SD Fire Chief Talks with UCCA

In April, UCCA continued its UC Talks One-on-One conversations by hosting SDFD Fire Chief Robert Logan and Deputy Chief Fire Marshal Tony Tosca. Fire Marshal Tosca began by sharing information about the fire department and his role in fire prevention. He frequently talks with community groups such as UCCA about fire prevention including defensible space and home hardening; the new home inspection risk assessments; and the new very high fire severity zone map. Both Chief Logan and Fire Marshal Tosca spoke about the dangers posed by lithiumion batteries because if damaged or not used properly, they can easily catch fire, and cautions the use of candles in the home.

Chief Logan was also presented with a special accommodation from State Senator Brian Jones' office. He has been with the Fire Department for 25 years, and has served in every level of the fire department, except as Assistant Chief. Those many years of experience will be instrumental when deciding on budgeting for the next year, and he assures us that our public safety will not be at risk. Chief Logan and Deputy Chief Tosca shared lots of information and we recommend that you watch the recording provided below right. And when it comes to the community during a wildfire, be prepared by following the Ready, Set, Go info, follow Zone 0 defensible space standards (5-feet around your home) and simply get to know your neighbors. Know who may have mobility issues and help them in an evacuation.

University City is a familiar area to Chief Logan, as we learned that he attended Curie Elementary during a two-week exchange from his school in Lincoln Park, which led him to attend and finish Standley Middle School. And he is proud to have created a Fire Technology Program for high schools to inspire more of our youth to serve our community.

Harry Mathis

A Lifetime of Service

University City lost a great advocate with the death of Harry Mathis on March 31, 2025. He will be remembered for a lifetime of public service and as a loving, devoted husband, father and grandfather.



28 years a Captain in the US Navy, he and wife Mary, with two children, Laura and Mary Helen, first settled in UC in 1970. When he retired from the Navy, they returned in 1981. He helped found UC Area Residents for Equity (UCARE) advocating for a fair share from City Hall, becoming Vice Chair and Chairman, UC Planning Group from 1986-1993. He served two terms on SD City Council from 1993-2000. Mathis was known as the voice of reason on the council for his common sense and integrity. He was one of three who contributed to the development of North UC as it is today, including the Golden Triangle, libraries, parks and public transportation.

Raised in San Francisco, he traveled by trains over public transportation. Later, as Chairman of the Metropolitan Transit Services Board 2006-2017, he was a consensus builder in developing the trolley system. He was most proud of contributing to the Silver Line (antique trolleys). He recently retired from the San Diego Local Agency Formation Commission, having served 31 years.

As founding members of Good Samaritan Episcopal Church, Harry and Mary were grounded in their Faith. Memorial Services will be held at Good Samaritan, Saturday June 7 at 11:00am, 4321 Eastgate Mall. He is survived by his wife, two daughters and five grandchildren.

Remembering Harry Mathis (1933 – 2025)

As many of you know, Harry Mathis died March 31 at age 92. He was a former UCPG Chair, two-term City Councilmember (preceding Scott Peters), and three-term MTS transit board member where he was instrumental in the development of the San Diego Trolley.

Harry was part of the group who developed the 1987 University Community plan along with George Lattimer and brought his expertise to the recent 2024 University Community Plan, attending many of the plan update meetings over the 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ -year long development of the plan. Services will be held on June 7 at Good Samaritan Episcopal Church.

I'm sure that's why Chief Robert Logan, when spending only two weeks at Curie Elementary during a school exchange, that he realized there are opportunities for a different life than what his Lincoln Park neighborhood offered, and he made sure to come back and attend Standley Middle School. University City – you helped influence Chief Logan and he in turn is serving our entire San Diego community. I say we can claim him as one of our own.

That's what we do UC – we build community. That's why we have the reputation as a neighborhood to live, to work, to raise families, to stay.



Mobility Plan Adopted by City Council

At its meeting on April 22, the City Council unanimously approved the City's first-ever Mobility Master Plan, which is designed to create a balanced, equitable and sustainable mobility system for the City, focusing on areas with the greatest needs for transportation improvements. It also promotes safe street designs that will help decrease pedestrian and bicyclist injuries and deaths, as intended by the City's Vision Zero plan.

Some notable aspects of the Plan include community profiles, which provide a snapshot of the Plan's focus areas, along with a list of over 300 mobility projects and 15 mobility programs to make it easier and more enjoyable to get around, and which advance the City's Vision Zero and Climate Action Plan goals. The plan includes the following projects in University City:


- A. Convert La Jolla Village Dr between I-5 and I-805 into a SMART Corridor with a flex lane in each direction that could be used for transit or HOV. The corridor may include transit signal priority, LPIs, curb extensions, and protected intersections.
- B. Install a flex lane along La Jolla Village Dr from N Torrey Pines Rd and I-5 by repurposing a general purpose lane in each direction.
- C. Install a two-way cycle track on the west side of Executive Wy from Executive Dr and La Jolla Village Dr.
- Implement a multi-use path along the north side of Genesee Ave from I-5 NB Ramp to Scripps Hospital Driveway.
- E. Implement one-way cycle tracks along La Jolla Village Dr from N Torrey Pines Rd and I-805.
- F. Implement one-way cycle tracks along Eastgate Mall from Regents Rd and Judicial Dr.
- G. Implement wide, non-contiguous sidewalks along both sides of La Jolla Village Dr between Genesee Avenue and Town Centre Drive, where missing.
- H. Implement wide, non-contiguous sidewalks along Nobel Dr between Genesee Ave and Villa La Jolla Dr, where missing.
- Implement bike lanes along Costa Verde Blvd from La Jolla Village Dr and Nobel Dr.
- J. Convert Genesee Ave from I-5 NB Ramp to the SR-52 WB Ramp into a SMART Corridor with a flex lane in each direction that could be used for transit or HOV. The corridor may include transit signal priority, LPI, curb extensions, and protected intersections.

Trash Collection Fee Update


The city is moving forward with a new trash collection fee for single



In a 6-3 vote, the Council advanced the fee to a June 9 public hearing. The Council will have the option of either rejecting the fee entirely or reducing the fee from the current \$48 per month. Residents will have the opportunity to protest the fee under California law (Prop 218). Anyone household subject to the fee will receive a protest form in the mail soon After April 21. If 50% plus one of the households return the protest by mail prior to the June 9 hearing the city will not be able to impose the fee.

Many residents are concerned that they will not be able to afford another monthly expense. At the same time, the city is facing significant budget shortfalls over the next five years. If the fee is not imposed, the city will either raise revenue from other sources or make significant budget cuts.

State of the County Address Focuses on New Ideas in Challenging Times

San Diego County Board of Supervisors Vice Chair Terra Lawson-Remer gave the State of the County address during an evening presentation on Wednesday, April 16. Vice Chair Lawson-Remer focused her address challenges at the federal level and how they affect programs that impact San Diegans. She outlined proposals on how to support the County's health, behavioral health and homelessness programs, the environment, consumer protections and more.

Vice Chair Lawson-Remer told the audience she wants the County to start a Medicaid plan of its own, a managed health care plan that could come to fruition in four years. She said a local revenue measure could leverage \$1 billion a year to support the health program and other needs, like public safety, essential services, childcare for working families and expand inhome supportive services for the older adults.

The vice chair called for reform of the County's reserves policy to staff and equip the new public health lab. She supports a bill that would use border toll revenues to clean up the Tijuana River Valley and proposes using freed up County reserves to create a \$10 million matching fund to match state grants or philanthropic donations. The vice chair would like to create a new County Consumer Financial Protection Division to protect San Diegans and she's exploring the possibility of creating a public bank that could finance affordable housing. She closed by recognizing the efforts of County employees who serve the people in the region.

The live address took place at the San Diego Natural History Museum at Balboa Park and was available in American Sign Language at the venue, on social media channels and television. Don't Let Earthquakes Catch You Off Guard

Earthquake Warning California is the country's first publicly available, statewide warning system that could give California residents crucial seconds to take cover before you feel shaking. Managed by the Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES), Earthquake Warning California uses ground motion sensors from across the state to detect earthquakes before humans can feel them and can notify Californians to "Drop, Cover and Hold On" in advance of an earthquake.

The MyShake App is a free smartphone app that provides iPhone and Android users with audio and visual warnings [magnitude 4.5 or higher and Modified Mercalli Intensity III (weak) shaking]. To receive earthquake warnings, individuals and family members can download the MyShake App and ensure phone settings are adjusted to receive emergency alerts. Councilmember Kent Lee

In April, Mayor Todd Gloria released his Draft Fiscal Year 2026 Budget. Due to the City's ongoing fiscal challenges, the draft budget includes significant reductions across many departments and programs in order to achieve a balanced budget, including reductions to library and recreation center hours, public safety, and homelessness services.

On May 1, the City Council will hold its first Budget Review Committee. Having served as our Budget Chair, I take the responsibility of comprehensively reviewing the budget seriously and will especially want to understand how these reductions may impact University City and the broader District 6 community. I would encourage members of the public to come down to City Hall for the Budget Review Committee and share their feedback regarding the budget. I also invite you to join my office and the Independent Budget Analyst (IBA) for a **Budget Town Hall on May 12** at 6:30pm at the North University Community Library (8820 Judicial Drive). The IBA will break down the Mayor's Draft Budget, and it will be an opportunity for my office to gather important community feedback. contributions to the arts and his role in promoting cross-cultural unity through music.

Although symptoms of these disorders can appear at different times, they may result from abnormal brain development during critical periods early in life. Dr. Behrens focuses on the epigenomic control of neural circuit formation and disruption within the prefrontal cortex, an area of the brain responsible for decision-making and reasoning, from late pregnancy through adolescence. 
Advocacy for San Diego Public Libraries

The reader gets to find the birds on every page and count them." With "Truck Walk," McLean hopes to inspire not only a love of trucks and nature but also a lifelong appreciation for storytelling and shared moments between parents and children. "It's never too early to read to children," she said.

McLean and her husband, whose three adult sons attended Doyle Elementary, Standley Middle, and UC High, are about to celebrate their 49th wedding anniversary. Perhaps Kevin will mark the occasion with the perfect gift—a book.

UC Garden Club Gets Doused by Water

A little bit of spring showers didn't deter UC Garden Clubbers from visiting the home of Mark and Candace Powell and learn about their front yard water feature with drought resistant landscaping. It took Mark about five - six months of hard work in planning, designing, digging, laying weed barrier sheets, and finding the perfect rocks (see if you can spot the fake ones, and Craigslist is a great option) to make the waterfall front yard. Mark learned techniques through YouTube tutorials, talking to local pond shops, and help from his brother Frank. Neighbors also provided cuttings for the landscaping. By doing all the work himself, the Powell's costs added up to about \$3,000 as opposed to professional estimates of \$15,000+. The hard work has paid off, as the front yard waterfall has become a favorite stop on neighborhood walks and a focal point of the neighborhood - plus it's drought resistant.

Monarch Butterflies in Dire Straits by Mark Hughes,

The iconic Monarch is, metaphorically, barely hanging onto the edge of Extinction Cliff (um, note that in this metaphor, they can't fly). The average count the last three years was over 250,000. The 2024/2025 count was 9,119. And scientists say that a stable population requires millions. "The population's size is extremely concerning," said Emma Pelton, an endangered species biologist with the Xerces Society for Invertebrate Conservation. "We know small populations are especially vulnerable to environmental fluctuations, and we think that's what happened this year."

What can you do? Plant milkweed. Our local nurseries carry a variety, and it's best to go with native milkweed, not tropical. However, if you do want to plant tropical, note that it's critical to cut the stems down to about 10" in length in late December and to remove all leaves. This helps prevent a Monarch-specific disease from embedding itself into the population. You can also obtain seeds from the Save Our Monarchs Foundation (saveourmonarchs.org). And when you plant milkweed, please group several plants in close proximity, as the caterpillars like to go from one plant to another, buffet-style (the milkweed is always greener?) Thanks in advance for helping save this beautiful creature.

Summary of University City Planning Group Meeting - April 8, 2025

There were two information items on the agenda, a brief introduction from a new development team, Cass Street, for the former Costa Verde mall, and the Sorrento to Miramar double tracking project presented by SANDAG on behalf of LOSSAN, the San Louis Obispo to San Diego rail corridor.

Cass Street proposes to develop a mixed-use neighborhood on the Costa Verde site consisting of housing, office, and hospitality uses. Retail, including a market, pharmacy, and restaurants would generally be the ground floor use with underground parking specific to each building. New entrances and exits, with circulation for cars, bikes, and pedestrians would be created with walkability prioritized. Access to the Blue Line Trolley and transit center on the east side of the site would be enhanced. The current buildings on the site, except the gas station and McDonalds, would be demolished and regraded to create a gently sloping property with new sewer and utilities under a central north-south "Main Street" with new buildings east and west. This project is at the concept stage with more detail to be discussed at the May 13 UCPG meeting.

Our second item was the Sorrento to Miramar double tracking project, presented as an information item. This is a very complex project consisting of two parts: double tracking the rail segment between Sorrento and Miramar to increase the frequency of trains and straightening the curves along the track to increase speeds. SANDAG considers the project as both parts together. This project also involves an exchange of MSCP/MHPA open space between SANDAG owned parcels and City owned parcels, and the exchange of "old growth" MHPA land with "new growth" MHPA land, and the filling of a slice of the canyon along the tracks with thirty feet of fill from excavated land nearby. We are still learning about the project's environmental impacts and trade-offs and expect to hear an action item for it soon.

Next month at the UCPG we will hear an action item proposing to remap the former Costa Verde site and to repeal the previous Costa Verde master plan, both of which will be decided by the City Council. There will be a visit for UCPG board members in early May to familiarize it with the site. Seritage, the owner of the eastern 1/3 of UTC, will present an action item proposing to redraw the parcel maps on their site.



Morena Northern Pipelines and Tunnels Project Update

Thank you to the University City and Clairemont communities for patience and cooperation during a significant construction milestone as part of the City of San Diego Morena Northern Pipelines and Tunnels Project! From April 11-14, 2025, Genesee Avenue at State Route 52 was closed for around-the-clock pipeline installation. Construction progressed as planned and Genesee Avenue was re-opened to two-way traffic on schedule at the end of the weekend before the Monday morning commute.

Construction is also progressing on Genesee Avenue between Governor Drive and Decoro Street in University City. Construction crews are continuing installation of one 48-inch wastewater pipeline and one 30-inch brine pipeline. The cleanup of construction equipment and traffic control devices on Genesee Avenue between Governor Drive and Decoro Street is scheduled to take place by the end of May 2025. By the end of May 2025, both lanes in both directions will be open to traffic on Genesee Avenue from Governor Drive to Decoro Street, and construction activity will move northward to the intersection of Genesee and Nobel Drive. The community will be advised of any delays to this current schedule and the June newsletter will include more information about the next phase of construction at the intersection of Genesee and Nobel Drive.

Please plan extra time when traveling on Genesee Avenue. The City and project team are committed to completing construction as efficiently as possible with safety as our highest priority, and the community's patience and coordination are appreciated.

Air Station Miramar Matters

Community volunteers Chris Nielsen and Diane Ahern recently attended a Community Leaders Forum (CLF) briefing at the Air Station with Commanding Officer Colonel Herrmann and Community Liaison Officer Kristin Camper. Air Station visitors are likely to notice increased signage and security measures at the Main Gate, also known as the East Gate, near the I-15 on Miramar Way. There are ongoing construction projects throughout the Air Station including runway repairs and hanger maintenance.

The Marine Corps is tasked with maintaining combat readiness at all times. At Air Station Miramar, aircraft flight operations are likely to increase in the coming months as pilots and their crews train to advance their skills and proficiencies. At times, pilots fly after sunset and community members may hear and see aircraft flying around the Air Station at night.

CO Herrmann remains committed to ensuring that pilots are adhering to the Air Station flight path course rules as described in the Air Station AlCUZ (Air Installation Compatible Use Zone) study. The AlCUZ program is an extensive analysis of the effects of aircraft noise, aircraft accident potential, and land use development upon present and future neighbors of MCAS Miramar. My Personal Wildland Fire ACTION GUIDE



Fire Department Brush Management and Weed Abatement for Property Owners

The San Diego Fire-Rescue
Department Wildland
Management and Enforcement
section comprises of four
programs: the Weed Abatement
and Brush Complaint Program;

Real Estate Defensible Space Inspection Program; Proactive Door to Door Brush Management Program; and the Annual Weed Abatement Vacant Lot Program.

It is the property owner's responsibility to maintain their defensible space within 100 feet of habitable structures or up to their property line. A City right-of-entry permit is required for brush management activities in City-owned open space parks. The San Diego Fire-Rescue Department (SDFD) does not have the resources to conduct weed abatement on behalf of privately owned parcels within the City of San Diego.

Beginning July 1, 2025, SDFD will offer a Home Risk Assessment, an educational Defensible Space Inspection that provides homeowners valuable insight about the defensible space and the Zone Zero 5-foot ember resistance zone. The goal of this personalized service is to educate homeowners about the purpose of defensible space while making your home defensible and ember resistant against wildfires. With this approach, SDFD aims to make more homes defensible and insurable.

SDFD also provides the Ready, Set, Go! guide and emergency evacuation resources, red flag warnings, emergency notification systems, as well as low-cost home hardening tips and products on their website at: sandiego.gov/fire/community-risk-reduction/wildfire-preparedness



Lithium-ion batteries supply power to many kinds of devices including smart phones, laptops, e-scooters and e-bikes, e-cigarettes, smoke alarms, toys, and even cars. If not used correctly, or if damaged, these batteries can catch on fire or explode.

The problem

- These batteries store a large amount of energy in a small amount of space.
- Sometimes batteries are not used the right way; batteries not designed for a specific use can be dangerous.
- Like any product, a small number of these batteries are defective. They can overheat, catch fire, or explode.

Safety Tips

- Purchase and use devices that are listed by a qualified testing laboratory.
- Always follow the manufacturer's instructions.
- Only use the battery that is designed for the device.
- · Put batteries in the device the right way.
- Only use the charging cord that came with the device.
- Do not charge a device under your pillow, on your bed, or on a couch.
- Do not keep charging the device or device battery after it is fully charged.
- Keep batteries at room temperature when possible. Do not charge them at temperatures below 32°F (0°C) or above 105°F (40°C).
- Store batteries away from anything that can catch fire.

Signs of a Problem

Stop using the battery if you notice these problems: odor, change in color, too much heat, change in shape, leaking, or odd noises. If it is safe to do so, move the device away from anything that can catch fire. Call 9-1-1.

Battery Disposal

- Do not put lithium-ion batteries in the trash.
- Recycling is always the best option.
- Take them to a battery recycling location or contact your community for disposal instructions.
- Do not put discarded batteries in piles.

Charging an E-bike

Charge your battery in a flat, dry area away from children, direct sunlight, liquids, tripping hazards, and in a location where the e-bike is not at risk of falling.

Parks and Recreation - Brush Management for Rose and San Clemente Canyons

Of the 27,673 total acres of open space managed by the *Parks and Recreation Department* Open Space Division, approximately 916 acres are located within 100 feet of structures. Among other duties related to open space land management, the Open Space Division is responsible for conducting brush management (vegetation thinning) on City-owned open space adjacent to privately-owned lots, which are developed with "previously conforming" (legal) structures built before the establishment of the city's first brush management regulations in 1989.

In Rose and San Clemente Canyons, the Open Space Division conducts brush management in accordance with Section 142.0412 of the San Diego Municipal Code and the San Diego Fire-Rescue Department's Canyon Fire Safety guidelines and policies related to brush management. The AI dispatcher will allow you to format the noise complaint or burglary reports by saying "Format Event". You just follow the questions asked by the Ai dispatcher. Otherwise, the phone tree says you can "Ask a question." When you say "ask a question" it will inquire what you need.

You can ask for a dispatcher or agent. It will confirm you want to speak with a live person. Once you confirm this, it will put you in the queue to speak with a dispatcher.

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
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
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
