watch: 5 of the 6 neighborhood watch signs from CM Lee's office have been installed. There are a couple of condo complexes looking to start a neighborhood watch group. Socks for Safety is now offering pickleball themed socks.

DISPATCH UPDATE

We do have some good news on the dispatch front. First, we are down to 19 dispatcher vacancies with several new hires already scheduled to start in early March. This is half of the amount of where we were last year with 38 vacancies. Our 911 performance and wait times on the admin line are doing very well. We are answering 90% of all 911 calls in 15 seconds

or less. Also, our Admin line or non-emergency line is answered in 2 minute or less 60% of the time. When people call during peak/prime time hours, the wait time will be a little longer.

We are exploring the option to partner with Microsoft who has advanced phone tree technology that could help us. We used to have Amazon's phone tree, but it got way too pricey. Right now, we are still on the old phone system, so the (*) star key is the way to go directly to a dispatcher for now. I would still encourage those callers who don't need an actual officer to respond to their location to listen to the prompts first. It could save them so much time. For example, if someone needs a police report for a fraudulent charge on their credit card, or minor hit and run report, this can be done quickly by yourself, online, without the assistance of an officer. No wait time and they can get a case number quickly on their own.

Many of our callers are asking us questions that do not require a police officer such as, how to file for bankruptcy; how to get a TRO; how to file for child custody; how to register their car; etc. These questions should directed to other agencies like the DMV or the Courts. Most civil questions can be answered by dispatchers at San Diego County's 211 Center.

OFFICER BROWN UPDATE AT UCCA MEETING

He introduced **Nicole Robertson**, the new Lieutenant for Northern Division. She mentioned the smart streetlights program is active. It was used successfully to find a missing senior when his license plate was captured by the system and he was found and returned home safely. Officer Brown brought up AB392 which directs that deadly force only be used when necessary. Officers are trained to make a plan. There is advanced officer training. He mentioned the CPTED program (Crime Prevention through Environmental Design) which recommends plant design around buildings to allow visibility. Questions from the audience included inquiries about the Palisades shooting: suspect is identified, targeted victim, no danger to general public; and about staffing cuts: possible but the department has gotten better at doing more with fewer officers. Public safety is a priority and overtime used as needed.

Are You Buying Stolen Goods? The Answer Could be in the Price

Everyone loves a bargain, especially with high inflation causing prices to skyrocket. But like all cautionary tales you are accustomed to reading from me, if it's too good to be true, be suspicious. This is especially relevant when buying goods online, which is a daily practice of millions of Americans. When comparing prices of a product you are clicks away from buying, be skeptical if you see the item listed drastically lower than what other sellers or store retailers are selling it for.

Heavily reduced prices and items with store tags still on them are telltale signs of stolen merchandise making it to online platforms. In San Diego, perpetrators have targeted stores including ULTA Beauty, Nordstrom Rack, Sunglass Hut, Home Depot, Lowe's, Target, Walmart and Dick's Sporting Goods. You have likely seen news reports of smash and grab burglaries where throngs of thieves brazenly break into stores to steal whatever they can wrap their arms around or bandits smashing glass counters to steal jewelry or luxury goods. These items are stolen with the express purpose of eventually being sold to unsuspecting consumers.

If you are a bargain shopper, who prides yourself on getting the lowest price, be aware that even if you unknowingly buy stolen merchandise, you are contributing to the destruction of legitimate retailers, and you could keep thieves in business. When stores are repeatedly victimized, they have to close locations, people lose jobs, and cities lose tax revenue. In the end, prices increase for all of us. Although you may save money on a suspiciously low online purchase, the cost to your community is much greater. Here are tips you should consider when buying products online from unvetted sources:

- Most stolen goods sold online are athletic clothes such as Nike, fragrances, cosmetics, tools, golf clubs and Legos. (These products are stolen every day from San Diego stores.)
- When shopping for a product online, check the name of the seller to see if it is logical for that seller to be offering that product at that price.
- Name brand products such as Milwaukee tools, Clinique cosmetics, and Enfamil baby formula are not sold at heavily discounted prices online from random sellers.
- If someone knocked on your door and offered to sell you a KitchenAid mixer sealed in a box for \$50, what would you think?
- Products sold online from unknown sources can be counterfeit and even harmful, such as lightbulbs, batteries and pet medicine.

You might be wondering what is being done to fight this battle. The California Highway Patrol has an Organized Retail Crime Task Force, which was established in 2019, to fight the rise of retail thefts, smash-and-grab burglaries and widespread shoplifting that has California beleaguered in in recent years. A recent law that went into effect last year attempts to regulate online marketplaces by requiring sellers to include contact and bank account information, as well as a seller's physical address. This is the first step legislators have taken to try to reduce organized retail theft.

Now that you are aware of how this nefarious business works, you can help put a stop to repeated theft by not buying merchandise from suspicious sellers. As your District Attorney, I'm committed to increasing communication and accessibility between the DA's Office and the public in order to keep you safe. As the former captain of SDPD Northern Division, he worked collaboratively with community groups to reduce gun violence and residential burglaries. Wahl helped launch the department's Neighborhood Policing Division, which handles some of the city's most challenging issues such as homelessness, mental illness, and drug addiction. Curie's 60th Anniversary

We met with two people named Mr. Elwell and Mrs. Wallace, and they talked about how Curie was 60 years ago. They attended Curie 60 years ago. These two students were there when the campus was just opened. When it first opened, it started with 3rd to 6th grades. We now have UTK- 5th grades. There were two classrooms per grade with about 35 or more students in each class. We have more classrooms and less students in each class. School started at 9:00am and ended at 2:50pm. Now, Curie starts at 7:50am and ends at 2:10pm.

There were more differences between Curie then and now. There were no fences or anything. If you were thirsty, you would have to wait till recess to drink water at the water fountain. There was no grass, only rocks. When a kid threw a rock at a kid, they would get in trouble. So they took all the rock away. There was a dress code for girls, they had to wear a dress or a skirt, no pants allowed. The garden was the lunch harbor and the playground was not painted and made of harder metal. They played four square, dodgeball, and tetherball.

If students worked at the lunch harbor, you would get a free ice cream. The milk was 6 cents. Barbra Root was the first principal. There were no after school programs. They had an ASB. To send a message to the office, they had a kid run it to the office. They had to use brown paper bags or lunch pails, but most used brown paper bags. They sometimes watched movies. If you didn't do so well at a certain thing, they sent you to summer school. Summer school was half day.

There were differences in the classrooms too. They had about 20 classrooms. They only had chalkboards. We have box light digital boards and white boards. They often reused their paper. They used a pencil and sometimes pens. The upper grade did cursive for writing. When they wrote essays, the first draft they used pencils and second they used pens. Our second drafts are sometimes on computers. They had to write their math problems on a piece of paper, and then they had to copy everything. In third grade, we do our math in workbooks. They didn't have a library, but a book mobile van. We have a school library now.

Curie is way bigger now. In conclusion, we learned that Curie is different and similar from 60 years ago. It was exciting to communicate and ask questions with Mr. Elwell and Ms. Wallace. We brought in Curie history into our own classroom.

JOHN LEE EVANS CHAIRS NATIONAL PEACE CORPS ASSOCIATION

It began as a passing whim but a transformative journey. A senior about to graduate from college filled out an application to volunteer for the Peace Corps. A few months later, he was accepted and sent to Honduras where he immersed himself in the vibrant culture and community of Tela in northern Honduras. For three years, he worked for a development agency improve local schools empower community leaders.

Today, John Lee Evans, the chair of the National Peace Corps Association (NPCA), explained that this chance encounter set the stage for a life dedicated to three passions — psychology, education and politics.

Upon returning to the United States, Evans settled in San Diego, where he has been a practicing psychologist for more than 30 years and community leader. Driven by his passion for education, he ran and was elected to the San Diego School Board in 2008. As President, he spearheaded numerous educational initiatives, notably Vision 2020, aimed at enhancing education quality and student outcomes from the first grade to high school graduation.

Evans's enduring connection to the Peace Corps led to his election to the board and later to becoming the chair of the National Peace Corps Association. In these roles, he advocates for the Peace Corps on Capitol Hill and raises awareness of its ongoing impact. Through his work with the 250,000-member NPCA, Evans seeks to highlight the invaluable contributions of the Peace Corps' 7,000 volunteers in more than 60 countries, and supports projects that promote community development, environmental sustainability, and social justice, both at home and abroad.

A longtime resident of UC, Evans and his wife Terri Cobo have two sons and a daughter. An avid traveler, he enjoys exploring new cultures and landscapes, most recently Namibia, Africa.

Evans' dedication to service and education inspires countless people, embodying the spirit of the Peace Corps and its mission to promote peace and friendship worldwide.

University Community Plan Update - Revised Draft 2

The Revised Draft 2 of the University Community Plan Update was released on Thursday March 14 by the City Planning Department. The following is the timeline going forward:

- Plan Update/Draft EIR Released Thursday 3/14
- City Planning Presentation at UCPG meeting -Tuesday April 9 regular meeting, on Zoom and in person
- CPUS/Public meeting (Zoom) Tuesday April 16
- Public Comments DEIR/Plan Update Due Monday April 29
- UCPG Comments DEIR/Plan Update Due Wednesday May 15

All reports are on planuniversity.org. The entire UCPG meeting on April 9, 2024, will be dedicated to the presentation of the plan by City Planning, with members of the Mobility and Parks department present as well to answer questions from the public.

The Revised Draft (March 2024) can be found on the "Materials" tab of planuniversity.org in two versions, one for on-screen viewing and one for printing. The Discussion Draft (April 2023) can be found in both versions directly under the box containing the Revised Draft (March 2024) materials. You may also find the Draft Engagement Summary Report useful as well. Starting on page 6 the City Planning department gives a list of issues brought up by the community and how they were addressed. There is also a comparison between the discussion draft (April 2023) and revised draft (March 2024). The "version for printing" compared. The document shows the Discussion Draft (April 2023). Orange shows what parts of the original Discussion Draft were changed. In late news, the City Council's Land Use and Housing committee (Kent Lee, Chair, Joe LaCava, Vice Chair) recommended to the full Council that the UCPG's governing documents be approved, and specifically approved the expansion of the UCPG board to 21 voting members with the addition of UC San Diego residents in a new UCPG District 4.



Updated University Community Plan Update Draft Now Out for Public Comment

The City of San Diego's City Planning Department continues to work on the University Community Plan Update, and an updated draft University Community Plan is now ready for community members' review and comments.

Last spring, City staff collected feedback on the University Community Plan Discussion Draft. Based on comments received, staff prepared the updated draft University Community Plan Update, along with a draft rezoning map and supporting technical information. These materials have been posted to www.planuniversity.org. Community members can review the latest version and send new comments by e-mail to planuniversity@sandiego.gov by April 29, 2024.

Along with the updated draft University Community Plan, the City released a second draft of Blueprint SD for public review and comment. This initiative, which updates and creates new policies in the City's General Plan, will guide where new homes and jobs near transit, parks and services should be located. The General Plan serves as the City's guiding framework for community plan updates and the long-term future growth and development of the City. This draft can be reviewed at sandiego.gov/blueprint-sd. The University Community Plan and Hillcrest Focused Plan Amendment, which is an amendment to the Uptown Community Plan, will be the City's first community plans to implement the land use strategies identified in Blueprint SD.

As part of Blueprint SD and the updated draft University Community Plan, the City released a draft Environmental Impact Report for public comment. The draft Environmental Impact Report analyzes the environmental impacts that could occur if the plans are implemented. This draft Environmental Impact Report can be viewed at https://www.sandiego.gov/ceqa/draft. Comments on the report can also be submitted by April 29, 2024, to planningceqa@sandiego.gov.

Once input is received on the updated draft University Community Plan and the updated draft Blueprint SD, the City Planning Department will incorporate feedback into the final plans. Those final plans will go through the public hearing process, where community members will have additional opportunities to provide feedback. They will ultimately be presented to the City Council for adoption later this summer. We thank community members in advance for sharing their time and thoughts.



SAN DIEGO A Utility for the People

On Sunday, March 3, Dorrie Bruggemann and Bill Powers from Power San Diego gave a highly informative presentation on the benefits of a public utility in the City of San Diego and how we get there. Go to bit.ly/PSD_PPP to view the PowerPoint Presentation. Top Questions:

- How much would a not-for-profit utility save overall? A not-for-profit utility would initially save about 20 to 25%, primarily by eliminating profits and taxes that would otherwise be collected by SDG&E. The switch would also eliminate SDG&E expenditures on excessive senior executive salaries (\$17 million per year to the CEO in 2022), advertising, contributions to candidates and elected officials, lobbying organizations, and influential local non-profit organizations.
- What happens to SDG&E workers? The non-profit utility would welcome SDG&E's IBEW 465 union workers. The initiative explicitly states that it will honor their collective bargaining agreement with SDG&E. What is being replaced is effectively the 'upper management' of the utility.

The Power San Diego ballot initiative allows voters in the City of San Diego the opportunity to vote in November 2024, on whether they would prefer a public utility over an investor-owned, for-profit utility that charges the highest electricity rates in the country. Thousands of valid voter signatures must first be collected to get the initiative on the ballot to make the change. UC NO-COST DUMPSTER DAY

Thanks to everyone who participated in the University City No-Cost Dumpster Day organized by Councilmember Kent Lee's office and UCCA. Held in the parking lot of UCHS in early March on a rainy morning, 18 volunteers helped 45 vehicles fill up four dumpsters, weighing approximately 7 tons. Each dumpster of oversized items helps keep roads and waterways free of illegal dumping and pollution. One local family was especially grateful, as they were tasked with clearing out their parents' home of 65 years. Pure Water San Diego Update in University City

Several construction sites are bustling with activity in the University City area for the Morena Northern Pipelines & Tunnels project, part of Pure Water San Diego Phase 1 construction. As of March 2024, crews have installed more than 12,200 linear feet of the pipeline, marking a milestone upwards of 50% completion.

Genesee Avenue, south of Governor Drive

On Genesee Avenue, south of the Governor Drive intersection, all pipes have been installed. The contractor has continued restoration in the area. In the SR-52 area, the contractor is currently planning for the steel casing and pipeline installation.

Genesee Avenue, north of Governor Drive

Construction crews are progressing along Genesee Avenue, between Governor Drive and Centurion Square. Once their work is complete, crews will open the lanes to the south of Luigi Terrace toward Governor Drive. In late March, the work will shift southbound lanes from Centurion Square and Luigi Terrace, which will move all traffic to the northbound lanes of Genesee Avenue. Crews will continue their work during the day, primarily Monday to Friday from 7:00am to 5:30pm. The construction team has coordinated with UC High School and neighboring apartment complexes in advance of this work. Once the new traffic control plan is implemented in late March, the student gate will be open in the morning and afternoon.



Towne Centre Drive near Nobel Drive

Crews are working along Towne Centre Drive to install pipelines from Renaissance Avenue to Nobel Drive. The work will likely be completed by the end of April 2024.



Tunnel Construction

A burst of activity launched in early March, as crews began work on tunneling at the launch shaft on Genesee Avenue, near Marian Bear Memorial Park and SR-52. Alternative parking is available at 5233 Regents Road. Additional tunneling work is ongoing at the I-805 shaft near Executive Drive.



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
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
